

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

There are 17 SDGs.

Here's a breakdown of how Nourish Eco Village addresses each of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs):



- **No Poverty:** By empowering communities and reducing reliance on external aid, Nourish tackles poverty through sustainable job creation, skill development, and enterprise support.
- **Zero Hunger:** The food security program provides 4,400 meals monthly, supporting children, teachers, and staff with both farm-grown and purchased food.
- Good Health and Well-being: Nourish promotes well-being by providing nutritional meals and mental wellness through educational, social, and environmental programs.
- Quality Education: Nourish supports early to secondary education, including ECD programs, Green Kidz Club, and local school outreach for comprehensive learning and growth.
- **Gender Equality:** Programs like Ubuntu Girls Club empower girls through mentorship, skills training, and career guidance.
- Clean Water and Sanitation: The Eco Village integrates sustainable water and sanitation practices to support agriculture, food security, and hygiene.
- Affordable and Clean Energy: Green building workshops promote renewable energy usage, while ecofriendly practices align with sustainable living.
- **Decent Work and Economic Growth:** Nourish creates local jobs through micro-enterprise development, supporting artisans, farm workers, and hospitality staff.
- Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure: Nourish's training workshops in areas like computer literacy, financial skills, and hospitality foster workforce readiness and innovation.
- Reduced Inequalities: The Eco Village focuses on inclusion, supporting marginalized and underprivileged individuals with equal access to opportunities.
- Sustainable Cities and Communities: Nourish integrates conservation into community life, linking local livelihoods with environmental stewardship to foster sustainability.
- Responsible Consumption and Production: The Eco Village promotes waste reduction and recycling, while artisans create products from sustainable or upcycled materials.
- Climate Action: Environmental education in Green Kidz Club and indigenous farming practices contribute to local climate resilience and awareness.
- Life Below Water: While not directly addressed, environmental education promotes a holistic understanding of biodiversity, including aquatic systems.
- Life on Land: Through conservation education and wildlife protection efforts, Nourish fosters harmony between people and nature, reducing poaching by addressing poverty.
- Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions: Community-centered governance fosters transparency, empowerment, and equality within programs.
- Partnerships for the Goals: Partnerships with Thornybush Community NPO, Andersen Foundation, and local stakeholders drive impactful community and conservation initiatives.



Priority SDGs

Nourish Eco Village is strongest in the following SDG areas:



PRIORITY SDG

No Poverty (SDG 1): Through economic empowerment, enterprise support, and job creation, Nourish addresses poverty by equipping communities with sustainable livelihoods.



PRIORITY SDG

Quality Education (SDG 4): Programs like RISE Educare and Green Kidz Club provide comprehensive education, from early childhood to secondary school, supporting both academic and environmental learning.



PRIORITY SDG

Zero Hunger (SDG 2): Nourish's food security initiative delivers thousands of meals monthly, addressing hunger and enhancing local food sustainability through its working farm.



PRIORITY SDG

Decent Work and Economic Growth (SDG 8): By supporting microenterprises and offering job training, Nourish promotes local economic stability and growth.

Nourish Progress

Lots of activity and huge expansion happened both in terms of physical infrastructure as well as impact delivery!



- SKILLS DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOPS 72 individuals benefited from increased skills by attending workshops/training in hospitality, sewing, baking, entrepreneurship, crafting, carpentry, and basic construction.
- JOBS/EMPLOYMENT 70 were jobs created including YES 4 YOUTH supporting 350 beneficiaries.
- YES 4 YOUTH 31 youth were hosted in job shadowing learnerships to enable them to gain workplace skills. In partnership with Africa Foundation we have been able to offer job opportunities for these previously unemployed youth for a year. This government funded project enables youth to gain invaluable work experience to jump start their employment path. For us, at Nourish we benefit with all this new, youthful energy which helps us keep the programs relevant and growing.







Scaling!

MAKREPENI (located on the road to Gowrie Gate, Sabi Sands) – the dream of replicating the Eco Village model became a reality with the launch of phase 1 in September 2023. Thank you to funding from Andersen Construction! Phase 1 included Green Kidz library, playground, outdoor classroom, Grannies kitchen and covered eating area, camping area for volunteers, and the farm.

Green Kidz after care was the first program launched serving the communities of Serville A & B, Utah, and Dixi and the turnout was much larger than expected! We are now feeding and providing environmental education for 250 + children each day. Green Kidz outreach into surrounding schools in the area has also commenced.

The build of Phase 2 comprised of the Enterprise Hub - Coffee Shop, Bakery, Craft Shop and Hospitality Training Centre commenced near year end to be launched in the next fiscal year. This project also allowed us to bring onboard 40 local labourers from the Makrepeni community over a period of 10 days (creating income and building skills).

METSI (near Paul Kruger Gate) - land has been granted by the tribal authorities for another 'node'.





A new computer lab was built and launched at Makrepeni in May 2024 thanks to a collaboration with University of Massachusets, Amherst and the Isenberg School of Management – we are now fundraising so that we can offer accredited and non-accredited courses to the children and adults in the community empowering them with important digital skills.







That's not all...

The computer lab at Sigagule has been busy with extra Maths classes this year benefitting 32 students. UMass students also visited Sigagule in May donating even more computers to the lab there and significantly boosting our capacity to deliver impact to the community.

Farming – both farms (Sigagule and Makrepeni) are thriving with fresh organic produce in abundance – beetroot, spinach, onions, tomatoes, chilies, and peppers. Over 600 kg of healthy veg was harvested! The majority of the produce goes into the feeding scheme which, between the 2 Eco Villages combined, provided 143,616 healthy meals to vulnerable children and community members in the year.

AND 38 fruit trees were planted at Sigagule and Makrepeni Eco Villages.

We have gone OFFGRID at Sigagule thanks to an incredible and generous donation by Filius e.V allowing us to walk the talk and be more eco friendly (plus survive loadshedding!)





Our Volunteers make a difference!

215 volunteers from 14 countries supported the 2 Eco Villages and built 6 veggies garden to support food security for community members.

Volunteers built 6 playgrounds in the communities uplifting the lives of 516 children

IMPACT METRICS

EDUCATION

- RISE CRECHE Sigagule 62 children provided with ECD learning opportunities and WILD HEARTS environmental education for pre-school children.
- Teachers are provided with on-gong training and resources for the WILD HEARTS
 program which helps us teach environmental education at a pre-school level
 through creative activities and art



GREEN KIDZ

- 4860 children provided with environmental education through Green Kidz outreach.
- 397 children received homework support, creative work, sport and eco development through Green Kids at Sigagule and Makrepeni
- 300 children experienced conservation/nature oriented field trips


RISE CRECH OUTREACH

- 420 children supported with moringa supplements. This is purchased from community homes supporting livelihoods. We also grow onsite at the Eco Village in Sigagule.
- 10 creches supported with food staples, resources and play learning support.
- Messages from our outreach creches remind us, that at a grassroots level small things make a big difference!

SEWING CENTRE

- New sewing centre completed at Sigagugle. Thank you to Timbavati Foundation. It's now buzzing
 with activity to stock our craft shop and empower skills to young women and men from the local
 village. We have hosted 4 sewing workshops during the year.
- 1200 reusable sanitary pads produced and distributed to 200 teen girls to keep them in school.









UBUNTU GIRLS CLUB

- 40 girls educated about HIV, unprotected sex, teenage pregnancy etc.
- As part of the program the girls also engage in self care practices such as meditation and journalling, creative development such as beading, and empowerment and confidence building such as self defence classes.





ANIMAL OUTREACH

- 42 animal outreach days to help community learn animal kindness and animal care.
- 460 village dogs vaccinated, treated, or sterilised to help animal welfare. We believe that animal kindness starts at home - so working with peoples dogs promotes empathy and connection. This is also part of our ONE HEALTH worldview - healthy people - healthy environment - healthy animals.







COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

- 11 Cleanup/plogging days days to collect litter in the village.
- 648 kgs of waste collected, sorted and recycled.
- 12 wire snare removed from the bush near our Eco Villages. This is a

practical way we can help keep animals out of snares and promote conservation.


