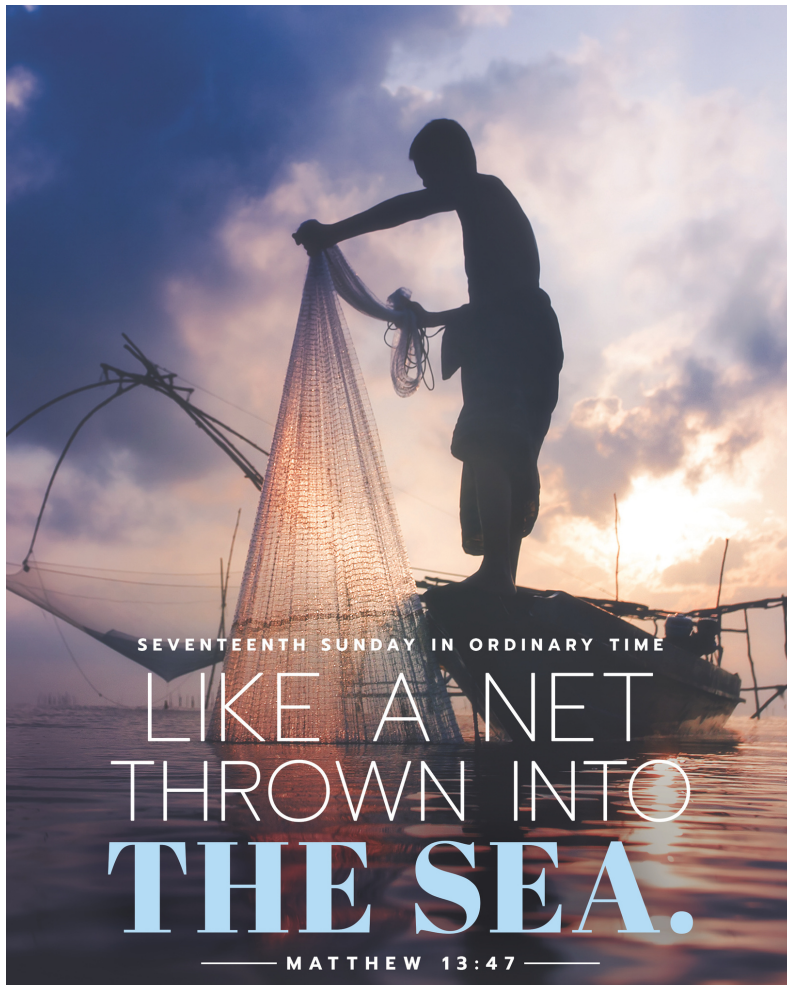

GOSPEL MESSAGE: 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Cycle A

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Jesus' parabolic discourse groups together seven parables in the 13th chapter of the Gospel of Matthew, and concludes with today's three parallel stories: the hidden treasure (v. 44), the fine pearl (vv. 45-46) and the fishing net (vv. 47-48). I will pause on the first two which highlight the protagonists' decision to sell everything in order to acquire what they have found. The first case has to do with a farmer who casually happens upon a hidden treasure in the field he is working. As the field is not his property, he must purchase it in order to take possession of the treasure: he therefore decides to risk all his possessions so as not to lose that truly exceptional opportunity. In the second case, there is a merchant of precious pearls; as an expert, he has spied a pearl of great value. He too decides to wager everything on that pearl, to the point of selling all the others.

These parallel stories highlight two characteristics regarding possession of the Kingdom of God: searching and sacrifice. It is true that the Kingdom of God is offered to all — it is a gift, it is a present, it is a grace — but it does not come on a silver platter: it requires dynamism; it is about searching, journeying, working hard. The attitude of searching is the essential condition for finding. The heart must burn with the desire to reach the valuable good, that is, the Kingdom of God which is made present in the person of Jesus. He is the hidden treasure; he is the pearl of great value. He is the fundamental discovery who can make a decisive change in our lives, filling it with meaning.

Faced with the unexpected discovery, both the farmer and the merchant realize that they are facing a unique opportunity which should not be missed; hence, they sell all that they own. Assessing the inestimable value of the treasure leads to a decision that also implies sacrifice, detachment and renunciation. When the treasure and the pearl are discovered, that is, when we have found the Lord, we must not let this discovery become barren, but rather sacrifice everything else in order to acquire it. It is not a question of disdaining the rest but of subordinating them to Jesus, putting him in first place; grace in first place. The disciple of Christ is not one who has deprived himself of something essential; he is one who has found much more: he has found the complete joy that only the Lord can give. It is the evangelical joy of the sick who have been healed; of the pardoned sinners, of the thief for whom the doors of heaven open.

The joy of the Gospel fills the heart and the entire life of those who encounter Jesus. Those who allow themselves to be saved by him are freed from sin, sadness, inner emptiness and isolation. With Jesus Christ, joy is always born and reborn (cf. Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium*, n. 1). Today we are called to contemplate the joy of the farmer and the merchant in the parables. It is the joy of each of us when we discover the closeness and the comforting presence of Jesus in our lives. A presence which transforms the heart and opens us to the needs and the welcoming of our brothers, especially the weakest.

Let us pray for the intercession of the Virgin Mary so that each of us may know how to bear witness, in daily words and gestures, to the joy of having found the treasure of the Kingdom of God, that is, the love that the Father has given us through Jesus.

Queridos hermanos y hermanas:

El discurso en parábolas de Jesús reúne siete parábolas en el capítulo 13 del Evangelio de san Mateo y concluye con las tres que escuchamos hoy: el tesoro escondido (v. 44), la perla de gran valor (vv. 45-46) y la red de pesca (vv. 47-48). Me detendré en las dos primeras, que destacan la decisión de sus protagonistas de venderlo todo para adquirir aquello que han encontrado.

En el primer caso, se trata de un campesino que, de manera inesperada, descubre un tesoro escondido en el campo donde trabaja. Como el campo no le pertenece, debe comprarlo para poder tomar posesión del tesoro. Por eso decide arriesgar todo lo que tiene para no perder una oportunidad verdaderamente extraordinaria.

En el segundo caso, encontramos a un comerciante de perlas finas que, gracias a su experiencia, descubre una perla de valor incalculable. También él decide apostar todo por esa perla, hasta el punto de vender todas las demás.

Estas dos parábolas ponen de relieve dos características del Reino de Dios: la búsqueda y el sacrificio. Es cierto que el Reino de Dios se ofrece a todos; es un don, un regalo, una gracia. Pero no se recibe pasivamente: requiere dinamismo, búsqueda, camino y esfuerzo.

La actitud de quien busca es la condición esencial para encontrar. El corazón debe arder con el deseo de alcanzar ese bien precioso que es el Reino de Dios, presente en la persona de Jesús. Él es el tesoro escondido; Él es la perla de gran valor. Él es el descubrimiento fundamental que puede transformar decisivamente nuestra vida y llenarla de sentido.

Ante este descubrimiento inesperado, tanto el campesino como el comerciante comprenden que se encuentran frente a una oportunidad única que no pueden dejar pasar. Por eso venden todo lo que poseen. Reconocer el valor incalculable del tesoro los lleva a tomar una decisión que implica sacrificio, desprendimiento y renuncia.

Cuando descubrimos el tesoro y la perla, es decir, cuando encontramos al Señor, no debemos permitir que ese descubrimiento quede estéril. Debemos estar dispuestos a dejar todo lo demás para adquirirlo a Él. No se trata de despreciar las demás cosas, sino de subordinarlas a Jesús, poniéndolo siempre en el primer lugar.

El discípulo de Cristo no es alguien que se ha privado de algo esencial; es alguien que ha encontrado algo infinitamente mayor: la alegría plena que sólo el Señor puede dar. Es la alegría del Evangelio: la del enfermo que ha sido sanado, la del pecador que ha recibido el perdón, la del ladrón al que se le abren las puertas del cielo.

La alegría del Evangelio llena el corazón y toda la vida de quienes se encuentran con Jesús. Quienes se dejan salvar por Él son liberados del pecado, de la tristeza, del vacío interior y del aislamiento. Con Jesucristo, la alegría siempre nace y renace (cf. *Evangelii Gaudium*, 1). Hoy estamos llamados a contemplar la alegría del campesino y del comerciante de las parábolas. Es la alegría de cada uno de nosotros cuando descubrimos la cercanía y la presencia consoladora de Jesús en nuestra vida. Una presencia que transforma el corazón y nos abre a las necesidades de nuestros hermanos, especialmente de los más débiles.

Pidamos la intercesión de la Virgen María para que cada uno de nosotros sepa dar testimonio, con las palabras y los gestos de cada día, de la alegría de haber encontrado el tesoro del Reino de Dios: el amor que el Padre nos ha regalado por medio de Jesús.

OCIA PROGRAM

The **Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA)** is a journey of prayer, learning, and reflection designed for those seeking to become Catholic, those seeking the sacrament of Confirmation, and for those simply exploring the Catholic faith. It is **open to all adults ages 18+.**

Our Lady of Mount Carmel will launch our all new OCIA program, using the *Invited* formation series, **starting Sunday August 23rd.** *Invited* was created with the conviction that OCIA should make disciples, not just deliver doctrine. Following the approach recommended by the Directory of Catechesis, the teaching anchors the whole process. Three priorities shaped the curriculum: fidelity to Church teaching, accessibility for those new to the Faith, and genuine formation of the whole person—mind, heart, and soul.

Every element is ordered toward a single goal: to know the faith and live it. For this reason, prayer is woven throughout the program, with particular moments designed to draw participants into a living relationship with God. Videos and resources support the catechist with focused, heartfelt content to support their teaching and the relationship they build with the participants.

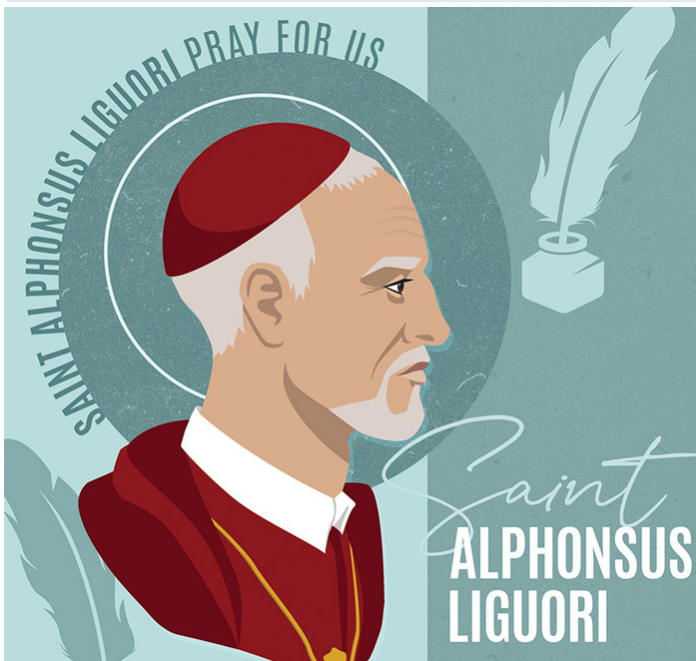
