The transformation of Kidderminster Town Hall, a Grade II Listed building at the heart of the town, is well underway and due to reopen its doors in Autumn 2025. With a striking new courtyard, modern performance upgrades, and a full refurbishment of key areas, the revamped venue promises to deliver a true "wow factor" for the community and visitors alike.

Leading the charge is Kidderminster Town Council, working in partnership with Wyre Forest **Local News**

District Council and backed by a share of the Government's Levelling Up Fund. The Town Hall alone has secured £8.5 million as part of a wider £17.9 million investment across the district. Councillor John Beckingham, Chairman of the Kidderminster Town Hall Committee, shared his excitement:

"It's great to see the transformation of our heritage building taking shape before our eyes. The new covered courtvard is almost complete and will be a real destination space when we open perfect for residents, bands. theatre companies, choirs, musicians, and performers."

Inside, the Music Room has re-

ceived a major upgrade, with the stage modernised, new sound and lighting systems installed, and the beautifully ornate historic ceiling carefully restored. The original flooring has also been refurbished. preserving the charm of the space while enhancing its functionality for today's performers and audiences.

A special highlight of the restoration is the ongoing work on the rare William Hill organ - an instrument of national and international importance that holds pride of place in the venue's musical heritage.

But it's not just about performances. The Town Hall's café area is being completely redeveloped

to create a flexible, vibrant space with indoor and outdoor seating and multiple entertainment zones for community use.

Accessibility and sustainability are also at the forefront. A new lift is being installed, alongside improved entrances for disabled visitors, upgraded mechanical and electrical systems, and refurbishment of ground floor facilities. Even the King Charles Suite roof is getting a makeover, with better insulation to make the space more energy-efficient and welcoming. Outside, the building's historic façade is being lovingly cleaned and restored, ensuring it continues to stand tall for future generations. All this work is being carried out by Speller Metcalfe, an awardwinning contractor known for its sensitive approach to heritage projects - including the Grand Theatre in Wolverhampton and the Museum of Making in Derby. Mark Hudgeon, Regional Director at Speller Metcalfe, said:

"As a local contractor, many of our team are from the Kidderminster area, so this project is close to our hearts. The new courtvard is a stunning focal point, and we're proud to help breathe new life into this incredible venue."

The regeneration of Kidderminster Town Hall is more than a renovation it's a cultural revival, and a powerful reminder of the role that heritage, music, and performance can play in shaping vibrant town centres.

Hartlebury Castle History, Heritage & Family Days Out



Easily reached from across the Wyre Forest district, Hartlebury Castle is one of Worcestershire's most fascinating heritage sites. With over 1,000 years of history behind its gates, the castle was once the powerful residence of the Bishops of Worcester-who have shaped both the building and the landscape around it since the 9th century. The current fortified manor began in the 1200s, and through the centuries, the castle has hosted royalty, endured the English Civil War, and witnessed moments of quiet faith and political drama.

Today, Hartlebury Castle is a much-loved visitor attraction, offering a full day out for all ages. Visitors can explore the historic Bishop's Palace, complete with beautiful state rooms, grand staircases and the renowned Hurd Library—a hidden gem of 18th-century scholarship. Audio guides and displays bring the past to life, from stories of saintly bishops to humorous

tales about butlers and dignitaries. Children can enjoy dressing up, spotting curiosities, and engaging with interactive displays designed to make history fun and accessible.

The castle is also home to Worcestershire County Museum, housed in the North Wing. This museum collection is a nostalgic journey through local life, with everything from Victorian schoolrooms and traditional toys to fashion, farming tools and even a 1950s kitchen. There are regular temporary exhibitions and hands-on activities for younger visitors. Outdoors. the grounds are just as inviting, with scenic walks around the moat, a sunken garden, picnic spaces, and a natural play area with a zip-wire and climbing features-ideal for families looking to spend a relaxed few hours in nature.

Since being saved by the Hartlebury Castle Preservation Trust in 2015, and with the help of a major National Lottery Heritage Fund grant, the site has been restored and revitalised. A range of community outreach programmes, education workshops and seasonal events now ensure the castle remains a living part of local culture. From open-air theatre to Tudor reenactments, there's always something new to experience.

Hartlebury Castle is open from February to December, with access to all areas included in a single admission ticket. There's a friendly café on site, a well-stocked shop, and most areas are wheelchair accessible. Whether you're a history enthusiast, a family on a day out, or simply someone who enjoys a peaceful walk in beautiful surroundings, Hartlebury Castle is a must-visit treasure in the heart of the Wyre Forest.

Wyre Forest and bevond. Mentor Link provides long term mentoring for vulnerable and distressed children and teenagers. Their trained volunteer mentors offer regular support sessions in schools and community settings, creating safe spaces where young people can talk, feel heard, and begin to build confidence.

What makes Mentor Link different is its focus on long term, consistent support. Rather than short term fixes, they work over weeks



and months, sometimes navigating difficult vears, to help young people rebuild trust, boost self esteem, and develop tools to cope with life's challenges. The charity works in partnership with schools across Kidderminster. Stourport and Bewdley, supporting pupils who may be at risk of exclusion, disengagement, or emotional distress.

Teachers and parents consistently praise the charity for the positive impact it has on children's behavacademic performance, attendance and confidence. Simply having someone who listens, without judgment or pressure, can make a huge difference to a young person

For busy parents, finding the right class, event, or support group can feel overwhelming. No one knew that better than local mum Eileen Cowles. What began as a simple weekly timetable on Facebook has grown into FamilyFunandSupport.com Worcestershire's one-stop website for family-friendly events and essential support services.

What is: FamilyFunandSupport.com? This free, easy-to-use guide helps parents, carers, and guardians across Worcestershire discover what's happening locally from baby classes and teen events to vital support groups. The site is organised into helpful calendars tailored to different age groups and needs. You'll find everything from antenatal classes and toddler groups to inclusive SEND events and older kids' activities. A Support Calendar also highlights services like mental health groups, dementia cafés, and community drop-ins making it easier to find the help you need, when you

need it. "We want families to feel connected, informed, and supported," says founder Eileen, "This site makes it simple to find what works — whether that's a fun day out or a safe space to talk."

The Story Behind the Site: Eileen created the first version during a difficult time in her parenting journey.

"As a postnatal mum of two, I found it hard to stay on top of what was going on. There were flyers in cafés, Facebook events,

posters in surgeries — but nothing all in one place. I felt overwhelmed and isolated, even though I knew support was out there."

Motivated by her experience, Eileen began collecting information from notice boards, Facebook, and word of mouth — compiling it into a weekly timetable for other parents. What started as a personal lifeline grew into a community project, then a full website with help from her partner, friends, and local groups.

Now operating as a Community Interest Company (CIC), Family Fun and Support Worcestershire is proudly backed by Worcestershire Public Health and Worcestershire Family Hubs. Their support helps the platform reach more families while reducing pressure on services by helping people self-navigate.

Working Together to Support Families:

"We're not just here to list events," savs Eileen, "We want to work with local businesses. charities, and services to help them get seen by the families who need them most. If everyone knows where to look, evervone benefits."

Local Lowdown Quirky Tales & Local Lore

The Wyre Forest is full of fascinating tales, curious characters, and unexpected oddities that give this corner of Worcestershire its unique charm. From ancient woodland whispers to strange sightings on the canal towpaths, here's your monthly dose of local legend.

Let's start in Bewdley, where it's said that Queen Elizabeth I once stayed overnight at Tickenhill Manor—and that her ghost still walks its gardens. Locals have long reported sightings of a woman in Tudor dress drifting through the grounds on misty evenings, especially near the old orchard.



In Kidderminster, there's the tale of the carpet factory bell that could supposedly be heard chiming at midnight long after the mill shut down. While some chalk it up to imagination or the wind in the old rooftops, others believe it's the lingering spirit of the town's industrial past.



Then there's the curious case of the "Wolverley Tunnel Whistle." Near the canal tunnel, boaters have occasionally reported hearing a high-pitched whistle with no known source. Some say it's caused by wind over the water, others blame a mischievous local spirit who enjoys startling passers-by.

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Meanwhile, Stourport-on-Severn has its own local mascot—the tale of the River Severn Monster. Described as a long, dark shape that occasionally surfaces near the old basins, it's often dismissed as a floating log... but not everyone's convinced.



Whether you believe in ghosts, monsters or just enjoy the richness of local folklore, Wyre Forest never disappoints. These stories may not appear in textbooks, but they're passed down with pride and a smile.

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A New SPACE for SEND Students at Kidderminster College

Kidderminster College has officially opened its brand-new specialist learning facility for students with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) and it's already changing lives.

The dedicated new area, named SPACE (Safe Place and Calm Environment), is a purpose-built learning zone designed for young people aged 16+ who need extra support to develop independence. life skills, and confidence as they prepare for adulthood.

Thanks to £279.312 of capital investment from Worcestershire County Council, this ambitious project was brought to life between August 2024 and February 2025. Students began accessing the facilities in May, with many more set to benefit from September onwards.

SPACE isn't just a room it's a learning experience. It includes:

A fully accessible training kitch-

en, where students learn to cook. budget, and prepare meals, as well as develop hospitality skills like serving hot drinks and customer service.

- •Two sensory rooms, designed for emotional regulation and sensory stimulation - essential for students who benefit from calm. low-stimulation spaces.
- •A one-bedroom training flat. replicating everyday living. Here, learners gain hands-on experience in tasks like cleaning, laundry, personal care, and managing daily routines.
- •A quiet common room, offering a welcoming space for students who prefer low-noise environments during breaks or between sessions.

Together, these new facilities create a bridge between education and everyday life — helping voung people with SEND gain real-world skills in a supportive environment.

Claire Heywood, Vice Principal at Kidderminster College, explained:

"We're proud to offer inclusive education for students with SEND across all levels. Through SPACE. we've expanded our support, providing the specialist environment so many of our learners need to grow in confidence, independence and wellbeing. We're especially grateful to Worcestershire County Council for believing in this vision and funding it — as nationally, post-16 SEND provision rarely receives this level of capital investment."

Kidderminster College now supports over 100 young people with Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs), across entry-level, Level 1. 2, and 3 programmes. Many of these courses are designed to prepare students for adulthood, community living and, ultimately, employment.

Students are already making the most of SPACE - developing customer service, hospitality, and retail skills, while also enjoying the chance to step away from the bustle of college life and recharge when needed. Councillor Dr Stephen Foster, Cabinet Member for Education and SEND, added:

"It's fantastic to see such dedicated facilities and passionate staff supporting these learners. This project is about investing in futures - and we're proud to have played a part in making that possible."

SPACE is now open and playing an important role in shaping brighter, more independent futures for young people with SEND across Wyre Forest and beyond.

As a Conservative MP, readers will not be surprised to learn that I was dismayed at Labour's election landslide. But I was, perhaps grudgingly, optimistic about Keir Starmer's performance on the global stage, and Wes Streeting's potential handling of NHS reforms. Until last week.

Keir Starmer's frankly extraordinary announcement that the UK will, from September, recognise Palestine as a state has completely shattered any illusions that Starmer is a global statesman. For sure, I agree that the situation in Gaza, with starving innocent civilians being, apparently, randomly shot by the Israeli Defence Force is simply appalling. And I have always agreed that a long-term aim of the so called "two state solution" is one

to support. But the terms of the announcement were surreal. Starmer's proposal, at its most basic level, said that unless the treatment of innocent civilians was not stopped by Israel, then the UK would recognise Palestine. So, rather than negotiating with Palestine (not easy, when Gaza is run by proscribed terrorist organisation Hamas) and seeking release of the hostages in return for recognition, he uses the objective as an effective punishment for a third state. Of course, I simplify the arguments immensely. 400 words is not enough to convey the complexity. But this all questions his motivation.

It is no coincidence that this announcement comes on the back of a letter from 150 Labour

MPs, many of whom face electoral obliteration in constituencies with Muslim populations. So, our position on regional peace in Israel lies not with a global strategy, but more with Starmer's prospects of lasting this parliament as Prime Minister. It seems that his principled position lies in tatters, a threadbare windsock blowing limply in the breeze of political opinion. Meanwhile, back home, we've had the start of 6 months doctors' strikes.

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Health Secretary Wes Streeting made a schoolboy error last year when he awarded junior doctors an unconditional 22.3% pay rise. We all warned that they would be back for more. The NHS needs reform. It has never had so much money spent on it, yet it is falling back with regards productivity. To be fair to the junior doctors, their training arrangements illustrate this point. So, I am disappointed by Streeting, but remain hopeful that he can pull something out of the bag. Successful reform of the NHS is the goal he must achieve, for all our sakes.

sion. Expect everything from marching bands and costumed dancers to classic cars and community champions – a joyful celebration of everything that makes Stourport special.

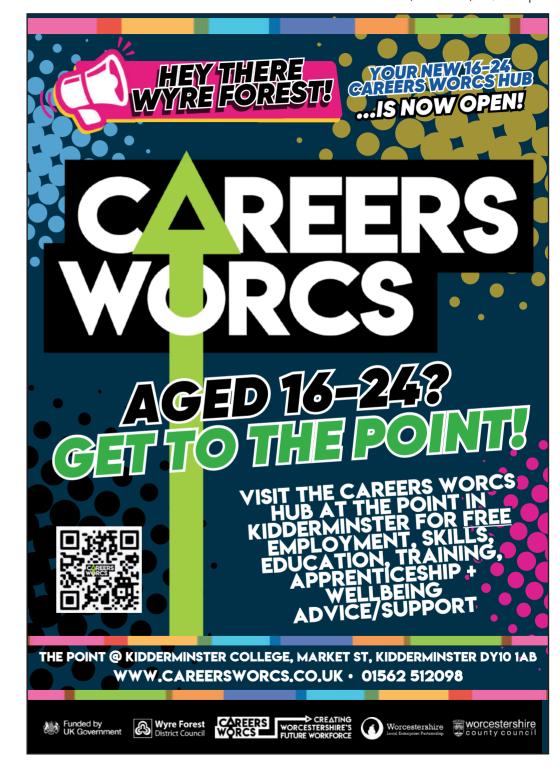

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History: The Great Floods of Bewdley When the Severn Rose Too High

Nestled along the banks of the River Severn. Bewdlev is a picturesque market town renowned for its charming riverside setting and historic architecture. But behind this tranquil scene lies a history marked by powerful floods moments when the Severn swelled beyond its banks and reshaped the town, its buildings, and the spirit of its people.

Bewdley's relationship with flooding stretches back centuries. The town's position on a meandering stretch of the Severn makes it especially vulnerable to rising waters during heavy rains and upstream surges. Over the years, there have been several major floods that tested the resilience of this tight-knit community.

One of the most devastating floods occurred in July 1947, a time etched in the memories of many local families. After weeks of heavy rainfall and melting snow from the Welsh hills, the Severn surged, inundating much of Bewdley's low-lying areas. Local newspaper reports from the time described scenes of chaos: "Water rose swiftly through the streets, forcing residents to evacuate by boat," said one eyewitness. Businesses along the riverside faced severe damage. and several homes were left uninhabitable for months.

The floodwaters did not only destroy property; they brought the community together in extraordinary ways. Volunteers from across Bewdlev banded

together to sandbag homes and businesses, providing relief and support to their neighbours. Local schools and churches opened their doors as shelters, embodying a spirit of solidarity that has become a defining trait of Bewdley.

Another major event was the flood of August 2007, part of a series of storms that caused widespread flooding across much of England. Bewdley's riverside streets were once again submerged, with water levels reaching record highs. Modern flood defences, installed after previous disasters, helped reduce the impact, but some areas were still severely affected. "It was frightening to watch the water rise so quickly," said a long-time resident. "But seeing the community come together reminded me

why I love this town."

Since then, Bewdlev has seen significant investment in new flood defences designed to protect the town from future high waters. These include reinforced embankments, improved river walls, and flood gates that can be closed during emergency events. The Environment Agency has also installed advanced monitoring systems along the Severn, allowing for earlier flood warnings and better response coordination.

These upgrades have made a real difference. In more recent flood events. water levels that might have previously caused widespread damage have been held back, protecting homes, businesses, and kev infrastructure. Residents report feeling more secure knowing these measures are in place, and the town council regularly tests and updates its flood response plans to keep pace with evolving risks.

Bewdlev's historic buildings, many daing back to the 17th and 18th centuries, have also been adapted to withstand flooding. Some have been raised, while others have installed flood-resistant doors and windows. blending preservation with practical-

As climate change brings increasingly unpredictable weather patterns, Bewdley continues to prepare for the future. Local authorities work closely with the community to promote awareness, resilience, and readiness, ensuring that when the Severn rises again, the town will be ready.

The story of Bewdley's great floods is not just one of destruction but of resilience, adaptation, and community spirit. It reminds us that while nature can be powerful and unpredictable. the strength and unity of a community can shine through even the highest waters.

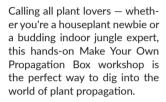

Health: Happy Gut, Healthy You! Simple Ways to Boost Your Digestive Health

Gut health has become a hot topic in recent years – and for good reason. Beyond just aiding digestion, your gut plays a vital role in immunity, energy, mental health, hormone regulation, and even the condition of your skin. Fortunately, there are simple, effective ways to support a healthier gut no extreme diets

or expensive supplements required. One of the most important things you can do is increase your intake of fibre. Highfibre foods like vegetables, fruit, whole grains, oats, lentils, and beans act as prebiotics they feed your good gut bacteria and help them thrive. The more variety you eat, the better, as different types of fibre support different strains of microbes. Experts recommend aiming for 30 different plant-based foods a week – that includes herbs, spices, nuts, seeds, and even coffee.

Alongside fibre, fermented foods are also kev. Natural yoghurt, kefir, sauerkraut, kimchi, miso, and kombucha all contain probiotics live bacteria that can help restore balance in your digestive system. Including small amounts of these in your daily diet can gradually improve the diversity of your gut flora. If you're trying these for the first time, introduce them slowly to avoid overwhelming your system, and be mindful of sugar content in shopbought varieties.

Equally important is what you reduce. Diets high in sugar, refined carbohydrates, and ultra-processed foods tend to feed the "bad" bacteria in your gut, encouraging imbalance. Limiting fizzy drinks, sweets, and ready-made snacks,

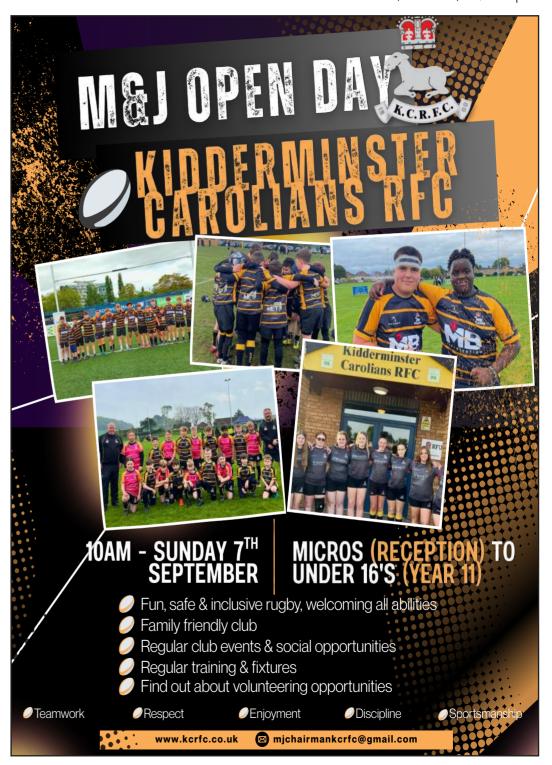
and replacing them with whole foods, nuts, seeds, or fruit can help reset your microbiome. It's not about being perfect – just making better choices more often. Even small swaps, like choosing brown rice over white or adding a handful of spinach to a sandwich, can have long-term benefits.

Stress management is another powerful tool for gut health. The gut and brain are closely linked via the vagus nerve, and stress can directly affect digestion, trigger inflammation, and alter the microbial environment. Simple practices such as mindfulness, breathing exercises, gentle walking, and regular sleep patterns can reduce this impact and support digestive health over time. For many people, taking just ten to fifteen minutes a day to unwind can noticeably ease digestive discomfort.

While antibiotics are sometimes necessary, they don't differentiate between good and bad bacteria. If you've been prescribed a course of antibiotics, it may be worth speaking to a pharmacist or GP about taking a probiotic supplement afterwards to help your gut recover. This is particularly important if you've had multiple rounds of antibiotics in a short period or experienced digestive issues afterward.

Improving your gut health is not about drastic overhauls – it's about small, consistent habits. Over time, these changes can lead to better digestion, stronger immunity, clearer skin, sharper thinking, and improved mood. Treat your gut well, and it will return the favour in ways you might not expect.

with ingredients you picked yourself.

Look out for wild apples too—they often grow near brambles and are ideal companions for blackberries in a traditional dessert. Soft, tangy apple balances the rich sweetness of the berries perfectly. 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Blackberry & Apple Crumble Bake using your foraged fruit



Ingrediants

For the fruit filling:

- 2 large cooking apples (peeled, cored and chopped)
- 200g fresh blackberries
- •2-3 tbsp soft brown sugar
- •½ tsp ground cinnamon

For the crumble topping:

- •100g plain flour
- •75g rolled oats
- •75g cold butter (cut into cubes)
- •75g soft brown sugar

Method

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C (160°C fan) / Gas Mark 4.
- 2. Prepare the fruit: In a large bowl, mix the chopped apples, blackberries, sugar, and cinnamon. Tip into an ovenproof dish and spread evenly.

- 3. Make the crumble: In a separate bowl, rub the butter into the flour using your fingertips until it looks like breadcrumbs (kids usually love this part!). Stir in the oats and sugar.
- 4. Top the fruit: Sprinkle the crumble mixture evenly over the fruit filling.
- 5. Bake for 35-40 minutes, until the topping is golden and the fruit is bubbling around the edges.
- 6. Cool slightly, then serve warm with custard, cream, or a scoop of local vanilla ice cream.

Top tip for little helpers:

Let them wash the berries, mix the filling, and sprinkle the crumble. Just be prepared for a few to disappear during prep! Local twist: If you have windfall apples from your garden or a neighbour's tree-use them! This recipe is all about simple, seasonal goodness.



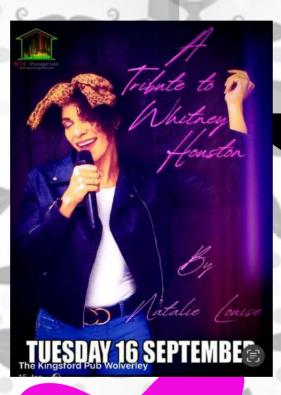

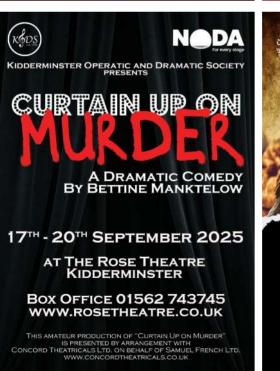

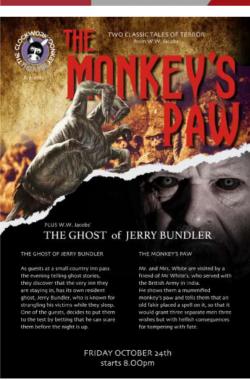

forget to top up screenwash with
a winter-ready formula.

If your brakes have been a bit squeaky or spongy, book in for a check before autumn's damp roads make stopping distances longer. A garage can also inspect your battery, as colder starts tend to highlight weaknesses.

MOT Reminder

September is one of the UK's busiest months for MOTs, especially for vehicles registered in the spring. Beat the rush and book early – many local garages offer a free retest or loyalty discounts if you book ahead.

September also brings the new '75' registration plates. Whether you're buying or just browsing, now's the time when forecourts are full of deals. 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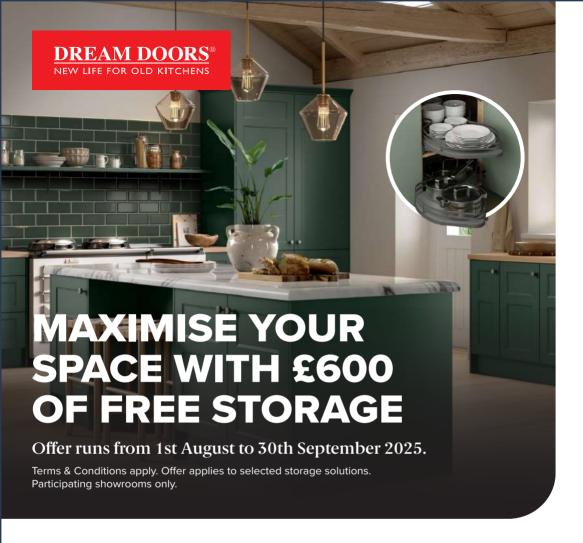


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
