Throughout history, agriculture and the patterns and movements of the stars have been significant in the way in which people have ordered time (think of Ecclesiastes 3:1-8). The pattern was change. Throughout the Middle Ages, calendars appeared in churches and in versions of the Book of Hours (a prayer book for the very rich) and each month was designated by the kind of work necessary to that month. (Of course it was based largely on the experience of the Northern Hemisphere.) October was sometimes depicted as the time that the grape harvest (late September) was made into wine and put in casks. It also was the

time of reseedling the fields before winter settled in and the ground would freeze, as we see depicted here in the Book of Hours for the Duke of Berry. Faith was necessary at all times of the year, as people believed in God at work in their work and their hope that their work would bear fruit. It required them to work (nothing would happen if they did not participate in what God was doing), but it also required them to be patient and to have faith in God's providence. No matter how hard you worked, difficulties were always a part of the deal: notice the birds here gathered behind the sower, feeding on the seeds he has just tossed, waiting to be plowed under, by the man with the plow. Habakkuk, in our first reading, wants reach in and change the world, but God invites him to continue in his work as a prophet and wait. In response for greater faith, Jesus informs them that they already have more than enough, but they need to remember a few things: 1) it is God's gift, 2) it is not going to work like magic, transforming the world as we see fit, and 3) our work in the world is our participation in the larger work God is accomplishing, so it will not happen on our schedule, and we will not be the hero of the moment. Love is our vocation...God does the rest.
