Provincial Elders' Conference Affirms the Church's Call to Justice and Public Witness

Grace, mercy, and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

In February of 2025, the Provincial Elders' Conference wrote a Statement and Letter to the Church, which came to be known as "The Compassion Statement." It was titled *Humbly and Boldly Following Christ in Our Ministries of Caring and Public Witness* and its purpose was to offer encouragement and prayers to the church in a very challenging and difficult time.

One year later we are writing again, this time having witnessed immense human suffering resulting from numerous orders and policies drafted by and enforced in the U.S. and around the world in inhumane and capricious ways. Such policies have impacted basic human needs including health care, food, shelter, and education. As is often the case, the most vulnerable have suffered most.

We are especially alarmed and grieved at the inhumane treatment of persons and their families who are immigrants, refugees, and asylum seekers, and those who care for them. Many people in our congregations, communities, and nations now live with constant fear and terror, the trauma of which is known to cause deep and lasting wounds, particularly for children.

We have witnessed the devastating loss of life, and the cruel treatment of children, youth and adults in the processes of detainment, arrest, disappearance, confinement and deportation. We have witnessed the increasing acts of aggression, violence, and racial profiling by federal law enforcement agencies in Minneapolis/St. Paul, Minnesota, and in a growing number of cities and towns across the U.S. We join other people of faith in calling for the protection of human and civil rights of all persons; thorough and legitimate investigations of the deaths of Geraldo Lunam Campos, Renee Nicole Good and Alex Pretti; accountability; de-escalation; and prayers for all involved. We have also witnessed the rise of Christian nationalism and its active threat to democracy.

We reiterate resolutions from the 2023 Provincial Synod on immigration matters, joining the National Council of Churches (US) in its call:

"for a comprehensive solution to our immigration challenges that respects the "Imago Dei" (the image of God) in all people, keeps our borders safe, and honors the diversity that makes our nation a great tapestry, and we affirm:

the worth, dignity, and inherent value and rights of immigrants, migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, and declare support for the humane treatment of any person coming across our borders, regardless of legal status."

As a province in two countries, we express our profound grief and disappointment in the threats and baseless negative comments directed at Canada by the United States. The U.S. has been privileged to enjoy a mutually beneficial and supportive relationship with Canada for many years, and it is being dramatically affected by those in the U.S. government pursuing an imperialistic agenda leading to a devastating loss of the longstanding cooperation of nations. Our siblings in Canada are searching for understanding and support as this stance by the U.S. creates fear and uncertainty in their lives. We call the church to prayer, to standing in solidarity with Canada, and to speaking out on their behalf. (Cont'd on Page 3)


(Cont'd from page 2) We offer support for our clergy, ministers, church leaders, and congregations, and our ecumenical and interfaith partners, in their care, support and advocacy for immigrants, migrants, and asylum seekers, and in their resettlement ministries for refugees. We call for adherence to court orders and to legal means for making program, policy, and funding changes and decisions. We continue to pray fervently for the protection of human and civil rights, respect for relationships with our nation's allies and sovereignty of nations, and adherence to international law.

We affirm the church's call to public witness and its prophetic tradition. In our liberty, some may discern Christ's call in this critical time as a call to recognize a higher loyalty to God and conscience, to protect and secure freedom and justice for all, and to preserve the democracy in which we are privileged to live [MCCL, ¶27]. In any discernment, we are called to do all things in love with the conviction that the day will come when truth and justice reigns. Even now, "Our Lamb has conquered. Let us follow him."

We abide in prayer for each of you and for all. May the church of Jesus, our Chief Elder and only Lord, be guided by love and mercy and unwavering hope in God's coming reign of justice and peace where all will live as one beloved community.


I hope the conversations around your Sunday dinner tables are positive about your pastor. I would encourage you to speak positively to your pastor and not grumble behind your pastor's back.

Racial Justice Team Announces Pilgrimage Grants

The 2023 Synod of the MCNP encouraged pilgrimages toward racial justice and healing in light of the profound impact of the Provincial Pilgrimage toward Racial Justice and Healing to Montgomery, Alabama for clergy, appointed pastors, and candidates for ordination held in September 2022. The Racial Justice Team is offering Pilgrimage Grants of \$500 to \$1,000 to encourage MCNP congregations to plan and experience pilgrimages toward racial justice and healing in 2026. Congregations may also apply for grant funds to join a pilgrimage sponsored by another entity such as the Calvin Institute for Christian Worship or an ecumenical partner.

Any site(s) or location of significance to/for the work of racial justice and the healing of relationships with Black, Indigenous, People of Color will be considered. Pilgrimage sites may be local, regional, or longer distances. A qualifying pilgrimage will occur before May 31, 2027. Please see the grant application for additional details.

The deadline to apply for a 2026 Pilgrimage Grant from the MCNP Racial Justice Team is June 1, 2026. Grant applications will be reviewed by the Racial Justice Team by June 30, 2026. Please visit the MCNP Racial Justice Team website for an application by scanning the QR code.



Black Music and Media's Power to Drive Social Change Explored in Moravian University School of Theology Lecture

Free public forum at Lancaster Theological Seminary examines the prophetic voices of artists and activists in movements for justice

BETHLEHEM, PA, January 30, 2026 — How have Black musicians and media makers shaped the fight for justice in America? What can faith communities learn from their courageous witness? Moravian University School of Theology invites the community to explore these vital questions through “Cultivating Courageous Resisters: The Influence of Black Music and Media on Social Activism,” part of its Spring 2026 Lifelong Learning series, “Faith in the Public Sphere.” The free program will be at 4 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 19, at Lancaster Theological Seminary’s (LTS) Santee Chapel (555 West James St., Lancaster), and will also be broadcast on Zoom. Registration for the event is available now at the QR code Below.

The event features Dr. AnneMarie Mingo, Associate Professor of Ethics, Culture, and Moral Leadership at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary — whose groundbreaking research examines how Black women have wielded music and media as tools of socio-religious activism.

From spirituals sung in secret to protest anthems that galvanize modern movements, Mingo traces the prophetic power of Black creative expression in the ongoing struggle for racial justice. “This isn’t just history — it’s about understanding the forces shaping our world today,” says Dr. Christian Rice, Dean of Moravian University School of Theology. “Dr. Mingo’s work on cultivating intergenerational activists offers both inspiration and practical wisdom for anyone committed to justice efforts.”

The lecture will be followed by a response from Rev. Dr. Catherine Williams, a professor at the School of Theology, creating space for rich dialogue and community engagement.

This event is part of The Rt. Rev. Dr. Nathan D. Baxter Forum for African American Studies, honoring the distinguished bishop, seminary dean, and Lancaster Seminary alumnus (MDiv 1976, DMin 1984) who also served as Dean of the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C.

“Come as you are. We’d love to have you join our community,” Rice shares. “These conversations are designed for anyone seeking to deepen their faith and engage thoughtfully with the world around them.”

The Lifelong Learning series brings together distinguished scholars and ministry leaders to explore the intersection of faith, social justice, media literacy, and courageous discipleship — creating opportunities for reflection, dialogue, and spiritual growth.



America 250

As we enter the 250th Anniversary Year (1776-2026) of America's declared independence, you may be interested in presenting the earliest string chamber music composed in America, written in Salem, NC, by Moravian pastor, administrator, and composer, Johann Friedrich Peter (1746-1813) in 1789. The quintets would have been composed for the Salem Collegium Musicum, but actually survive in the Philharmonic Society of Bethlehem (PA) Collection. Peter left no copy in Salem upon his departure in 1790. Six String Quintets | sheet music / score and parts | \$35 for each set of two quintets. MMF also publishes the first string chamber music composed by an American. The Three String Trios by John Antes, Moravian pastor, missionary, composer, and instrument maker, are available from MMF for \$35 per set at MoravianMusic.org.



Celebrating the Ministry of Marie Couts



At the close of 2025, the Eastern District marked the retirement of Sister Marie Couts, who concluded twenty-one years of faithful service as Director of Christian Education on December 31, 2025. Throughout her ministry, Marie has been a steady and creative presence, equipping congregations, leaders, and educators to grow in faith, purpose, and confidence in their call to serve Christ.

Since 2004, Marie has supported congregations across the Eastern District by providing resources and training in Christian education, faith formation, and leadership development. Her work has included curriculum development, workshops and trainings, conference leadership, and ongoing encouragement of those engaged in educational ministry. She has been a tireless advocate for educators, a trusted partner to clergy and boards, and a gifted interpreter of Moravian identity and practice.

Marie's influence has extended well beyond the Eastern District. She has served the Northern Province and the wider Moravian Church in numerous capacities, including leadership in educational ministry, synod and conference planning, interprovincial initiatives, and the development of Moravian history and confirmation curricula. Her contributions include work on Loving Hearts United, Living Branches, Take the Ancestors with You, the companion piece to the New Catechism, and the Moravian history workshop, The Story of Us, as well as leadership within the Association of Partners in Christian Education (APCE) and service as representative to the Ohio Council of Churches Governing Board.

Perhaps most enduring is Marie's commitment to lifting up the call of each individual to use their God-given gifts in service. Throughout her ministry, she has consistently elevated the importance of lay ministry while fostering strong, collaborative relationships with ordained leaders. This emphasis on partnership continues to shape the Eastern District's approach to ministry and leadership development.

As Marie enters into new forms of service within the Moravian Church, we give thank for her faithful witness, creative leadership, and deep love for Christ and the Church. Her legacy lives on in the countless educators, leaders, and congregations she has encouraged and equipped over more than four decades of ministry.

Congregational Spotlight

St. Paul's Moravian Church: Sharing God's Love, One Table at a Time

St. Paul's Moravian Church has found meaningful and practical ways to live out its calling to hospitality and service through community outreach events such as a **Free Fish Fry**, a **Free Spaghetti Dinner**, **Clothes Give-Away** and **Free Pet Food Give-away**. These gatherings were about more than providing meals, clothes or pet food; they were living expressions of welcome, generosity, and relationship-building, rooted in our congregation's understanding of Christian mission.

The **Fish Fry** began as a simple idea grounded in a familiar Moravian value—bringing people together around the table. Our hope was to partner with the Marlton Community Homeowners Association (HOA) as a way to meet our neighbors and work together in shared mission. Unfortunately, the HOA was unavailable at the time due to internal challenges, including furloughs. Even so, St. Paul's continued forward, trusting that faithfulness often begins with small but intentional steps.

Volunteers from across the congregation prepared food, served meals, and greeted guests, creating an atmosphere that was warm, joyful, and intentionally inclusive. For many attendees, the Fish Fry was their first experience with St. Paul's Moravian Church. In that simple setting, they encountered a congregation committed to being present, accessible, and welcoming; a quiet but powerful witness to Christ's love lived out in community.

The **Spaghetti Dinner** outreach grew from a similar desire to meet people where they are. Free, family-friendly, and open to all, the dinner addressed a real need for fellowship and shared space in a world that often feels fragmented and rushed. Like the Fish Fry, it offered time for conversation, laughter, and mutual care. Guests were not treated as recipients of charity, but as neighbors and friends, reflecting Christ's gracious invitation to gather, belong, and be known.

All of our events have had a lasting impact on the congregation itself. Members who may not serve in traditional church roles discovered purpose and connection through cooking, serving, and hospitality. Following these events several families have attended our church services and shared that they met us at one of these events! These ministries strengthened relationships within the faith community while extending Christ's love beyond the church walls—faith put into action through simple acts of service.

Looking ahead, St. Paul's hopes these outreach programs will continue to grow and evolve, perhaps through new partnerships, expanded volunteer involvement, or additional community-focused initiatives, while remaining rooted in their original purpose: **sharing God's love, one table at a time**.

"Moravians & The Revolution," Talk by Scott Gordon

The American Revolution put Pennsylvania's Moravians in a tough place. They wanted to remain neutral, but Patriots demanded that they choose a side and threatened to seize all their property if they didn't. When military forces—troops on the move, prisoners, injured soldiers—occupied Bethlehem ("engulfed" the small community, John Ettwein said), Moravians had no choice but to transform the way they lived. These communities did survive these dangerous times. But, as this talk will explore, the Revolution transformed Bethlehem permanently.

Scott Gordon is a professor and the Andrew W. Mellon Chair at Lehigh University. His current research focuses on slavery and other forms of unfreedom in early Bethlehem and, more generally, on religion, social ambition, and patriotism in colonial and revolutionary Pennsylvania.
