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EMMA ZUERCHER

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In case you missed it, Sonnenberg's own Emma Zuercher unveiled her newest sculpture this summer at a dedication ceremony on Saturday, July 12 in the parking lot in front of MCC Connections. Her focus was to create a piece acknowledging the partnership of MCC Connections and the Material Resource Center.

Emma is the daughter of Steve & Lisa Zuercher, niece of Carloyn Zuercher and granddaughter to Keith Sommerfeld and Arlin Zuercher. She graduated from Waynedale High School and is a 2023 graduate of Goshen College, where she studied Sign Language Interpreting and Art. When she is not interpreting or making art, she enjoys gardening, being active outdoors, and shopping at MCC thrift stores.

The following is Emma's Artist Statement about the project.

The local and global work of MCC is displayed in the visual elements of the Earthshaped metal sculpture outside MCC Connections. The words "peace," "relief," and "development" that



wrap around the globe are central components of the mission of MCC. Buckets that hold kit supplies and bags for thrifted goods are represented as well. They lace together as one with the cross at the center.


The ribbons of metal that make up the globe have a flowing motion, much like cloth. Intentional or not, as humans, we often express our cultural identities through the textiles we wear and use. The variety of colors and textures in the metal reflects the textiles tied to the multiplicity of human experiences around the world. Similar to how the metal ribbons rest on and support each other, we also weave our lives together on this planet.

All of the metal on the sculpture is reclaimed aluminum. I enjoy the process of gathering metal for a sculpture, wondering about its past as I prepare it, and imagining the future of its story as I add it to a sculpture. Nearly all of the metal, including the words, I cut out by hand. After cutting and sanding the pieces, I welded them to the sculpture. The last step, and one of my favorites, was to move it outside, watch it glitter in the sunlight for the first time, and paint it.

This Week in Anabaptist History ... In a letter (found in the Amsterdam Mennonite Library) dated
September 7, 1758 a Mennonite community from Page County, VA petitioned Dutch Mennonites for help to recover from an Indian raid associated with the French and Indian War.

It practically wiped out the settlement for a short time. The people fled to Pennsylvania, where they waited for an answer to their appeal. It was signed by Michael Kauffman, Jacob Boner, Samuel Bohm, and Daniel Stauffer. It stated "...One family was murdered and the rest of us and many other families were obliged to flee for our lives, leaving all and going empty-handed." Johannes Schneyder and their minister and elder, Martin Funck, would go along to Holland to assist in presenting the request for help. The Page County congregation numbered 39 families or about 100 members in 1758.

Page County, Virginia, is situated in the valley drained by the South Fork of the Shenandoah River. This river flows north between the Massanutten Mountain and the Blue Ridge (Shenandoah Forest). It was near Luray, the county seat, that the first and largest settlement of Mennonites was made in Virginia in the second quarter of the 18th century. This area had had a checkered political history before it became Page County. It was at first in Spotsylvania County that originally included all the land in Virginia west of the Blue Ridge. In 1734-1738 it was a part of Orange County, 1738-1745 of Augusta County, 1745-1772 of Frederick County, and 1772-1831 of Shenandoah County. Then in 1831 that part of Shenandoah County lying between the Massanutten Mountain and the Blue Ridge was taken to form Page County.

Decline in the county began when a number of Mennonites joined the Baptist Church prior to and after the American Revolution. A number of Page County Mennonites moved elsewhere. Local leadership in the church was not maintained. The dwindling membership was served by Rockingham County preachers until 1885, when there were not enough members left in Page County to justify the 30 or more miles of travel to serve them.
