Justice and Witness



Aurora's July 8 Pride Parade was again a beautiful event to support and celebrate the LGBTQ community. For a second year New England Congregational hosted a pancake breakfast and church service for the many churches who all together walked down the hill to take our place in the parade on a warm sunny day. Those of us from CCoB walked with our banner and our colorful mini doors: "GOD'S DOORS ARE OPEN TO ALL", and handed out cute stickers to the cheering crowds.

I recently joined several other members of **Fox River Valley Initiative** in a meeting with Mayor Jeff Schielke and Laura Newman to discuss Batavia's need for affordable housing, and the proposed "Residence at River Point" south of town on Rt. 25. The City Council has unanimously approved continuing to explore the feasibility of this 72-unit project. The biggest question is whether the long vacant quarry site could support the weight of the building. We also discussed other potential locations, but since Batavia is so desirable for profitable development, it's an expensive and daunting challenge.

Immigration: three members from CCoB, St. Charles Episcopal, and Geneva Unitarian Universalist Society drafted a letter commending and supporting NOT cooperating with ICE officials in any illegal, unconstitutional manner. Members of many churches will have met on a 7/23 Zoom call to discuss/approve the letter and determine who should receive it (i.e. elected officials, law enforcement, etc.). We hope to have at least ten churches/organizations sign this letter. This effort to protect innocent immigrants dovetails nicely with our outreach to Dia Nuevo Communidad (New Day Community Church) in Hoffman Estates, as described in July's *Tower*.



Pilgrim Press

The Pilgrim Press is a bold voice of the UCC with a rich heritage spanning 400 years of publishing. In 1617, it began publishing treatises for the English Separatists against the Church of England under the name Pilgrim Press in Leiden, Holland.

Today the Pilgrim Press publishes books at the intersection of religion and culture, focusing on topics like faith, social justice, and contemporary issues. Some notable titles include "Water Bugs and Dragonflies: Explaining Death to Young Children," "Fat Church: Claiming a Gospel of Fat Liberation," and various hymnals and resources for religious education. They also publish works related to the writings of John Bunyan, including "The Pilgrim's Progress" and related resources.



Eight of the original fourteen members left this church within five years to form other congregations.
