QUARTERLY THEME: Christ, The Son of God

TOPIC: CHRIST, THE SOVEREIGN SAVIOR

INTRODUCTION:

How often when we are in a period of pain or discomfort and desirous of someone to understand, do we reject those who offer words of comfort as not being able to understand. How often do we assure ourselves that no one knows of the hurt that we experience in our bodies or minds. There are times though when someone *is* able to reach the need and provide the comfort. It is because they “speak the same language”; they know what is going on and we feel that they have been through it and are thus qualified to comfort. The Word tells us that the captain of our salvation—if indeed we have found His salvation—was made perfect through suffering.

Though He was and is higher than the angels, is it not wonderful that God sent Christ to live the sinless life and yet suffer that He might be fitted to succor us? It is an unspeakable treasure to know that Christ has experienced all, through which He can be at the right hand of God to intercede for us. He knows how we feel and can “speak the language” of our needs if we will but listen.

CENTRAL TRUTH: God was made flesh, that He could dwell among us and be touched by our plight.

GOLDEN TEXT: ***BUT WE SEE JESUS, WHO WAS MADE A LITTLE LOWER THAN THE ANGELS FOR THE SUFFERING OF DEATH, CROWNED WITH GLORY AND HONOUR.*** Hebrews 2:9

The other day an acquaintance of mine told me of a visit he had the previous night. It seems a friend of his, a boy who played with him, who went to the same school and lived in the same neighborhood had returned for a visit. In the interval of time since they had graduated from school, the friend had gone on to become quite famous. He was a noted college athlete and now had entered professional sports. My friend could not get over the fact that, in spite of his recent acclaim, his friend was still interested in him and had chosen to take the time to come and see him. The gulf, if it can be called a gulf, between the two young men is as nothing compared to the gulf between sinful man and the Lord Jesus. Yet, Jesus comes to us as Savior, High Priest and Friend. The thrill my friend experienced, is nothing compared to the thrill that grips the heart of every believer who says, “my Friend and Savior came to me and extended salvation and continues to come to me in my need.”
