A Community Celebration

30 Years of Kingdom Trails

In September 2024 more than 300 people, landowners, donors, sponsors, community members, and trail lovers, gathered to celebrate a remarkable milestone: the 30th Anniversary of Kingdom Trails. Held at the scenic Inn at Mountain View Farm, owned and operated by one of KT's Founders, Marilyn Pastore and her husband John, the event also served as a heartfelt tribute to the generous landowners who make Kingdom Trails' 100+ miles of trails possible.

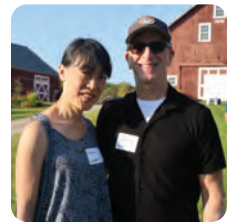
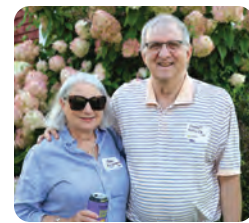
The celebration was presented by Title Sponsors, the Village Sport Shop and the Moriah Wilson Foundation, with generous support from Community National Bank. Under the tent provided by All Around Rental, guests mingled and enjoyed live music from Ashley Jane's Hootenanny, creating a festive, down-to-earth atmosphere that honored KT's roots.

The evening's flavors were proudly local. Jasper Hill Farms donated cheese, Libbey's Meat Market prepared a hearty buffet dinner, and sweet treats from Auntie Dee Dee's capped the meal. Beverages flowed freely throughout the night, thanks in part to Lawson's Finest Liquids, who generously donated all of the beer for the celebration. Their continued support of the KT community was deeply appreciated.

A highlight of the evening came when Chris Hibshman, co-owner of the Village Sport Shop, reflected on his family's deep roots in the community and the shop's long-standing partnership with Kingdom Trails. In a heartfelt moment, he was surprised with an original sign from when his grandfather and family owned and operated the Darion Inn, now the Inn at Mountain View Farm, drawing warm applause and symbolizing the lasting ties between KT and those who have helped it thrive. Executive Director Abby Long also took the stage to thank KT's landowners and community members for their continued support. Adding to the celebration, Senator Peter Welch spoke passionately about KT's impact on the Northeast Kingdom, and Karen Wilson of the Moriah Wilson Foundation shared a moving tribute to Moriah's legacy and KT's role in inspiring her love of the outdoors and athletic journey.

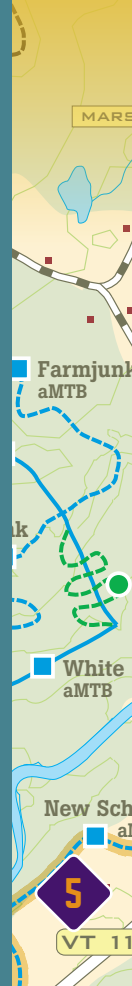

Legislative Action

In the 2025 Legislative Session, KT joined forces with fellow trail organizations through the Vermont Trails & Greenway Council to support H.147 and S.79, bills aimed at establishing the Recreational Trails Compensation Study Committee. This initiative would explore ways to recognize and incentivize private landowners who host public-access trails, a vital step toward maintaining and expanding Vermont's outdoor recreation network.

Over 70% of Vermont's public trails cross private land. Nonprofit trail organizations like Kingdom Trails rely on the generosity of these landowners, who are not compensated due to the State's liability protections. As trail use increases, it becomes more challenging to maintain access. A proposed study would evaluate the economic impact of trails and identify strategies for sustainable stewardship, both critical to preserving access and supporting Vermont's \$2.1 billion outdoor recreation economy, which makes up 5% of the state's GDP. Although related bills did not pass this session, trail organizations' advocacy helped prompt state action. Vermont has launched the Local-Level Outdoor Recreation Economic Impact project, which will deliver actionable recommendations to help communities better understand and support outdoor recreation.



It's All About the Trails!

Climate Readiness and Resiliency

Last summer KT and our surrounding community faced unprecedented challenges due to severe flooding from storms on July 10 and again on July 30. These events caused extensive damage, with culverts uprooted, bridges washed away, and sections rendered impassable. The immediate aftermath forced temporary closures during the peak tourism season, significantly impacting the local economy. The storms inflicted approximately \$300,000 in damages, not including the loss of membership revenue. This financial strain compounded the \$150,000 in damages from the previous summer's flooding, raising concerns about the sustainability of ongoing recovery efforts.

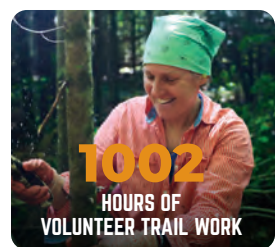
Despite these setbacks, the resilience of KT and the surrounding community has been remarkable. Swift action by the KT trail crew and remarkable volunteers allowed for the reopening of most trails within days. We extend a special thanks to Al Beaupre and Tom Evers who went above and beyond to help! KT is now focusing on enhancing trail resilience by adopting even more sustainable construction practices to mitigate future flood impacts. We continue to welcome visitors and encourage volunteers to assist in ongoing recovery efforts, emphasizing the community's commitment to rebuilding and strengthening the trail network for future generations.

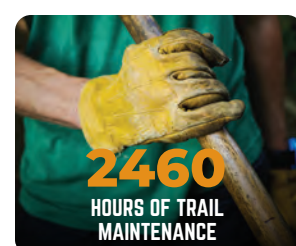

Electric Tools Grant from Vermont Council on Rural Development

KT was granted funding from the Vermont Council on Rural Development to support the transition to battery-powered trail maintenance and building equipment. This funding allows KT to reduce carbon emissions in line with our commitment to environmental stewardship. This project enabled the purchase of chainsaws, leaf blowers, and batteries, allowing us to adopt greener practices while maintaining 100+ miles of trails. By incorporating this eco-friendly equipment, we support our mission to foster the health of our local community, economy, and surrounding environment.

NorthWoods and KT Nordic Partnership at Dashney

KT teamed up with the NorthWoods Stewardship Center this winter to groom Burke Mountain's Dashney Nordic trails, adding a new 16 km of Nordic opportunity for KT members. NorthWoods operated the rental center on weekends for ski and snowshoe rentals, sweetening the deal even more!

Trails Toward Lyndonville

In 2024, KT contracted with NorthWoods, IdeRide, and Sinuosity to design and build a 1.3 mile aMTB accessible trail on Lyndonville's Pudding Hill. This new trail extends from KT's 2023 trail build around Kingdom Campground, featuring a VTrans-approved and signed crossing on VT Route 5, and brings us another step closer to connecting to downtown Lyndonville via trails.

We are deeply grateful to the Athletic Brewing Company and the Town of Lyndon for their funding through the Two for the Trails Grant and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds.



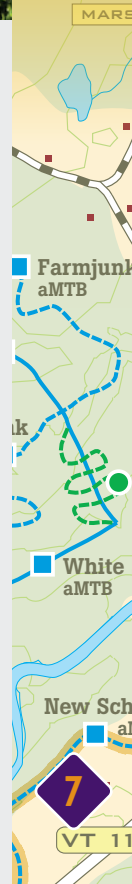
SJA Stewardship Day

In a powerful collaboration of service, learning, and inclusion, sophomore students from St. Johnsbury Academy rolled up their sleeves alongside KT staff and partners from Vermont Adaptive Ski & Sports and Adaptive Sports Partners to rebuild a bridge on the Border Trail. Using locally harvested and milled lumber, the team worked to make this section of trail fully accessible for adaptive mountain biking (aMTB). Throughout the day, students gained hands-on experience in trail construction while learning the deeper value of creating outdoor spaces that welcome everyone. This annual partnership is one we treasure, uniting youth, community members, and organizations in a shared mission to strengthen and make our trails more inclusive.



Kitchel Upgrade and Expansion

One of the most iconic trails in the KT network just got an exciting upgrade! Originally built in 2009 and named after KT founder Doug Kitchel, Kitchel was the first machine-built trail on the system, thanks to KT Landowner Knight Ide, who generously donated his time and equipment to bring it to life. It quickly became a rider favorite for its smooth flow and playful lines. In 2024, as a tribute to our roots and in celebration of how far we've come, we teamed up once again with Knight and the expert crew at IdeRide to usher Kitchel into a bold new chapter. The revitalized corridor now features not just the beloved original Kitchel (Green Circle), but also two brand-new descending trails: IdeRide That (Blue Square) and Drop It (Triple Black Diamond). Designed to preserve and enhance the original flow while introducing fresh challenges, these three stacked trails offer progression, variety, and pure fun for riders of all levels.





Elevate 2024

In its **second year**, this long weekend of bikes, friends, and community has grown! Elevate brings together women and gender expansive cyclists to cultivate community, develop skills, and foster their love of mountain biking. The weekend offers three days of clinics, group rides, socials, and bike demos. From lift service, to yoga classes, to epic KT rides, this event is a guaranteed good time! We're incredibly grateful for the partnership with VMBA and NEMBA, bringing together all of the New England mountain bike family to our trails.

Winterbike

After a **one-year hiatus** due to a lack of snow, Winterbike rolled back into East Burke for the 13th year on February 8th. KT partnered with MTBVT to bring back Vermont's ultimate fatbike festival with support from Lawson's Finest Liquids and Ranch Camp at Mike's Tiki Bar. Riders enjoyed cold-rolled singletrack on the iconic Kingdom Trails network and celebrated the love of winter biking with an incredible community of riders.

Torchlit Trail Experience

KT hosted another **amazing** Torchlit Trail Experience last winter! After one of many heavy snowfalls, participants snowshoed along a torchlit trail to a campfire with hot cocoa and s'mores! Our friend Bobby Farlice-Rubio was on hand, offering his unique gift of storytelling and astronomy. A huge thank you to Bobby, the Wildflower Inn, and NorthWoods Stewardship Center for the use of their telescope!

Kingdom East School District

In **2024**, over **200 local youth** had the opportunity to mountain bike through KESD's programs, sponsored by KT through a grant funded through the VOREC Community Grant Program, a grant program of the Vermont Outdoor Recreation Economic Collaborative (VOREC) administered by the Vermont Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation. These programs give our local youth with barriers to entry the chance to engage in mountain biking, a healthy outdoor outlet. They were able to learn and grow in a supportive community with individuals they could trust and feel comfortable with.

KT Kids Ride

In its **12th year**, KT partnered with Kingdom Mountain Bike Camps to host the KT Kids Ride, a weekly guided ride for kids aged 8-14 in June and July. This year 140 kids had a blast out on the trails! The groups met for six sessions over the course of this summer despite the flooding that we experienced here in the NEK.

Race Back to School

Yet again, the **Race Back to School** (RBTS) filled us with joy! The weather was perfect, the racers all had fun and local schools raised money for their programs through pledges! A huge thank you to the Inn at Mountain View Farm for allowing access to their property!

Additionally, the RBTS isn't possible without the epic fun stations developed by local schools and organizations each year! Thank you to Burke Town School PTO, Adaptive Sports Partners, Field, Farm and Forest, The Riverside School, and Kingdom Kids for donating their time and energy!

Outdoor Empowerment Programming

BIPOC Programming

Kingdom Trails partnered with BIPOC groups to connect people of color with outdoor experiences, to offer mountain biking programs for BIPOC youth and adults. The initiatives provided a supportive environment where participants could discover the joys of mountain biking, something they may not have had the opportunity to experience otherwise. Programs like these help build a strong, supportive community, allowing participants to share experiences, tackle challenges, and celebrate successes together.

We are grateful to The Wildflower Inn for their generous use of the gazebo and field, Sport Thoma for providing bikes for adult programs, and the Kingdom East School District for supplying youth bikes from Burke Town School. These programs were also funded through the VOREC Community Grant Program, a grant program of the Vermont Outdoor Recreation Economic Collaborative (VOREC) administered by the Vermont Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation and we are deeply grateful for this support!



1PVD Cycling Returns

We were thrilled to welcome 1PVD Cycling back to Kingdom Trails for their fourth visit! Hailing from Providence, RI, this inspiring nonprofit empowers high school students from diverse backgrounds to dive into the world of competitive cycling by breaking down barriers, financial, technical, and cultural. The 1PVD crew hit the trails for an unforgettable ride and gave back to the network with a hands-on volunteer day, helping reshape the New T trail. Their energy, dedication, and passion for cycling make this partnership something we look forward to year after year.



The Vermont Youth Cycling Race, hosted by KT and Burke Mountain, took place at Magill Fields for the third consecutive year! We love the energy and enthusiasm that the athletes and spectators bring to the Kingdom and are grateful to the VTYC Team for all the work they put into the event!

Kelly Brush Adaptive MTB Camp

KT was delighted to welcome for the 3rd time the Kelly Brush Foundation's largest-ever Adaptive Mountain Bike (aMTB) Camp to Kingdom Trails. More than 20 adaptive riders from across the country, joined by dozens of volunteers and expert coaches, gathered for three unforgettable days of riding, learning, and connecting. With the foliage at its peak, participants built skills, confidence, and community while navigating our scenic trail network. From mastering berms to pushing personal limits, riders left with more than just improved technique, they gained independence, pride, and pure joy. As one participant shared, "I stepped out of my comfort zone and just went for it." We're proud to help make the outdoors more accessible and to support this incredible community of adaptive athletes.

The NorthWoods mountain bike adventure camp mission is to share our passion for exploring and understanding the natural world, while developing technical mountain biking skills in a safe, fun and adventurous environment.

Executive Director, Maria Young shared "It doesn't take much time with our summer bike campers to verify that the joy and sense of adventure that two-wheeled travel through the woods brings is not a joy meant to be reserved for those that can afford it. KT shares our commitment to making sure this experience is possible for all kids, and these camperships are one meaningful way that KT and NorthWoods can team up to spread the joy of mountain biking in this community."



Kingdom Kids

KT partners with Kingdom Kids a non-profit dedicated to support getting kids outside to enjoy all that the NEK has to offer. KT provides up to 25 individual annual youth memberships to Kingdom Kids scholarship recipients, increasing educational and recreational opportunities for all!

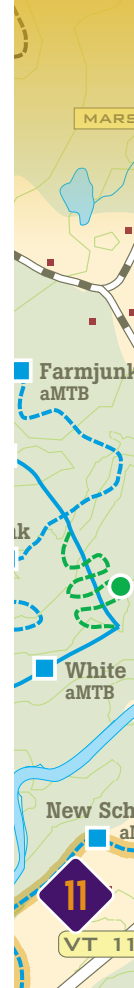

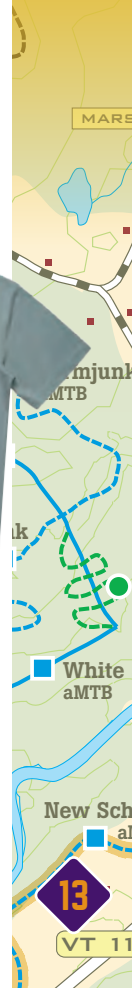


Riders on the Storm

Financial Report

FISCAL YEAR 2025: APRIL 1, 2024 – MARCH 31, 2025

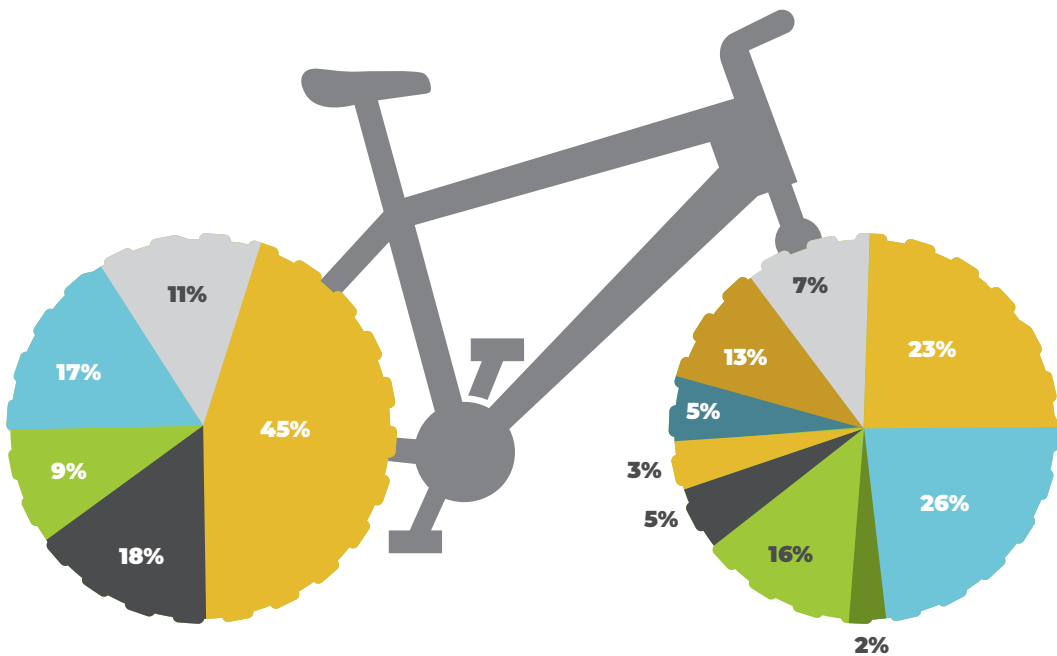
The Kingdom Trail Association closed Fiscal Year 2025 with a slight positive margin, despite navigating significant challenges. In July 2024, two major flooding events caused severe trail damage and temporary closures, requiring immediate redirection of staff time and resources toward emergency maintenance. These events impacted membership sales, which fell below the levels of the previous year.

Despite these disruptions, KT exceeded both budgeted revenue and profit margin projections, largely due to strong grant and donation support. The 30th Anniversary celebration helped boost our annual fund significantly above expectations, while additional public and private grants supported flood recovery costs. This external funding was crucial in offsetting the operational impact of the summer storms and maintaining access to trails that are vital for our members and the local economy.

Operating expenses were significantly lower than both last fiscal year and KT's budget, reflecting disciplined expense management during a year of uncertainty. Improved operating cash flow and higher-than-expected income resulted in a stronger net revenue position.

Looking ahead, KT remains financially sound, with adequate reserves to cover near-term operational costs. However, key risks persist, including uncertain weather patterns and continued decline in Canadian memberships and visitation, factors that influence both revenue and our broader community connection.

KT is focused on resilience, innovation, and building long-term sustainability. The strength of our partnerships and the generosity of our supporters allowed us to overcome a difficult year. With cautious optimism, we look forward to continuing to steward world-class trails and supporting the regional economy.

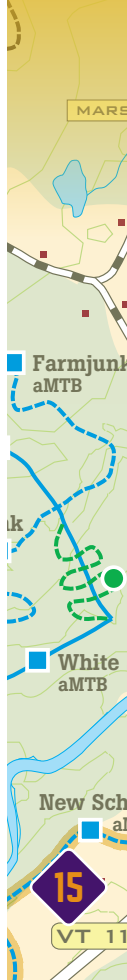
