



What is Sports Premium Funding?

Schools with 17 or more eligible pupils receive £16,000 and an additional payment of £10 per pupil. Schools must use the furding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. This means that you should use the premium to: develop oradd to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers and/or make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years. Sports Premium can not be used to deliver the minimum requirement of the National Curriculum or to cover the planning preparation and assessment time of teachers known as PPA. The total amount received in 2021-22 is £18,700.00 (+£7000 from previous year).

Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium

ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport

The funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following OBJECTIVE:

To achieve <u>self-sustaining improvement</u> in the quality of PE and <u>sport in primary</u> schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact <u>against</u> the vision (above) that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

the engagement of <u>all</u> pupils in regular physical activity - kick-starting healthy active lifestyles

the profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement

increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport

broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils

increased participation in competitive sport

Under the Ofsted Schools Inspection Framework 2015, inspectors will assess how effectively leaders use the Primary PE and Sport Premium and measure its impact on outcomes for pupils, and how effectively governors hold them to account for this. Schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding and the effect it has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment.

To increased participation in competitive sport	The continued development of our outdoor area (forest area, MUGA) has helped us continue to provide pupils with a wide range of activities and experiences. As a result of this, the amount of pupils engaging in some form of physical activity has increased. We have continued to make cross-curricular links through the 'Teach Active' and our orienteering scheme to enable us to provide pupils with the recommended amount of physical activity each day. The amount of opportunities for the children to engage in physical activity has increased significantly this academic year. Through our enrichment days and residentials, we have provided all of our pupils with new experiences where they have had the opportunity to develop new skills. All children who completed the pupil voice stated that they have enjoyed having the opportunity to try new things and develop new skills. As a school, we have offered pupils a wide range of interschool and intraschool activities where they have been given the opportunity to compete in both inclusive and competitive sporting events. The continued use of the school mini bus has increased the opportunities that we can offer. Our links with local sports clubs and sports providers have enabled us to offer a range of activities and opportunities. For example our links to a local sports club has led to many of our children joining that particular club. Our relationship with a local swimming provider has enabled us to not only offer our Year 3 children with a whole academic year of swimming but we've also been able to target children in older year groups who weren't proficient swimmers.	 Continue to build relationships with local sports providers. Continue to offer pupils with enrichment opportunities and the opportunity to participate in interschool and intraschool events. Further enhance the playground/astroturf area, providing pupils with safe, enjoyable and structured activities during break and lunch times. Continue to develop outdoor areas in preparation for forest school training. Ensure that all children are provided with the opportunity to participate in the required amount of physical activity.

This is to ensure that all equipment is safe for the children to use. Ensuring that the equipment is safe and well maintained allows the pupils access to it. This contributes towards 60 minutes of physical activity that pupils are required to engage in each day. Due to the MUGA being unusable in winter months, this hindered the amount of physical activity pupils could do. With the surface and drainage system being improved, it will be useable all year round, which will provide additional space for playground games. Playground leader employed to provide additional activities at break and lunch times. Because of this, there has been an increased number of pupils participating in structured physical activity during lunch times. To ensure all Y6 pupils were able to swim prior to leaving primary school, we offered a half term of 'catch up' swimming". 7 Y6 pupils attended with the majority of them now able to swim the required distance.
