### It's TIME to READ!

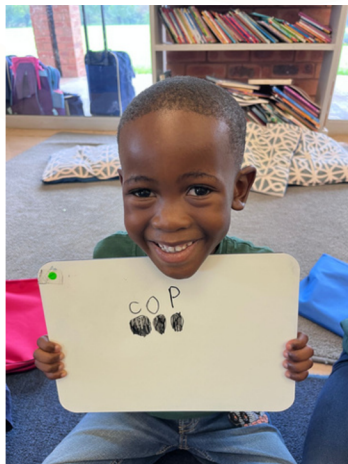

## Academic Benchmarking & ADvLEARN

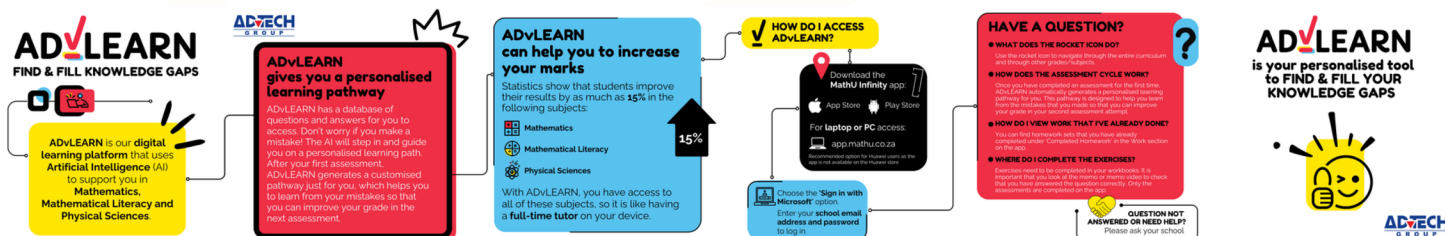

This international benchmarking assessment in English and Mathematics provides valuable insights into pupils' strengths and areas requiring further support. By identifying these key focus areas, we can implement targeted interventions, ensuring both teachers and parents can better assist each pupil's academic journey.

Our pupils also showcased their skills in various academic competitions, including the English, Mathematics, and Computer Applications Technology Olympiads. A standout moment this term was our Escape Room Mathematics Week, which challenged pupils to apply problem-solving and logical thinking in an engaging and interactive way.



To support effective learning strategies, we hosted a Study Skills Workshop, equipping pupils with valuable techniques to enhance their study habits and academic performance.

We continue to encourage the use of the ADvLEARN platform for Mathematics and Physical Sciences. This invaluable resource provides real-time feedback, highlights problem areas, and offers concept videos to aid revision. By reinforcing classroom learning in an interactive manner, ADvLEARN remains an essential tool for academic support and extension.



To ensure our teaching remains aligned with the latest educational developments, all our teachers attended the IEB regional and national conferences this term. These sessions provided valuable insights and updates, ensuring that the newest information from the IEB is effectively implemented in our classrooms.

## Maths Week in the High School

This year our theme for Maths week was Escape Room where pupils had to solve the puzzles to escape the room to make it to the next round. Our second breaks were jam-packed with fun activities which needed intense brain activity as teams applied their mathematical skills. On Pi Day, the last two remaining teams solved a murder mystery using a few Maths formulae. Congratulations to Team Sigma, the champions of 2025! We are also super proud of all the pupils who participated in the Maths Olympiad during the busy Maths week.

### Human Rights Day 2025 talk in assembly

Good Morning school. I am Nikhil and joining me today is Lefa. Today we will be providing valuable insights on Human Rights Day. In South Africa, Human Rights Day is observed annually on March 21st, commemorating the 1960 Sharpeville Massacre and the fight for liberation from apartheid. It's a day to reflect on the sacrifices made and the ongoing pursuit of human rights.

In the South African Context: Human rights day commemorates the Sharpeville Massacre, where peaceful anti-apartheid protesters, majority of whom were school pupils, were shot and killed by police, highlighting the apartheid government's human rights abuses. The importance and origin of Human Rights Day stems from its roots in the Sharpeville Massacre, serves as a reminder of the sacrifices made and the fight for a more just and democratic South Africa. It is a day to reflect on the progress of human rights, to ensure that human rights are protected and strengthened for future generations, and to promote a culture of human rights. The 2025 theme for Human Rights Month is "Deepening a culture of social justice and human rights". But, what are human rights? Human rights are fundamental freedoms and rights that are inherent to all human beings, regardless of race, sex, nationality, ethnicity, language, religion, or any other status.

South Africa recognizes a broad set of human rights in its Constitution, particularly in the Bill of Rights (Chapter 2 of the Constitution), which outlines 27 fundamental rights.

A few of these Human rights in South Africa include:

- Freedom of speech,
- Freedom of peaceful assembly,
- Freedom of peaceful movement,
- Rights to basic education, housing, water and sanitation

Other rights include the right to privacy, Human dignity, religious freedom, no slavery, citizenship, and children's rights.

Each of us can enhance human rights by standing up against injustice, amplifying the voices of the marginalized, and committing to equality and dignity for all, every day. With every human right comes a responsibility. And Lefa will now discuss the responsibilities that are associated with these human rights.

We often talk about human rights, but what we don't discuss enough are the responsibilities that come with these rights. Having rights doesn't mean we can do whatever we want without consequence. It means we must respect the rights of others. If we have the right to free speech, we also have the responsibility to use our words wisely, without spreading hate or misinformation. If we have the right to education, we have the responsibility to learn, to grow, and to contribute positively to society. If we have the right to freedom, we must ensure that our actions don't take away someone else's freedom or dignity.

Every right we enjoy comes with a duty to uphold those same rights for others. We cannot demand equality while treating others unfairly. We cannot expect justice while turning a blind eye to injustice. True human rights are not just about what we deserve—they are about how we treat others, how we uplift those around us, and how we build a society where fairness and respect are the norm. A fair and just world isn't created by demanding rights alone but by actively upholding the responsibilities that come with them. It starts with us—our actions, our choices, and our willingness to protect not just our own rights, but those of others.

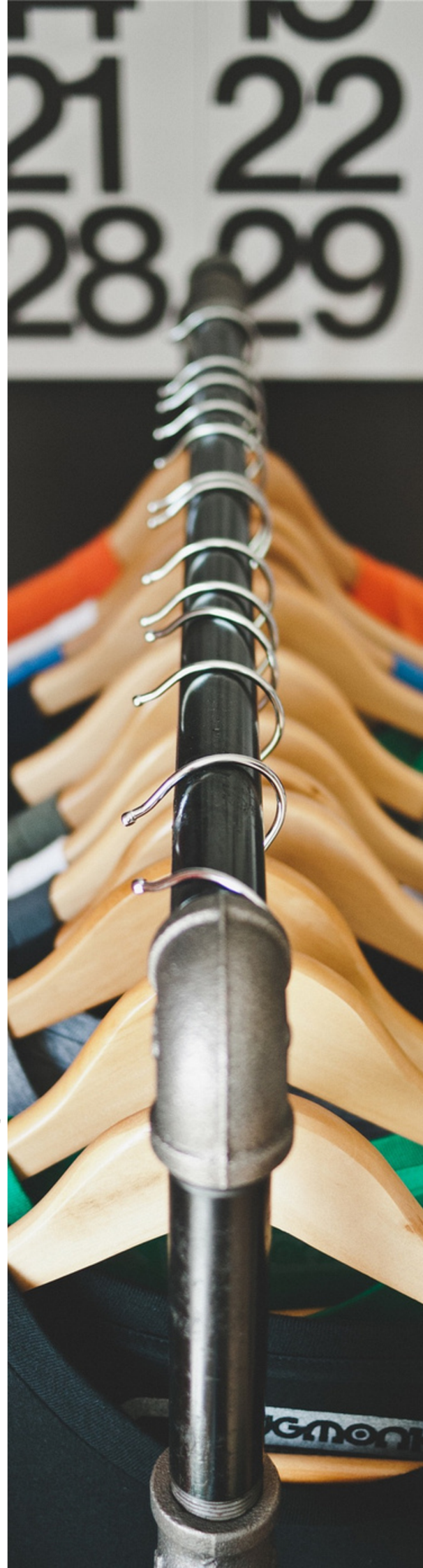
