

A Quick & Easy Guide to the Stewardship & Capital Campaigns:

"We Are Not the Same Thing"

As we near the *end* of our annual stewardship campaign, "Peculiar People, Precious Gifts," and the *beginning* of our capital campaign, "From Heritage to Horizon," I thought it might be wise to take a moment to differentiate them, as they are not the same thing. Both are very important. Both have me excited about our future here at CCoB. I would strongly encourage you to give generously to both. But they are not the same thing.

So here is a quick and easy guide. I hope this is helpful. If you have any questions, you can always ask me, our Moderator Lucinda Page, our Vice Moderator Jen Larson Angelini, or our Capital Campaign co-Chairs Mark Weiss and Ann Alexander.



Annual Stewardship Campaign:

- Runs from September 7 through October 5 (although you can pledge anytime)
- This is the effort we make every year to build and fund a budget for the year to come, 2026 in this case.
- The money we collect goes toward things like:
- o Staff Salaries
- o Regular utilities, like electricity, water, and internet connection
- o Children's & Youth ministry events
- o Music for the choir, as well as musical guests
- o Worship & Arts
- Annual donations to local and world charities through our Outreach Team
- o Regularly scheduled maintenance to the building, inspections, and unexpected repairs

It may not sound exciting, but this is the heartbeat of our daily ministry at CCoB.



The 2025 Capital Campaign:

- Runs from October 19 through December 7 (although you can pledge any time)
- Is a once a decade effort to fund major building repairs and upgrades that are necessary for CCoB to continue doing effective ministry into the future
- Collects money that will go towards things like:
- o Paying off the loan we drew to replace our 80 year old boiler, fix the leaking roof, and extend our stewardship calling by installing solar panels on the roof
- o Paying for tuck pointing to restore and protect our historic church building
- o Upgrading the outdated audio and visual technology in the sanctuary
- o Refurbishing parts of Paxton Hall for our events, but also as a place to extend hospitality to our neighbors.
- o Making our church more accessible and friendly by upgrading the person lift, improving entrances, and adding signage to make it easier to navigate the church

A capital campaign is for the larger projects that allow us to honor the work and the vision of those faithful who came before us, as we step into God's future.

Capital Campaign Projects Status



Solar panel installation: It has been quite a while since we voted to purchase and install solar panels as an act of civic and ecological responsibility: our attempt to lessen our footprint on the environment. So where does that project stand all these months later? Good news! The permitting process for installing the solar panels included getting approval

from the Batavia Historic Preservation Commission as well as a building permit from the city. We got an enthusiastic OK from the Batavia Historic Preservation Commission, and then the city council actually needed to pass a new ordinance to allow *all* electric customers in the city, including the CCOB, to install renewable energy. The existing rules allowed only residential and small business customers to do so. With that done, the city could finally issue the building permit for our solar project. *What's next?* We're waiting for the solar panels to be delivered, so that installation can be scheduled. We hope to have a fully functioning system by the end of the year!

And the current Capital Campaign activity? So glad you asked! Our consultant, Aaron, is helping us build teams and prepare the team members to kick off the pledge campaign in mid-October.

Your two campaign chairs, Ann Alexander and Mark Weiss, have recruited Dave Hummel and Matt Wicks to be the Gift Gathering Team Captains. They will recruit their Gift Gathering Teams in the next couple of weeks. Why is this important before we kick off the actual fundraising? The more folks we have lined up to contact members during the campaign, the lighter the load will be on everyone. This is not about strong-arming folks to give, but rather about answering questions (and gathering feedback) to remind folks or help newer folks understand why we have set the admittedly ambitious goal for capital gifts during the next three years, over and above what our congregation pledges for the annual budget, which is covered by the stewardship campaign that was moved up to September this year.

We have filled the chairperson slots for most of the support teams: Prayer — Jean Deptolla, Youth — Suzy Daly, Communications — Lisa Youngdahl, and Creative Giving — Lynne Potter. We will give you more information about joining one of these teams in the coming weeks, but please feel free to reach out to the team at capitalcampaign@congregationalchurch.org, or talk to Paige, Ann, or Mark at any time if any of these roles sound interesting to you.

The campaign kicks off officially on Sunday, October 19, with a post-service celebration event from 11 to noon or so. This marks when the Gift Gathering Teams kick into gear. We will hold several forums and seminars in October and November, giving folks plenty of opportunities to consider the needs we're intending to cover, ask any questions they might have, and provide information about creative ways to give to the campaign. Commitment Sunday on December 7 will celebrate the pledges received by that date.

Remember, these pledges constitute intentions to give to the capital campaign fund. As Paige has mentioned in her announcements, this is separate from the annual stewardship pledges we are all being asked to make for operating funds to cover running the church in 2026. If you are moved to give during 2025 you are welcome to do so, but we are taking capital campaign pledges that can be completed anytime over the next 3 years, including a lump sum payment in 2028 if that is what works best for you.

We ask that you prayerfully consider not only your budget, but what the Congregational Church of Batavia means to you and how you can help guarantee that it continues to serve its congregation and the local community. Stay tuned!
