Introduction

I want to start by wishing you all a very Happy New Year! I trust 2026 has begun positively for everyone. As I share my first thoughts of the year, I'd like to take a moment to look back on the Christmas season just gone.

A heartfelt thank you goes out to everyone who helped organise the Warm Welcome Christmas Lunch. It was a truly wonderful occasion, and it was fantastic to see so many people join in—thank you again for making it such a memorable event! Later that evening, I attended the District Council's Christmas Carol Service at St Bartholomew's Church. It was another brilliant gathering, and I'm grateful to all who played a part. Personally, I felt honoured to be asked to do a reading at the church where my parents were married and where my siblings and I were christened!

This year has already seen me busy with fresh casework from residents across Ducklington. Many of these matters relate to road maintenance, and I, along with local volunteers, have been actively reporting potholes. I'm hopeful that we'll see significant improvements to our village roads soon.

Planning Concerns

One of the topics that fills my inbox is planning around Ducklington and Witney. I share many concerns people raise with me – the main concern being the introduction up-to nearly 5000 more homes across Witney in the next 15 years. With any new housing developments, it is critical that the District Council prioritise local people. This is something that just hasn't happened. For example, many 'affordable homes' go to those who live in Central Oxford, where they are moved to our town. Surely, this is wrong? We have hundreds of people on our local housing register, so we need to prioritise local people to Ducklington and Witney – that should not be rocket science.

Household Waste Recycling Centres Changes Come into Effect

From 14th January, residents are being asked to book slots to visit their local HWRC. When you arrive at the tip, you will need to prove proof of address.

I have real concerns that this is going to make it more difficult for people to visit the tip, which in turn, could lead to more fly-tipping. If you or a family member is not online to book a visit to the tip, then you can call the council on the phone number below:

Oxford Congestion Zone

Despite much opposition, the Oxford Congestion Zone is now live. Here in Ducklington, we will get 25 passes to travel through the areas below. Once you have used your 25 passes, you will need to pay £5 to travel through the areas in the table. Blue Badge holders are exempt, but do need to apply for their exemption.



Ducklington History

Whilst rifling through an unlabelled white box that I randomly extricated from the collection of Ducklington history society material, I found a small paper booklet titled "Ducklington History Trail". Created in 2010 by the Ducklington History Group, it takes the reader on a guided tour of the more notable part of the old village. I can find no information as to if/how it was distributed, and it seems a crime for it to languish without the Ducklington community being aware of it. So, my aim is to share it with you across several editions of the newsletter.

A trail is of no use without a map; and whilst the booklet has a somewhat blurry one, by good fortune the original hand drawing was also in the box, which is reproduced below. The History Group then selected 21 sites and provided descriptions to convey some of the history of each. The June 25 – Jan 26 editions of the newsletter gave brief descriptions of the first 15 locations; here is the last instalment:



16. **Tristram Road.** On turning left into Tristram Road, there are three old cottages on the left hand side, the detached Lilac Cottage and the semi-detached Brecon and Pear Tree Cottages. The latter have a datestone of 1676 on the front elevation. The orientation of these cottages is curious as until 1837 there was no road access to them. Tristram Road was only created on enclosure when it was renamed Backway Private carriage Road and Public Footway. Proceed along Tristram Road, passing the back of the Strickland Arms and two converted barns on your left. Cross over Witney Road and proceed down Church Street to The Old Farmhouse.
17. **The Old Farmhouse.** Originally called Ducklington Farm this was the last working farmhouse in the village. On the wall is a datestone of 1682, probably the date of the original building which was refaced in the early nineteenth century. To the rear of the property, just visible from the road, is a two storey stone granary. Continue along Church Street to the next property, Lynden House.
18. **Lynden House.** Dated 1661, Lynden House, originally a farm house of two storeys and attics, retains chamfered beams and a gabled central stair turret. The barn conversions opposite originally belonged to Ducklington Farm, and the development of Strainge's Close was the farmyard. Proceed along Church Street turning left at The Square towards Windrush Farm, passing the site of the blacksmith's forge (19) on the right.
20. **Windrush Farm & Cottage.** At the end of the tarmac road, Windrush Farmhouse is on your left, behind which are the original farm buildings, largely intact, and are a good example of the layout of an eighteenth century farmstead. Windrush Cottage, opposite, is a fine example of an early seventeenth century thatched house which retains ovolo-moulded, wood-mullioned windows and is typically single storeyed with attics. Return to The Square, turning left towards the church to Church Farm.
21. **Church Farm.** Church Farm is possibly late sixteenth century making it the oldest property in the village after the church. It has stone mullioned windows, a through passage and winder stairs. The lane running down

the side of Church Farm leads to the Lowe Windrush Park, and the Fritillary Meadow which is open to the public one Sunday a year in April, when many people come to view the rare flowers in their natural setting.

The continuation of Church Street, now a private road, was the main road to Standlake before 1800. It is significant that there are no pre 1800 properties fronting the present Standlake Road beyond the pond.

That's it! This concludes the reproduction of the Ducklington History Trail. I hope you enjoyed it.

Meet the Parish Councillors – Matt Barker

Having grown up in an RAF family—with a father who served for 24 years—Matt's early life was one of constant travel, living across the UK, Germany, and the Netherlands. Driven by a desire to support local families and youth, Matt spent four years as a **school governor at the Batts School** and has been a familiar face at **St Mary's Church** in Witney. There, he served as a "sidesman" and was heavily involved with "Groundbreakers," the church's Sunday school programme.

Within the Parish Council, Matt has been a driving force for village connectivity. At the start of the pandemic, he and his family established the **village Facebook page** to ensure no resident felt isolated and that help was always just a message away. Matt also founded the **Village Events Committee (VEC)**, which he continues to Chair. Under his leadership, the VEC has brought the village together for landmark celebrations including the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, the King's Coronation, and VE Day commemorations. Matt is the first to credit his team, noting, "*We could not put these events on without the amazing people who give up their time and the expertise they bring.*"

Matt is equally passionate about protecting Ducklington's unique character. He is a vocal campaigner for **saving the Moors from development** and a consistent advocate for reducing speeding traffic through our streets. He also plays a vital role on the **"Projects" sub-committee**, ensuring that S106 developer funds are managed carefully for the long-term benefit of the entire village.

When he isn't busy with council business or his restoration work, Matt is a lifelong fan of music and football, having played the sport competitively since the age of seven.

The Parish Council is fortunate to benefit from Matt's community-minded leadership, his creative expertise, and his dedication to preserving the beauty and safety of Ducklington for future generations.

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St Bartholomew's Church, Ducklington. Finding Warmth in the Waiting Season

Dear Friends,

February and March are months of transition. The brightness of Christmas has passed, spring is not yet fully here, and the days can still feel cold and quiet. And yet, this in-between season has something important to offer. It invites us to pause, to notice, and to trust that even when things appear still, change is quietly underway.

In nature, growth often happens unseen. Beneath hard ground and winter frost, new life is already forming. In much the same way, our community is shaped not only by busy events and summer gatherings, but by smaller moments, the choice to step out when it would be easier to stay in, to connect when it might feel inconvenient, and to keep showing up for one another.

Winter can make coming together more challenging. Darker evenings and colder days naturally draw us inward. Yet experiences like the recent **St Bartholomew's Rambling group** walk remind us how rewarding it can be to share time and conversation, even when wrapped in coats and scarves. These walks, which are open to everyone, are usually held on the second Saturday of the month and offer more than fresh air; they offer companionship, encouragement, and the simple joy of being together.

It is in this spirit that we are also introducing a new **First Sunday of the month service 10am, "Worship Together"**. This shorter, relaxed and inclusive service is open to everyone, whatever your age or experience of church. It is a gentle opportunity to pause, to be together, and to create space for reflection and for meeting with God in a friendly and unhurried way.

At the heart of village life is the understanding that we are stronger together. WILD DUCK

By the time you read this, 2026 won't be quite so 'new', many well-intentioned resolutions will have fallen by the wayside and life, for many, will have reverted to familiar patterns.

My resolution is to forge ahead with caring for our small green spaces in Ducklington, so that they serve our wildlife and offer us little patches of wonder and beauty as the seasons change. We already have a solid group of volunteers who put their hand to various planting and gardening tasks - but if you'll join us, we can do lots more (and you'll get a bit of a Green Gym workout)!

The scope to make a difference is vast. According to the *State of Nature report (2023)*, across the UK, the species studied have declined on average by 19% since 1970 and nearly one in six species are threatened with extinction from Great Britain! Studies have found that that UK is one of the world's most nature-depleted countries, with on average about half its biodiversity left - far below the global average of 75%. It means the UK is in the bottom 10% globally for biodiversity.

What could YOU do to make a difference? Perhaps you want to encourage a particular butterfly, moth or bird that you used to see a lot of, but is now in decline. Or you might have visions of hedgehog highways linking different parts of the village. Or perhaps a garden pond is more your thing? So many possibilities!

The staff and children have come back refreshed from their festive break and have settled back into school well, all ready for their new learning.

In Nursery, the topic this term has been 'winter wonderland'. The children have enjoyed a variety of winter and Arctic themed books such as 'A thing called snow'. Some activities have included winter yoga poses, snowman hedgehog models, Arctic animal paintings, small world play and cotton bud snowflake craft. The snow on the first day back really helped to kick start our topic and draw in the children's interest and excitement!


In Reception, the team have welcomed the children back together after the Christmas break. They have been so happy to catch up with their friends and settle back into routines. The children have enjoyed a variety of activities, including developing their handwriting and playing number games. There has been great excitement exploring the outdoors and discovering the snow. It has been a joy to see their enthusiasm, confidence and love of learning shine through.



Y4 have been learning about Anglo-Saxon settlements. They learnt how the Saxons used a method called Wattle and Daub to create walls for their buildings. First, they created their wattle frame and then had enormous fun using clay, water and hay to make their daub walls. The children were very pleased that they did not use the additional material of manure that the Anglo-Saxons would have!



Year 2 have started to learn about Grace Darling and her amazing rescue, they are also exploring how schools have changed over time and interviewed a school governor to learn more about schools in the past. They have started a printing unit in art and are exploring relief printing. The children enjoyed using their hands to make printed paper to embellish with drawings of flowers. This week they will visit the refurbished library in Witney and choose a book to borrow for the classroom. This is a brilliant way to encourage reading for pleasure.



Year 5 have been really enjoying engaging in some fantastic science investigations with electricity. We have been creating simple circuits using our bodies to start with and then moved onto testing different components of a circuit. We have loved investigating and testing different theories and are super excited to test some materials to find out whether they are conductors or insulators too!

In year 6, we have started off the year by looking at the body in more detail. In Science, we have learnt all about the circulatory system and how our muscles get the oxygen they require. Over the next few days, we will be consolidating our learning by writing a blog on this in our English lessons, challenging ourselves to include technical vocabulary amongst relative clauses and parentheses. During art, we have focused on the artist Frankie Greig to explore the shapes that make up our facial features. We have used a variety of mediums to recreate these features and look forward to creating our mixed media self-portraits in the next few weeks.



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
