Presentation to Munsee Tribe on Moravian Missions

Earlier this year, the Munsee Tribe in Kansas contacted the Northern Province with an interesting request. They asked for a presentation about their own history with the Moravian Church. You see, many of the Munsee families living near Ottawa, Kansas today, have ancestors who were members of the Moravian mission congregations in Pennsylvania and Ohio.

The talk, which was originally presented on October 25, 2025, begins with a very brief history of the early church. It then tracks the Moravian missions as they wound their way west, following the migration of the Delaware, Munsee and Mahican congregations.

Advent Series: Come Let Us Walk in the Way of Faith, Hope, and Love

The MCNP Racial Justice Team and the MCSP Moravian Team for Reconciliation (Racial, Cultural and Ethnic) are pleased to announce that they are jointly sponsoring this year's **New Way of Being Advent Series**, "**Come, Let Us Walk in the Way of Faith, Hope, and Love.**" How do we know "God still goes that road with us?" How do we walk with those seeking safety, refuge, and a new life? The series will provide suggestions for ways congregations and individuals may walk with our immigrant neighbors. All sessions will be offered on Zoom on Wednesdays, December 3, 10, and 17, at 7:30 PM ET. Zoom access is below. Each session will include scripture readings, prayer, and a presentation by a guest presenter or presenters, followed by small group discussions. Each session will be one hour, concluding at 8:30 PM ET. We are delighted to announce our guest presenters.

The Rev. Angelica Regalado-Cieza, Pastor at Fries Memorial Moravian Church in Winston-Salem, NC will be our guest presenter on December 3. Rev. Regalado-Cieza will lead us in *a vital conversation on immigration in our church and communities, especially as we prepare our hearts during Advent — a season that reminds us of God's welcome and the holy movement of people seeking home.*

On December 10, **The Rev. Mikayla Sauerbrey**, pastor of Calvary Moravian Church in Allentown, PA and **Marcus Dip Silas** of *Mending Together* will be our guest presenters for the session on December 10. Calvary Moravian began a new ministry assisting a refugee family in March of 2025; and Mending Together, a Minnesota-based non-profit supporting those who have experienced trauma and working for recovery and renewal by removing fear. They teach refugees and those who walk alongside them how to *build a world where everyday people and refugees mend together.*

The Rev. Ben Lippert, pastor of the Schoenbrunn Moravian Congregation in New Philadelphia, Ohio, will be the guest presenter for the session on December 17. Rev. Lippert will share from his experience *building community organizations and networks to assist and support our immigrant friends and neighbors.*

Provincewide Updates



Moravian Disaster Response (MDR) Updates

Hurricane Melissa in Jamaica – The Board of World Mission has received a report from the Provincial Board of the Jamaica and Cayman Islands Province of the Moravian Church following Hurricane Melissa's devastating impact. The report included photos and brief initial assessments of several church-owned properties, the majority of which are located in the parishes of Westmoreland and St. Elizabeth, which experienced some of the most severe destruction. The

report is extensive, but notes that some properties have not yet been assessed for damage.

According to the report, five church buildings have been destroyed: Carmel, Salem, Beaufort, Springfield, and Faith Moravian Church. In addition, 20 church-owned facilities, the majority of which are churches, but also manses and schools, have sustained severe damage, with roofs torn away and major structural losses. Damage to homes and community buildings is also extensive. The report noted that "it is feared that most, if not all, of the 36 congregations at the Central and Western District Conferences have sustained some level of damage."

The Provincial Board has outlined a multi-step plan for the coming months, which includes addressing immediate needs, offering pastoral and psychological care, continuing to coordinate assessments in affected areas, mobilizing local volunteer groups for cleanup and repair, and establishing the Moravian Church Jamaica and Cayman Islands Disaster Response Fund. The BWM has contributed an initial \$10,000 to this fund. Additional support is greatly needed to meet the scale of destruction and to help our partners rebuild their places of worship, ministry, and community life.

We are aware of several fundraisers across the Worldwide Moravian Unity and ask that Moravians in North America respond to this disaster through BWM channels to help us facilitate a coordinated response. This also enables us to prepare for North American mission teams to assist with recovery efforts when the Moravian Church in Jamaica is ready to receive us. We are also maintaining contact with partners and leaders in Cuba and Haiti, who were also impacted by this storm.

Typhoon Halong in Alaska – The BWM is also closely monitoring the situation in western Alaska following Typhoon Halong, which reached Alaska on October 12. The storm brought hurricane-force winds, widespread flooding, and severe damage to coastal villages across the Yukon–Kuskokwim Delta region.

Through news outlets and Moravians in Alaska, we know that several communities with Moravian congregations have been directly impacted, including but not limited to: Kongiganak, Bethel, Napakiak, Kwigillingok, Napaskiak, Kipnuk, Quinhagak, and Tuntutuliak. Damage resulting from wind and flooding is widespread. Hundreds of people from Kipnuk, Kwigillingok, and perhaps other villages were evacuated by the National Guard to Bethel and Anchorage because nearly all homes sustained severe damage. Moravian facilities, such as Bethel Moravian Church and the Moravian Seminary in Bethel, have begun helping those displaced by the storm.

With the guidance of Moravians in Alaska, BWM has contributed an initial \$10,000 to the Western Alaska Disaster Relief 2025 Fund, which was established by local community organizations and regional partners, many of whom were recommended by Moravian contacts. BWM has also contributed \$10,000 to the Alaskan Province for housing displaced people in Moravian facilities in Bethel, including two parsonages and the seminary. Further donations are greatly appreciated to help us continue this response.

Racial Justice Team and PEC Will Hold Listening Circles

The members of the Provincial Elders' Conference and the Racial Justice Team (RJT) of the Moravian Church Northern Province are excited to invite congregations to participate in a Province-wide program called *Listening Circles*. Listening Circles have their origin in indigenous cultures; they are not places for debate but are places for expression and community building. The PEC and the RJT believe that listening is integral to the work for justice and healing; and that creating intentional spaces for listening is greatly needed in our time. An initial session of the Listening Circles was held earlier this year, and we received positive feedback from all who participated.

Listening Circles will meet for 90 minutes and follow a program that includes worship, singing, scripture readings, prayer, and reflecting on prepared questions. Congregations will be contacted by a facilitator who will arrange and lead the Listening Circle(s) in your region. We would like to complete the Provincial Listening Circles by February 15, 2026. Congregations are encouraged to plan Listening Circles within their congregation following this initial experience.

We believe the time spent in listening will deepen relationships within and among congregations and their communities and strengthen and build the work of justice and healing. Peter left no copy in Salem upon his departure in 1790. Six String Quintets | sheet music / score and parts | \$35 for each set of two quintets. MMF also publishes the first string chamber music composed by an American. The Three String Trios by John Antes, Moravian pastor, missionary, composer, and instrument maker, are available from MMF for \$35 per set at MoravianMusic.org.

Calvary Moravian Church: Answering the Call to Refugee Care

In early 2025, Pastor Mikayla Sauerbrey of Calvary Moravian Church in Allentown, PA, received a call from Rev. Sue Konig, Director of Racial Justice and Healing for the MCNP, inviting Calvary to partner with a long-standing Allentown ministry serving the local refugee community after executive orders severely restricted the US Refugee Admissions Program. Moved by what Pastor Mikayla describes as the work of the Holy Spirit, and despite having no prior experience in refugee care, the congregation boldly said yes. Since March, Calvary has been walking alongside a Syrian family as they make their home in Allentown. The ministry, led by two dedicated members, David Venditta and Jessica Jenkins, and supported by many others through transportation, job searches, medical appointments, and more, has been a rewarding journey for all. With guidance from Mending Together, a Minnesota-based nonprofit specializing in trauma-informed refugee care, this ministry has deeply impacted all involved. Calvary remains committed to showing up for their neighbors and trusting the Holy Spirit to guide their steps.

As both David and Jessica reflected on what this ministry has meant to them, they had these comments to share:

"I am so proud of this family and how hard they have been working to acclimate to life in a new country. I also reflect on how this experience has affected my life. The way my world has expanded has become one of the most rewarding experiences. I have seen changes in my willingness to give of myself, to give my time, to expand my world view and I have been challenged to become aware of and examine my biases. This family has taught me the importance in slowing down in our ultra-fast paced culture." – Jessica Jenkins

"The Syrian family I've come to know is easygoing, kind and generous. I consider them my friends. They've taught me to appreciate the culture of their homeland and their courage in adopting a country so different from their own. They've faced major hurdles in going from Arabic to English, getting jobs and navigating the American bureaucracy. But when I'm able to help them, even in the smallest ways, I'm warmed by their gratitude and the belief I'm doing God's work. Our hard-pressed refugees would have an easier path if more churches would stand up for them as Calvary has. In light of the Trump administration's cruel crackdown on immigrants, the need is urgent." – David Venditta
