**July 16: Feast of Our Lady of
Mount Carmel**

The Memorial of Our Lady of Mount Carmel commemorates the apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary to St. Simon Stock on July 16, 1251, when she entrusted him with the Brown Scapular as a sign of her maternal protection. The Carmelite Order traces its spiritual roots to Mount Carmel in the Holy Land, where the Prophet Elijah courageously defended the worship of the one true God. Inspired by his example, hermits settled on the mountain, dedicating their lives to prayer and later forming the Carmelite community. They built a chapel in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary and became known as the Brothers of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Mount Carmel, fostering a deep devotion to both Elijah and Our Lady.

GOSPEL MESSAGE: 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time – Cycle A

If Our Hearts Properly Receive the Word of God, His Purpose Will Be Accomplished in Our Lives.

Brothers and sisters, God reveals Himself to humanity through Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition not merely to inform us about Himself, but to transform us into the glorious beings He created us to be. This transformation takes place only when we properly dispose our hearts and receive the Word of God for what it truly is—not the word of men, but the Word of God (1 Thess 2:13).

The Word of God is not static ink on a page. It is living and active (Heb 4:12). It is Christ Himself speaking to His people. The seed of God's Word is always good; the question is the condition of the soil. In the Parable of the Sower (Mt 13:1–23), Jesus teaches that the fruitfulness of God's Word depends on the disposition of the human heart. The Word is always powerful, always alive, and always effective, but its impact depends on how we receive it.

A heart that is open to God's transforming Word is marked by faith (believing that God's promises will be fulfilled), humility (recognizing that God's wisdom is greater than our own), docility (allowing the Church to guide our understanding and responding to the promptings of the Holy Spirit), obedience (putting God's Word into practice), prayerfulness (allowing Scripture to become the language of our prayer), and perseverance (remaining faithful even when the Word challenges us).

The prophet Isaiah reminds us that God's Word "shall not return to me empty, but shall accomplish that which a purpose" (Isa 55:11). When welcomed with faith, the Word transforms our desires, heals our wounds, strengthens our hope, purifies our thoughts, guides our choices, and ultimately leads us to salvation.

If we receive the Word with the dispositions of heart mentioned above, then the promise of Jesus will be fulfilled in us: we will bear fruit thirty, sixty, and a hundredfold (Mt 13:23). Our lives will increasingly reflect the image of God in which we were created—loving, compassionate, holy, peaceful, joyful, and fruitful.

Si nuestros corazones reciben debidamente la Palabra de Dios, su propósito se cumplirá en nuestras vidas

Hermanos y hermanas, Dios se revela a la humanidad por medio de la Sagrada Escritura y la Sagrada Tradición, no solo para darnos a conocer quién es Él, sino para transformarnos en los seres gloriosos que creó para que fuéramos. Esta transformación solo ocurre cuando disponemos adecuadamente nuestro corazón y recibimos la Palabra de Dios por lo que verdaderamente es: no palabra de hombres, sino Palabra de Dios (1 Tes 2,13).

La Palabra de Dios no es tinta estática sobre una página. Es viva y eficaz (Heb 4,12). Es Cristo mismo hablándole a su pueblo. La semilla de la Palabra de Dios siempre es buena; la pregunta es cómo está dispuesto el terreno. En la parábola del sembrador (Mt 13,1-23), Jesús nos enseña que la fecundidad de la Palabra de Dios depende de la disposición del corazón humano. La Palabra es siempre poderosa, siempre viva y siempre eficaz; sin embargo, su fruto depende de cómo la recibimos.

Un corazón abierto a la acción transformadora de la Palabra de Dios se caracteriza por la fe (creer que las promesas de Dios se cumplirán), la humildad (reconocer que la sabiduría de Dios es superior a la nuestra), la docilidad (permitir que la Iglesia guíe nuestra comprensión de la Palabra y responder a las inspiraciones del Espíritu Santo), la obediencia (poner en práctica la Palabra de Dios), la oración (hacer de la Sagrada Escritura el lenguaje de nuestra oración) y la perseverancia (permanecer fieles incluso cuando la Palabra nos desafía).

El profeta Isaías nos recuerda que la Palabra de Dios «no volverá a mí vacía, sino que cumplirá mi voluntad y llevará a cabo mi encargo» (Is 55,11). Cuando es acogida con fe, la Palabra transforma nuestros deseos, sana nuestras heridas, fortalece nuestra esperanza, purifica nuestros pensamientos, guía nuestras decisiones y, finalmente, nos conduce a la salvación.

Si recibimos la Palabra con las disposiciones del corazón mencionadas, entonces se cumplirá en nosotros la promesa de Jesús: daremos fruto al treinta, al sesenta y al ciento por uno (Mt 13,23). Nuestras vidas reflejarán cada vez más la imagen de Dios en la que fuimos creados: amorosos, compasivos, santos, pacíficos, alegres y fecundos.

The **Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA)** is a journey of prayer, learning, and reflection designed for those seeking to become Catholic, those seeking the sacrament of Confirmation, and for those simply exploring the Catholic faith. It is **open to all adults ages 18+.**

Our Lady of Mount Carmel will launch our all new OCIA program, using the *Invited* formation series, **starting Sunday August 23rd.** *Invited* was created with the conviction that OCIA should make disciples, not just deliver doctrine. Following the approach recommended by the Directory of Catechesis, the teaching anchors the whole process. Three priorities shaped the curriculum: fidelity to Church teaching, accessibility for those new to the Faith, and genuine formation of the whole person—mind, heart, and soul.

Every element is ordered toward a single goal: to know the faith and live it. For this reason, prayer is woven throughout the program, with particular moments designed to draw participants into a living relationship with God. Videos and resources support the catechist with focused, heartfelt content to support their teaching and the relationship they build with the participants.

Pope Leo XIV has decreed that **from Jan. 10, 2026, to Jan. 10, 2027, "a special Year of Saint Francis"** shall be proclaimed. 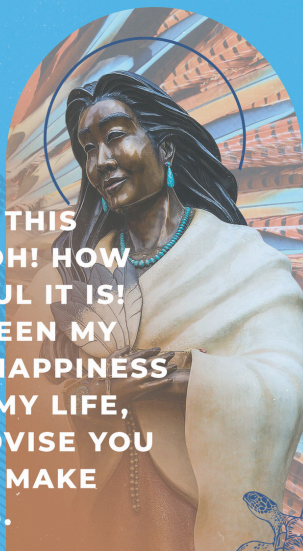

The Kingdom of God

546 Jesus' invitation to enter his kingdom comes in the form of parables, a characteristic feature of his teaching. Through his parables he invites people to the feast of the kingdom, but he also asks for a radical choice: **to gain the kingdom**, one must give everything. **Words are not enough; deeds are required.** The parables are like mirrors for man: will he be hard soil or good earth for the word? What use has he made of the talents he has received? Jesus and the presence of the kingdom in this world are secretly at the heart of the parables. One must enter the kingdom, that is, become a disciple of Christ, in order to “know the secrets of the kingdom of heaven.” For those who stay “outside,” everything remains enigmatic.

Dear Faithful of the Archdiocese of San Francisco:

Today, I am informing you that we have reached a settlement agreement in principle associated with the Chapter 11 bankruptcy action in the amount of \$395 million.

The proposed financial settlement would resolve all lawsuits related to child sexual abuse brought against the Archdiocese under California Assembly Bill 218 (AB-218).

We recognize that no financial settlement can erase the painful legacy of these past actions. However, we believe this proposal offers a path toward fair compensation for survivors who have carried the burden of this abuse for a lifetime. Sexual abuse of children and young people is a tragedy that has affected many parts of society, including the Church. Although most of the sexual abuse claims brought under AB-218 in the Archdiocese of San Francisco involve incidents dating back many decades and individuals who are deceased or no longer in ministry, we accept responsibility for the failures that allowed this harm to occur. I sincerely apologize to all those who have suffered because of those failures. We remain committed to fostering healing and reconciliation and to accompanying all who deserve our unwavering respect, attention, and prayers.

California has, on more than one occasion, lifted the civil statute of limitations for historical sexual abuse claims, and the real possibility of future legislative changes presents a significant risk to our Archdiocese, parishes, and schools. To address potential liability arising from known and unknown historical claims, the proposed settlement includes a channeling injunction and releases for the Archdiocese and other archdiocesan entities. These protections require that covered claims be resolved through the settlement trust established for that purpose rather than through civil litigation.

Over the past decades, the Archdiocese has absorbed the financial impact of legal expenses and settlements on behalf of parishes, schools and other related entities. The current environment is much more challenging. While parishes and other archdiocesan entities were not included in the Chapter 11 filing, they will need to contribute funds and assets not restricted for specific purposes toward this proposed settlement to secure these legal safeguards and share in the work of making amends for the harm of the past. I want to emphasize that our central archdiocesan chancery office is contributing as much as possible to minimize parish impact, and no donor-restricted donations to parishes, schools, or the Archdiocese, nor donations to the Archdiocesan Annual Appeal, will be used. Each pastor is receiving information about parish contribution amounts, and additional information about channeling injunctions and releases is available in the attached Q&A document.

We want our Catholic family to move forward together and continue to focus on and grow our vital [ministries](#) to the faithful and community members who rely on our services and charity. Our faith calls us to maintain strong screening and preventative measures to protect children and eradicate this shameful crime from our midst and from society as a whole. Since the 1980s, the Archdiocese of San Francisco has prioritized training and background screening, and our Office of Child and Youth Protection and [Safe Environment Program](#) has an outstanding independent audit record.

I want to express my deepest appreciation to our chancery, parish and other archdiocesan leadership teams who, along with a very capable team of legal professionals, worked tirelessly for more than 30 months to bring about this proposal. Together, they engaged in this very challenging work with the highest integrity, character and authentic care and sensitivity. While there is much work still to be done as we make progress in good faith on the details of a consensual Chapter 11 plan of reorganization, I ask you to join me in prayer for all survivors of sexual abuse, for our Archdiocese, parish communities and schools.
