

Our church is investigating the feasibility of installing a hearing loop system in our sanctuary. A hearing loop system allows those with hearing aids equipped with a telecoil to connect directly to the sound system audio. This would make it much easier tor hearing aid users to hear the service, the announcements, and follow the sermon.

Before we proceed further with this study, it would be helpful to know how many of our congregation members would benefit from this kind of a system. About 70% of hearing aids have a telecoil, and you should ask your audiologist about options for your particular hearing device.

#### **Justice**



Since the last J&W report, the three churches (including CCOB) that had taken on the mission to ensure local law enforcement would not aid illegal ICE activities, hosted a program on November 24 at the Unitarian Church in Geneva to provide information on the rights of immigrants and bystanders. Rebecca Glenberg, a well-credentialed attorney from the **ACLU**, gave an excellent presentation. The main takeaways: immigrants and bystanders have the right to remain silent and are urged to document/photograph ICE activities, as long as they don't interfere and stand at least 4 feet away. ICE search and seizure is not allowed without a judicial warrant, nor can they enter private areas of the workplace.

She explained the Illinois **TRUST ACT** forbids state and local police from enforcing federal immigration law. State and local police cannot ask about citizenship or status; or stop, arrest, search or detain someone based on immigration status; nor can they provide housing in a jail or facility for ICE. They can't assist ICE with enforcement operations without a federal criminal warrant. Need more info? Contact Ann Alexander for a link to the PowerPoint presentation.

Related to immigration protection, Irene Crane has suggested J&W work with her to hold a "whistle mania" workshop after church some Sunday. For perhaps an hour or less, we would assemble kits containing whistles and information on our rights, etc. for sounding a warning when ICE officers are in a neighborhood. Stay tuned.

November 15 was another **food drive** in the Tri-Cities. For the second month our parking lot was the official drop off location for Batavia. This time we took car loads of donations to the new **Batavia Food Pantry** and to a food bank in Aurora. This was our answer to helping those who weren't getting their SNAP benefits.

Fox River Valley Initiative held an "Action" (assembly) on November 8 in Elgin to highlight the Need for Affordable Housing. The program featured several moving testimonials of formerly unhoused speakers, and statistics on the housing situation. Several officials agreed to help expedite the development of affordable housing projects throughout the Fox Valley, and most of the audience indicated willingness to get involved. Following the Action, many of the crowd traveled to 1212 Larkin to see the award-winning housing project that now provides 48 units, and is a beautiful example of what can come from many members of FRVI working together for a common cause. Christmas, already??? Well, the stores have been preparing for months.

This year's Advent theme is from Sanctified Art: "What Are You Afraid Of." Other services during the season will include "The Longest Night" on Thursday, December 18, with music by lark&laurel, Christmas Eve communion services at 3 and 7 p.m. and Epiphany Sunday on January 4 with Communion and "Star" words for 2026.

As we usually have many visitors on Christmas Eve, we would like to have two or more greeters at both services. If you are planning to attend one of these services, please consider being a greeter. There is a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board outside Pastor Paige's Office or you can contact the church office to volunteer....and *Thank You* (in advance).

Happy New Year! Really? It isn't even Christmas! Just wanted to give you peek at the service theme for that time between Epiphany and Ash Wednesday —"Salt and Light." Easter is early in 2026 (April 5) making the time between Epiphany and Ash Wednesday not much more than a month. Join is for services as Pastor Paige explores the significance of these words.



**Advent**: the first season of the Christian church year, leading up to Christmas and including the four <u>preceding</u> Sundays. The true meaning of Advent is the celebration of Christ's coming and the season of anticipation and preparation for Christmas. It's a four-week Christian liturgical season that looks back at the first coming of Jesus as a baby and anticipates his second coming. During this time, believers focus on reflection, hope, peace, joy, and love, often through practices like prayer, Scripture reading, and lighting candles.

**Epiphany**: a Christian holiday celebrated on January 6 that marks the revelation of Jesus to the world, specifically commemorating the arrival of the Magi (the three wise men) to the baby Jesus. It is often considered the end of the Christmas season and is also known as Three Kings Day.



Christmas is not just a day, an event to be observed and speedily forgotten. It is a spirit which should permeate every part of our lives.


