

THE ART TRAIL ROUTE

The Art Trail starts from the Travelodge Hotel on the Ducklington Roundabout. As you come into the village you will see one of our beautiful **Fritillary Mosaic Planters**. You will find a number of these throughout the village.

Continue into the village to the park on the right-hand side and our **Sensory Garden**. There is a poem engraved in the path by our famous local poet, Pam Ayres. Take a seat and enjoy the garden. Use your senses to smell, see, touch and hear the plants, but please don't eat them!

Carry along the main road and enter Church Street. Take the first left into Bartholomew Close. At the bottom, through a gate, there is a quiet grassy area where you will find the hand-crafted **Wooden Sculpture**.

Come out of Bartholomew Close and back onto the Witney Road and continue round the bend down to the centre of the village. Opposite the village pond you will see the **Kinetic Oak Leaf Sculpture**.

Go past the church, cemetery and allotments on your right, and through the metal gate. Make your way down the track, going over the stone bridge, until you get to a junction. The **Fritillary Flower Sculpture** can be found here.

When looking at the sculpture, go to your left and down the track that points in the direction of St Mary's Church spire. At the end of the track go through a metal gate and across the field. **Please be aware of livestock in the field and do not let dogs off the lead.** Go through the metal gate and over the bridge to join the lake pathway. You can go either direction around the lake to the exit by the A40 underpass. Take the path/cycle track that is on the left as you exit the lake, before the underpass. This will bring you back to Ducklington Roundabout and the Travelodge.





Fritillary Mosaic Planters

Chalcroft Sensory Garden

Bartholomew Close Wooden Sculpture
