



About Parrish Family Vineyard

In 1925, the Parrish's grandfather, Earl Henderson, moved to Atascadero, California – where he had PO Box One – and in 1927 planted and managed over 740 acres of wine grapes. But with the era of the Prohibition and Great Depression, Earl was unable to take the next step in owning his own winery – but this dream was not forgone for the family.

Fast forward to David Parrish, Henderson's Grandson, who started in the wine world in the 1970s developing new trellising techniques in Napa, working alongside greats like Robert Mondavi. With the vision of continuing the family legacy on the central coast, David planted 40 acres of Cabernet Sauvignon on his Creston ranch in 1995. In 2004, David fulfilled his grandfather's dream by making his first vintage of Cabernet Sauvignon and in 2013 planted 30 acres in the Adelaida District of Paso Robles. The Adelaida winery and tasting room opened in 2018 to feature a cozy home-style tasting room, scenic vineyard foods, and delicious food offerings to compliment the wine. Truly committed to a family-run winery, David is joined in the business by his son-in-law, Ethan Ray, and daughter, Cecily Parrish Ray.

Acreege Parrish Family Vineyard sources their wine grapes primarily from their superior estate vineyard in the Adelaida District of the Paso Robles AVA. They also own a vineyard in the Creston (established in 1995). They have 70 acres total of grape vines with 40 acres in Creston and 30 acres in Adelaida.

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About David Parrish


Owner & Winemaker

David Parrish's grandfather, Earl Henderson, was one of the first grape growers on the Central Coast, having planted 740 acres of grape vines in Atascadero in 1927. As a child, David spent a lot of time with his grandfather on his ranch, where he learned the ins and outs of farming.

David graduated from UC Davis in 1974 and started a vineyard trellising company. He was fortunate to meet a group of Napa growers who wanted to make Napa a world class wine growing region. After his Davis professor, Dr. Kliewer, convinced him to take up the invite to work with these Napa growers, David moved to Napa and started working with Robert Mondavi and Bob Steinhauer of Beringer Winery. After a few months, he was working with most of the wineries in the Napa area.

Though the experience of working with Napa greats was rewarding, David always wanted to return to the Central Coast and grow his own grapes. With the vision of continuing the family legacy, David planted 40 acres of Cabernet Sauvignon on his Creston ranch in 1995. In 2004, he made his first vintage of Cabernet Sauvignon; in 2011 opened the family's first tasting room in Downtown Paso Robles; and in 2013 planted 30 acres at his Adelaida Vineyard. David, along with his family, opened a premier tasting room and winery at the Adelaida Vineyard in 2018. The new tasting room features stunning vineyard views, warm hospitality, and delicious food offerings by his daughter and son-in-law.

Since 1995, David's passion has been Cabernet Sauvignon. He strives to produce rounded, full bodied Cabernets with an elegant finish that are approachable and sophisticated. His dedication to his craft has led to numerous accolades for this wines and constant innovation in the vineyard and winery.



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About the Parrish Vineyards

In 1995, the Parrish Creston vineyard was planted on 40 acres with 100% Cabernet Sauvignon. This unique vineyard consisted of four different clones of Cabernet grafted onto two different rootstocks. The clones featured were Clone 4, 6, 7, and 337. The 2014 Clone 6 became an awarded and popular vintage. In 2020, the vineyard was replanted with more Cabernet Sauvignon, but a few other varieties to add to the Parrish wine portfolio - Merlot, Grenache, and Petite Sirah.

The terrain of the Parrish Creston vineyard is unique to the region due to its location with the influence of the cool evening coastal breezes and the warm daytime temperatures at 1,200 feet elevations. The soil features granite with high calcium, which produces beautiful color and flavor for the wine.

The Cabernet has its own unique personality and as David would tell you: “The wine is distinctive and never tries to be anything else.” Just like he was taught by his Grandfather Earl, “If you’re a 3rd baseman, stay at 3rd base, and don’t worry about what everyone else is doing.”

The latest vineyard David planted is in the beautiful, famed Adelaida District AVA of Paso Robles, which is set amongst the Santa Lucia Range at 1,550 feet elevation. It was planted in 2013 featuring Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Petit Verdot, Syrah, Zinfandel, and Sauvignon Blanc. In studying the land, David divided up the 30 acre vineyard into 16 different soil blocks. At the very top of the hill, the first soil is almost all calcareous, but as it slopes down toward a creek bed, it gradually shifts from calcareous to clay. With the mix of clay and calcareous, there will be pronounced acidity, full tannins, and great structure as well as spice in the wines. This vineyard is also home to the Parrish Family Vineyard tasting room and winery.



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About Parrish Winery

The swirling Parrish wine in your glass originated from our state of the art winery adjacent to the tasting room and fondly known as the barn. Set amongst the vines of our Adelaida Vineyard in Paso Robles, it is in close proximity to the fruit that produces our award winning Cabernet Sauvignon, Bordeaux blends, Sauvignon Blanc, and other varietals. The winery was built in 2016-2017 and had its first full estate vintage overseen by the winemakers David Parrish and Cody Alt.

The winery features 15 stainless steel fermentation tanks ranging from 4 to 6 tons (1,300-1,900 gallons). Each tank is equipped with automatic pump over set ups, full wrap glycol jackets for heating and cooling, and micro oxygenation lines.

In addition to the tank room, there is a malolactic room that features temperature and humidity adjustments, which efficiently and reliably finish malolactic fermentation for our wines. The winery also features a laboratory that monitors the progression of the grapes and the wines with the assistance of Winexray software.

Once the wines have been processed post-harvest, they journey into our temperature controlled barrel room to rest for up to 22 months before bottling. The beautiful, clean-lined winery is the perfect location for creativity to meet science. Tours of the winery are available during the Winter, Spring, and Summer months (January-July).



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Sustainability

Vineyard Practices Owl houses are positioned around the vineyards to invite barn owls to inhabit and assist in our rodent control.

Barley and beneficial flowers are sown down the rows of the vineyard to help eliminate weeds and reducing our need for chemicals.

Rich compost is used in the rows of the vineyard as organic fertilizer.

Seaweed is infused into the drip irrigation to add natural minerals to our soil. We also use a mix of worm cast and organic products, known as organic tea, to enhance the microbes.

Winery We practice water conservation and believe in being good stewards with our water. Our winery features a state of the art water treatment system to capture and treat gray water.

We use solar to reduce our carbon footprint and offset one hundred percent of the total electrical use of our ag pump, winery, and tasting room.

Adelaida Creek Restoration The Parrish family donated in perpetuity 0.64 acres of a creek on the Adelaida property to San Luis Obispo County. The Parrishes are the custodians of the creek and the 500 native plants that were planted by the San Luis Obispo Resource Conservation District.

Rehab of the creek was an important step to improving the land for the sake of the vineyard and the betterment of the community as a whole.



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
