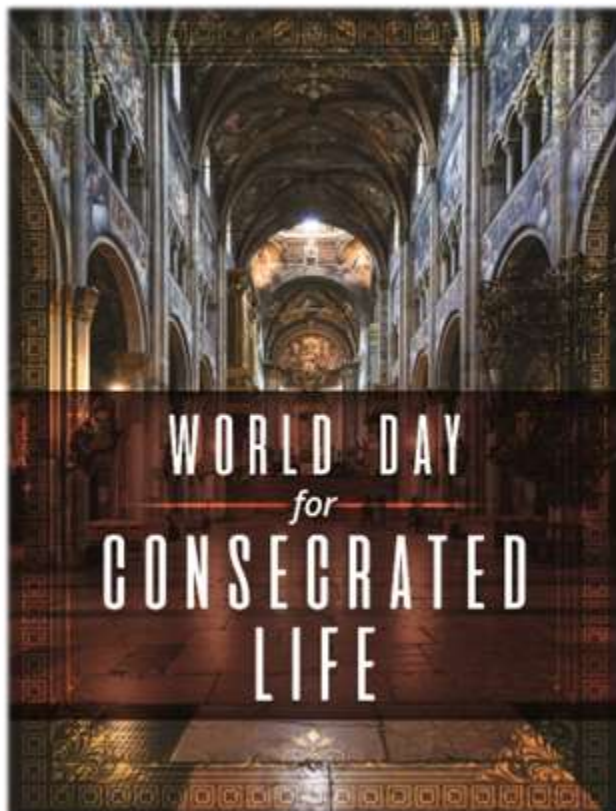

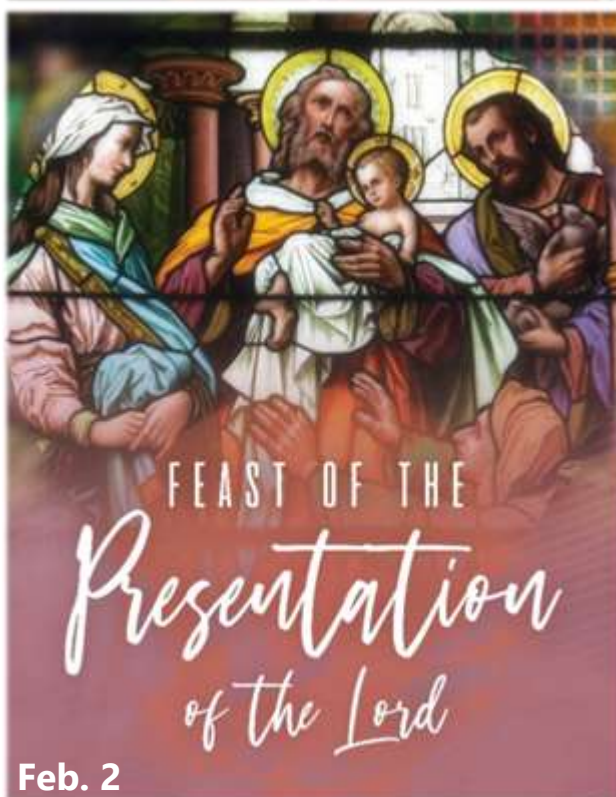

Clergy Message

The Gospel this Sunday (Mt. 5:12-23) is popularly known as the Beatitudes. This word came from the Latin noun, *beatitudo* which means a state of blessedness or happiness.

In the gospel today there are eight or nine “blessedness” recounted by the Lord.

The Catechism says:

1717 The Beatitudes depict the countenance of Jesus Christ and portray his charity. They express the vocation of the faithful associated with the glory of his Passion and Resurrection; they shed light on the actions and attitudes characteristic of the Christian life; they are the paradoxical promises that sustain hope in the midst of tribulations; they proclaim the blessings and rewards already secured, however dimly, for Christ's disciples; they have begun in the lives of the Virgin Mary and all the saints.

This paragraph is quite loaded with information for a better understanding of the Beatitudes.

“They are the paradoxical promises that sustain hope in the midst of tribulations.”

They are paradoxical in that, the way the Lord views blessedness is not the same as the world views blessedness - in a simple term happiness.

Perhaps you have your own definition of happiness. Some might view difficulties, sadness, persecution as the opposite of happiness; more so of blessedness.

I remember the words of the Lord from the book of the Prophet Isaiah:

8 “For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways,” declares the Lord.

9 “As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts. (Is. 55)

The Lord teaches us to live and be truly happy in this world and in the next life. And if you are going through any of these, you have hope and joy.

El Evangelio de este domingo (Mt. 5:12-23) es popularmente conocido como “The Beatitudes” (ingles). Esta palabra proviene del sustantivo latino *beatitudo*, que significa un estado de bendición o felicidad.

En el evangelio de hoy hay ocho o nueve “bienaventuranzas” contadas por el Señor.

El Catecismo dice:

1717 Las bienaventuranzas dibujan el rostro de Jesucristo y describen su caridad; expresan la vocación de los fieles asociados a la gloria de su Pasión y de su Resurrección; iluminan las acciones y las actitudes características de la vida cristiana; son promesas paradójicas que sostienen la esperanza en las tribulaciones; anuncian a los discípulos las bendiciones y las recompensas ya incoadas; quedan inauguradas en la vida de la Virgen María y de todos los santos.

Este párrafo está bastante cargado de información para una mejor comprensión de las Bienaventuranzas.

Son promesas paradójicas que sostienen la esperanza en las tribulaciones.

Son paradójicas en que, la forma en que el Señor ve la bienaventuranza no es la misma que el mundo ve la bienaventuranza - en un término simple la felicidad.

Tal vez tienes tu propia definición de la felicidad. Algunos podrían ver las dificultades, la tristeza, la persecución como opuestas a la felicidad; más aún de la bienaventuranza.

Recuerdo las palabras del Señor del libro del profeta Isaías:

8 Porque los pensamientos de ustedes no son los míos, ni los caminos de ustedes son mis caminos –oráculo del Señor–.

9 Como el cielo se alza por encima de la tierra, así sobrepasan mis caminos y mis pensamientos a los caminos y a los pensamientos de ustedes. (Is. 55)

El Señor nos enseña a vivir y ser verdaderamente felices en este mundo y en la futura vida. Y si estás experimentando alguna de estas cosas, tienes esperanza y alegría.

St. Blase, bishop and martyr (Feb. 3)

St. Agatha, virgin and martyr (Feb. 5)

St. Paul Miki and companions, martyrs (Feb. 6)

*1625 **Saint Blase** was the bishop of Sebaste in Armenia during the fourth century. Very little is known about his life. According to various accounts he was a physician before becoming a bishop. His cult spread throughout the entire Church in the Middle Ages because he was reputed to have miraculously cured a little boy who nearly died because of a fishbone in his throat. From the eighth century he has been invoked on behalf of the sick, especially those afflicted with illnesses of the throat.*

Catechism of the Catholic Church

Jesus was buried and He descended into hell

629 To the benefit of every man, Jesus Christ tasted death (cf. Heb 2:9). It is truly the Son of God made man who died and was buried.

630 During Christ's period in the tomb, his divine person continued to assume both his soul and his body, although they were separated from each other by death. For this reason, the dead Christ's body "saw no corruption" (Acts 13:37).

636 By the expression "He descended into hell", the Apostles' Creed confesses that Jesus did really die and through his death for us conquered death and the devil "who has the power of death" (Heb 2:14).

637 In his human soul united to his divine person, the dead Christ went down to the realm of the dead. He opened heaven's gates for the just who had gone before him.

Feast of the Presentation of the Lord

This feast was originally celebrated in the Eastern Churches as "The Meeting" or "Encountering" (Hypapante), in the Church mankind meets the Lord. By the sixth century it began to be celebrated in the West, where the focus became the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and was accompanied by solemn blessings and processions with candles; hence, it is popularly called "Candlemas." By the offerings of the Blessed Virgin Mary and St. Joseph and the prophecy of St. Simeon, the life of Christ here begins to point toward his Resurrection.
