Maryann McAllister, Victim Advocate, Burlington Police Department


"She has changed my life, and the life of my children and I am only one of likely thousands that came before me." - anonymous tribute from a domestic violence survivor

Mary McAllister has worked for the City of Burlington for 28 years. She began as a police officer in uniform, but it didn't fit... Then in 1994 she saw that the Burlington Police Department, Woman Helping Battered Women (now Steps To End Domestic Violence) and the then Burlington Women's Council were looking for someone part-time to collect statistics on Domestic Violence and she applied. This initial role led to Mary being part of the pioneering team that created the protocols and trainings which resulted in the development of Burlington Police Department's first domestic violence response policy.

She became the first victim advocate embedded within a police department, and is currently the Domestic Violence Victim Advocate in the Burlington Police Dept. Crisis, Advocacy and Intervention Program.

Mary found her calling and has dedicated her professional life to assisting victims of crime, especially victims of domestic violence. There are thousands of community members, adults and children, who are not victims but are survivors thanks to work that Mary has done. She has helped those she serves get support through just about every provider there is, and works closely with Family Court, STEPS, Hopeworks and the State's Attorneys victim advocates.

Mary is a state-recognized expert in matters relating to supporting victims of crime and is an expert on domestic violence lethality assessment, having trained professionals across the state on this vital tool. In her decades


Cathleen Kelley, LICSW, Social Work Care Manager, Pediatric New American Program, UVM Children's Hospital

Cathy Kelley is an essential member of the Pediatric New American Program (PNAP) at University of Vermont Children's Hospital. She has been deeply involved in serving children and adults in Chittenden County, particularly Vermont's refugee and immigrant population for over 25 years.

Cathy's impact is immeasurable. She brings a wealth of knowledge, community partnerships, and deep sense of health equity to her position. As one colleague described, Cathy is the "secret sauce" in elevating the care of refugees and immigrant families served by the PANP.

Cathy takes a holistic approach working closely with New American families while breaking down barriers to care and coordinating with multiple organizations to ensure wrap-around, culturally sensitive services and multi-generational supports for these families. An excellent collaborator, she has nurtured partnerships with schools, mental health providers, child advocacy organizations, legal service partners and the Department for Children and Families. She routinely collaborates with the US Committee for Refugees and Immigrants Vermont, AALV and UVM's Connecting Cultures program, a trauma-



Cathy's expertise on unique issues of care for children in immigrant families have made her a sought-out trainer and educator. She recently gave statewide lectures on working with interpreters and on social work concerns for newly arrived Afghan families. Cathy teaches and volunteers in the UVM College of Education and Social Services Social Work Department mentoring students, sharing her passion for child and family well-being, and training the next generation of social workers.

Cathy helped create and co-leads the Refugee and Immigrant Mental Health Working Group an advocacy group working to address significant barriers that exclude or prevent refugee and immigrant community members from obtaining services.

Cathy received her Master of Social Work at Adelphia University in New York and completed her Bachelor of Arts in psychology at the University of Vermont. She is a certified Licensed Clinical Social Worker.


Christina (she/her) started with Spectrum in 2018 as a Youth Coach in the Burlington Drop-In Center, where, after a year, she transitioned into Drop-In Center Program Manager. Through the first several months of the pandemic Christina supported the Drop-In Center program in pivoting services and meeting the needs of the youth community on the front lines. In May of 2020 Christina was elevated to the role of Spectrum's Director of Basic Needs Programming. Christina now oversees the Burlington Drop-In Center, the Pearl St Transitional Residence, and the Warming Shelter. In this role she supervises almost 30 people, including full and part time staff.



Christina's colleagues speak of her positivity, creativity, and passion to address the individual needs of the youth Spectrum serves. She also works to address the larger systems issues effecting these youth, especially those involved in the mental health system. She is a natural leader and has proven herself to be an invaluable member of the team. As one colleague put it, "What Christina does is magical."

Christina's drive for working in the affordable housing and homeless services field was instilled in her from early childhood. By the age of 16 Christina was regularly volunteering her time with Habitat for Humanity in Trenton, New Jersey. She went on to live and work internationally building homes through natural disaster relief efforts, before returning stateside to attend school at Warren Wilson College in Asheville, NC. Christina continued to grow in this field working full-time for Habitat for Humanity, and later as a Housing Specialist in western North Carolina.

Christina made the move to Vermont in 2018 and has since set roots here with her husband and daughter. Through her work at Spectrum, Christina has deepened a powerful sense of community, prioritized uplifting youth voice, and advocated for programmatic and systemic change to better meet the needs of young people experiencing homelessness.

Transgender Youth Program, UVM Children's Hospital

The Transgender Youth Program (TYP) at UVM Children's Hospital has provided care for gender-diverse youth and their families since 2016. It is a dedicated multidisciplinary team of medical, psychological and social work professionals. The team offers a spectrum of care, from simple support and guidance to evidence-based developmentally appropriate medical interventions. It is founded on the belief that all people, including children and teens, should be allowed to live their lives in their self-identified gender.

The TYP strives to provide patients and families with comprehensive education and resources regarding available options for social and medical transition. The

clinic follows the guidelines for gender-affirmative care, as outlined by the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Endocrine Society and the World Professional Association of Transgender Health. The current care team consists of Erica Gibson, MD; Elizabeth McDonald, APRN; Joshua Shamoon, LiCSW; Madison Smith, PsyD; Kimberlee Roy, PhD; Marlene Maron, PhD; Wendy Bliss, RN; and Laurie Ose, LPN.

The TYP team collaborates with primary care providers, mental health providers, social workers, schools, state organizations like the Department for Children and Families and the Vermont Department of Health as well as community-based organizations like Outright VT and Centerpoint. The team, recognized as experts across the state, is committed to educate others regarding evidence-based care for gender diverse youth whether that is in one-to-one conversations or in large conference presentations.

In their work, they meet with families and create a safe space to help youth explore their gender identity, providing care that is inclusive and gender-affirming. Last year, in the face of threats and harassment from an online campaign aimed at doctors and staff caring for transgender children and youth, the TYP team took a stand and continued to provide care for this vulnerable population.

Sara Schnipper, , MSW, CAPPCON Medical Social Worker, University of Vermont Medical Center

Sara Schnipper is a medical social worker for the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Psychology Consult service (CAPPCON) at UVM Medical Center (UVMMC) which serves pediatric mental health patients in the Emergency Department. Recognizing the severity of the youth mental health crisis in the community and identifying the need for a social worker with a therapeutic skill set to be integrated into the hospital Emergency Department, Sara advocated for her current position. In this role Sara has elevated CAPPCON's ability to provide collaborative and trauma-informed care. She has inspired many with her selflessness, tireless energy, initiative and finely attuned therapeutic child, adolescent, and family centered care.



Sara is dedicated to the pursuit of just and equitable treatment for every child and always advocates fiercely for her patients. She does not shy away from finding solutions for even the most complex cases, often crafting creative solutions, or developing entirely new trauma responsive practices.

Since receiving her master's degree in Social Work from the University of Vermont in 2009, Sara has been a force in advocating for the best interests of the patients and families she serves by establishing strong connections, and effectively and efficiently navigating complex mental health and medical systems.

Prior to her role as CAPPCON social worker, Sara was a Pediatric Social Worker for UVMMC Children's Hospital and Burn Shock Trauma Social Worker. In addition to these roles, she previously held leadership roles at the NFI Hospital Diversion Program, a seven-

bed inpatient crisis stabilization and treatment program for children and adolescents with psychiatric concerns.

Sara is an incredible asset, embodying the mission of working together to improve the safety and well-being of children. She is committed to providing high quality care to a pediatric psychiatric population and her work will continue to enhance the care for youth and family presenting to the Emergency Department and inpatient.

Gabriella Tufo Strouse, Community Outreach Director, King Street Center

Gabriella Tufo Strouse has been part of King Street Center since 1995. She has had an immeasurable impact for almost 30 years as an unyielding advocate for kids and families through her work as the director of King Street's mentoring program and in the youth mentoring field across the state.

Gabé's passion for and skills in fostering mentoring opportunities are unparalleled. She coordinates the design and implementation of King Street Center's comprehensive volunteer program, including over 120 mentors, Book Buddies, and program-based community members. The Mentoring Program adheres to best practices in accordance with the National Quality Mentoring System and she provides year-round training and support for 60+ mentors & mentees annually.

In 1999 Gabé co-founded the Champlain Valley Mentoring Network, an inspiring group of mentor directors who come together monthly to discuss mentoring, best practices, training, events, trending youth topics, and advocacy work. The group grew and expanded across the region and in 2019 was renamed the Champlain Valley Mentoring Network.

Tireless in her efforts to expand opportunities for youth, Gabé is responsible for the development and implementation of multiple innovative programs including an afterschool teen program, Each One Reach One book buddies and King Street Lemonade, an entrepreneurial training program for middle school youth. She also implemented a job and career readiness component in the startup program at King Street called Teen Futures.

Gabriella has created a culture of support and collaboration in the greater Vermont youth mentoring field by always making herself available to support new program coordinators at other agencies and ensuring that




all mentoring program coordinators feel that they are part of a larger community. She works tirelessly to meet the needs of youth, making each voice feel heard and valued.

Gabriella grew up in the Burlington area, attended Rice High School and graduated from the University of Vermont, where she majored in Secondary Education with a concentration in English and earned her secondary teaching degree. While at UVM Gabriella was a mentor through the university's Big Brother/Big Sister Program. 
