Spring Pasta Salad Recipe

Ingredients:

10 ounces large shell pasta

1 1/2 cups radishes, sliced

1 cucumber, thinly sliced

1 cup green pepper, diced

1 1/2 cups carrots, peeled and sliced

1/4 cup onion, diced

1 ½ cups mayonnaise

2/3 cup sugar

2 teaspoon dill weed

2 tablespoon vinegar

Directions:

Cook pasta according to directions. Drain.
Combine pasta and vegetables in a large bowl.
In a small bowl, combine mayo, sugar, dill weed, and vinegar. Pour over vegetables and stir until combined. Chill for at least 2 hours. ■

2023 Holiday Schedule and No-Tag Weeks

If a holiday falls during the week, trash and recycling collection takes place on the day following the holiday, and collection for the remaining days of the week also takes place one day later than usual. Friday trash is collected on

Saturday during such weeks. This one-day push is called the holiday schedule.

During winter weather, recycling and trash operations might be suspended. Under the City's stronger snow policy, KCMO suspends collection during big storms to make those drivers available for snow plowing. If this is the case, the holiday schedule goes into effect; check kcmo.gov/snow.

No-tag ("trash amnesty") weeks happen twice a year and on special occasions. During those weeks, residents can put out up to 12 bags curbside without any additional tags as long as each bag weighs less than 40 pounds. Regular trash rules apply. No hazardous waste, bulky items, or leaf and brush will be collected.

No collection occurs on the following holidays, with a one-day delay all week except as noted:

Martin Luther King Jr. Day: Jan. 16

Presidents Day: Feb. 20 Memorial Day: May 29 Juneteenth: June 19 Independence Day: July 4

Amnesty Week/No-tag pickup will run Wednesday, July 5 through Saturday, July 9, and Monday July 10. 12 bags will be collected.

Labor Day: Sept. 4

Veterans Day: Nov. 10 – No impact on collection Thanksgiving Day: Nov. 23 – Thursday collection

will take place on Friday

Day after Thanksgiving: Nov. 24 – Friday collection will take place on Saturday, Nov. 25

Christmas Day: Dec. 25

Amnesty Week/No-tag pickup will occur Tuesday, Dec. 26 through Saturday, Dec. 30. 12 bags will be collected.

New Year's Day: Jan. 1

An Open Letter to the WPNA Board of Directors

My late wife and I moved to West Plaza in 1972, before the neighborhood had its own identity. Folks would say, "I live in Kansas City, on Genessee Street," but they had no concept of West Plaza as a separate community within the context of the larger city. Today, neighbors proudly say "I live in West Plaza." When we arrived here 50 years ago. West Plaza was sleepy and rundown, populated mostly by elderly retirees. Over 70 percent of the homes were rentals, most of them owned by absentee landlords, and many in poor condition. Today, we see most of the older homes rehabbed, with new homes springing up in their midst. Property values are on the rise. This phenomenon did not occur by accident but resulted from years of concerted effort by West Plaza residents.

Over the years, West Plaza, led by its neighborhood association, has met numerous challenges, including negligent absentee landlords, drug houses, crime, liquor licenses, and ill-conceived commercial development. We have overcome these challenges by presenting a strong, unified front. Although the WPNA has no official authority to write or enforce City ordinances, City officials do look to us for advice. They recognize that we are well-organized, and that our opinion matters because we vote.

Humans are social creatures. The survival of a healthy community depends on the cooperation and companionship of others. Our neighborhood is made of much more than a collection of houses; most importantly, it is a community of neighbors who live in those houses, a group of people cooperating toward common goals. The goal of our West Plaza Neighborhood Association is "to improve the quality of life in the West Plaza Neighborhood," and our motto is, "We look out for each other." Any action taken by the Association should be predicated upon these principles. We must always ask, "What is the best thing for the most people?"

Right now, our neighborhood is faced with a problem of real concern: the proliferation of short term rentals, most of them owned and operated by out-of-town corporations. Houses no longer occupied by permanent or even semi-permanent residents now serve overnight guests, strangers

who have no concern for the neighborhood whatever, who are merely seeking a place to party or to spend the night. In most cases, there is no on-site manager watching over their "guests" to monitor the activities that take place in these houses. As you may imagine, this is a formula for disaster. The potential for criminal activity with unsupervised strangers coming and going is significant.

A recent report by the City Auditor states that there are approximately 4,175 short term rental units in Kansas City, with only about 7% of them registered. There are at least 60 STRs already operating in West Plaza, with fewer than 6% registered, and there is currently no limit to how many more there may be. Although the City Council has passed a few basic ordinances to regulate short term rentals, the City has neither the money nor the staff to ensure compliance with the ordinances. In a report of findings published on January 27, 2023, the Kansas City Neighborhood Advisory Council (KCNAC) stated, "The depopulation associated with this trend results in fewer registered voters, lower census counts, reduced school enrollment, and shrinks revenues needed for local infrastructure and basic services."

On a more personal level, each house full of strangers is that many fewer real neighbors who care about you and your family, who can watch your house or feed your dog when you are away, who can call the police when they see something fishy going on, who can help you in an emergency, or who may be not only your neighbor but your friend. In the long run, isn't this what a neighborhood is all about?

By replacing real neighbors with transient visitors, short term rentals pose a serious threat to the integrity of the wonderful neighborhood our neighbors worked so hard to build. Until the City has the means to limit and regulate short term rentals, I suggest that they ban them altogether. Other cities have done this. I urge the West Plaza Neighborhood Association to take a strong stand on this issue. Ask yourselves, "What is the best thing for the most people?"

Kansas City Neighborhood Advisory Council Meeting Notes

On January 19, 2023, the Kansas City Neighborhood Advisory Council (KCNAC) held its monthly general meeting at the Southeast Community Center. KCNAC was formed in 2003 to advise governing bodies "in the development and implementation of public policy impacting the quality of life for Kansas City residents." Each district is represented by a volunteer director. Until redistricting takes effect this August, West Plaza is in the Fourth District and our KCNAC director is Kate Barsotti.

City Auditor Douglas Jones spoke about Part II of his office's November-December 2022 audit related to short-term rentals. Part I was a topic at KCNAC's December 2022 general meeting. The full text of each may be accessed here and

<u>here.</u> Both audits informed the City's decision to impose license fees on short-term rentals which will be put to a vote on April 4, 2023. The ballot language may be found <u>here.</u>

Tiffany Moore, co-director of KCNAC, presented main ideas from the advisory council's researched and recommended proposals regarding the governance of short-term rentals.
