

BRO. DAVID LEFLORE

In the second century BC, Judea became the stage for one of the most intense religious persecutions in Jewish history. At the center of this crisis was Antiochus IV Epiphanes, the Greek/Syrian ruler whose policies led to the desecration of the Jerusalem Temple in 167 BC and sparked the Maccabean Revolt. These events would permanently shape Jewish religious identity and give rise to the festival of Hanukkah, also known as the Feast of Dedication. Antiochus IV's self-appointed title, "Epiphanes," meant "manifest god" or "god revealed." Many Jews, however, mockingly referred to him as "Epimanes," meaning "the madman," reflecting their view of his arrogance and erratic behavior. While earlier Seleucid kings had allowed Jews a degree of religious autonomy, Antiochus took a far more aggressive approach. Internal divisions within Judea, between traditional Jews and Hellenized elites, gave him an opening to interfere directly in Jewish religious life, including the appointment and removal of high priests. In 167 BC, Antiochus issued decrees aimed at eradicating Jewish religious practice. These included: Banning circumcision, Sabbath observance, and Torah study. Forcing Jews to participate in pagan sacrifices. Installing pagan altars throughout Judea. The most shocking act was the desecration of the Jerusalem Temple. Antiochus ordered a pagan altar, likely dedicated to Zeus, to be erected on top of the Temple's altar of burnt offering. Unclean animals, probably pigs, were sacrificed there. This act is referred to in Jewish tradition as the ultimate sacrilege and is echoed in Daniel 11:31 as the "abomination of desolation." For Jews, the Temple was not merely a building; it was the dwelling place of God's presence. Its defilement represented an assault on the covenant itself. Resistance began when an elderly priest named Mattathias refused to offer a pagan sacrifice. When a fellow Jew stepped forward to comply, Mattathias killed both him and the Syrian official overseeing the ritual. In 167 BC, this act ignited open rebellion. After Mattathias' death in 166 BC, leadership passed to his son Judas, known as Judas Maccabeus ("the Hammer"). Though vastly outnumbered, Judas led a guerrilla campaign against Greek/Syrian forces. In 164 BC, Judas Maccabeus and his followers recaptured Jerusalem. They found the Temple defiled and in ruins. After cleansing it and rebuilding the altar, they rededicated the Temple on the 25th of Kislev, exactly three years after its desecration. Jewish tradition later emphasized the miracle of a small amount of consecrated oil lasting eight days, forming the basis for the eight-day celebration of Hanukkah. The desecration of the Temple and its rededication became symbols of resistance, faithfulness, and divine deliverance, echoed later in both Jewish tradition and the New Testament, where Jesus is depicted attending the Feast of Dedication (John 10:22). In Jewish memory, Antiochus Epiphanes remains not a divine manifestation, but "Epimanes," the mad tyrant whose attempt to extinguish the faith instead strengthened it. Now, the true "Epiphanes," God revealed – Jesus, is in the temple and the Jews fail to see Him for who He is. Instead, they see Jesus as just another "Epimanes" or madman. Now you're all set for the message Sunday.

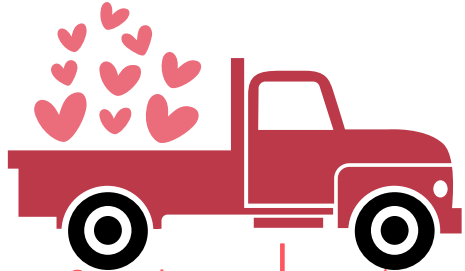
