On Sanctuary and Care for All

I must have been 11 or 12 years old when I picked up a book from my grandmother's side table and soon found myself immersed in the anxiousness of *The Hiding Place*, Corrie Ten Boom's memoir of her family's involvement with the Dutch Resistance during WWII. When neighboring Germany's Third Reich invaded the Netherlands and reigned by terror, Corrie and her family came to assist as many as 800 Jewish people in escaping arrest and deportation to Nazi concentration and death camps. The Ten Booms built a secret room behind a false wall in their home—a hiding place—to harbor vulnerable ones. The name of the secret room and the book title were taken from Psalm 119:114—*You are my hiding place and my shield; I hope in your word.*

As people rooted deeply in their Christian faith, the Ten Booms could not turn away from sheltering their endangered neighbors. Motivated by their commitment to Christ, they felt compelled to risk their own lives to act righteously. When their resistance work was discovered, Corrie, her sister Betsie, and their father, Casper were taken into custody by the Gestapo and held in camps where Casper and Betsie perished. Corrie survived her imprisonment at Ravensbruck. For the rest of her life, she would speak of her release as being a Divine intervention. In the aftermath of the war, she learned that her release had been erroneous and that she had been destined for the gas chamber.

It's an inspiring tale. And a chilling one as well.

While I don't mean to imply a direct correlation between then and now, I'm aware of chilling news stories in our present era, especially when it comes to the treatment of undocumented people. With ultra-zealous responses from the U.S. Immigration Customs and Enforcement Agency (ICE) toward non-citizens within our nation's borders, mistakes are being made. Compliant immigrants are being deported without due process, sometimes to notorious facilities outside of the United States where human rights are not given consideration. Today I learned that three young children who are U.S. citizens have been deported along with their non-citizen mothers who, upon arrest, were not given the opportunity to speak with their families or their lawyers. One of the children is a cancer patient now separated from medicine and medical care. This is heartless.

Jesus compels us to act with compassion toward the people on the margins (Matthew 25:40). You could make the connection that Jesus' teachings are based on earlier Godly precedents such as: *The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself...*(Leviticus 19:34).

It is with such imperatives in mind that our Board of Elders feels led to make a statement: Since our Moravian motto ends with "in all things love," it is who we are and is a call to follow Jesus's example of caring for the least of these. We are called to welcome the stranger and to help those in need. In that love, we as fellow children of a Loving God, offer sanctuary and care to all who come to our community for help and safety. "In all things love" is more than a motto; it is a call to Peace and Justice as a church and as followers of Christ.

May we continue on a compassionate path,

Pastor Chris continues to schedule worship assistants for the coming months. This time around, a signup sheet has been posted on her office door—so check your calendars and sign up for your preferred dates. And if you've never assisted and would like to, go ahead and sign up for a Sunday!

SANCTUARY FLOWER CHANGES

Over the last year or so, if you have sponsored flowers, you have noticed the price of fresh flowers has increased. When the first increase occurred, the price increased to \$40.00 a vase. Many of you made the decision not to sponsor flowers as often, due to the price. This January, the church received a letter from our florist that there would be another increase for our weekly flowers in February 2025. Our florist is losing money due to the increase cost of gas for delivery, labor and the cost of the flowers. Our florist has attempted to keep cost for churches down by providing flowers that are colorfully out of season or that they have on hand. (For example, you may have

noticed the pink and yellow flowers during Advent.) As of February 1, 2025 the price per vase of flowers will be \$55.00 for Florist Color Choice (\$50.00 for the flowers and \$5.00 for delivery) and \$60.00 for Seasonal Colors (\$55.00 for the flowers and \$5.00 for delivery). These prices are guaranteed for two years.

A conversation began to determine any alternatives we could offer to members who no longer want to pay the increased cost of flowers, but still want to be able to do something in memory or honor of a loved one. We did not want to take away the opportunity for families to order fresh flowers but we also felt there should be options for families to make a donation. You can make a \$25.00 donation in memory or in honor of a loved and you can choose one of the following areas to designate the funds to: Weekly Bulletins, Silk Flower Replenishing, Welcoming Ministry Team (Receptions, Visitor Bags, Children's Worship Bags), Technology and Fellowship Hall Refurbishing.

There is a new form for you to fill out and include with your payment for your choice of either Sanctuary Flowers or a designated donation. Your request and payment in full must be placed in the lock box in Fellowship Hall 4–6 weeks before the date requested. The forms will be available in the Narthex, Fellowship Hall, and the church office.

Carol Messina has been the voice on the other side of the phone asking if you would like to sponsor Sanctuary flowers for quite a while. Carol has decided to step aside from calling as with this venture there is no need to call. A very special thank you to Carol Messina for her time and effort in calling people to sponsor the Sanctuary flowers.

Acceptable plastics:

- Newspaper sleeves
- Plastic e-commerce mailers
- Dry cleaning bags
- Bubble wrap & air pillows
- Case overwrap
- Salt & wood pellet bags
- Pallet wrap & stretch film

Plastic NOT acceptable:

- Plastic bottles (water, soda, etc.)
- Degradable/compostable bags
- Prewashed salad mix bags
- Frozen food bags
- Candy bar wrappers
- Chip bags
- Dried fruit & nut bags
- Produce bags such as used for grapes
- Six-pack rings
- Pouch packaging
- If material easily is shiny & crinkles or crunches
- If material does not stretch easily

THERE WAS NO ROOM AT THE INN...

Since 1987, MORAVIAN OPEN DOOR (MOD) has provided a temporary home for homeless adults in Manhattan, NYC.

This ministry provides safe and affordable transitional housing for 40 homeless adults. MOD provides a healthful breakfast and supportive social services to rebuild our residents' lives. MOD helps them to obtain jobs and benefits, with the goal of finding permanent affordable housing and learning the life skills to maintain it.

Residents at Moravian Open Door pay a small monthly fee for their room and services (often much of their limited income); this covers only about 50% of the operating costs for the facility and its full-time staff of three.

Moravian Open Door receives no government funds. Donations from individuals, congregations, and other private sources must cover the rest of operating expenses.

Gifts may also be made on the MOD website www.moravianhouse.org, or online via the Moravian Ministries Foundation in America Giving Portal https://mmfa.info/giving-portal/. On the MMFA Portal, scroll to the section GIVE NOW to a Specific organization

or Ministry where Moravian Open Door has a tab. MMFA will absorb any fees for the donation.

FIVE WAYS TO GIVE

The Moravian Ministries Foundation in America has generously agreed to begin paying all processing fees charged for online gifts made through the Moravian Giving Portal. While the Foundation itself has never charged any kind of fee, the backend processor, Blackbaud Merchant Services, charged a processing fee like others who perform this service. Now, this processing fee will no longer be withheld, so our church will get the full balance of gifts given via the Moravian Giving Portal. As a reminder, there are several different ways to provide your offerings:

- **1.** Bring your offering to Sunday worship. Gifts can be offered whether you attend via "Parking Lot Worship" or worship in the pews.
- **2.** Mail your offering to the church office at College Hill Moravian Church, 72 W. Laurel St., Bethlehem, PA 18018.
- **3.** Use your bank's "bill pay" service. A one-time or recurring payment can be made by a bank on your behalf. Banks that offer this service typically cut a check and mail it to the church at no cost to you. Contact your bank for details.
- 4. Make an online payment through the Moravian Giving Portal https://mmfa.info/giving-portal/
 Go to this link, click on our church's name, and follow the instructions to make a one-time gift or a recurring monthly gift. Donations can be made by members and non-members via direct debit of a bank account or by credit card. All donation processing fees for portal gifts are now paid by the Moravian Ministries Foundation, so your full donation will be received by our church.

5. Make an online payment through Realm. Members can direct debit funds monthly from their bank account to the church's bank account. Realm charges a fee for processing the contribution, so users may wish to add 1% more to their offerings to offset this fee. Check out the Realm page on our church website for a video tutorial and instructions.
