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Who we are

Surf Life Saving Northern Territory (SLSNT) is a volunteer-based community service organisation regarded as the peak coastal safety body in the NT, which formed in 1983 and incorporated in 1991.

Whilst surf lifesaving activities have been embedded in the Australian way of life for more than 100 years, they have only been present in the NT since 1971 when our first club, Gove Peninsula Surf Life Saving Club opened its doors in Nhulunbuy.

In 2015 the organisation comprises of three affiliated surf life saving clubs, located in Darwin and Nhulunbuy. Surf lifesavers have a very positive contribution to make, on and off the beach and as each year passes we continue to experience strong growth in all our activities.

Why we exist

To save lives.

We believe all Territorians should learn water safety skills, including swimming and resuscitation, and be provided with safe beaches, water environments and aquatic venues.

SLSNT works to achieve this by delivering lifesaving, development and sports programs for our members and the wider community. In addition, SLSNT manages and delivers accredited education and training services through our Academy and professional Lifeguard services through Australian Lifeguard Services NT.

Some great personal and team results were achieved, with several world medals making their way to the NT for the first time in our short history. Chief Executive Officer's Report

It gives me great pleasure to present to you the Surf Life Saving NT Annual Report for the 2018 season.

SLSNT is a fantastic organisation, which is capable of making a difference in people's lives - whether they are our members, sponsors or the public who need our help. Our positive contribution to the NT community is achieved by:

- Providing hundreds of people the opportunity to gain lifesaving skills and knowledge,
- Providing a safe space for members of the public to visit the beach and enjoy our tropical lifestyle,
- Promoting a healthy, active lifestyle,
- Developing youth to become great citizens.

This year SLSNT sustained our contribution to the NT community as a major coastal water safety, drowning prevention and rescue authority.

The replacement of our Offshore Rescue Boat with a brand new 9.5m custom built rescue vessel, Lifesaver 1, ensured that the 24/7 Search & Rescue service continued to deliver the high standards of service and response times that we, and our partner agency the NT Water Police, have come to expect.

SLSNT successfully completed two bodies of research in 2018 – a Coastal Risk Assessment of Darwin and Gove and the Interagency VHF Marine Public Safety Network Review.

The Coastal Risk Assessment made a number of recommendations including better use of technology by our lifesaving services. It is hoped that some of these recommendations will be on the beach in the coming seasons.

The VHF Marine Radio Review was submitted to the NT Government for investigation and preliminary responses from them have been positive – it is hoped that 2019 will see a more positive response to the need for a wide ranging VHF Marine radio network in the Darwin area at a minimum.

Member education is crucial to our continued success as an organisation. SLSNT and the clubs worked hard to deliver a wide range of courses to keep members engaged and ensure lifesavers have the skills needed to patrol.

One of the keys to retaining members is recognition of their efforts, and in April, SLSNT hosted our annual Awards of Excellence formally recognising the contribution of our members. Every awardee has a passionate commitment to surf lifesaving and I would like to congratulate them again on their dedication and hard work in 2018.

Our links with NT Government Departments, the NT Water Police and the NT Water Safety Advisory Council continue to develop. These relationships are important to SLSNT as we strive to reinforce our credibility and relevance as the peak coastal water safety authority and community-based emergency service.

SLSNT continues to have a strong relationship with Surf Life Saving Australia and SLSNT is appreciative of the opportunities we receive to have input into national initiatives and directions.

Thanks to our clubs who do a great job promoting surf lifesaving through their involvement in the community conducting, or supporting, popular public sporting events such as swimming and triathlon events, Darwin's Fannie Bay Classic Swim (Darwin SLSC), Beercan Regatta (Mindil Beach SLSC), Beach Volleyball (Gove Peninsula SLSC).

In 2018, SLSNT partnered with local design agency, Boab Design to look at our promotion within the community and what could be done to improve it. I look forward to releasing the new concepts in time for the 2019 season.

Appreciation

Our biggest asset is our members who, rain or shine, volunteer their time every weekend of the season to make sure the local beach is safe for the public to enjoy. I wish to pass on my sincerest appreciation to every member of our wonderful organisation; you all do an amazing job.

I would also like to thank the SLSNT President and the Board of Directors for their dedication and support as well as the volunteer members who gave up their time to conduct the business of SLSNT.

To the SLSNT staff, thank you. 2018 has once again been a year of change with the departure of long term staff members and you all deserve high praise for your continued support and dedication.

I wish everyone associated with SLSNT a wonderful 2019 and look forward to seeing you all out on a beach next season.

As I write this report, I look back on the last three reports I have submitted to the members to see how we have progressed over the last few years. It is clear that over that period we have achieved a number of great things, and yet are as much the same as we ever were; we have made some improvements to our operations, but there is still a long way to go.

Through the last couple of years SLSNT has managed to generate sufficient funding to ensure that we have the best equipment available. Unfortunately, our human resources are still limited to a very small and dedicated group of members. We are conducting lifesaving operations to a very high standard, but are limited in our capacity, and must strive to expand our membership so that we can provide the service the community has come to expect of us.

Search and Rescue (SAR) Team

The SAR Team has continued to be the main operational lifesaving service provided by SLSNT contributing 443 volunteer patrol hours and performing 7 rescues and 164 preventative actions.

This year the team received a new uniform after several years unchanged. The new uniforms give our personnel a more professional look, as well as enhanced protection from the sun and weather than any previous uniform we have provided our members with. The new uniforms are also unmistakably lifesaving themed, with the bright red and yellow enhancing the brand so well recognised by the public.

ORB

Lifesaver 1, our offshore rescue boat, was busy performing search and rescue taskings, water safety for events and conducting training operations. There is potential for the service to expand in the future, but to do this the SAR team will need to recruit new members. In the search for new personnel for the SAR Team, we may have to look beyond our traditional base.

Wet season patrols

Wet season patrols have continued to be run with great success. The patrols have managed to find more consistency of operation than the past couple of years. There has been a small number of new members qualified to perform these patrols, as well as an increase in hours performed by other members. If the service is to continue in 2019 and beyond we will need to recruit more operators to share the workload.

Major Projects

Interagency VHF Marine Public Safety Network Review

In early 2018 SLSNT received the final version of the report commissioned to investigate the needs of a coastal safety marine radio network. The report was funded by the NT Government, with various surveys and site inspections carried out during 2017.

The report made several recommendations for the installation of marine radio infrastructure. The proposed network would improve the safety for boat users around the NT coast, and increased communication capabilities would reduce the number of "false alarm" rescues we respond to. It would also enhance the abilities of our members to communicate with other organisations during operations. For these reasons SLSNT has taken the final report to the NT government and lobbied for the government to implement the recommendations. There has been moderate support from within the government, however no firm commitments as yet. SLSNT will continue to lobby government, as it is increased safety for our members and the public, at no cost to our organisation.

Coastal Risk Assessment

The second major report completed in 2018 was the Coastal Risk Assessment for the Darwin and Nhulunbuy local government areas. The report saw unforeseen delays; however, a final report was received May 2018.

The report made several recommendations, which SLSNT has reviewed over the second half of 2018. Many of the recommendations are beyond the control of SLSNT, and rest with various departments of the NT Government. SLSNT will

provide the report to those appropriate and seek to lobby various groups to implement the recommendations as appropriate.

A small number of recommendations are directly actionable by SLSNT, and strategies are being developed to implement them in 2019 and beyond. One of the major findings of the report was that statistics held by SLSNT are minimal, and a plan to improve this will be implemented in 2019. It is imperative that clubs maintain relevant patrol statistics, as these underlie development of procedures and justify funding requests.

Drones

There has been much discussion about the use of drones for surf lifesaving operations, both within the NT and generally around the country. Recently Westpac has provided a national sponsorship to implement drones in every state. In the year ahead a drone will be introduced into service for use with the SAR Team. The planning of this has begun, however it is only in the early stages, so there shall be much more to report next year. Our members and the public will no doubt be pleased to see a new and advanced piece of equipment introduced, however we should not expect too much in this first year, as there will most likely be some teething issues to sort out.

Luke Marcroft – Lifesaver of the Year

Luke is a very dedicated and respected member of the Mindil Beach SLSC and SLSNT. During the 2017 season Luke contributed 68 volunteer patrol hours, assisting with water safety for Mindil Beach Nippers and events such as the Beer Can Regatta, Fannie Bay Open Water Swim and Darwin Harbor Clean Up. Luke is an active member of the SAR team and holds a number of awards. In 2017, Luke was selected for the 2nd year in a row to join a team of 8 Australian lifesavers to travel to Japan to assist in patrolling during their Summer. Luke's experience as a lifeguard allows him to provide insight to worldwide lifeguarding strategies in his current role as Director of Lifesaving at the Mindil Beach SLSC. During 2017, he also patrolled Surfers Paradise while competing with BMD Northcliffe SLSC.



Lifesaving management

Club Lifesaving

The clubs have continued to patrol the beaches of Darwin and Nhulunbuy well, with no lives lost between the flags. For several years we have experienced clubs performing the lifesaving functions well by themselves, and unfortunately this has led to a lack of attention by SLSNT. Over the 2019 season and beyond SLSNT must strive to become more engaged again with club lifesaving, so that it may be supported and grown to a new high. This engagement must also go the other way, with clubs willing to receive help and advice, and providing more feedback of issues they are experiencing to both SLSNT and their fellow clubs.

Lifesaving committees

One way we can improve the engagement and communication between clubs and SLSNT is to support stronger Lifesaving and Education Committees. This will give the clubs a voice to raise any issues and provide clear guidance for our representatives to national committees. It will also give the relevant SLSNT directors a strong forum through which they can pass information back down the chain from national to clubs. Draft terms of reference for these committees have been developed, and hopefully can be implemented in 2019.

Lifesaving Forum

In May 2018 a Lifesaving forum was held at SLSNT headquarters, where representatives from the board, the clubs and the staff were joined by the SLSA Lifesaving Chair and the National Coastal Safety Manager. Whilst attendance was low, those who did attend received very useful information, and strong discussions were held. It was beneficial to SLSNT and club representatives to have our national personnel present to provide information and advice. Whilst nothing is currently planned for 2019, we will look for opportunities to conduct a similar forum again in future.

Summary

2018 has been a year of solid improvements and advancements, offset by unmatched potential. Whilst it is disappointing that we have not managed to achieve every goal set, it is important to note we have not taken any backward steps. The outlook for 2019 and beyond looks to be much of the same. It will be up to the board, and the membership generally to determine what the acceptable standard is for the future. The community expectations grow ever high as each year passes, not only for our organisation, but for all those similar to us. In contrast, it is becoming constantly harder to find both funding and volunteers. Many may argue that in the current times we would be well

advised to consolidate our current Lifesaving operations, and not try to over-commit our already stretched resources. Others would argue that the saving of lives in the coastal environment is paramount, and we must strive to expand in any way which will reduce lives being lost. Whatever the end decision is, the key to a successful future relies on 2 factors: improved communication and growth in capacity.

On a more personal note, I would like to thank several people who have assisted me this year. I have received significant and ongoing support from the President, Grant Barnett, who has always been willing to discuss matters and give a second opinion when I am ever in doubt. Andrew McGuinness has been a great help throughout the year, very ably filling in for me at SLSA meetings when I have been unavailable. The rest of the directors on the board have assisted whenever I have referred anything Lifesaving related to the board, ensuring it has been supported with ease. From the staff our CEO, Samantha Farrow has always been available to provide guidance to myself and the rest of the board, which has allowed the directors to conduct their roles. At the beginning of the 2018, our long-time Lifesaving Operations Manager, Trevor Radburn left for opportunities interstate. This left a large role to be filled, and Skip Hall has done a great job learning a new job and making it his own.

At the end of my fourth season in the role of Director of Lifesaving I have come to love the role. I fully understand the requirements of Lifesaving in the NT and am pleased with the achievements we have made in my time as director. There is however much work still to be done. It is my intention to stand again for this position, and I hope I am returned to the role so I can continue to serve the members and the public to achieve the service they expect.

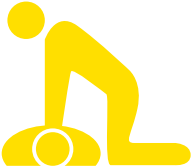

The Australian Lifeguard Service NT (ALS NT) began in 2006, with the Darwin Waterfront Corporation contracting SLSNT to provide a 365 day a year service at their premier venue. From these humble beginnings ALS NT has grown in the past few years, today boasting a workforce of 38 staff working across 4 locations.

2018 was another successful year for the ALS NT, with zero drowning deaths occurring in any of our contractual areas. Lifeguards supervised over 700 000 visitors across our four locations, rescuing 116 and performing 1,148 first aid treatments.

Each of the four locations our Lifeguards patrol provide a different set of conditions for them to operate under. So it is important that our Lifeguards undertake regular training and fitness testing to ensure they are equipped with the necessary skills to identify and deal with any scenario. These skills ensure that ALS NT lifeguards are able to promote a safe environment for locals and visitors to enjoy.

In 2017, ALSNT won a three-year contract for the provision of Lifeguard services at the Leanyer Recreation Park and Palmerston Water Park from the NT Government. In 2018, the service provided was further refined and lifeguards relished the opportunity to expand their lifeguard experience at venues boasting slides, skate parks and wet play zones.

Mindil Beach is one of the most popular beaches in the NT, assisted by the hosting of twice weekly markets through the Dry Season at the location, and the number of visitors to it remains steady. Thanks to the support of the City of Darwin, we are able to continue proving a Lifeguard service at this popular beach. In addition to providing a watchful eye over beach users, Lifeguards also consistently liaise with visitors and local wildlife, answering queries and providing local knowledge on the area.

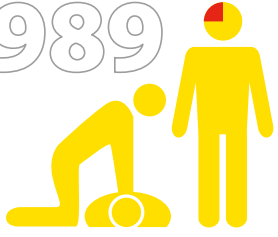

Left - Darwin Wave Lagoon

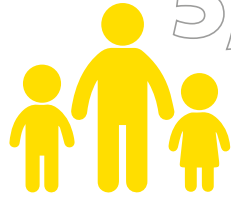
Below - Lifeguard Training

SLSNT remains focused on providing educational programs for its members and the community as a significant step to improve safety through knowledge. As the saying goes, prevention is better than a cure. With this in mind, SLSNT sees the provision of educational programs to our members and the wider community as a vital strategy in achieving our organisational vision of zero preventable deaths in NT coastal waters.

SLSNT through auspicing arrangements with Surf Life Saving SA, delivers nationally recognised, accredited lifesaving education to the NT community, members, emergency services and local schools. SLSNT has developed a name in the NT for high quality training and education and will continue to deliver this service into the future.

Commercial Education

Surf lifesaving has a strong and proud history of saving lives in Australia, and SLSNT believes our lifesaving skills can be applied to many different environments and circumstances. SLSNT is capable of delivering a range of emergency care and aquatic rescue training courses across a range of industries including sport, education, medical, government and administration.

To ensure participants are learning lifesaving skills from experienced and highly trained individuals, SLSNT employs qualified surf lifesavers as trainers. All profits made are invested back into supporting our members and the community.

In 2018, 957 members of the public learnt valuable lifesaving skills through courses such as First Aid, CPR, Advanced Resuscitation and Spinal Management. This engagement over the last few years has increased our network of commercial and community groups and raised awareness of surf lifesaving and its training principals.

Member Education

Our surf life saving clubs are the primary deliver of lifesaving training for members and successfully delivered core lifesaving awards such as Bronze Medallion and Surf Rescue Certificate to 209 participants and completed 12 skills maintenance days for members.

To assist the clubs in delivering training, SLSNT has partnered with a local facilitator and ex surf lifesaver Sharon Stewart to deliver a trainer skill set for members.

Our trainers and assessors have also been provided access to professional development workshops with our partner RTO SLSSA to keep their delivery techniques at the forefront of training & assessment.

In addition to our traditional Lifesaving services SLSNT provides training opportunities through the support operations section with delivery of advanced lifesaving courses including Inflatable Rescue Boat crew and driver certificates and rescue water craft certificates along with SMAR and ORB qualifications.

Education and Awareness (cont'd)

Bridget Riggs – Educator of the year

Bridget has been the Chief Instructor at the Darwin SLSC for the past 4 years where she is instrumental in training new members in the Bronze Medallion and the Surf Rescue Certificate. Bridget gives up countless hours to the Darwin SLSC both on and off the beach. In addition to the hours Bridget has dedicated to training and assessing club members, Bridget also contributed 73 volunteer patrol hours. At the end of the 2017 season, Bridget has dedicated a very impressive total of 364 volunteer hours and gained 70 training awards during her membership.



Community Awareness

With the employment of a full time Development Coordinator, SLSNT was able to significantly increase the presence of surf lifesaving in the community.

SLSNT, with the support of the clubs, attended the Defence Open Day, Casuarina Senior College and Darwin High School Career Expos.

2018 saw the introduction of the Surf n Sail program at the Darwin Waterfront and the Water Awareness Sessions at Leanyer Recreation Park.

Surf n Sail was a joint initiative between with Australian Sailing NT and Darwin Sailing club and involved running five sessions at the Darwin Waterfront over the January & April school holidays. The Surf & Sail program was developed to encourage participation in and around water, as well as to build the profile of both Surf Life Saving and Sailing within the Darwin community.

The two-hour sessions provided children with the opportunity to participate in Nipper activities such as board paddling, and beach and water flags and the opportunity to learn the basics of sailing. The turn out from the sessions was great, especially the second session – we saw around 200 kids come through during the two hours. In total, we saw around 500 children across the five sessions.

April there were two sessions ran by Mindil Beach SLSC, which gave some of their junior and youth competitors an opportunity to coach younger athletes and children. Mindil saw it as a great opportunity to attract more members, particularly as the demographic of the participants was key to keeping surf lifesaving going in the Darwin area.

Water Safety Awareness, utilised the 1.2m deep lagoon at Leanyer Recreation Park and through the use of games and toys encourages participants to get in the water and be safe. Again this was run in the January and April school holidays with a great response.

Held at the start of June, Beach Week returned in 2018. The change of venue from Lake Alexander to Mindil Beach was positive with over 2 000 people attending and taking part in all of the beach and ocean activities on offer. We look forward to being part of this again in 2019.

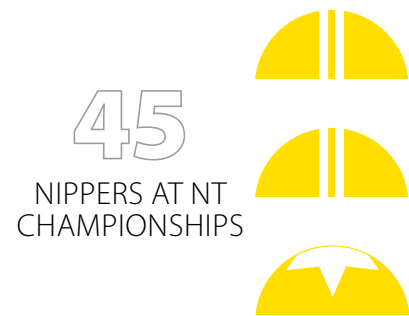
Water Safety Week, is an NT Government initiative that focuses on creating awareness about keeping ourselves and others safe in, around and on the water. 1500 members of the public attended this to learn about keeping ourselves and others safe in, around and on the water.

Surf Sports



Sport is one of the foundations of the surf lifesaving movement with training and competition being essential tools to improve the skills required by our lifesavers to keep our NT beaches safe. Providing opportunities to participate and compete in surf sports is recognised by SLSNT as a key initiative to recruit and retain members.

In my opinion Surf Sports within the NT has again remained stable in participation, which is good to see and like 2017 is an improvement on the decline it was having.

Again we were unfortunately unable to hold any other championship events, bar the NT Championships and this still needs to be addressed. Although we had a functional sport committee this year, there were times when the committee member's views were at opposites, so a consensus on future events and what they should look like was difficult. Particular events like the current Beach and Paddle Series and the NT Championships (where they should be held and how often) were hot discussion topics. As clubs are yet to have their AGM for 2019, SLSNT will continue to work with current sport representatives to develop surf sports and their events for 2019 and beyond.

2018 was an average year for surf sports in the Territory, but overall I feel it was generally successful. Our Darwin based clubs are still recovering from the loss of their more elite youth of two years ago and of course Gove is still down on numbers in the cadet and late teens due to the change in the community. As mentioned in the last annual report though past youth members have come back to help in the current wet season training, so this is a promising sign of good things to come.

SLS Interstate Championships

SLSNT had to make the unfortunate decision to not attend the 2018 SLS Interstate Championships due to lack of availability of athletes during the school holiday period. Funds budgeted for this event are used to support other suitable events as agreed upon.

SLSA's National sport conference was held in May and attended by myself and Laura, this was a good conference and our argument that a melanoma was just as dangerous as a marine stinger was instrumental in stopping a controversial rule change on the wearing of long sleeve rash vests in the board races. It shows that occasionally our experience in the tropics can have positive input to the Eastern states. It should also be known that most other states, particularly the smaller ones also find the Interstate Championships an irrelevant competition.

Beach and Paddle

SLSNT's Beach and Paddle series was held again, this time with the five courses and dates selected by competitor cohort representatives. It was aimed to offer longer downwind events for the more experienced competitors (OC's, skis and surf boats) while still having two short course events for the SUP's and lesser experienced ski paddlers. It was generally seen as a success although the wind wasn't always in the direction it was meant to be coming from so did provide a challenge for some competitors. Overall feedback was that the competitors were happy with the variety of courses and distances selected. Across the series there was 48 competitors, from a variety of craft: surf ski, Outriggers (OC1, OC2, OC6) ocean skull, SUP's and a surf boat crew.

Modified Sport event

2018 saw the opportunity for members to be involved in an SLSA driven initiative called modified sport. As our season is opposite to the rest of Australia, it was ideal for Darwin to be used as a final location for a pilot program. Modified sport program is designed for everyone to participate in surf sports, no matter age or ability. The program was set out so that everyone was guaranteed at least four races, with seeded and handicap races to suit all levels of ability and experience. The new and simple racing formats are a new take on traditional racing, and there was plenty of positive feedback from the participants.

Taleah Newhouse from SLSA came to Darwin in mid-August and ran a modified sport event, which saw participants from both Darwin & Mindil ranging from U9 – Masters competitors, plus some new to surf lifesaving. Feedback was that majority all enjoyed the short, sharp different formats of racing. The new formats even encouraged some participants who don't tend to like racing, more involved and keen to race and pursue surf sports.

Life Saving World Championships - Adelaide

Mindil SLSC sent a significant team to Adelaide to compete (in unusually tough conditions) in the 2018 Life Saving World Championships. Athletes competed in Masters & Youth events across surfboats and ocean/beach. It was good to see that the two Darwin based clubs were able to combine to make competitive crews in the rowing (both men & women) and achieve some great results on a World stage. Mindil came away with four Bronze medals, which is an incredible feat at a World Championship.

2018 Sea Swift NT Surf Life Saving Championships

The 2018 Sea Swift NT Surf Life Saving Championships were hosted by Darwin SLSC from the 7-9 September.

Due to a lack of availability of NT referees, SLSNT were required to bring two Queensland officials (Mick Lafferty & Denis Mathison) to jointly manage the event. They did a great job in keeping our event as relaxed and informal as it usually is, whilst also training of some of our new officials.

We were also used as a trial event for the new carnival entry system SEMS, with SLSA providing a staff member to support during the champs. SEMS ran quite well and SLSA were able to get valuable feedback on any issues that were discovered. Unfortunately, due to unforeseen circumstances Gove were only able to send over a small team, whilst Broome were unable to send over any competitors.

Competition started on the Friday night with the flags events held under lights and music, which provided a great atmosphere and a great way to kick off the championships. Competition continued on with a similar format to the last few years with the majority of seniors events held on the Saturday, leaving the junior and Iron events for the Sunday. Tides were a challenge, but between the officials and the water safety crew the courses were fair and there was only one minor delay towards the end of Sundays competition.

Beach & Paddle Series

The Championships saw 111 members from the three NT clubs, compete in 138 events over the two days. It was a great event, with competitor numbers being on par to previous years. Nipper numbers continuing to be steady with 45 competitors, plus 66 Senior competitors from the three clubs.

Host club Darwin SLSC won the Championships on 950 points, followed by Mindil Beach (873.6) and Gove Peninsula (105.4). For the discipline champions, Darwin SLSC won both the Beach & Surf Boat competition with 366 & 20 points respectively. With Mindil Beach dominating the Ocean events, coming away with 616 points.

We look forward to travelling to Broome for the 2019 event. With the possibility of a good wave on offer, hopefully we will also be seeing Port Walcott compete in our championships for the first time.

Coaches and Officials

Our relationship with Julian Norton-Smith has continued to grow with him visiting both Darwin and Gove again this year. Julian's visit saw great attendance in both Gove & Darwin. Gove saw around 30 Nippers, Youth & Age Managers attend over the four sessions run, including a fantastic session run at Little Bondi. The Darwin visit naturally saw a much larger attendance, across a range of sessions held at Lake Alex, Cullen Bay Marina & Casuarina Beach. Julian also ran an Age Managers/Coaching Course and also managed to compete in event 2 of the Beach & Paddle series.

Official development grew this year with a significant number of members taking part in the online training and officiating at the NT championships under the guidance of the Queensland officials. Paperwork for these officials still needs to be finalised, but is a positive step forward for NT officials.

Our sport desperately needs coaches for us to move further forward. Our current position with only 1 qualified coach interested in training across the ski and board disciplines is unsustainable. Clubs need to try and find their own suitable candidates and SLSNT need to be there to provide pathways for these people to achieve this. Without this surf sport within the NT can't improve.

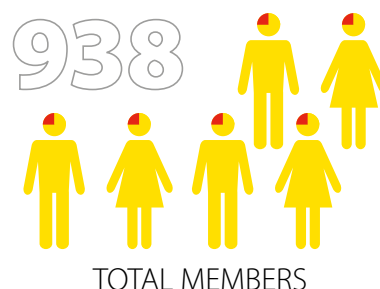

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2018

The financial report covers Surf Life Saving Northern Territory Incorporated as an individual entity. Surf Life Saving Northern Territory Incorporated is a not-for-profit Association, registered and domiciled in Australia.

The functional and presentation currency of Surf Life Saving Northern Territory Incorporated is Australian dollars.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

In the opinion of those charged with Governance the association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*, the Associations Act and the Associations constitution.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 *Presentation of Financial Statements*, AASB 107 *Statement of Cash Flows*, AASB 108 *Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors* and AASB 1054 *Australian Additional Disclosures*.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

The association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*. It has been recognised as a Public Benevolent Institution by the Australian Charities and Not for Profits Commission. The association has received endorsement from the Australian Taxation Office as an income tax exempt charity. The association has also received a GST concession.

(b) Leases

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

(c) Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the association obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

When grant revenue is received whereby the association incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

Surf Life Saving Northern Territory Incorporated receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for zero or a nominal value. These assets are recognised at fair value on the date of acquisition in the statement of financial position, with a corresponding amount of income recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

(d) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(e) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for nil or nominal consideration have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

Leased assets and leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or their estimated useful life.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(g) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.
