Love: The Heart of Advent

One of my favorite parts of our Advent celebration at St. Paul is the lighting of the Advent wreath. Each week, the candle's glow radiates this amazing light both literally and figuratively, especially when times seem dark. And I began to think...if ...

hope, peace, and joy are the candles we light during Advent, then **love** is the flame that makes them burn. Love is the heart of this season because Advent is the story of a God who refuses to love us from a distance!

It is love that causes the Word to become flesh to dwell among us (John 1:14), all so that love might move more freely amid our fractured lives, hearts, and souls. Love looks at our exhaustion and says, "I am with you...in all of this." And it is through love that the Incarnation (God with us) becomes real.

Love motivates Jesus to step right into the middle of our real-life world, wading into the thick of things, unfazed by what he finds. You see, Advent love is not sentimental like a Hallmark movie. No, it is stubborn, gritty, embodied—it rolls up its sleeves, unwilling to leave us in our chaos, our hurt, our pain.

And Advent love doesn't stop there. It doesn't only shine the light of Christ *upon us*—it shines *through us*. And if you look closely, you'll see Christ's hands and heart in motion everywhere...not just at Christmas, but year-round. On Tuesday mornings, the parking lot fills with the aroma of coffee and the sound of blessings spoken over hurried commuters. On Wednesday nights, college

students gather around tables, finding a place to ask questions and grow in faith, while on the floor above, neighbors grieve together and find hope through support groups that remind them they are not alone. On Thursday afternoons, strangers roll up their sleeves in the fellowship hall and offer the gift of life through a blood donation. On weekends, laughter rings out from the soccer field as little ones chase the ball.



Week after week, love shows up in classrooms providing mentors as well as new winter coats and Thanksgiving meals, in kitchens preparing dinner for the homeless, in quiet living rooms where a Stephen Minister listens and prays, and in joyful community events like Easter egg hunts, Messy Church, parking lot picnics and concerts, Story Time with Santa, and magnificent choir cantatas. The love of Christ weaves through it all—turning ordinary moments into extraordinary signs of grace—proof that God is among us.

This Advent, my prayer is that Christ's love takes on flesh through St. Paul—through our words, our work, our presence, our courage. And may our weary world see, through us, the radiant truth that God is here—still loving, still healing, still shining.

The Meaning of the Christmas Season

As Thanksgiving leftovers are finished and our company leaves, we notice that the lights begin to twinkle and familiar carols fill the air; our hearts turn once again toward the beautiful mystery of Christmas. It is a season rich with words that guide our spiritual imagination—**Advent, Love, Hope, Peace, Joy, Giving, Receiving, Bread of Heaven, Christ Is Born, Santa Claus, Jesus' Birthday**—each one offering a facet of the story that shapes our faith.



During **Advent**, we wait. Not a passive waiting, but a holy anticipation that stirs the soul. Advent invites us to slow down, breathe deeply, and look for God's presence breaking into our world in unexpected ways. It reminds us that Hope is not wishful thinking—it is confidence that God keeps His promises.

And so we speak of **Hope**—the Hope that God is still writing redemption into our lives. We speak of **Peace**—not simply the absence of conflict, but the deep and steady calm that comes when Christ dwells within us. We speak of **Joy**—a joy that runs deeper than festive celebrations, a joy rooted in knowing that God is with us.


As we ponder these gifts, we also think of **Love**, the very heartbeat of the Christmas story. Love led God to take on flesh and dwell among us. Love led Mary to say yes, Joseph to trust, shepherds to run toward the light, and wise men to offer their treasures. Love leads us, too—to give, to serve, to forgive, to receive grace we could never earn.

Christmas is also a season of **giving and receiving**. We exchange presents not simply to follow tradition but to mirror the generosity of God, who gave us Jesus, the **Bread of Heaven**—the One who nourishes our souls and fills our deepest hunger for belonging, meaning, and mercy.

Of course, we also enjoy the lighter, joyful traditions: the sparkle of trees, children's laughter, and yes, even **Santa Claus**—a symbol of cheerful generosity and simple delight. These things, too, can be reminders that joy is meant to be shared.

But at the center of it all is the miracle we remember each year: **Christ is Born**. Christmas is, at its heart, **Jesus' Birthday**—the moment when eternity stepped into time, when heaven touched earth, and when God's Love became visible in a manger.


A Season of Generosity and Gratitude

Advent in the Everyday Moments

As we enter the Advent season, our church fills with familiar symbols—candles glowing softly in the stained-glass windows, the manger scenes hung behind our choir, and children wide-eyed with anticipation. But Advent is more than counting down the days until Christmas morning. It is a season that invites us, and especially our kids, to practice four gifts that shape our everyday lives: hope, peace, love, and joy.

In our Children's Ministry, we see these themes come alive in wonderfully simple

ways. **Hope** appears when a child prays boldly for something only God can do—trusting, without hesitation, that He hears them. It's in the way they expect God to be good, even when circumstances around us feel uncertain. Their hope encourages us to look forward with the same trust.

Peace is visible in moments when children slow down their busy little bodies. It's the way classmates learn to solve conflicts with grace (and a little guidance) or how a deep breath before prayer helps a child in need of a moment to reset. Advent reminds us that peace isn't the absence of noise, but the presence of Jesus in the middle of it.

Love just might be the easiest to spot. Children love freely and generously. Their actions teach us that love isn't just a warm feeling. It's something we choose to give, again and again, just as God chose to love us through the gift of His Son.

And **Joy**, well, joy is everywhere. It bursts through giggles during crafts, shines through wide smiles during worship songs, and settles deeply in hearts that know they are loved by God. Advent's joy isn't tied to presents or holiday treats but rooted in the good news that Jesus came for each and every one of us.

This Advent may we learn from our children. As we light the candles each week, let's also look for hope, peace, love, and joy woven into the everyday moments God places before us. May our hearts be as open and expectant as theirs.
