## 2025\_11\_09 Homily Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome

The Basilica of St. John Lateran is the Cathedral of Rome, named 'the mother of all churches' in the year 320. Pope Leo lives at the Vatican, but St. John Lateran is his Apostolic See. Today the Catholic Church commemorates what this Basilica means to the entire people of God. It is a symbol of the New Temple, a symbol of the Catholic Church with Christ as its head, and we as living stones of this spiritual building. According to Ezequiel, the Temple is God's house, and the wells in it give new life to God's pilgrim people as they journey through the desert. In our spiritual Temple, Jesus is the Living Water, given by the Spirit in the Sacraments, to vivify and purify us. St. Paul reminds us that we are the new temple: our bodies are vehicles created by God to carry his Saving Presence in this world.

In Jesus' times, the official religion had become an empty institution, a social structure with rituals, prescriptions, bloody sacrifices, and a huge business around the Temple. Jesus comes to implement a religion that is humane, merciful, and followed by people who want to be righteous and loving. He comes and confronts the empty religion established around the Temple of Jerusalem: The great celebrations that take place in the temple, especially during the Passover with so many pilgrims, had led many believers to lose the true meaning of their spirituality. In this context, Jesus proclaims that it is urgent to establish a new spirituality, not centered around the temple or animal sacrifices, but about the kind of people that God created us to be.

According to Jesus, a true spirituality doesn't require meaningless rituals or the sacrifice of animals anymore. The sacrifice of animals is offered in the Temple to please a God who is unmerciful and far away from his people. And this God can be manipulated for those who make promises and perform rituals that are pleasing to Him. Unfortunately, this is the spirituality of many Christians in today's world. They want to please a god who requires bloody sacrifices, and they believe that they can buy their salvation with promises, devotions, and empty rituals. Those who follow this religion use God's name to justify expressions of racism, hatred, exclusion, violence, immorality and injustice. So, Jesus in the Temple teaches us that our spirituality cannot be disconnected from the challenge to change the world and change that has to be done according to God's will.

In the New Temple, God is praised by those who pay attention to the needs of the poor and vulnerable, for those who seek integrity and mercy in all their relationships, and for those who get involved in the implementation of justice, peace, and love in the world.

Dear brothers and sisters: The true Temple of God is now the Human Family. Each person in this world is a living stone, created and loved by the Father, anointed and redeemed by the blood of Christ and strengthened by the Holy Spirit. Today, we affirm the sacredness of the human body, the sacredness of all forms of life, and the commitment to build up spiritual temples in our families, in our local communities, and in the universal Church. In this Year of Hope, we are to restore our spirituality, following the example of Christ. We are to be people of tender love, generous charity, and true disciples, always seeking integrity in all our relationships. Jesus Christ is the living water, given to us in the sacraments to purify, renew, refresh, and strengthen us. The message is clear: Our spirituality is a call to transform the world and make real God's plan in it. That is true faith, true Christian spirituality, true piety, and it expresses authentically our love of God. Our liturgies, devotions, and individual sacrifices will only make sense if they lead us to see each other as God's beloved children and act with love, respect, and compassion towards each other.

True authentic Christian faith will always lead us to be better people, day by day, to be more committed with deeds of justice and mercy, to become instruments of reconciliation and truth, and to respect all forms of life on our planet. May our faith never be empty, but always be a source of grace and love for ourselves and for others. May the Catholic Church shine in the midst of the darkness of the world, with our righteousness and love.
