





Lector: A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews


By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace. And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets-- who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented-- of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground. Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, apart from us, be made perfect. Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

- To receive the consecrated bread, extend your hands upward, palms crossed and facing up.
- To receive the consecrated wine, please guide the chalice to your lips as it if offered. However, if you prefer, you may leave the consecrated bread in your palm and the Chalice bearer will intinct the host into the wine and place it on your tongue. Please do not personally intinct the host into the chalice.
- If you desire to receive Communion but are not able to come to the Altar rail, please notify an usher and the Priest and Chalice bearer will bring Communion to you.



HYMN/ANTHEM/MUSIC STORIES

"Make Them Hear You"

"Make Them Hear You" by Brian Stokes Mitchell is a powerful ballad that conveys a message of fighting for justice and equality. The song encourages the listener to tell their story, speak up, and make a lasting impact on future generations.

The opening lines, "Go out and tell our story, Let it echo far and wide," emphasize the importance of sharing



emphasize the importance of sharing the struggles and victories of marginalized communities. It urges individuals to raise their voices so that their experiences and perspectives are heard by a wider audience.

The lines, "How justice was our battle, And how justice was denied," allude to the injustices and systemic oppression faced by the community the song represents. It highlights the importance of seeking justice and equality, even in the face of denial or resistance.

The following lines, "And say to those who blame us, For the way we chose to fight, That sometimes there are battles, That are more than black or white," address the criticism often faced by individuals fighting for justice. It challenges the notion of oversimplifying complex issues and promotes a nuanced understanding of the struggles faced by marginalized communities.

The song also touches upon the theme of perseverance, as seen in the lyrics, "And I could not put down my sword, When justice was my right." It symbolizes the determination of the protagonist to continue the fight for justice, unwilling to back down despite hardships.

The chorus, "Go out and tell our story, To your daughters and your sons," emphasizes the importance of passing down stories and knowledge to future generations. It highlights the role of education and awareness in fostering empathy and understanding.

The lyrics, "Your sword can be a sermon, Or the power of the pen, Teach every child to raise his voice," suggest that activism can take various forms. Whether through vocal advocacy or written expression, individuals have the power to inspire and educate others to fight for justice.

The song concludes by expressing hope for a better future, when justice will be demanded by a multitude of individuals, as depicted in the line, "Will justice be demanded, By ten million righteous men." It implies that collective action and unity can pave the way for a more just society.

Overall, "Make Them Hear You" calls for the amplification of marginalized voices, encouragement to continue the fight for justice, and the importance of spreading awareness to future generations. It serves as a rallying cry for individuals to make a lasting impact on society and create a more equitable world.

"My Faith Looks Up To Thee"

Ray Palmer was a rather unhappy and lonely young man teaching school in New York City when he was inspired to write the words for this song. He wrote the words in a notebook that he kept in his pocket, and didn't give the matter much more thought. Ray Palmer, a later doctor of theology, and Lowell Mason, a doctor of music, met in Boston in 1830. Mason inquired to Palmer if he had any lyrics that could be inserted for Spiritual Songs for Social Worship, a compilation that was being prepared by Mason and Thomas Hastings for publication within a couple years.

Palmer presented Mason his leather book containing his poem, "My Faith Looks Up to Thee," originally in six stanzas. The two men walked into a shop so Mason could obtain a transcript of Palmer's words. It wasn't until he arrived home that evening that the forthwith celebrated stanzas were read, and Mason immediately wrote the tune OLIVET, the only melody ever performed with Palmer's poem.

Palmer believed his hymn flourished since it "embodied, in appropriate and simple language that which is most central in all true Christian experience—the act of faith in the divine Redeemer—the entrusting of the individual soul to Him entirely and forever"
