



Second Advent Candle: Peace

"May we be in this world a ray of that light which shone forth from Bethlehem, bringing joy and peace to the hearts of all men and women." – Pope Francis

The second candle on the Advent wreath represents **Peace**. Like the first candle, it is also purple. the "Bethlehem Often called Candle," the second Advent candle reminds us of Mary and Joseph's journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem before Mary gave birth to Jesus. Building on the meaning of the Prophecy Candle, this second candle recalls that after all of the division, destruction, and dispersion of the kingdom in the Old Testament, there might finally be peace on Earth – Jesus is coming, and so is his Kingdom of Peace. As we read in the quote from Pope Francis, this light of peace shone forth from Bethlehem for all the world. (hallow app)

Clergy Message

Advent is a season of active waiting and preparation. This Sunday, the gospel speaks about John the Baptist, an important companion in our journey (cf. Mt. 3:1-12).

According to Matthew, the author: "John wore clothing made of camel's hair and had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey."

That was not a typical Jewish dress nor a common diet at that time. Pope Francis described it as "austere" and "radical" (cf. Angelus Address 2022).

It is a striking contrast to the religious leaders during the time of Jesus. In the words of the Lord, Pharisees and scribes wore long robes as a sign of status, but they are specifically known for altering their clothing to draw attention. They made the tassels on their garments longer and their phylacteries (prayer boxes worn on the arm or forehead) wider, both to appear more pious and to be noticed by others. (cf. Mt. 23:5; Lk. 20:46)

What captured the attention of the local Jews, that they went as far as the Jordan river to listen to John?

For many years, they believed in the prophecy that the Messiah will be preceded by the return of Elijah: Now I am sending to you Elijah* the prophet, Before the day of the LORD comes, the great and terrible day. (Mal. 3:23)

It is interesting to know how Elijah was described in the Old Testament:

"He wore a hairy garment* with a leather belt around his waist." "It is Elijah the Tishbite!" (2 Kgs. 1:8)

Catechism **718** says: John is "Elijah (who) must come." The fire of the Spirit dwells in him and makes him the forerunner of the coming Lord. In John, the precursor, the Holy Spirit completes the work of "[making] ready a people prepared for the Lord."

John, who prepared the way of the Lord, preached: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!"

El Adviento es una temporada de espera activa y preparación. Este domingo, el evangelio habla sobre Juan el Bautista, un compañero importante en nuestro camino (Mt. 3:1-12)

Según San Mateo, el autor: *Juan usaba una túnica de pelo de camello, ceñida con un cinturón de cuero, y se alimentaba de saltamontes y de miel silvestre.*

Ese no era un vestido típico judío ni una dieta común en ese tiempo. El Papa Francisco lo describió como "austero" y "radical." (S. Papa Francisco)

Es un contraste sorprendente con los líderes religiosos durante el tiempo de Jesús. En las palabras del Señor, los fariseos y escribas llevaban largas túnicas como señal de estatus, pero son específicamente conocidos por alterar su ropa para llamar la atención. Hicieron las borlas de sus prendas más largas y sus filacterias (cajas de oración usadas en el brazo o la frente) más anchas, tanto para parecer más piadosas como para ser notadas por los demás. (cf. Mt. 23:5; Lc. 20:46)

¿Qué llamó la atención de los judíos locales, que llegaron hasta el río Jordán para escuchar a Juan?

Durante muchos años ellos creyeron en la profecía de que el Mesías será precedido por el retorno de Elías: "Ahora te envío el profeta Elías, antes de que venga el día del Señor, el día grande y terrible." (Mal. 3:23)

Es interesante saber cómo Elías fue descrito en el Antiguo Testamento:

Era un hombre con un manto de piel y con un cinturón de cuero ajustado a la cintura. Entonces el rey exclamó: "¡Es Elías, el tisbita" (2 Reyes. 1:8)

El Catecismo **718** dice: Juan es "Elías que debe venir" (*Mt* 17, 10-13): El fuego del Espíritu lo habita y le hace correr delante [como "precursor"] del Señor que viene. En Juan el Precursor, el Espíritu Santo culmina la obra de "preparar al Señor un pueblo bien dispuesto" (*Lc* 1, 17).

Juan, quien preparó el camino del Señor, predicó: "Arrepiéntanse, porque ya está cerca el Reino de los cielos."

Catechism of the Catholic Church MAN

380 "Father,... you formed man in your own likeness and set him over the whole world to serve you, his creator, and to rule over all creatures" (Roman Missal, EP IV, 118).

381 Man is predestined to reproduce the image of God's Son made man, the "image of the invisible God" (Col 1:15), so that Christ shall be the first-born of a multitude of brothers and sisters (cf Eph 1:3-6; Rom 8:29).

382 "Man, though made of body and soul, is a unity" (GS 14 # 1). the doctrine of the faith affirms that the spiritual and immortal soul is created immediately by God.

383 "God did not create man a solitary being. From the beginning, "male and female he created them" (Gen 1:27). This partnership of man and woman constitutes the first form of communion between persons" (GS 12 # 4).

384 Revelation makes known to us the state of original holiness and justice of man and woman before sin: from their friendship with God flowed the happiness of their existence in paradise.
