

PASTOR'S LETTER




SAINT IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH, BISHOP AND MARTYR

Saint Ignatius of Antioch, October 17. Antioch, in present-day Syria, was the third largest metropolis in the ancient world after Rome and Alexandria. Ignatius became its bishop around 69, succeeding Saint Evodius, but above all the apostle Peter, who had founded the Christian community in that city. It is said that Ignatius, originally from a non-Roman pagan family, professed his Christian faith at a late age, recognizing that God is love and that the risen Jesus was the long-awaited Messiah, thanks to the preaching of Saint John the Evangelist, who had evangelized those lands. Ignatius was a strong bishop, a zealous pastor. The followers of his Christian community called him a "fiery" believer, as the etymology of his name suggests. During his episcopate, the terrible persecution of Emperor Trajan began. The bishop refused to renounce his faith and was therefore condemned to be transported in chains to Rome. Thus began his very long journey, during which he was often tortured by the guards, until his arrival in Rome. The execution of the sentence took place in 107 in the Colosseum, during the celebrations for the emperor's victories in Dacia, and in this way "the Wheat of Ignatius" was ground by the ferocious beasts to be transformed into "Christ's Eucharistic Bread." From Bishop Ignatius's journey to martyrdom, seven beautiful letters survive, which also constitute an inimitable document of the life of the Christian communities of the time. When he arrived in Smyrna, he wrote the first four, three of which were addressed to three other communities in Asia Minor: Ephesus, Magnesia, and Trali. In them, he expressed his gratitude for the many demonstrations of affection. The fourth letter, however, is addressed to the Church of Rome and contains a plea not to hinder his own martyrdom, for which the bishop feels honored, considering it an opportunity to rejoin Jesus by following the path of his own life and his painful Passion. After passing through the Troada, Ignatius wrote three more letters: to the Church of Philadelphia, to Smyrna, and to the bishop of the latter city, Polycarp. In these letters, he asked the faithful to support the Church of Antioch, which was about to face the imminent sacrifice of its pastor, and offered the bishop interesting guidelines on the exercise of the episcopal function. We also have pages of true and proper declarations of love for Christ and his Church, which for the first time was defined as "catholic"; testimonies of the tripartite conception of the Christian service or ministry of the bishop, priests, and deacons for the faithful; as well as guidelines on how to counter the docetic heresy that claimed that the Incarnation of the Son was only apparent and not real. But above all, in his letters we read the desire, expressed almost as a prayer, that the faithful always maintain the unity of the Church by overcoming all errors and eliminating all divisions. Saint Ignatius prayed for the Church, commended it with tears to God, and gladly submitted to the soldiers to be chained and taken to Rome. At Seleucia, a seaport located about twenty-five kilometers from Antioch, they boarded a ship that sailed along the coast of Asia Minor. Some of his faithful from Antioch took a shorter route and

arrived in Rome before him, where they waited for him. For most of the journey, Saint Ignatius was accompanied by the deacon Philo and Agathophus, who are considered the authors of the accounts of his martyrdom. During the voyage, Saint Ignatius was guarded day and night by ten soldiers who, according to the saint, were like "ten leopards." He adds, "I was fighting with wild beasts on land and sea, day and night," and "when they were treated kindly, they became even more enraged." The numerous stops gave the saint the opportunity to confirm the faith of the churches near the coast of Asia Minor. Wherever the ship docked, Christians sent their bishops and priests to greet him, and large crowds gathered to receive his blessing. Delegations were also appointed to escort him along the way. In Smyrna, he had the joy of meeting his former classmate Saint Polycarp; Bishop Onesimus, who was heading a delegation from Ephesus: Bishop Damasus, with envoys from Magnesia; and Bishop Polybius of Tralles. Burrus, one of the delegates, was so helpful to Saint Ignatius that he asked the Ephesians to allow him to accompany him. From Smyrna, the saint wrote four letters. The guards hurried to leave Smyrna to reach Rome before the end of the games, for the illustrious and venerable -looking victims were the great attraction in the amphitheater. Ignatius himself, delighted, seconded their haste. They immediately embarked for the Troas, where they learned that peace had been restored in the Church of Antioch. In the Troas, Ignatius wrote three more letters, one to the faithful of Philadelphia. From the Troas, they sailed to Naples in Macedonia. Then they went to Philippi, and after crossing Macedonia and Epirus on foot, they re-embarked at Epidamnus (present-day Durazzo in Albania). According to the Acts, as the saint approached Rome, the faithful went out to greet him and rejoiced at seeing him but regretted having to lose him so soon. As he had foreseen, they wished to take steps to free him, but he begged them not to prevent him from reaching the Lord. Then, kneeling with his brothers, he prayed for the Church, for the end of the persecution, and for charity and harmony among the faithful. According to the

same legend, Ignatius arrived in Rome on December 20, the last day of the public games, and was taken before the city prefect, to whom the emperor's letter was delivered. After the customary formalities, he was hurriedly taken to the Flavian Amphitheater. There, two fierce lions were unleashed upon him, which immediately devoured him, leaving only the largest bones. Thus, his prayer was answered. The details of the story are uncertain, but there is certainty about his martyrdom, which occurred in the ninth year of Emperor Trajan.

Stewardship A Disciple's Response Stewards of the Church: Part 1

Community and Stewardship

Through Christ's New Covenant, God reconciles humanity and forms us into a new community—the People of God, the Body of Christ, the Church. This unity is a gift to be cherished and preserved by lives of humility, gentleness, patience, and love (Eph 4:1–6). Because we are members of one body, its health and vitality depend upon the stewardship of each member. All are called to foster the gifts of others and to use their own gifts in service of the Church (1 Cor 12:7).

The tradition of tithing in the Old Testament reminds us that giving back to God is central to stewardship (cf. Dt 14:22). In the New Testament, Paul teaches that spiritual gifts must be directed toward building up the Church (1 Cor 14:12). This means stewardship is not optional—it is the responsibility of all who have been baptized. Each person has a vocation, but all share the same mission: to strengthen the Church by proclaiming, teaching, serving, and sanctifying.

Baptism places upon us the duty to offer ourselves—our gifts, resources, and lives—in service to God and His people. Pope John Paul II emphasized this call to active participation in the Church's mission, reminding us that every Christian is entrusted with a share of responsibility. Stewardship is not only about giving money but also about sharing time, talents, and presence in ways that build up the community of faith.

Above all, Christ is our model. His total self-giving inspires us to offer ourselves generously, even in small and ordinary ways. St. Paul reminds us that "whoever sows sparingly will reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will reap bountifully. God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor 9:6–7). True stewardship flows from love, and when lived fully, it strengthens both the Church's unity and its mission in the world.

Evangelization and Stewardship

Stewardship in the Church embraces evangelization, catechesis, and works of justice and mercy. While the Church's institutions and programs serve these purposes, stewardship also requires that each member of the faithful take personal initiative in living and sharing the faith.

Since we have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us exercise them:* if prophecy, in proportion to the faith;

Rom 12:6

Parents hold a central role within the "domestic church," the home. Their mission is to teach their children the truths of the faith, to pray with them, and to instill Christian values in the midst of a secular culture often opposed to them. This includes guiding children in the practice of stewardship, modeling generosity and service, and resisting the consumerism and individualism so widespread in society. Parents witness most powerfully by example, through selfless service to one another, their children, and the wider community.

Parishes, too, must be true communities of faith where this way of life is taught and practiced. Good stewardship requires transparency, accountability, and ethical financial management from pastors and parish leaders, while parishioners must take responsibility by offering both their financial support and personal service. The strength of parish life—its programs, vitality, and service to members and the wider community—depends on this shared commitment.

Yet stewardship is not limited to one's parish. The diocese, as a communion of parishes, forms the local Church and unites its people in faith, worship, and service. Stewardship here means the same spirit of generosity, responsibility, and active involvement that parish life requires. Catholics are called to understand and support the broader needs of their diocese, including financial realities and the oversight of leaders and administrators.

Stewardship also reaches beyond the diocese to the universal Church. It is expressed through support of the missions, global works of charity, and efforts of evangelization worldwide. For some, this involves direct participation in missionary activity; for others, it is generous giving to collections and programs that extend Christ's love and presence across the world.

Every Catholic is called to evangelize, and authentic stewardship naturally leads to it. As stewards of God's mysteries, believers are moved to share the gifts and graces they have received, especially the knowledge of Christ. The world, as Pope Paul VI reminds us, has a right to hear the riches of Christ, for in Him the human family discovers the wisdom, righteousness, sanctification, and redemption it longs for.

They are now preparing to publicly declare their intention to continue their journey towards becoming Catholics. At this Rite, they are asked to more fully embrace the Gospel message with the help of God, and are also signed with the Cross to show that they now belong to Christ, the Shepherd of souls. During this time, the parish community has the opportunity to more fully participate in and pray for those in the OCIA process. This Rite places these catechumens in a formal relationship with the universal Church. By Church law, the Pope, bishops, clergy and all the faithful are to pray for those who will enter into the order of the catechumens.. We encourage all parishioners to pray for these souls as they continue in the initiation process over the coming months, and to reach out to them as fellow members of the Household of Christ.


