Greetings from Hope Ministries!

This summer we (Scott and Michelle Toth) were so blessed to visit many of our churches in the US and Canada and to spend the full week at Eastern Camp. We want to thank each of you that hosted us for your generous hospitality and for the fellowship we shared together. Your support for the work at Hope Ministries is such an encouragement to us!

Vila Aviva Children's Home

One of the reasons for our US travel was to continue raising support for completing the children's home construction. While we were away, the home construction continued under the supervision of the engineer and architect that have been helping us with the project. The plumbing has now been completed, as well as the cement plastering of the interior and exterior walls around the home. A well was drilled and a water tower was put up to have constant clean water supply for the children. The next step is the electrical installation. After that is completed, we will be installing doors and windows, tile for the floors, and kitchen and bathroom fixtures. God has been so faithful to supply for each step of the building as we go. For those who are able to give towards the finishing of the home, donations can be made through the ACCF (USA) or ACCMBC (Canada.)

Medical Boat Clinics

We were able to hold 6 medical clinics over these last three months. One of them was a first-time clinic at Conceição. Conceição is a community where we had started a home group 8 years ago. At that time the enemy tried to stop us. There was violent drug and gang activity in the area and the police moved in and sent some of the young people to prison. Then the boat we were using to get to the home group needed repair and could no longer be used. On top of that we lost the church worker who was helping us when he was killed in a bus accident. In spite of these difficulties, we continued to pray for this community and many of the

villagers by name over these last 8 years. Now, this June, we had the opportunity to go back to hold a clinic and saw many of the people we

had been evangelizing 8 years ago. They were so happy to see us again! Seeing that we had not forgotten them and were coming back after so many years to hold a clinic, they were encouraged that God had not forgotten them either. We invited them to our Itabira outreach which is near their community and are now praying for God to open doors to start a home group again in Conceição that will eventually be a church.

Medical Boat Repairs

We are in the process of replacing the wood on the hull of our medical boat that is now 25 years old. The front half of the hull was already replaced at the beginning of the year but now we need to finish replacing the back half of the hull. Pray with us that we would be able to get the right kinds of wood for the needed repairs and also for skilled carpenters who can do the work efficiently and with excellence. The wood is not available commercially so the carpenters need to go into the jungle, purchase a tree, cut it down and use a chain saw to cut the wood to the right dimensions on the jungle floor. The boards are pulled to the river's edge by water buffalo and then transported down river to the carpenters near our Bujaru River church. It is a complicated process but we are thankful that God is the one providing all we need for this ministry. While the medical boat is being repaired, we are able to continue with scheduled clinics using our smaller mission boat.

Youth Camp

We had a wonderful 3 day youth camp over the weekend

of July 4-6. There were 110 young people registered. The theme was "Foundations" and focused on foundations of the Christian walk being consistent (daily) study of the Word, time in prayer, and fellowship with Believers. Acts 2:42 was the theme verse. We are thankful for many young people in our church that are growing in faith, steadfastness, perseverance and love for others.

- Pray with us for safety traveling to clinics and church ministry.
- Pray with us for funds to complete construction of the children's home and the four river base churches.
- Pray with us for wisdom as we train and send out Brazilian missionaries to these river churches.

Typically, the Trustees are over a district in which they live, communicating with the Churches in their district, finding out about needs and prayer requests and working with the Reps to find solutions to those needs.

The Trustees are the decision-makers for the Foundation who, based upon the Spirit's guidance, determine the course to best fulfill the ACCF's mission and purposes. They work together, guided by our by-laws, to determine how they can best provide information, programs, financial resources and other services to our Churches in North America and missionary projects around the world for the purpose of spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the salvation of lost souls.

Rubber to the road: our organization operates and accomplishes through Committees- volunteers who fervently and faithfully administer and serve in various areas. Sometimes these Committees are just one individual, but most Committees have several members. If you are currently attending one of our AC Churches and are interested in serving on one of our Committees, please reach out to us.

As the Executive Director and with my wife, Betty, as the Secretary/Treasurer, it is our responsibility to see that all of this is executed in God-honoring, legal, efficient, edifying, and transparent ways, with accountability and stewardship always in the forefront.

He will be returning to his hometown in Parana in August where he hopes to fully recover before returning to the ministry in September. During this time, his wife, Elisangela, will be undergoing a knee surgery where she will not be able to use her knee for at least 30 days after the procedure. Please keep Fernando and Elisangela in your prayers as they recover.

A few months ago, the home received a grant from the Foundation Trustees to carry out repairs and renovations on several of the structures at Nepo. The first of these repairs

was recently completed on the Directors Home's walls, which had crumbling plaster. To make them more solid and durable, ceramic coating was installed on the pillars and the remaining walls were stripped and replaced. The kitchen windows, which were no longer able to be opened due to rust, were also replaced.

The termite infested interior doors were replaced and the exterior of the home was also painted. We are thankful for the Lord providing a reliable and hardworking construction worker, Jerry, who used to be a former boy here at the home. The next project to be completed will be to repair and renovate the home that houses the boys.

In July, the home welcomed a short-term missionary, Leonardo Pachesnik, who is fruit of the CLM children's home. Leonardo was a child at CLM and was taken care of by Fernando when he used to work at CLM. Leonardo recently joined YWAM (Youth with a Mission), which is an interdenominational evangelical Christian organization dedicated to mobilizing and training young people from various nations for global missionary work. After completing the

training, Leonardo spent time traveling to some institutions doing missions, then returned to CLM to help there. When Fernando and Elisangela were visiting CLM in May, Leonardo expressed interest in spending time at Nepo. He's knowledgeable in soccer, understands computers, and plays some musical instruments. We are thankful to be able to have Leonardo's help with our CTE Adonai after school program's workshops.

Also in July, one of our boys, Gabriel, was adopted by his aunt and uncle. He had been spending the weekends with them, and at the end of the month, the judge granted permanent custody. We had a sendoff gathering for the boys, staff, Gabriel, and his relatives. It was a time to say goodbye and pray for Gabriel and his aunt and uncle. We thank God for the time we had with Gabriel here at the home and pray His blessings on this new family.

Our churches in Paraguay are growing through friendship evangelism – sharing the message of salvation through caring relationships and building bonds of trust with our neighbors, families and friends.

Our goals are to create a church community where every member is a “minister of reconciliation” (2 Corinthians 5.18) and every home (1 Corinthians 16.19, Romans 16.5) is an extension of the church, using cell groups that multiply



to reach our generation, our friends and family to Christ. In our cell groups we have an opportunity to worship, pray, and share God’s word.

Josue is an example: a young chef specializing in hamburgers, came to know the Lord through a friend who volunteers at our Escuela de Vida program. He felt loved and accepted and was invited to a cell group and was baptized in June. He loves the Lord and is growing into a leader in training.

Richard and Catalina were in our cell group last year and this year, they have opened their home to a cell group. Both of them and their kids are active in the church and their cell group, also known as the “church at home.” Lately, Catalina has also been hosting monthly birthday parties with friends from the neighborhood. They always share a Bible verse and pray for each other. Her neighbors attend the weekly cell group and enjoy forming these deep and spiritual friendships.

“Churches in homes” become churches - Ypané

A family cell group is becoming a “church,” a group of Believers who share the good news of salvation with neighbors, friends, and family.



Nestor and Emilia felt led to work in Ypané, a city where Nestor’s family lived. It was a neighborhood that needed Godly principles and the Gospel story. Ever since his nieces and nephews were little, he would pick them up and bring

them to church for Sunday services in San Antonio. The kids continued to come and even beg their parents to let them be baptized. Their parents started coming to church and also became saved. Now, they are part of the team that Nestor and Emilia are training as new leaders. This team is now working in Escuela de Vida in a public space, rain or shine. This project, providing meals and spiritual teaching, is a priority for 70 kids in that area.



Now, you are also part of this ministry. Through the ACCF donations, we started construction on our property in Ypané. We started with a wall, a well, and now continue with the construction as funds are available.

Western Camp

In Mark 6:30, Jesus called His disciples to “Come away and rest by yourselves.” It was an invitation to separate themselves from the work of the kingdom, from the press of the crowds, and from daily cares. And best of all, they got to just be with Jesus. That’s what coming to Western Camp has been, an invitation to come away and spend time with Jesus.

The specific experiences each year have been different depending on our season of life, but what hasn’t changed is that special sense that this is a sacred spot, a place and time dedicated to seeking Jesus more deeply.

The facilities and activities allow us to use all parts of who we are—body, soul, mind and spirit. The scenery lends itself to worship, to stillness, to quieting the noise in our heads. The staff are careful to not get in the way of what the Holy Spirit might want to reveal to each one who steps foot on this ground. We have spent many hours in the Prayer Chapel, talking, listening, waiting. The campfires at night have touched our spirits- singing together, listening to testimonies of our Brothers and Sisters. Visiting over leisurely meals is an increasingly rare moment to break bread and share our stories, our joys and our sorrows, and we come away richer.



Some years, camp is focused on themes of friendships, difficult to achieve forgiveness, or lessons from different books of the Bible. This year had it all. There was a book, a simple book, that unfolded in layer upon layer of motives, actions in right and wrong directions, unexpected twists and turns, and simple truths. Jonah has it all. And when God applies His touch of truth to our hearts, transformation happens.

We thoroughly enjoyed having Nick Vujicic and his family, including his mom, with us this year. They brought a fresh sense of grace and truth wrapped up in a loving family. The preaching and teaching presented opportunity after opportunity to go deeper. The Brothers from CLM, Anderson Kasnocha and Juan Villalba, and our Brothers and Sisters



from Denver reminded us of the call of Ninevah when we would rather settle back onto the couch. The choirs, special numbers, and general singing were heartfelt and soul stirring (shout out to you, Lila Webel!!)

The unique opportunity to gather daily with our Church family makes me wonder if that is what the early Church was like. On second thought, isn’t that just exactly what Heaven will be like. Western Camp is just a hint of Heaven.

Eastern Camp

In the book of John, Pilate asks Jesus the poignant question, “What is Truth?” At Eastern Camp 2025, that very question was the theme for the week, and it was answered in many different ways and looked at from many different angles. Ultimately, however, the best answer to the question will always be that Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life.



It was our second year at Susquehanna University in southern Pennsylvania for Eastern Camp, and things began to feel more familiar this time around. Not only did God bless us with wonderful weather for the week, but the University was also able to accommodate over 1,200 of us (a new

record!) despite the renovations underway on the cafeteria. The temporary spot to eat was part of the gymnasium Field House, but was more than adequate to meet the needs of all those at camp, with room to spare.

Monday’s class discussions during the week included:

- How the world tries hard to form our opinion on which truth is the right one, but we learned that only God’s Word is the infallible, unchangeable, and perfect form of truth in which we can put our hope and trust
- How satan, known as the “anti-truth,” uses doubts, fears and distractions to rob us of our joy that we would otherwise find in Jesus and in serving Him.

- How to allow God (through the two-edged sword of the Bible) to both shape us and to bring healing through grace through Jesus Christ.



- How God calls us to not only seek truth, but to pursue many other attributes of holiness such as self-denial, witnessing to others, discipleship, and living a life full of peace, joy, and forgiveness.
- How each of us that knows Christ represents His name and must be willing to defend it when called upon, acting as salt and light to those around us.

Aside from the forums and sermons that also discussed various aspects of the truth, other hallmarks of the week included the



various children's choirs, teen and adult choirs, and the orchestra. With more limited availability for the gym this year, more activities in the afternoon took place outside, such as volleyball, soccer, and spike ball. Each night was rounded out with an array of special numbers throughout the Inspiration Time programs, as well as the always popular singing times with the Gospel Hymns, the Zion's Harp, and Praise and Worship songs.

As we headed home from another blessed week at Eastern Camp, we look forward to seeing how God can use each of us in the coming year to better serve Him and to better carry the truth to a lost and dying world.

Reflecting on these past three months, it is evident that even in the ups and downs God remains in control and we are so grateful for His presence in the midst of every new challenge and blessing we face.

We are excited to welcome Sis Brenda Bodjanac as our newest caregiver to Manos Pequeñas. She has committed to stay until January and is staying with Sis Leah Albu in the girls' house. It is such a blessing to have more support with all the tasks and teaching... and the children are so excited to have another "Tia" to play with them, laugh with them, and teach them new things.

Abigail Schmitt (from Wooster, Ohio) also came to help in the month of June.



Whether making meals, helping with math homework, or reading books, the kids and caregivers all appreciated her joyful presence and willingness to serve.

Our oldest girl graduated from 6th grade in June. It was an

exciting time for her and her grandmother, as well as several members from Church who came to celebrate with her. Pray for her transition to "secundaria," that she stays strong even with more worldly influences, that she remembers all she has learned, and that she makes wise decisions as she continues to grow in her knowledge of God.

A small group from Tecate built a porch covering on another one of the houses this month. With the hot summer sun, it



is a blessing to have shady places for the children to play outside. We also received some visits from various groups in Tecate that have brought food for the children or took them on outings. We are grateful for the support from the community, and the opportunity to show others our ministry, and even be a witness, inviting them to church and telling them about God.

The kids have enjoyed their vacations from school, using it to catch up on



areas they are behind in, working outside with "Papá" (Bro Juan Carlos Quinonez), watering all the fruit trees around the property and playing soccer. We have also been studying books of the Bible and having all the kids write a small devotional each day to share with the whole family (all the caregivers and children) in the afternoon. We hope when they return to school in September that they are refreshed and equipped physically, mentally and spiritually.

Prayer requests:

-Please pray that God sends a couple to help provide relief care- to care for the children during break days and vacations

-Pray for wisdom for the caregivers as they help the children work through complex issues and past trauma

-Pray for the children that they learn more and more about God and one day make the decision to give their lives to Him, and that He helps them make good decisions that honor Him.

Greetings from CLM!

Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding (Proverbs 3:5). The only thing constant at CLM is change, and we rely on God's presence to guide us through the many decisions that are necessary on a daily basis.

Staff Situation: We currently have a full team of caregivers, as Marcos and Suzana returned to CLM after a few months away due to a son's health problems. We had an extra couple, Junior and Jurema, here temporarily, so we were able to give Mateus and Rosangela part of their vacation time during winter break. However, this week, Cristiano and Thais let us know that they are planning to end their time at CLM next month. So, we are actively looking for caregivers again. Please pray for God to send the right people, servants equipped to deal with the very difficult situations we face in caring for children and teens who have experienced extreme trauma.

Claudio and Daniele ended their time at CLM in July. Dani returned to working for the hospital she previously worked for in Curitiba, but now at a new branch in Guarapuava and Leticia, a young lady from church, took her place with the finances. We are seeking God's guidance regarding hiring another social worker, as the demands in this position are overwhelming given the high turnover rate of the children.

Consistent Turnover in CLM Children: Since we last wrote in May, 3 children and teens left CLM and 6 more arrived. The new children are still adapting to being at CLM, and things are a little bit crazier than usual as we try to teach Christian values to preteens and teens that come from a totally different culture. We have 2 babies, and the rest of the children are aged 11 to 17. Several of them present significant behavioral challenges, and we request prayer for the caregivers who live with the children 24 hours per day, as the battle is intense. Please pray for Yuri*, age 13, who is currently hospitalized, waiting to be transferred to a psychiatric treatment facility after having several episodes of aggressive behavior. (*not his real name)

Sports Court Finished: In the last issue of the Newsletter, we mentioned our new multisport court was in progress, paid for by a partnership between the Agraria (agricultural co-op) and the state government. The lines are finally painted, and you can see the finished court in the attached picture. We are also putting the finishing touches



on the fitness room so we can open it for use.

Winter Break: The children had three weeks off school during winter break, and the CLM staff worked hard to keep them occupied during this time. There were piano, accordion, flute and recorder lessons, a trip to the museum, and an afternoon of drawing at an art studio. The office staff organized a team competition that lasted two days, with sack races, tug of war, and many other fun activities. There was also a day for making and flying kites.

Jessica Lay is visiting us from Curitiba for a few weeks and has spent time with the kids giving music lessons and helping teens study for proficiency tests. She is the granddaughter of Jakob Lay, who donated the land for the CLM farm.

Trip to the United States

States: During the three weeks that the children were off school, board president Juan Villalba and director Anderson Kasnocha were in the U.S. They were able to attend Warm Beach Western Camp (see picture) and Eastern Camp, where they had the opportunity to speak with many of you regarding the work at CLM and the importance of donations from North America in providing for monthly expenses like food, clothing, transportation and salaries. Thank you for being part of every child's story of restoration and hope.
