At least by the 5th century, Peter and Paul were at the head of the Apostles. The two from S. Vitale are on the underside of the main arch, at the apex, on either side of the image of Jesus, with the other Apostles following down the arch. In the Neonian Baptistry, they head up the procession that of the Apostles around a central image of the Baptism of Christ. Throughout the images that come down to us from the early Church, it is clear that standardized characteristics were assigned to the different Apostles, as you can see here (St. Peter with short white hair and beard, St. Paul with dark hair, balding and long beard... St. Andrew always has wild hair). Also note, that the images are not the two-dimensional images we have come to expect. It is interesting to note that, at this time, St. Paul is included as one of the 12. In all likelihood, this is due to the significant roles the two of them play in the Acts of the Apostles. In Matthew's gospel, it is Simon who receives the revelation of who Jesus is, is renamed Peter, and proclaimed as the one on whom the Church will be built. As you read about either of them, their significance always falls back on the work that Christ is doing through their lives. The readings for the Vigil and for the Day, on this feast, point to God's action in the world because they allow God to work in them. We put a great deal of significance on their leadership, their authority in the Church, because we do not see that it is God at work in them that makes them important (a truth they will point to again and again), and it should lead us to understand ourselves in the same way. We too are called to allow Christ to work in us and through us so that the love of God reaches the ears and hearts of everyone living. Having a hierarchy sometimes makes it hard to see our own role. Peter and Paul both understood that authority resided in the community, guided by the Holy Spirit. It is this same Spirit that guided them in their work as they spread out in the world. Through Synodality, it is what Pope Francis sought to awaken us to anew: God is at work in the lives of all in the Church collectively and individually as extensions of the whole. We celebrate Sts. Peter and Paul in the context of this Church, which they served by allowing God to lead.
