A Thought from the Rector

Happy New Year! Happy new? I'm not so sure. Human nature is usually disinclined to change. We naturally gravitate toward the familiar. And yet, we find the Psalmist speaking repeatedly in praise of the new. Psalm 40, verse 3, for example, says: "The Lord put a new song in my mouth..." Whether we like it or not is irrelevant, God is often found in the new.

The truth is that life will force you to experience new things, new circumstances, new people, etc.... And in most cases, we meet those moments with trepidation. But what if God is in the new, then does that change anything? I believe it does. It replaces dread with hope and fear with courage.


An illustration of this dynamic comes from the book, *My Son Is a Splendid Driver*, by William Inge, in which he describes an interaction that occurs between a man and a woman in a book store. They grew up together, but have not seen each other in years. Joey, the protagonist recalls that Betsy had been an aspiring actress, and he inquires about her work as an actress. In answering his question, she tells him that she has become a member of Alcoholics Anonymous, and that becoming an actress is no longer something she is pursuing. And then she says this: *"I had to give up my conception of what my life was going to be, do you see? My will had to be overcome. I had to learn that there's a stronger will that works behind the entire universe that sometimes stops us in our headstrong way and says No. And then you have to surrender to a real life, Joey. The life that's really yours.... "*

Betsy does a beautiful job of describing the hard-won nature of human surrender and the fruit that is born of acquiescence. Ultimately, it's called faith. While we may not know the way, we trust the One who does. God is in the new.




Men's Breakfast

Bedell Recipient: St. James the Less, Scarsdale

Founded in 1849, St. James the Less is an active and growing parish in Scarsdale. Rev. Astrid Storm, the Rector of St. James, considers it now to be a regional, rather than local parish, as it has absorbed a number of other parishes in the area that have closed. As such, in addition to regular weekly services, St. James provides many programs and services throughout middle and lower Westchester County and the North Bronx, including a thriving nursery school, food pantry, and soup kitchen, as well as youth, music and adult education programs.

Mother Storm first approached St. Matthew's in 2023, to see if the Bedell Fund would be able to provide a grant to help with much needed repairs to the church and grounds. After completing a master plan for the property, St James decided that the project that had top priority was the design and development of an outdoor fellowship/arrival court and expanded and upgraded parking facilities, and applied to the Bedell Committee for a grant for this work. Limited parking had been a consistent concern of parish leadership, both

for church services and for parish and community gatherings as the membership has grown. The arrival court is both the focal point for entry into the Church and an outdoor area for services and gatherings.

The Bedell Committee and St. Matthew's Vestry approved a grant for \$225,000 in late 2023. Work was delayed while permits were sought from the Village of Scarsdale. The project scope tackled several necessary improvements to the Church's parking lot and access ramp, and mitigation of poor drainage. The work began in the early summer of 2024 and was completed this December in time for Advent and Christmas.

As a result of the Bedell grant, St. Matthew's has developed a wonderful relationship with St. James and helped a growing Westchester Episcopal Church better meet the needs of its congregants. Mother Storm and members of the St. James Vestry have made several visits to St. Matthew's and attended our services. We hope our relationship as sister churches will deepen in the coming months and years.

Youth Group

Despite bad weather and lots of sickness going around, we had a great Youth Group Christmas Party! Pupusas were tried for the first time by all, plenty of candy canes were consumed, and some strange gifts changed hands in our White Elephant exchange. Big hits included a bonzai tree, a singing Santa hat, and...tape. The Christmas Party concluded a wonderful Fall of Youth Group gatherings of all different sorts with a mixture of both fun and Christian formation. We'll pick up gatherings again in January, and a full schedule for the Winter and Spring will be published in the New Year.



St. Matthew's will host a Men's Beefsteak Dinner in the tradition of the New York beefsteaks of the 19th century – that means tons of steak and sausage, plenty of cold beer, jackets and ties, and limited cutlery. It will be a memorable night of men's fellowship and good eating, and a hymn or two may even be sung.
