Autumn is a remarkably busy time in the church year. Each Sunday service leading up to Advent has its own theme. On the last Sunday of October, we celebrate the Reformation marking the anniversary of Martin Luther posting his 95 Theses in 1517, which protested perceived abuses in the Catholic Church and is considered a pivotal event in the split of Western Christianity.

All Saints Sunday is the first Sunday in November, honoring all saints, both known and unknown, and is a day that we at CCoB remember and celebrate those who have died. We will ring a bell and light a candle as each name is read. If there is a name of someone you would like to have included call or email the church office by Wednesday, October 29.

On November 9 during morning worship, representatives from the three charities selected by the Outreach team for the 2025 Gift Festival will give brief presentations about their organization.

Because we celebrate Thanksgiving on the Sunday before the actual day, November 23, and this year it is also the last Sunday of the church's liturgical calendar year, November 16 will be Reign of Christ Sunday, also known as Christ the King Sunday, celebrating authority of Christ as king over all creation and the Church.

What Do You Fear? A Good Question for Advent and Today

Every time Advent rolls around again, it always feels a little bit dissonant to me. At exactly the time that everyone is preparing for the joy of the Christmas season...decorating their homes with colorful lights, wrapping bright packages, singing cheery carols, and planning meals and parties with friends and family...our tradition calls to us to remember the reality of the darkness in which we live, the grief, the pain, the fear that are often parts of human life. The very first Sunday of Advent is always an apocryphal reading, where the earth rumbles, and the heavens tear open, and everything we thought we could trust is upended. The season of hope, ironically but appropriately, begins by naming those things that scare us the most.

This year we will once again be using A Sanctified Art's program for Advent called this year "What Do You Fear?" It's a timely question for the season of Advent and also for the season we find ourselves in right now. There's a lot that is frightening out there. And the message of Advent is the message the angels deliver, again, and again, and again in our scriptures, "Do not be afraid!" The Good News of Advent and Christmas is that the God who has journeyed with Their people for generations shows up again, in the person of Jesus Christ, to journey the dark, difficult roads by our side.

Join us this Advent season, beginning on Sunday, November 30. And do not be afraid.

Justice and Witness



Bob Huxtable alerted us to a possible \$10,000 grant available to 60 churches. The following is a rough draft of the J&W proposal:

Our mission: we hope to help those in our area who are struggling or lonely.

We would like to host a monthly "Community Dinner". This would provide not only good food and fellowship, but a chance to ask "how can we help?". We could be a resource for various services (simple home repair, rides to appointments, etc.), as well as providing financial help through gift cards (like gas, groceries, school supplies), and perhaps limited emergency rental assistance. Our expenses would also include the cost of the dinner. If we receive this generous \$10,000 grant, it could be administered by a small committee under the umbrella of the Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

We already have our monthly **Administer Justice Legal Clinic**, which might be another gateway to the needs of those people. On Oct. 17, Heather Hamilton, Jean Stone and Ann Alexander were among 500 who attended the annual Administer Justice Fundraising Dinner celebrating 50 years of providing legal aid across the country to many people who otherwise couldn't afford it. This was a very powerful presentation that made us proud that the CCOB is one of the churches committed to this cause.

Another good cause was the food drive to help many immigrant families living in fear. We were one of three churches in the Tri-cities accepting specially requested foods/supplies on Saturday, October 11. Karon Van Gelder, Sue Price and I, plus several volunteers from elsewhere, were able to fill one SUV and half a pickup truck, thanks to many generous drivers who dropped off donations. Everything was delivered to a secret location in Elgin, and from there delivered directly to families in need. We hope to be the designated drop off for Batavia once each month. Our "Blessing Boxes" project for Hanover Park will resume after the holidays.






Elderday along with singing some Halloween songs for the clients.

United in Spirit and inspired by God's grace, we welcome all, love all, and seek justice for all. We are the United Church of Christ.

The rise of civil unrest, and extreme violence, coupled with disruptions from climate change around the world mean that increasingly people are forced to leave their homelands to seek safety and a secure future for their children elsewhere. The reasons for leaving are diverse and complex: extreme poverty, threats from gang violence, war and religious or social persecution, or devastation from droughts and extreme weather. As the United Church of Christ, we have a moral responsibility to walk alongside immigrants and welcome them to be part of our church, no matter what their immigration status, and no matter where they are on life's journey.

As Christians, we are called to love our neighbors. The Bible is unambiguous in calling us to welcome aliens and strangers in our land, and to love them as we love ourselves. In these times, let us listen to the voice of the still-speaking God. We will learn how to respond to these new sisters and brothers residing among us.

The United Church of Christ has a long history of solidarity in the struggle for dignity and human rights for immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees regardless of their immigration status. We do this through a network of grassroots leaders in the UCC National Collaborative on Immigration (sign up here) working to share a prophetic stance and lift up the voices of impacted leaders. General Synod Resolutions over the last decades show the continued support from our denominations. We also work at the federal level to advocate for just and equitable immigration policies.

One way to keep momentum going is to have constantly greater goals.
