

City of Greenfield - City Council Meeting Minutes – July 28, 2026

Mayor Fox called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. All members of the Council were present.

Consent Agenda: Approval of the agenda, minutes of the July 14, 2026 meeting, and alcohol license renewals for Bloodline Irish Pub and Olive Branch. Motion by Faust, seconded by Christensen, to approve the consent agenda. Motion carried.

Greenfield Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Project – Payment Applications Nos. 4 and 5: Council considered Strand Associates, Inc.'s recommendation to approve the following payment applications to Municipal Pipe Tool Company, LLC: Payment Application No. 4 for \$154,706.64 and Payment Application No. 5 for \$339,947.13, for a total of \$494,653.77. Motion by McMorran, seconded by Faust, to approve Payment Application Nos. 4 and 5. Motion carried.

Hayes Street Sanitary Sewer Replacement: Council considered approximately 125 feet of open-trench replacement of 8-inch sanitary sewer pipe on Hayes Street, originally estimated at \$75,000. Motion by Clayton, seconded by Faust, to proceed with the project based on a quote of less than \$60,000. Motion carried.

Citizen Forum: A resident shared concerns regarding the unsafe operation of electric scooters by young riders. She described recently exiting a business on the square and nearly being struck by two teenagers riding electric scooters. She did not hear them approaching, and the riders showed little concern after the near collision. She has also observed young riders disregarding traffic laws, including running stop signs and traveling the wrong direction around the square. Council members acknowledged receiving similar concerns and expressed shared frustration regarding the unsafe operation of electric scooters and similar devices. The Council discussed actions being taken by other communities, including prohibiting certain devices or requiring riders to possess a driver's license. Council will continue discussing the issue, and residents are encouraged to report their experiences and safety concerns.
