Maria Montessori

Maria Montessori was a doctor of medicine and one of the foremost educators of our time. After her graduation from medical school in 1896, Dr. Montessori became interested in the study of children who were deemed unable to be educated. In 1907, she opened the famous Casa dei Bambini in Rome, Italy. Dr. Montessori opened this school based on her discovery that children follow a developmental pattern of human potential from the moment of conception.

In the years following, and for the rest of her life, Maria dedicated herself to advancing her child-centered approach to education. She lectured widely, wrote articles and books, and developed a program to prepare teachers in the Montessori Method. Through her efforts and the work of her followers, Montessori education was adopted worldwide.

Dr. Montessori's teachings and work are born of exacting research and study throughout her life. They are founded in medical principles and grounded in spirit. Dr. Montessori devoted herself to life, not just an education system. It is for that reason she did not want herself aligned with the word "method". Dr. Montessori has proven that the child is universal and all children of all countries of the world are born with the "absorbent mind". Montessori education has proven itself in every known culture of the world regardless of race, creed, religion or nationality.

3. Compilation of Manuals: Notes will be handed out in class.
4. Lecture notes, taken by you, will be compiled into a notebook along with written assignments.
5. Observations of Montessori indoor and outdoor environments as assigned during the course. Written reports will be required in conjunction with these.
6. Several assignments will be announced during the training. These include, but are not limited to: Preparation of an Original Practical Life Exercise, Preparation of Reading Materials, and Preparation of Math Problem Cards for use with the Montessori Mathematic Materials.
7. Tests and/or quizzes on Practical Life, Sensorial, Mathematics, Language, Montessori Philosophy and Terminology.
8. Independent practice, with the Montessori materials, will be recorded. Additional opportunity to work with the equipment will be arranged.
9. Final Examination:
 - Oral Examination: A demonstration of your ability to use the Montessori materials.
 - Written Examination: A written understanding of the philosophy of the Montessori Education and the theory of the materials.
10. Internship: Student teaching in an approved Montessori School

The amount of time spent on independent study varies according to each individual. Our policy is to assist each student in meeting the course requirements and in becoming a successful Montessori teacher.

Upon successful completion of the course work, internship, practicum, oral and written examination, and meeting payment obligations, you will receive a Montessori Teaching Certificate from Santa Monica Montessori Institute.

- Proof of Finances:

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) requires the Santa Monica Montessori Institute to provide an estimate of what it would cost you to live and be a student in the United States for a minimum of 12 months. You are then obligated to provide evidence that you are able to meet these financial requirements. Funds must meet or exceed the estimated expenses.

Please provide us with evidence that you are able to meet these financial requirements. This evidence is usually submitted in the form of personal bank statements or other sources of income outside the United States.

The Santa Monica Montessori Institute estimates the total average cost for a 12 month period to be \$48,000.00

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F-1 Student Visa Requirements

The requirements for an F-1 visa are:

- Apply and be accepted into a course of study at a [SEVP-approved](#) school in the United States
- You must be enrolled as a full-time student at the institution
- You must be proficient in English or be enrolled in courses leading to English proficiency
- Have proof of sufficient financial funds to support study in the United States, for at least the 1st year – SMMI estimates \$38,315.00/Year (2024)
- Have ties to your home country that show an intent to return after you finish studying in the United States, since the F-1 visa program is a temporary visa
- Live outside the United States when you apply. (Or request for a “[Change of Status](#)” if applying from within the United States)
- Pay the SEVIS and I-20 Processing fee

F-1 Visa Interview Requirements:

- Unexpired Passport valid for six months beyond the intended date of entry into the United States
- The Form DS-160 confirmation page: <https://ceac.state.gov/genniv/>
- Application fee payment receipt
- A photo that conforms to U.S. State Department requirements
- Form I-20 that was issued to you by your academic institution

You should also be prepared to bring evidence of:

- Transcripts, diplomas, degrees, or certificates from schools you attended
- Proof of ties to your home country, as well as proof of funds to support you and pay for your studies while you are in the United States – If you have a sponsor in the U.S. they will need to fill out Form I-134: Declaration of Financial Support - <https://www.uscis.gov/i-134>



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Interview Process:

During your interview, the consular officer will ask you questions, to determine whether or not to approve your F-1 visa. Make sure you are complete and accurate in your answers, as you will be under oath.

The consular officer will also take your fingerprints, although this will vary depending on your location. After your visa interview, the consular officer may determine that your application requires further administrative processing. The consular officer will let you know if this is required.

Once your interview is complete, you will be informed of the outcome and, if successful, be issued a visa to study in the United States.
