Rev. Hati's main message on Reconciliation Sunday was to 'Do Something'.

*I have registered for **the 2022 Cultural Competency Course at Trinity United Church** that will happen in September and October of this year. It is expected that I share some of what I learn to the congregations of Zion and St. Andrews. What better way then via The Messenger. Here is my **third info** on the topic **Doctrine of Discovery**. It is my hope that it will help to give more people some kind of insight in the struggles of Indigenous people in our country and what they are up against.*

DOCTRINE OF DISCOVERY

What is the Doctrine of Discovery?

- Has its roots in a series of Papal Bulls (special edicts from the Pope) dating to the 15th century
- A legal framework that justified European invasion and confiscation of lands and the genocide of the original inhabitants of those lands who did not declare themselves to be Christian
- Became the basis of colonization by Spain, Portugal and England of many lands, including North America

Why is it still relevant?

- Based on the belief that “colonizers were bringing civilization to savage people who would never civilize themselves” (*Canada’s Residential Schools: The History, Part I: Origins to 1939, p. 18*)
- Affected the way Indigenous peoples have been perceived by non-Indigenous peoples, culminating in the establishment of residential schools and their ongoing legacy today
- The Doctrine of Discovery has been cited in decisions of the Supreme Court of Canada as recently as the 1990’s
- A key Truth and Reconciliation Commission Call to Action is the repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery (Call to Action 49)

Relevance to Christianity

- The Doctrine was based on the very notion of who God is, how mission is to be carried out and the exercise of power and control over others
- Christian mission in the New World came to be based on the occupation of “empty lands” and extension of the gospel to peoples considered pagans or infidels (i.e. inferior). Believed Christianity was a superior and/or the only legitimate religion
- This notion of superiority led to the subjugation of Indigenous peoples spiritually, culturally, militarily and economically

Response of the United Church

- March 2012: The United Church of Canada General Council Executive approved the motion that “The United Church join the World Council of Churches in denouncing the Doctrine of Discovery as fundamentally opposed to the gospel of Jesus Christ and a violation of the inherent rights that all individuals and peoples have received from God”
- The motion also committed the United Church to urge “the government of Canada and governments around the world to dismantle legal structures and policies that are based on the Doctrine of Discovery to enable Indigenous Peoples to determine their own aspirations and issues of concern”
