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Collision with other boats and water users. Particular danger of canal boats in narrow canals.	Paddlers, leaders, coaches and/or public	Instructing paddlers to be aware of other vessels on the water, including stationary boats. Paddlers advised to take appropriate/avoiding action. Paddlers should understand the rules of the canal and behave accordingly. Visual check of tyres and lights on trailer. Trailer to be serviced annually, and before long trips	Drivers are responsible for checking loads on trailers and roof racks. 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Sprains, Strains Injuries, Overexertion Dehydration & Fatigue management	Paddlers, leaders and coaches	Ensuring paddlers are aware of correct manual handling techniques. Importance of water for rehydration is included in briefing	Ongoing training in paddling techniques. Ongoing advice on manual handling techniques. Extra trolleys ordered. 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Weather and environmental conditions	Paddlers, leaders and coaches	Assessing weather conditions prior to paddle. Ensure procedures and guidance are understood by all. Continuous dynamic risk assessment. Injury and drowning	Paddlers, leaders and coaches (person capsizing and person rescuing)	All paddlers must wear buoyancy aids. Beginners should learn rescue skills in the swimming pool (where possible) before paddling on the canal and should be competent swimmers. Paddlers are taught how to exit the boat if they capsize and how to rescue others. Ensuring trained paddlers/coaches are on the paddle to assist a rescue. Lead paddlers/coaches to carry first aid kit, radio/phone and flares. Undertake complete pre-paddle briefing session. Minimum of 1 qualified first aider on every paddle	Leaders/coaches to ensure buoyancy aids are fitted correctly. Regular checks on equipment before and during sessions and trips. Ongoing rescue skills training.	Paddle leader can ask paddlers to check their neighbor's buoyancy aid Paddle leader to oversee	Each paddle briefing	1/7/2026
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Hypothermia	Paddlers, leaders and coaches	Paddlers advised to wear suitable clothing for the weather conditions. Adjustment to clothing as required by conditions. Aware of the signs of hypothermia. Carry hot drinks in Thermos.	Group leader to carry emergency foil blanket and/or change of clothing. Point out that even when air temperatures are high, the water can be really cold Wear neoprene layer when for these situations	Paddle leader to coordinate and advise.	During briefing	1/7/2026

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Emergency assistance	Paddlers, leaders and coaches	All participants to carry medical information card. Lead coach to carry contact details of coastguard and emergency services on all paddles. Appropriate radios or mobile phones to be used. Know the correct procedure for emergencies. Correctly qualified coaches/leaders in attendance. Throwlines, first aid and appropriate kit to be carried.	Have an emergency plan in place for the venue. 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Environmental health issues, such as waterborne diseases	Paddlers, leaders and coaches	Paddlers should be aware that there can be discharges into the river especially after a lot of rain. Paddlers should not enter the water if they have cuts and wounds and should avoid swallowing any water. Paddlers should wash as soon as possible and seek medical attention if they develop symptoms.	Gather as much appropriate information prior to paddling and share with participants.
