

Order of Christian Funerals



PLANNING GUIDE

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The staff of St. Mary of the Assumption Church has prepared these guidelines to assist your family in planning the Funeral Mass. We hope that by choosing the readings and music, you and your family might share more fully in the liturgy, and express your care and love for the deceased. Attached to this booklet is a liturgy planning form to plan the Funeral Liturgy. Please fill it out as best as possible and bring it with you to your meeting with the priest, deacon, or pastoral associate. Be assured of the prayers of our parish during this time of sorrow.



GENERAL INFORMATION

Catholic Funeral

The Church confidently proclaims that Jesus, the Son of God, by his death and resurrection, has broken the chains of sin and death. The Order of Christian Funerals celebrates this in three groups of rites that correspond to the three ritual movements in the funeral of Christians. These three movements form one procession beginning with the Vigil (wake), followed by the Funeral Mass, and Rite of Committal at the cemetery. While this is the usual custom, options are available.

Cremation

In recent years, the restriction of cremation has been lifted. While the Church encourages cremation to follow the Funeral Liturgy, it realizes that financial constraints or other circumstances may result in the desire for cremation before the funeral services. Cremated remains are brought to the church and treated the same as if a body were present. The Church discourages the dividing or scattering of ashes. Cremains are to be buried in the ground or placed in a columbarium. A columbarium is a structure designed to hold the cremated remains of the deceased, typically in individual niches.

Scheduling a Funeral

Funeral Masses can be held any day of the year with the exceptions of Sundays, Holy Days, or during the Sacred Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday). The funeral director works with the family and the clergy to find a date to schedule the funeral.

Eulogy Guidelines

If a eulogy is given, it is most appropriate when given at the funeral home. Time at the funeral home is meant to be a time to reflect on the life of the deceased. Time at the funeral Mass is to reflect on the blessing of the deceased's life from God and time at the luncheon is to focus on the relationships with the deceased's loved ones.

Ministers

Readers: We will provide readers from the parish to proclaim the readings and Universal Prayer. However, family or friends who want to participate in these liturgical roles may do so. Readers should be Catholics familiar with the Mass, and should have a good public speaking voice. We will provide you with copies of your chosen readings when you meet with the parish staff.

Gift Bearers: You may choose two or more people to bring the bread and wine forward during the Offertory.

Musicians and Servers: Our staff will contact our musicians and servers. Families are welcome to request that a family member or friend offer their musical talents as part of the funeral liturgy. However, all visiting musicians must coordinate in advance with the parish music director and receive approval before participating. While their contributions are valued, it is important to note that the primary responsibility for providing music during the Mass remains with the parish's designated musicians. Guest musicians may be invited to participate in a limited role – such as offering a prelude, communion reflection, or postlude – depending on their experience and the needs of the liturgy. This policy ensures the sacred nature of the liturgy is preserved and that all musical elements align with the Church's liturgical norms. Secular music can be played at the funeral home or luncheon. Sacred music is to be played at the Mass.

Stipends

All parishioners are entitled to our ministries without charge. We also would not exclude anyone who is not formally registered or hasn't been able to contribute financially to the parish. Some people desire to make an offering to the church. Typically, a portion of the fees paid to the funeral director is used to cover the services of the music ministers (organist and cantor) and the priest (Total \$400.00). Again, these are not required in order to receive a Christian burial.

Mass Offerings

Masses for the intention of the deceased can be requested through St. Mary of the Assumption or any parish church. The usual stipend is \$10.00 per Mass. Due to a large volume of requests, we can only schedule **4** per year for each household based on availability (2 weekend Masses and 2 weekday Masses). Additional intentions may be distributed to other parishes, to the missions, or to retired priests.

Other Donations

If you wish to honor your loved one by making a donation to a special fund or ministry, our staff can assist you in that decision. We discourage individual purchases of memorial vessels and vestments since this often results in an overabundance of items for the parish.



THE ORDER OF CHRISTIAN FUNERALS

I. RITE OF RECEPTION

During the Rite of Reception, the priest greets the family and friends and blesses the body/casket of the loved one with holy water. A white pall (a symbol of the person's baptismal garment) is placed over the casket by the family.

Then, all will process to the front pews while singing a hymn of consolation. When all have reached their places, the priest invites the assembly to pray, to be seated, and to be attentive to the Word of God.

II. THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

In every celebration for the dead, the Church attaches great importance to the reading of the Word of God. A careful selection of readings from Sacred Scripture will provide the family and the community with an opportunity to hear God speak to them in their need, sorrows, fears, and/or hopes.

For your convenience, brief summaries of the Scripture readings are included in this packet to facilitate your selection. The Gospel reading is always proclaimed by a priest or deacon. You may invite family members or friends to proclaim the first reading, second reading, and Universal Prayer.

Homily

The purpose of the homily is not to eulogize the deceased, but to offer the hope of the resurrection to all who are present. Still, information about the deceased is helpful in prayerful preparation of the homily. The focus of the information should be on how the deceased lived out the gospel message. Your personal reflections will be welcomed by the homilist when you meet.

III. LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

Preparation of the Gifts

Following the General Intercessions, the Liturgy of the Eucharist is celebrated according to the familiar norms experienced at Sunday Mass. The Preparation of the Gifts, which involves the presentation of the bread and wine to the priest, can be brought forward by family members of your choosing.

IV. FINAL COMMENDATION

Following the reception of Holy Communion, prayers are offered that express our trust and hope in the love of Christ, which conquers all things and destroys even death itself. A song of farewell, incense, and the prayer of commendation are offered so that the loved one may be granted eternal rest and that God's loving and perpetual light may lead all souls to paradise.



READINGS FOR THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

The first reading is taken from the Old Testament, or from the Acts of the Apostles or Revelation during the Easter Season. Please choose one of the following readings and mark your selection on the planning form. A short passage containing the main message of the reading has been provided.
