OFFICIALS NEEDED!

Become an Official – OA NEEDS YOU!

USA Swimming Officials are parent volunteers who are committed to supporting and observing swimming by ensuring fair and equitable competition. These officials are required in order to have a "legal" sanctioned meet (meets in which the swimmer's time for their event is recognized by USA Swimming).

Olympus Aquatics and Utah Swimming are always looking for new volunteers to join the ranks. Being an official is a great way to serve your club and support swimming in Utah. NO EXPERIENCE NECESSARY! Swim meets are a major source of OA's revenue and we cannot run a safe, fair and equitable meet without certified officials. Becoming a part of the OA official's team is a great way to serve the swimming community. As most clubs, we rely on our own parents/guardians/volunteers to provide the majority of officials to oversee our meets.

Frequently Asked Questions / Concerns

How do I become an official?

- This is a role that takes training, but the certification process is not overly difficult.
- Attend a clinic once a year, which includes classroom discussion, review of an officiating video, and a lot of questions and answers.
- Familiarize yourself with the USA Swimming Rulebook available online at USASwimming.org.
- Take the online, open-book test; once you start, it can be saved so you can work on it a little at a time, if you wish.
- Register to become a Non-Athlete Member, complete both a background check and an "Athlete Protection" online course (a test that all Officials, Coaches and Meet Directors must take every two years). The fees for USA registration and the background check will all be reimbursed to you by OA once you complete your certification.
- Beyond that, the balance of the training is on-the-job through four apprentice sessions shadowing experienced officials during meets.

I am new to the sport of swimming and don't know the rules – how can I be an official?

- Don't worry! USA and Utah Swimming have a good training program and a great cadre of
 experienced officials to help you learn the ropes. Many officials have started just where you
 are. You will become well-qualified in no time at all and will gain a better appreciation for
 the sport along the way.

When is the next officials' clinic?

Does this count toward my volunteer requirements for the club?

 Yes, sessions you work as an official at meets count toward your club volunteer requirements.

Will there be any cost to me?

- There is a fee for the USA Swimming non-athlete membership and for the background check, but these costs will all be reimbursed to you by OA once you complete your certification.
- The uniform is black pants, skirt, skort or shorts, a white collared shirt and black shoes/socks. Shirts are given frequently as an "officials' gift" at meets when you volunteer. Other than the occasional free shirt, you will need to provide your own uniform.

Why do I need a background check done?

- USA Swimming has instituted nationwide reforms with the purpose of ensuring the safety and well-being of the children in our care. As part of that program, all coaches must now pass "enhanced" background checks and all Officials and Meet Directors must pass standard background checks.
- Results are confidential only the subject of the check sees the full results. The officials chair
 is told only when a person has passed, and can only approve certification when (s) he
 received the "pass".

How big a time commitment is it?

Upfront:

- The clinic is generally 3-4 hours in one session.
- Reading and test prep approximately 1-2 hours
- On-line test approximately 1-2 hours.
- On-line Athlete Protection course approximately 30 minutes 1 hour

On-going

- Commit to officiating a minimum of 4 sessions over two meets (6 sessions for starter/refs).
- Attend a clinic every year.
- For sessions you are working, be at the pool 45 minutes to an hour prior to the meet starting (show up at the athletes' warm-up time).
- Spend a little time staying current on rules and interpretations (maybe 1 hour per month)

Will I ever need to recertify?

Yes. All officials in Utah re-certify every year. To maintain your certification you must:

- Attend an Officials Clinic or work as an official at a championship meet (zones, sectionals, nationals).
- Stroke/Turn Judges must officiate a minimum of four sessions, at two or more different meets each year.
- Starter/Referees must officiate a minimum of six sessions, at two or more different meets each year.

What are the benefits?

 If your child is swimming in the meet, you are already there so you might as will help your team out

- Time passes quicker
- Best seat in the house
