In our first reading (Isaiah 66:18-21), we glimpse God's vision for a universal Church embracing every nation and tongue. As the exiles returned, Isaiah prophesied that Gentiles would not merely observe but serve as priests and Levites. This radical inclusion shatters old boundaries and points forward to the priesthood of all believers celebrated in the New Testament. From the trials of exile emerges the promise of global mission and worship.

The author of the letter to the Hebrews reminds us not to lose heart under God's loving discipline: "For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives." Every correction aims to produce the peaceful fruit of righteousness, strengthening our character and deepening our trust. Rather than resenting hardship, we learn to welcome it as a father's guidance.

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus warns that many will attempt the narrow door yet fail to enter. He delivers a stark judgment: "I do not know where you come from; depart from me, all you evildoers!" This warning underscores the urgency of perseverance and authentic repentance. Mere proximity to Jesus isn't enough; we must walk the path he sets before us.

When we connect these readings, we see a clear pattern: God's discipline prepares his people to pass through the narrow gate. Just as Israel's trials equipped them for a new chapter of mission, our own struggles—shaped by divine love—fortify us for the journey of faith.

Let us pray: Heavenly Father, grant us grace to recognize your discipline as the mark of your love. Strengthen our hearts so we might endure every test and enter through the narrow door. May we, your gathered and sent people, bear witness to your glory among all nations. Amen.

En la primera lectura (Is. 66:18-21), vislumbramos la visión de Dios de una Iglesia universal que abarque a todas las naciones y lenguas. Cuando los exiliados regresaron, Isaías profetizó que los gentiles no solo observarían, sino que servirían como sacerdotes y levitas. Esta inclusión radical rompe los viejos límites y apunta hacia el sacerdocio de todos los creyentes celebrado en el Nuevo Testamento. De las pruebas del exilio emerge la promesa de misión y adoración global.

El autor de la carta a los hebreos nos recuerda que no debemos desanimarnos ante la disciplina amorosa de Dios: "Porque el Señor disciplina al que ama, y castiga a todo el que recibe por hijo". Toda corrección tiene como objetivo producir el fruto pacífico de la rectitud, fortaleciendo nuestro carácter y profundizando nuestra confianza. En lugar de resentirse las dificultades, aprendemos a acogerlas como guía de un padre.

En el Evangelio según San Lucas, Jesús advierte que muchos intentarán entrar por la puerta estrecha, pero no logran entrar. Él emite un juicio severo: "No sé de dónde vienes; ¡Apártense de mí, todos los malhechores!" Esta advertencia subraya la urgencia de la perseverancia y el arrepentimiento auténtico. La mera proximidad a Jesús no es suficiente; debemos caminar por el camino que él nos presenta.

Cuando conectamos estas lecturas, vemos un patrón claro: la disciplina de Dios prepara a su pueblo para pasar por la puerta estrecha. Así como las pruebas de Israel los prepararon para un nuevo capítulo de la misión, nuestras propias luchas, moldeadas por el amor divino, nos fortalecen para el camino de la fe. Vamos a rezar: Padre Celestial, concédenos la gracia de reconocer tu disciplina como la marca de tu amor. Fortalece nuestro corazón para que podamos soportar toda prueba y entrar por la puerta estrecha. Que nosotros, tu pueblo reunido y enviado, demos testimonio de tu gloria entre todas las naciones. Amén.

SAINTS of the Week

St. Monica (Aug. 27)*

Saint Monica, is St. Augustine of Hippo's mother. She was born in 331 A.D. in Tagaste, which is present-day Algeria.

When she was very young, she was married off to the Roman pagan Patricius, who shared his mother's violent temper. Patricius' mother lived with the couple and the duo's temper flares proved to be a constant challenge to young Monica.

Three children were born to Monica and Patricius: Augustine, Navigius, and Perpetua.

Monica followed Augustine to Rome. St. Ambrose helped her convert Augustine to Christianity following his seventeen-year resistance.

Augustine was baptized in the church of St. John the Baptist at Milan. The pair were led to believe they should spread the Word of God to Africa, but it the Roman city of Civitavecchia, Monica passed away.

Augustine recorded the words she imparted upon him when she realized death was near. "Son, nothing in this world now affords me delight. I do not know what there is now left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled."

St. Augustine (Aug. 28)*

This famous son of St. Monica was born in Africa and spent many years of his life in wicked living and in false beliefs. Though he was one of the most intelligent men who ever lived and though he had been brought up a Christian, his sins of impurity and his pride darkened his mind so much, that he could not see or understand the Divine Truth anymore. Through the prayers of his holy mother and the marvelous preaching of St. Ambrose, Augustine finally became convinced that Christianity was the one true religion.

He was baptized, became a priest, a bishop, a famous Catholic writer, Founder of religious priests, and one of the greatest saints that ever lived. He became very devout and charitable, too. On the wall of his room, he had the following sentence written in large letters: "Here we do not speak evil of anyone." St. Augustine overcame strong heresies, practiced great poverty and supported the poor, preached very often and prayed with great fervor right up until his death. "Too late have I loved You!" he once cried to God, but with his holy life he certainly made up for the sins he committed before his conversion.

The Passion of St. John the Baptist (August 29)

The Memorial of the Passion of Saint John the Baptist complements the Solemnity of his birth, celebrated on 24 June. John is the cousin of Jesus. He was conceived when his parents, Zechariah and Elizabeth, were elderly. Both his parents were descendants of priestly families. John's birth took place about six months prior to that of Christ, and coincides with the Gospel episode of the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth. The liturgical celebration of his martyrdom, which occurred between 31 and 32, has ancient origins. It was already celebrated in France in the 5th century, and in Rome the following century and can be traced to the dedication of a small basilica that dates back to the 5th century where he was buried in Sabaste in Samaria. Tradition holds it was on this day that his head was found. Pope Innocent II had it later transferred to Rome to the Church of Saint Sylvester in Capite. (vaticannews.va)
