

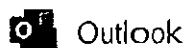

Subject: Proposed Amendment to Parking Ordinance

I understand that proposed amendments to the City of LaGrange Parking Ordinance will be considered at the Council meeting tonight and, although I will be unable to attend due to a previously scheduled out of town trip, I am submitting the following written comments with a request that you share them at the Council meeting tonight during discussion of the proposal. Specific concerns as follows:

1. Referencing 72.02 B - Manner of Parking, the proposal, if enacted, will interfere with emergency vehicles (fire, police, ambulance, EMS, etc.), school buses, mailbox delivery, delivery vehicles (UPS and Amazon), and garbage trucks. Parking on both sides of the street reduces space for these vehicles, as does allowing parking in cul de sacs. Mention is also made of "circumstances, or "special circumstances", which begs the question of who determines what circumstances qualify and who determines a valid circumstance?
2. Referencing 72.03 B - Limitations of Stopping and Parking, amends the current provision prohibiting parking on a sidewalk, adding "except in residential neighborhoods where a sidewalk and a driveway to the homeowner's residence cross." People walking for exercise on sidewalks, especially seniors,

do not need to be dodging cars parked on the sidewalk or intersections of sidewalks. Sidewalks are in the public right of way. This entire section is problematic as few residents, let alone visitors, will read the 16 exceptions listed. The proposal, if adopted, presents an enforcement nightmare for the LaGrange police and Code enforcement staff.

3. Referencing 72.45 Snow Emergencies (A) mention is made of "heavy snowfall", which is not defined, and no mention is made of sleet, ice, black ice, or road conditions. Ground temperatures influence how much of a hazard snow presents. Again, there is so much new procedure proposed that by the time the Mayor and police processed it, the time lost in doing so may add to the hazard. The City has an outstanding public works department and City Hall has a record of significant success in dealing with weather challenges.
4. Referencing 72.61 Parking in Business District, this proposal amends the parking limit within the business district from two to four hours. Parking is limited in the business district now, and with the proposed extension, will necessitate additional parking facilities. The reopening of the Courthouse will only add parking to this scenario.
5. Referencing 72.99 Penalty, this proposal reducing the fine structure to \$50, or \$25 if paid early, rather than the current progressive violation rates of \$50, \$100 and \$500. There is no incentive for repeat violators to not continue to violate the parking ordinance. An additional question is whether this provision will apply to all violations of the Parking ordinance or just those in the Business District?

Concluding, this proposal needs additional work by the Ordinance Committee, addressing the concerns expressed above. I recommend rejecting this proposal, and sending it back to the Committee, with the assumption all agree that public streets and sidewalks are not the domain of a homeowner, but are for access and use by the public for the intended purpose and services. Your attention to this matter is appreciated.

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
