Peculiar People, Precious Gifts: Stewardship 2025

But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a **peculiar** people, in order that you may proclaim the excellence of the one who called you out of darkness into this marvelous light.

1 Peter 2:9

The Gospel passages prescribed by the Lectionary Cycle this fall are a series of parables about discipleship from the book of Luke that are tricky, difficult, challenging...frankly, quite *peculiar*. But, if we're being honest, discipleship itself is a peculiar kind of thing, as we put aside the shiny, vacuous promises of Power, and Money, and Fame, and follow our humble Messiah, Jesus. By the standards of this world, it is a peculiar calling...disciples are a peculiar people.

The author of 1 Peter certainly thinks so, using this very language in verse nine of the second chapter of that book. There he doesn't mean strange, or odd so much as he means something like unique, distinctive, *set apart*. And he is clear that we are set apart for a purpose, the purpose of shining God's light and love into a dark world.

From September 7 through October 5, as we study these challenging parables from Jesus, as we discover what is so peculiar about discipleship, we will also engage in our annual Stewardship Campaign, *Peculiar People, Precious Gifts.* Because it is precisely in our unique, distinct, precious gifts that the Church is made strong, and the world a little bit brighter.

We will spend some time in this season looking at CCoB's needs in the year to come, as well as some of its vision, its dreams, its plans to shine in Batavia and the world. Then, together, we will give, of our material assets, yes, but also those precious gifts that set us apart... musical talent, a penchant for art, a love of hospitality, an administrative mind, a questioning spirit. And we will pledge these gifts to the work God is doing here, in this place, in the year to come.

Please note, that this is not the same thing as our upcoming Capital Campaign. You've heard plenty about that in the preceding months, and you will hear a whole lot more come October...it will be an exciting time, as we work to ensure the strength and mission of our church for the decades to come, building on the legacy that has preceded us. But before that, in September, we will focus on the stewardship campaign, our Peculiar People and Precious Gifts. Questions? Want to make the congregation aware of your event? Use the Marketing Rule of 7s.

Have you ever heard of the Marketing Rule of 7s? This is the theory that your audience must see a message at least 7 times before an action is taken. It means presenting a message multiple times, and in a variety of ways.

You might not think of an announcement of an event at church as marketing, but marketing is communications and communicating an awareness of what our church offers creates interest. Following the Rule of 7s, we already use a variety of channels to spread our messaging. Among members we have the eNews and The Tower. To reach a greater audience beyond membership, we use several social media applications, press releases, print media, and build in-person connections at community events. All of these are examples of outbound marketing by which we reach out to the public. The church website is considered inbound marketing, where a potential visitor might find more about us through their own research. The more ways we can potentially reach our audience, and the more times, the more effective our communications will be.

Whatever you might be helping plan at church, consider the Rule of 7s in your marketing. You can reach out to me, and as Communications Manager for our church, I can help you with this. I will post on social media, our website, design a flyer, send information to news media, even brainstorm new possibilities. Contact me directly, otherwise I might not be aware of your project, or that you need my help.

Justice and Witness



A Fellowship Luncheon with the Islamic Center is tentatively planned for September 14 or 19. Sadly there was no Iftar Dinner this year due to Mazher Ahmed's serious stroke last December. Mazher is now doing quite well. She and Hamid stopped by during coffee hour recently and proposed this fellowship luncheon to be held here at church following our Sunday service. The rough plan is she provides some Indian dishes and we bring a few salads and deserts. Details will be determined at the J&W meeting August 31,.

The other topic we are discussing at that meeting is our ongoing support (Blessing Boxes, etc.) of **New Day Community in Hanover Park** (not Hoffman Estates as mentioned in the last *Tower!*). We had talked about opening up our **Blessing Boxes** food collection to the whole CCoB... Karon Van Gelder suggested we enlarge the project to also include **Elgin's Centro de Information Food Pantry**. This organization offers many services, and is a great resource for immigrants who live in fear. We will be considering whether our church could be a drop-off spot for food donations from the whole city of Batavia — definitely food for thought.

The "Immigration Letter", signed by seven churches (including ours) and five ministers, commending law enforcement for following the Illinois Trust Act (protecting law abiding immigrants from illegal ICE detentions and deportations) was sent to local police/sheriff departments, Fox Valley mayors, and Kane elected officials. The feedback has been very encouraging. A second Zoom is scheduled for September 3, to discuss our next steps to protect and support immigrants.

I attended a **Fox River Valley Initiative Listening Session** on Saturday, August 23. Sixteen members from numerous churches met at St. Charles Episcopal to discuss their most pressing local concerns. Key issues include affordable housing, cost of child care, mental health, public transportation, and of course the immigration situation. Members of FRVI are encouraged to form focus groups to consider strategies that might lead to resolving these problems.

So, What's Happening with the Capital Campaign?

Does it feel like nothing's been happening since we decided to proceed last spring? It's true that the current parts of the process have not been visible -- and part of that is by design because so many folks are less available over the summer. However, having secured the services of Walsh & Associates, and in particular Aaron, to guide us through the upcoming capital campaign, The Capital Campaign team is now in the necessary planning phase, which will include recruiting helpers, for the active fundraising phase, to kick off in October.

Pastor Paige will be tying the peculiar parables in her early fall sermon series to the larger concept of stewardship — not just monetary gifts, but all the ways we offer ourselves to the work and life of our church. This should help us start thinking about the balance between stewardship pledges (annual giving for the day-to-day running of the church) and capital funding pledges (committing to extra giving over three years to fund large but necessary projects to enhance the ability of our church to serve us and our community going forward, and to pay off debts already incurred in this process). So, stay tuned.
