

Thinking back to my last post prior to this year's apple pressing day, I was very worried that we would be struggling for fruit by the time of the event at the beginning of October. How wrong I was! My worries were based on the number of apples that were falling from the trees around the village and most other people were of the same opinion. However, the long dry summer was followed by a spell of wet weather in September, and this may have helped the trees to retain the fruit for longer than expected.

One thing is certain, there was an awful lot of apples. This was partly due to the warm spring, when the trees were in blossom, and the lack of those troublesome late frosts that we are prone to get allowed a greater amount of pollination. Also, there is a suggestion that the dry summer caused considerable stress in the trees, the consequence of which produces an abnormally large amount of fruit.

This is likely to be a survival strategy, a situation we probably have all witnessed in the hedgerows this year and significantly with the oak. If anyone has stood under a large oak tree this autumn, it's impossible not to notice the carpet of acorns surrounding it. This is generally referred to as a 'mast year', when the trees produce an unusual number of acorns, ensuring a higher chance that some will escape consumption by the animals that usually feed on acorns in the autumn.

Traditionally, it was common to turn pigs out into the forests to fatten up on the acorns, a practice known as 'pannage'. This is still practised in some areas of the county, notably in the New Forest, where it helps to remove the abundance of acorns, which are poisonous to horses and other farm animals, but not to pigs. The mention of pigs brings me back to apple pressing, as one of the most common questions I get asked is, 'where does all the waste apple go'? This is called pomace, and the connection is of course, pigs. Our pomace goes to Peashell Farm to mix in with the pig food, so fulfilling our idea of reducing waste and turning all those lovely apples into something useful.

A big thank you to everyone who came down to another successful apple pressing day. We were blessed again with a dry day, although not especially sunny.

We had an amazing number of apples this year, the most ever, and special thanks to all those who brought some apples for pressing. Thankfully we had our new press in operation, which helped us cope with the amount that needed pressing. It is actually an old press, possibly 200 years, although a bit like grandma's old broom, with three new handles and six new heads, it has been much rebuilt with mostly-new wood.

We are grateful to the parish council who were able to negotiate a road closure, allowing the event to occupy more of the village green, making it safer for everyone to spread out. There was a good selection of steam engines, vintage tractors and other classic vehicles, and it was nice to have the Ducklington Morris able to perform for everyone. The ever-popular vintage tea tent was busier than usual. Thanks to all our volunteers for baking cakes and manning the tent all day. It is heart-warming to have an event where everyone can come and enjoy a couple of hours outside, just connecting with their neighbours. A great community effort and really nice to chat to so many people.

The date for next year's apple pressing day is Sunday 11th October. Hope to see you all there.



#### **Art Trail**

The art trail is well underway in Ducklington. The wooden art structure at Bartholomew Close Park is finished. Cotswold artist, Natasha Houseago, has been working on site since July. She enjoyed having many visitors and discussing her work. The sensory garden has started on Chalcroft Park. This will have a poem given by Pam Ayres engraved in the stone paving, surrounded by plants and trees and places to sit and enjoy. The mosaic planters are now at the entrances to the villages, so thank you to Sarah Varnom and volunteers for creating these lovely planters. Artwork coming in the new year will be at the beacon and at the entrance to Fritillary Field , both designed by Oxfordshire artist, Christopher Townsend. The funds used for the art trail were given by s106 monies, designated for art, to Ducklington Parish council. The whole trail will be launched in

spring/early summer 2026, so watch this space.



Also to note, the new base at Glebelands Park is for two new benches, again coming soon. Chalcroft play park is due to be renovated late 2026 with monies from the solar farm.

I recently attended to provide an update on some of the activities I get up to as a Councillor and a Scout Leader. Please do encourage family and friends along.

#### **Bartholomew Close Public Art**

The wonderful Natasha has recently finished the fantastic art sculpture at the bottom of Bartholomew Close. You can see the swan and the fritillary – it really is a masterpiece, so if you're having a walk through the village, go and have a look.

#### Witney Library Re-Opening

Over the last few months many of you will know that the library has continued to service people from the Witney Fire Station, due to the refurbishment. But I am now really pleased that the library will be re-opening on 6th December! The new space will be fantastic, continuing to put readers at the heart of its service. So, from 6th December please to support the local library back in its newly refurbished premises.

#### **The Moors**

The recent spell of wet weather has clearly demonstrated why The Moors is entirely unsuitable for development. We must continue to firmly oppose any building plans here. The Environment Agency have previously stated that development on this site is inappropriate, making the ongoing efforts by the developer and landowner to be completely self-serving. I will continue to stand against these proposals, and I know many of you share this commitment.

#### Oxford Congestion Zone

Despite much opposition, the Oxford Congestion Zone is now live. Here in Ducklington, we will get 25 passes to travel through the areas below. Once you have used your 25 passes, you will need to pay £5 to travel through the areas in the table. Blue Badge holders are exempt, but do need to apply for their exemption.






#### **Ducklington History**

Whilst rifling through an unlabelled white box that I randomly extricated from the collection of Ducklington history society material, I found a small paper booklet titled "Ducklington History Trail". Created in 2010 by the Ducklington History Group, it takes the reader on a guided tour of the more notable part of the old village. I can find no information as to if/how it was distributed, and it seems a crime for it to languish without the Ducklington community being aware of it. So, my aim is to share it with you across several editions of the newsletter.

A trail is of no use without a map; and whilst the booklet has a somewhat blurry one, by good fortune the original hand drawing was also in the box, which is reproduced below. The History Group then selected 21 sites and provided descriptions to convey some of the history of each. The June/July edition of the newsletter gave brief descriptions of the first six locations; here are several more:



- 7. **The Old School.** The National School, and the attached head teacher's house, were built in 1857-58 on a site given by the Stricklands of Cokethorpe. Originally of two rooms, the infants section was enlarged in 1896 and a third room was added in 1901. In 1930 the school was reorganised as a primary school with the older children having to travel to Witney. In 1962 a new school was built across the road and the old school finally sold for private housing in 1994. Proceed along Standlake Road to The Bell.
- 8. **The Bell Yard**. The collection of buildings known as The Bell Yard is most interesting and worthy of study in its own right. In 1839 it was a complex of six houses, a carpenter's shop, yard and gardens. The portion now forming The Bell restaurant, of seventeenth century origin, was a cottage held by William Jordan, a wheelwright, adjoining Smith's forge. The building that is now the pub was probably a barn, but in the mid nineteenth century was extended and converted into a brewery which ceased operating in 1886. Inside the pub is a covered well, probably used to provide the brewing water. Leave the Bell Yard and continue along Standlake Road passing Eve Cottage on your right, to Yew Tree House;
- 9. **Yew Tree House.** Originally a farm, this property was rebuilt in the 1860's as a gentleman's residence, but later reverted back to a farm. The land opposite the house was laid out as an enclosed small park, hence the remains of high stone walls fronting the properties on Standlake Road. To the rear of the house were barns and stables, now converted into residential units. The farmyard lay on the other side of Church Street on land occupied by Bartholomew Close. Continue around the "S" bend passing Manor Farm on your left.
- 10. **Manor Farm**. A seventeenth century farmhouse with a later additional "cottage" built for the retiring farmer when his son took over the running of the farm. The farm buildings were in the area now occupied by Pound Close. The fields lay behind and to the right of the house.
- Parish Pound, the Great House & Old Bakehouse. The piece of land at the far side of the entrance to Pound Close was the Parish Pound where stray animals were kept until collected by their owner. The fine of one shilling, paid to the constable, was called the "pinlock". The high wall opposite the Pound was the garden wall of The Great House which was demolished around 1840. Proceed around the bend and along Witney Road. The end cottage on the right, number 14 Witney Road, is reputedly the kitchen end of the Great House and dates from the seventeenth century or earlier. On your left is the thatched Old Bakehouse which date back from the late seventeenth century. Continue along the road to The Strickland Arms.

- 12. **The Strickland Arms.** [now a private dwelling] It may have been previously called the Ball or Blue Ball, but the name was evidently changed when the Stricklands became resident at Cokethorpe from 1812. In the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries the buildings on the right of the pub yard were two storeyed, extending all the way to Witney Road, and included a brewery. The main building is seventeenth century, much altered, but remains some original features. Continue along Witney Road past the former village shop (13) as shown in the image and the Baptish Church (15) to the green called Chalford Common.
- 13. **Chalford Green.** [presumably the grassed area where the Council have added some children's play equipment]. Chalcroft has been an open area since at least 1837 and presumably for many years previously. To the north are the cottages of Little Ducklington, where the author and broadcaster Mollie Harris lived as a child. To the east is a lane called Coatham which may have been the main driveway to the Great House. Retracing your steps along Witney Road, turn right by the post box and along the footpath which leads towards Tristram Road.

#### To be continued...

I also have something for those who have access to the Internet and want to see our village as it once was. Between the 1820s and 1960s, Ordnance Survey produced maps of the UK landmass at a whopping six inches to represent one mile. These are accessible via the National Library of Scotland. Use https://maps.nls.uk/geo/find to access the resource, and within the dialog box labelled 'Choose maps' select 'Great Britain, Ordnance Survey' and 'OS Six-Inch, 1820s to 1960s'. Then, using a mouse wheel, use your geographic skills to zoom into Oxfordshire and then Ducklington. Click on the box in which Ducklington is located and it will turn blue ... and at the right edge are the OS maps through the years that are available. Select each of them and enjoy scrolling to zoom into the very high resolution imagery ... they are exquisite. You can even buy them!



Dear Friends,

If you're curious, or if you're simply weary and in need of peace, you would be so welcome to come along to church this Christmas season. Whether it's to join in the singing, to light a candle, or simply to find a few quiet moments in the midst of the hecticness, our doors — and our hearts — are open.

Why not take a fresh look this Christmas? Beneath the familiar wrapping of the Nativity, you might find hidden gems you hadn't noticed before — signs of love, hope and wonder waiting to be rediscovered.

There will be a collection during the service which will be shared equally between the Church and the Chair's chosen charities - Dementia Oxfordshire, part of Oxfordshire Age UK, and Oxfordshire Wildlife Rescue. There will be refreshments after the service and, as with all services at St Bartholomew's, everyone is most welcome!



#### **Ducklington Solar Farm Construction Nearing Completion**



We have an important update regarding the **Ducklington Solar Farm** project, which many residents have been following closely.

The Parish Council has received a construction update indicating that the main **bulk of the construction work is scheduled to finish between November and December this year**. This is a significant milestone for the project.

Once the main construction is complete, the focus will shift entirely to site tidiness and the technical aspects of bringing the solar farm online. This will involve a considerable amount of **site clearance and cleanup**, as well as detailed **electrical testing** of all the new equipment.

#### **Energisation and First Generation**

The current estimate for the site to be connected to the grid and fully energised is between March and May 2026.

We understand that residents are keen to know exactly when the solar farm will start generating electricity. While a precise date isn't available yet, the developer has assured the Parish Council that they will **provide the first date of generation as soon as it is firmed up**.

We anticipate having a more detailed and firm date to share with you early in the New Year.

The Parish Council will continue to monitor the progress and provide updates in future newsletters. In the meantime, if you have any immediate queries about the solar farm construction, please submit them to the Parish Council and we will pass them on to the developer.

#### Friends of St Bartholomew's Church, Ducklington

Do you like churches, but not going to church? I think that is perfectly understandable and permissible and possible, and churches are much more than what happens there on a Sunday!

When I was at the Cheltenham Literary Festival in October, I picked up a book by Andrew Ziminski, *Church Going: A Stonemason's Guide to the Churches of the British Isles*.

At the beginning of the book, Ziminski says this:

For many centuries, churches were the most prominent and busiest building in their community... and so offer as close an encounter with the past as it is possible to get.

The same book had this somewhat frivolous verse by Evelyn Ryan on the flyleaf (Ryan was an Ohio poet and jingle and slogan writer!)

Every time I pass a church I stop and make a visit, So when I'm carried in feet first God won't say "Who is it?"

There is another – more thoughtful – poem about visiting a church by Philip Larkin: it is called *Church Going*, and I definitely recommend reading the whole poem! Larkin adopts a somewhat cynical attitude, but there are some really profound thoughts and lines in the poem. I particularly like ..

For, though I've no idea
What this accoutred, frowstry barn is worth,
It pleases me to stand in silence here:

A serious house on serious earth it is, In whose blent air all our compulsions meet, Are recognized, and robed as destinies.

If you are drawn to church buildings, as Philip Larkin said he was, do make St Bartholomew's Church a place to visit. The church is open from 10am-3pm most weekdays and Saturdays and Sundays, and you might find that you have the church to yourself if you visit at one of those times!

The Friends of Ducklington Church are a loose association of people who love the fact that the church has been here in the centre of the village for many, many generations. Each year individual Friends make a donation [£12 or £20] and this is ring-fenced to maintain the fabric of the church — that is, the bricks and mortar (and the gutters and the drains!). Currently, there are about 100 Friends and so their contribution is not insignificant.



### WILD DUCK

Our intrepid volunteers turned out on 27th September to carry out a bit more work to help create wildlife-friendly verges and fill them with nectar and pollen, bringing a bit more colour and joy to us all.

One team tended to the planting in the car park beds, another cleared the Starnham Road 'triangle' of grass cuttings and planted a few perennial wild flowers, then planted snowdrops along the footpath that leads from there to Witney Road. 
