

Montessori Toddler to Primary Transition Guide

As your child nears the end of their time in the Montessori toddler community (16–36 months), we begin preparing them for a smooth and supportive transition into the Primary classroom (ages 3–6). This transition is a significant step in their Montessori journey, and we aim to make it thoughtful, respectful, and developmentally appropriate.

Below is a step-by-step guide for parents, along with expectations and how we support your child through this important milestone.

2. Parent Communication

- You will be invited to discuss your child's readiness and any questions about the transition.
- We'll share timelines, classroom expectations, and ways to support the transition at home.

4. Gradual Integration

- Visits increase in length and frequency, allowing your child to build confidence.
- We observe their comfort level, engagement, and social connection.

1. Observation & Readiness Assessment

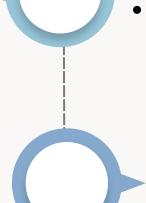
- Teachers assess signs of readiness including toileting independence, verbal expression, focus, and confidence in the toddler environment.
- We begin informal observations and document key developmental milestones.

3. Short Primary Visits

- Your child will take short visits to the Primary classroom accompanied by a toddler guide.
- They will meet Primary teachers and explore materials at their own pace.

5. Full Transition

- Once your child is ready and comfortable, they will transition fulltime into the Primary classroom.
- We coordinate with you to ensure the shift feels smooth and supported.





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What You Can
Expect from the
Primary
Environment

- A longer, uninterrupted 2.5-hour morning work cycle
- New materials in math, language, geography, and science
- A greater focus on social-emotional development and peer interaction
- Continued emphasis on independence and responsibility
- Encourage independence with dressing, toileting, and routines
- Support a consistent sleep and meal schedule
- Talk positively about the transition as a "big step" in their growth
- Allow time and space for your child to share their feelings and experiences
