The Global Garage Sale

I recently sold my home and moved, so I know the heartache and hardship of seeing your whole life packed into boxes or tossed into the trash outright. Of course it's not "life" that's contained in our material possessions or even our idea of home. Yet it feels that way because we're incarnate beings for whom the tangible world is the most real one.

Cups and dishes, clothes and furniture, mementos of the years and adventures behind us: There may be little monetary value attached to these things, yet still they're precious, irreplaceable. I have a shirt that belonged to my dead sister: It's literally rotting and not my style and I never wear it and wouldn't surrender it at gunpoint. Our attachment to possessions isn't a moral issue until we make it one—until we cross the line where the things we own, own us back.

We know we've reached that point when our decisions are based on things rather than people, values, and goals. Will we turn down the right job because it won't support our lifestyle? Do we not help a stranger because we don't want to muss our clothes? Do we withhold the check for disaster relief because of exaggerated car payments? Are our possessions making our choices for us?

As the church year slides predictably into Armageddon again, we're reminded that the stuff claiming our time and attention today will be gone in short order. Lo, the day is coming, the prophet warns once more, when the world we know is going into the dumpster. As we cling to every book we'll never read on every shelf of every room, we need to keep this phrase in mind: Lo, the day is coming, no kidding.

As the disciples followed Jesus faithfully into Jerusalem, the backwater folks around him struggled against the magnetic pull of material wealth. They were slack-

jawed at the monumental scale of Herodian walls and buildings: Some stones weighed many tons and were in place at the expense of human lives. Perhaps they felt small and ignorant in the face of such grand things. They were also surely swept up in amazement that Rome and its loyal clients could command such resources. How could Jerusalem's greatness be disputed and the powers-that-be not seem attractive, worthy of honor, perhaps even allegiance? Jesus meanwhile sniffs at these wonders as if at a bad odor. Where the disciples see magnificent walls, Jesus already sees ruins. And indeed, most of the great cities of the ancient world are reduced to ruins today: artful, historically significant, and gone, baby, gone. If we plant our hearts there, we follow our treasure into the rubble.

CATHOLIC TRIVIA

QUESTION

Why do Catholics call priests Father?

ANSWER

One of the common objections evangelical Christians have to Catholics is our practice of calling priests by the title Father. They will often cite a passage in Matthew's Gospel in which Jesus tells his followers: "Call no one on earth your father; you have but one Father in heaven" (23:19). It seems pretty straightforward, but when we put this verse in context, we see that Jesus is speaking out against religious leaders who had forgotten what their proper role was and who were bad examples through their own hypocrisy and elitist attitudes.



In other Gospels, we find Jesus himself using the title father for different characters, such as in the Parable of Lazarus and the Rich Man (Luke 16:19-31) and the Parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). If we put the verse from Matthew into the full scope of Jesus' teachings, he isn't saying that we can't use words like "father," "rabbi," or "master." Rather, he is telling us that we should be mindful of the full meaning of those titles and not to misuse them.

To call a priest "Father" is more than a sign of respect for the office of the priesthood. It goes all the way back to the way St. Paul understood his own work as a missionary and evangelizer. Paul wrote, "I am writing you in this way not to shame you but to admonish you as my beloved children ... It was I who begot you in Christ Jesus through my preaching of the Gospel. I beg you, then, be imitators of me. This is why I have sent you Timothy, my beloved and faithful son in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 4:14-17).

Yes, we have God alone as our heavenly Father, but there are also those here with us who nurture and nourish our faith through their teaching and care. This is why the title of Father has been applied to the church's pastors in different ways since the earliest days of the Church, including monks and nuns using the title "abbot" and "abbess" (from abba) for their spiritual leaders and Christians around the world recognizing the "Holy Father" or "pope" (from papa) as the head of the family that is the Church. The title Father is a reminder that priests have a special responsibility to care for, protect, feed, listen to, and nourish those who have been entrusted to them, all after the example of our Father in heaven who never ceases to give us what we truly need.

AROUND THE DIOCESE

• Local Vietnamese Catholics will honor not only their ancestors at their annual Mass but also one of their own who now leads the Diocese of San Diego. The Vietnamese community will celebrate the **Feast of St. Andrew Dũng-Lac, Priest, and Companions, Martyrs** known collectively as the Vietnamese Martyrs, on **Sun, Nov. 16**, at Good Shepherd Church in Mira Mesa. Bishop Michael Pham will be the celebrant, accompanied by Auxiliary Bishops Ramón Bejarano and Felipe Pulido, along with many Vietnamese priests who serve in the diocese. A procession will begin at 2:00 pm, immediately followed by the Mass. The event will conclude with a reception in the parish hall. The entire Catholic community is invited.



• This year's **Lucy Howell Humanitarian Award** was presented to Bishop Michael Pham on Oct. 23, during Casa Cornelia Law Center's 18th annual La Mancha Awards. The ceremony was held in the Peace and Justice Theatre in the University of San Diego's Joan B. Kroc Institute for Peace & Justice. Casa Cornelia Law Center, which was founded in 1993, is a public-interest law firm that provides legal services to victims of human and civil rights violations. It primarily serves immigrants in Southern California. Bishop Pham came to the United States in 1981 as a teenage refugee from Vietnam. As the seventh bishop of the Diocese of San Diego and the first Vietnamese bishop to lead a U.S. diocese, he has stood with immigrants. Earlier this year, Pope Leo XIV named Bishop Pham to lead the diocese, becoming the nation's first Vietnamese American bishop.
