Often times when we're living with a disability, whether it's our own life or a loved one's, it's easy to get hung up on all of the things that CAN'T be done. After all, we work so hard to try to fix those things. So at times, we may lose sight of all of the things that we, or our loved ones CAN do. At the end of the day, we are all different and unique in our own ways, we ALL have things to work on. Still there is one thing for certain, we are all in this together.

At Families Helping Families, we are here to help you throughout your journey. We are here to help and we want you to feel free to lean on us for support. On the next page, we have put together a fun-filled list of heart soothing and memory making activities for Fall. These can be done with family or friends to bring some joy and laughter into this Fall Season. Some things can be done alone. After all we all need some alone time. We hope this list will help to inspire you to get out and enjoy the season.

Not everyone will be able to do everything on the list and that's ok. Just pick the things you CAN do. Fun Filled Fall Activities—Happy Fall!

Fall brings vibrant colors, yummy aromatic scents like cinnamon, pumpkin, and vanilla. It brings cooler temps, crisp air, and gentle breezes. Summer heat starts to subside and a more subtle warmth remains, providing better opportunities to get outside.

With this burst of sensory stimulation, it's important to remember, that we need to be mindful in our planning, so our loved ones don't become overstimulated. individuals struggle with temperature regulation, due to disability or prescription medications. Although Fall provides a bit of a reprieve from the scorching days of summer, we're still in the South and it can be quite warm. It's important to plan your adventures, making sure to stay hydrated when engaging in physical activity.

The sun is still very bright during the day, so if you or your loved one has visual sensitivities, you may want to plan activities later in the afternoon, or bring sunglasses or a cap if tolerated. Keep in mind that some of the scents of the season can be overwhelming. Some of these more aromatic foods may be best enjoyed on the patio where the smell won't be so overwhelming. These are just a few

examples of how careful planning can help to set the stage for a successful activity. Some of these ideas below may not be for everyone and some may require added assistance or parental supervision or help from others. You can decide what is appropriate for you or your family. If you find that it is difficult for you or someone you love to navigate many of these activities,

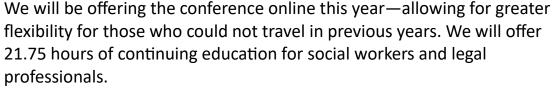

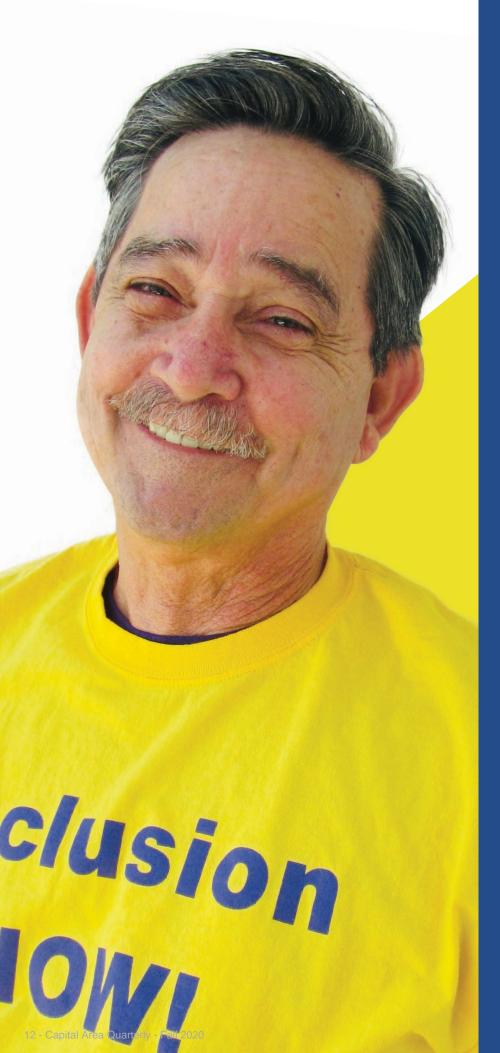

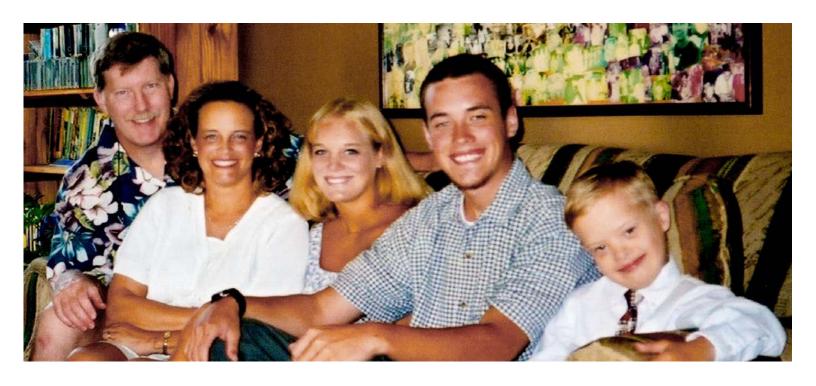
Meet Tommy Comeaux LaCAN Region 2 Leader

Tulane Infant & Early Childhood Consultation Supports and Services (TIKES) is a partnership between the Louisiana Department of Education, Tulane University, and local non-profits throughout the State to provide FREE mental health consultation to child care providers across Louisiana.



Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation (ECMHC) is an intervention that teams a mental health professional with early childhood professionals to improve the social, emotional, and behavioral health of young children in early learning settings.

TIKES mental health consultants are licensed mental health professionals who have been trained in infant & early childhood mental health.





The TIKES Tele-MHC line is available to anyone caring for young children. They would receive basic support and referrals to community agencies where they can receive more in-depth support and/or treatment.

This guide provides you, as a parent, with a quick overview of the Louisiana Connectors, why they are important for students and teachers alike, and the resources available to further support your child's learning at home. This guide is a supplement to the Louisiana Student Standards Parent Guide.

Who ARE THE LOUISIANA CONNECTORS FOR?

The Louisiana Connectors are intended for students who, due to a significant cognitive impairment, are determined by their Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to be eligible to participate in the LEAP Connect assessments.

What ARE THE LOUISIANA CONNECTORS?

The Louisiana Connectors are the academic content and skills students are expected to learn in each grade, Kindergarten through grade 12. They are aligned to, and make up the "big ideas" found in, the Louisiana Student Standards in English language arts, mathematics, and science. The Connectors are designed to provide pathways for students with significant cognitive disabilities to achieve grade-level expectations.

When WERE THE CONNECTORS DEVELOPED?

Louisiana adopted new student standards in ELA, math, and science in Spring 2016 and 2017. In the months that followed, the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education approved aligned Louisiana Connectors in Bulletin 127. These standards replaced what were previously known as the Extended Standards.

Where ARE THE CONNECTORS USED?

- Individualized Education Plans (IEP) to establish academic goals and monitor student progress
- **O** Lesson planning
- **G** Group and individual instruction
- General education and self-contained classrooms
- Parent-Teacher conferences to discuss student progress
- **©** LEAP Connect assessments

Why are the connectors important?

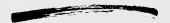
 ${f G}$ Grade-level expectations are the **highest expectations** we have for all students.

- Students with significant cognitive disabilities must have **opportunities** to work toward and achieve grade-level expectations.
- **O** Alignment between the Louisiana Student Standards and the Louisiana Connectors clarifies the pathways for academic success.
- The alignment also facilitates greater **collaboration** between teachers and specialists, providing more opportunities for the **inclusion** of students with significant cognitive disabilities in the general education classroom.

How are the connectors used?

Each Louisiana Connector is aligned to a Louisiana Student Standard that breaks the standard down into key concepts and skills. In the following example, the steps towards achieving the standard are outlined.

LOUISIANA STUDENT STANDARD



3.NBT.A.2 Fluently add and subtract within 1000 using strategies and algorithms based on place value, properties of operations, and/or the relationship between addition and subtraction.

LOUISIANA CONNECTORS



- LC.3.NBT.A.2a Use the relationships between addition and subtraction to solve problems.
- LC.3.NBT.A.2b Solve multi-step addition and subtraction problems up to 100.
- Contraction LC.3.NBT.A.2c Solve multi-digit addition and subtraction problems up to 1000.

HOW DO THE CONNECTORS SUPPORT MY child's learning?

The Louisiana Connectors are the aligned standards for assisting educators in planning and implementing successful school experiences for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. While most students with disabilities in Louisiana pursue a traditional pathway to a high school diploma, certain students with the most significant cognitive disabilities have alternative pathways available to them. Quick-Sheet of Ideas for Students with Disabilities

TO HELP WITH

Reading Instruction & Literature Study

Try this!

- Use differentiated reading material
- Enlarge the text or font.
- Add pictures or rebus symbols to text.
- Use highlighting tape to draw attention to key words or phrases.
- Provide digital text and an electronic text reader
- Provide an audio version of the text.
- Have the student listen to and retell what was read.
- Provide a summary of the text.

TO HELP WITH

Word Study

Try this!

- Use words from the student's daily experience
- Provide magnetic letters, letter stamps, or letter cards for practicing new sounds and letters.
- Give students small dry-erase boards for practicing sounds, letters, or words.
- Have the student match words and pictures
- Have the student use an electronic communicator rather than spelling words orally.
- Teach the spelling strategy: Say the word, spell it, write it, cover it, write it, and compare.
- Ask the student to write the first letter only during a spelling test.
- Try a recognition-only spelling test.



TO HELP WITH

Comprehension

Try this!

- Use prediction strategies ("What do you think will happen?")
- Give students sticky notes to mark main ideas, answers to their predictions, and more.
- Provide text enhancements such as illustrations or highlighting of grammar.
- Provide story maps with labeled spaces for setting, characters, problem, and solution.
- Have a student to give oral responses, draw pictures, or use AAC to answer questions.
- Ask a student only factual questions—who, what, where, and when.
- Have a student sequence pictures of story events rather than writing or answering oral questions.

TO HELP WITH

Written Language Tasks

Try this!

- Give students pictures or illustrations as writing prompts.
- Provide stimulus questions such as "What person in the story did you like best?"
- Provide sentence starters and fill-in-the-blank sentences.
- Pair student with a scribe who can write what the student says.
- Give a student a structured page that provides questions and spaces for answers.
- Have the student create posters, dioramas, mobiles, or paintings to demonstrate knowledge.
- Keep supplementary activities to help students maintain focus when a class activity lasts too long.
