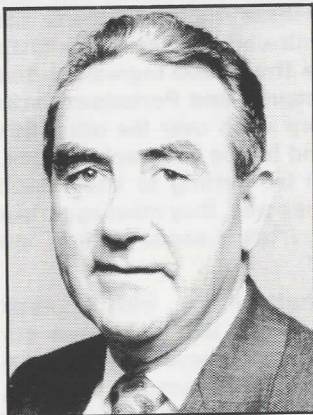

SPONSORSHIP:

Gilbeys, sponsors of the **Budweiser Cup** competition, have generously donated £15,000 for this season's competition.

The winning club receives £3,500; runners-up £1,800; beaten Semi-Finalists £950 each; beaten Quarter-Finalists £600 each; and beaten First Round teams £300 each.

The balance of the sponsorship is given over to competition costs and administration by the Irish League Management Committee.

Glenavon — The Budweiser heralded a new era

GLENAVON fans will always have an affinity with the Budweiser Cup competition.

The Lurgan Blues reached the semi-final of the first year of the competition, losing 0-2 to the eventual winners, Glentoran, at the tail-end of 1987.

A sturdy enough performance in itself for a club that had not won a senior trophy (Mid-Ulster Cup successes of 1983/4 and 1986/7 excepted) since the City Cup of 1965/6.

But it was in the next year of the Budweiser that Glenavon broke through the ranks of the also-rans to join the 'elite' clutch of clubs that jostle for major honours on a regular basis. It also proved to be the time when manager **Terry Nicholson** finally shook off some long-standing critics so eager to seek a change of leadership.

Distillery were accounted for (although only just—an aggregate of 3-2 over the two legs) in Round 1 and wins over Portadown by 2-0 (I'm sure a repeat would be acceptable to Nicholson tonight) and Coleraine by 3-0 put the Mourneview men into a final with Linfield, a Linfield that was to win the Irish League championship before the Budweiser Final was concluded.

It was a final of two distinct parts.

The first game finished 1-1 with Glenavon fortunate to level things with a controversial equaliser in the last minute of extra time. Linfield had scored the first goal of the game in the first half of extra time and when the referee over-ruled the linesman to give Glenavon a last-minute corner it

seemed of little consequence. It was of much more significance seconds later when a **Tony Scappaticci** header took a deflection off Linfield defender Darrin Coyle and ended in the net.

Part Two brought everyone back to The Oval, on April 25, 1989, and the unthinkable happened. Linfield were demolished as rarely before by a Glenavon side that had a night when they might have defeated any opposition.

After 18 minutes, **Geoff Ferris**, (an experienced 'B' Division player in his first season of senior football), put Glenavon ahead when Dunlop could only parry a cross. Linfield were still in contention at the break but the deficit swiftly doubled after the re-start when **Gary Blackledge** scored Glenavon's second.

It was the third goal, scored by Ferris, that announced to all and sundry in a manner more emphatic than any tannoy announcement that Glenavon had 'arrived'. He collected a ball from **McBride**, controlling it and turning in a split second before hitting it past a helpless Dunlop. It was one of those shots when the ball has 'goal' written all over it long before it scorches the back of the net. Linfield, on this occasion, were dead and buried.

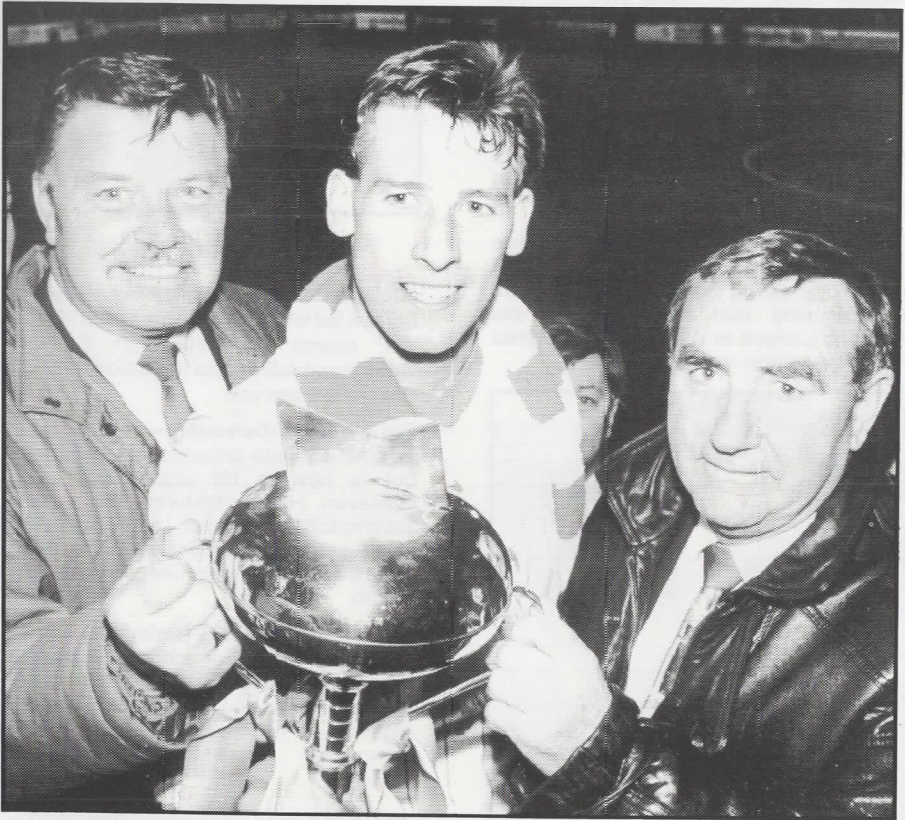
Now the fans were sure that history was being written and they jumped and sang their way through the rest of the match. Linfield had Lindsay McKeown sent off, **McBride** made it 4-0, Philip Knell scored a consolation for the Windsor Park side and **Duncan Lowry** and **Ferris** (his hat-trick) added two more. SIX-ONE!

Since then Glenavon have gone

from strength to strength. Last season they carried off the Roadferry Cup and finished runners-up in the League championship. This is their third successive final this season and the Gold Cup now resides at Mourneview and there's more to

come yet.

No surprise then that the Budweiser is special for the Lurgan Blues. That victory twenty months ago heralded a new era of success at Mourneview Park.

Glenavon — One by one

CRAIG ROBSON (Goalkeeper) — Age 20. Son of former Glentoran, Glenavon and Coleraine centre-half Alex Robson. Formerly with Amateur League side Fisher Body. Has done well since making first team debut last month.

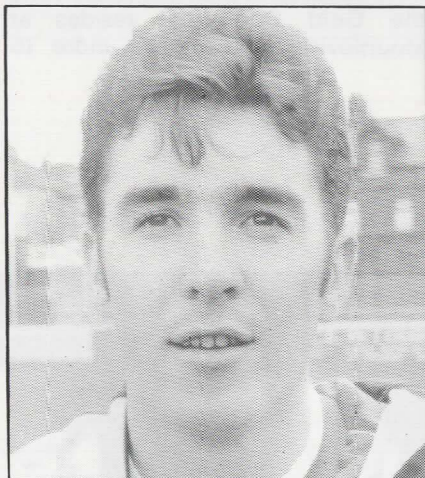
ROBERT BECK (Goalkeeper) — Age 26. Arrived at Mourneview from Distillery in October 1983 and has made over 300 senior appearances since. An unfussy 'keeper who has made one or two uncharacteristic lapses this season and recently lost his place to Craig Robson.

DEAN McCULLOUGH (Defender) — Age 26. 'Deano' is a tigerish tackler and strong-running defender who is back at Mourneview for a second time after a career which has taken him from Portadown to Coleraine and Carrick.

TONY SCAPPATICCI (Defender) — Age 22. Celebrated his birthday last month by being selected for the Irish League side that drew 1-1 with the Football League at Windsor Park. Signed from Banbridge in March 1989.

JOHN CAMPBELL (Midfielder) — Age 17. Lurgan lad who is a graduate of the I.F.A.'s YTP course at Castlereagh College. 'Soup' has made a rapid transition through Colts and Reserves.

PAUL BYRNE (Defender) — Age 26. Team skipper who was previously at Drogheda but is now in his eighth year with Glenavon. He has matured into a most accomplished sweeper after spending some years at full-back. Another who represented the Irish League side last month.

MICHAEL McKEOWN (Defender) Age 22. Arrived on the senior scene with quite a bang after making his debut as a teenager over three years ago, Michael has only just regained a first team spot after some contractual problems earlier in the season.

ANDY RUSSELL (Defender/Midfielder) — Age 20. Now in his second spell with the club after a 2-year scholarship course in the U.S.A. Andy has recently forced his way into the first team squad and was one of thirteen happy players at Windsor Park when the Gold Cup was won last month.

STEVIE CONVILE (Midfielder / Defender) — Age 31. Previously with Carrick and Ballymena, this busy and tireless player has proved an asset to Terry Nicholson's side since he arrived nearly two years ago, not least for his versatility in fitting-in at full-back when required.

RAYMOND McCOY (Striker) — Ulster's Young Player of the Year in 1983. Raymond gained full international honours when he came on as sub against Yugoslavia in 1987. The ex-Coleraine forward became the most expensive signing in Irish League football when he joined Glenavon last month. Scored the first goal in the Gold Cup final win over Portadown.

BRYAN ROBSON (Striker) — Age 23. Came into the first team squad in October. Once of Portadown but Glenavon signed him from Amateur League Fisher Body.

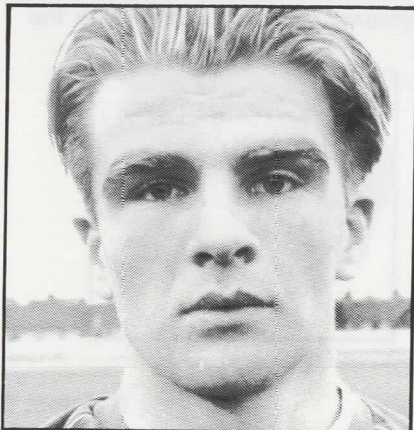
GLENN FERGUSON (Striker) — Age 21. Rejected offers from a number of Irish League clubs to sign for Glenavon in August. Dundonald-based Glenn graduated from Ards Colts to play over 50 games for the senior side and scored 15 times for Ards last season. He has found the net in every round of this season's Budweiser so far.

FINTAN McCONVILLE (Midfielder) — Age 23. a super 'find' from junior club Oxford United three years ago. 'Finty' is now a priceless member of Glenavon's midfield. Strong-running, strong-tackling and good on the ball, he too was in the League squad that played the Football League last month.

BRIAN KENNEDY (Midfielder) — Age 20. Made his senior debut last season after graduating through the Colts and Reserves. Manager Nicholson has every confidence in the lad who was on the bench for that Gold Cup triumph last month.

GEOFF FERRIS (Striker/Midfielder) — Age 28. Serious injury delayed the start to the season for the man Mourneview fans will always remember for his hat-trick against Linfield in that 6-1 Budweiser Cup Final of 1988/99. Geoff, who scored soon after coming on as sub in this season's Ulster Cup Final, is now a first team regular once again.

STEPHEN McBRIDE (Striker) — Age 26. Before joining Glenavon in October 1985, Stephen started out his senior career with Linfield, spent six months at Motherwell in 1984 and returned to Windsor Park. Has now matured into one of the League's most exciting players and made his full international debut against Denmark in October. Has aroused the interest of Football League and Scottish League clubs this season.

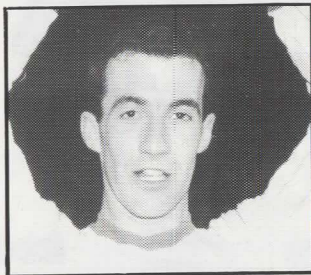

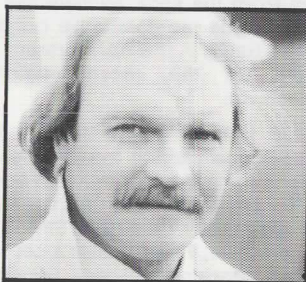

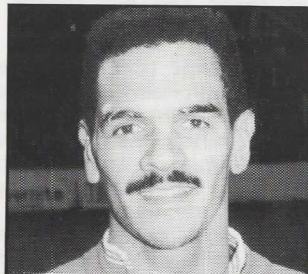

Portadown — One by one

MICHAEL KEENAN (Goalkeeper) — Age 33. Portadown's longest serving player, Michael has been one of the main reasons why the team broke the success barrier this year in great style, lifting the Smirnoff Irish League and Lombard Ulster Cup. He was a hero in that memorable Ulster Cup replay with Glenavon, saving penalties in the shoot-out, and also netting one of them from the spot. Michael has gained Irish League representative honours, as well as being in the full Northern Ireland squad for the recent match with Yugoslavia.

PHILIP MAJOR (Right Back) — Age 21. Philip is now playing top of his form, after experiencing the nightmare of being sent off, for the first time in his career, in the replayed Ulster Cup final. Strong but fair in the tackle, Philip is also a constructive and an attacking full-back. Formerly with Glentoran.

IAN CURLISS (Left Back) — Age 25. Accomplished defender who has had his season disrupted by injury. A regular choice for the Irish League representative squad Ports fans will be hoping Ian is fit enough to play a full part tonight.

JOEY CUNNINGHAM (Midfielder) — Age 23. Glenavon will want to try and curtail the activities of Joey tonight as he has been devastating in the three final games against Glenavon this season, scoring two brilliant goals in the process. He has great skills, speed and ball control and is difficult to contain.

BRIAN STRAIN (Central Defender) — Age 26. The Portadown skipper is a key player in the side, and he confirmed his intense loyalty to the club by making it clear earlier this season that his future was at Shamrock Park, rather than trying his luck across the water. Brian is a great motivator who likes to make forays into opposing penalty areas and tends to pop up with vital goals. Had a trial with Manchester United, but the Royal Victoria Hospital physiotherapist is happy to remain in the Province. A native of Killyleagh, he also played for Glentoran.

ALFIE STEWART (Sweeper) — Age 26. There are few more talented players in the League than the cultured Alfie, another former Glentoran player. Was one of the main reasons why Portadown made history by winning the League for the first time, and Ronnie McFall rightly makes the point that the £15,000 fee he paid for Stewart can be looked on as one of the footballing bargains of the decade. Injury prevented him from representing the Irish League against the Football League recently.

PAUL DOOLIN (Midfielder) — Age 27. Until Glenavon signed Raymond McCoy, the 27-year-old Dubliner was the costliest player in the Irish League. There were raised eyebrows when Ronnie McFall splashed out £20,000 for Doolin during the close season, but not any longer. The former Bohemians, Shamrock Rovers and Derry City star is now getting into his stride and he has been in great form in recent matches.

KEVIN MCKEEVER (Defender) — Age 24. The likeable Londonderry man is one of the most versatile players in Portadown's squad, and he can slot in at midfield, in the back four or as a full-back. With so much competition for places Kevin has had to battle to hold his own, but he has been happy to accept the challenge, and takes on any role allotted to him. He is not afraid to move upfield to join in attacks and has scored a few valuable goals this season.

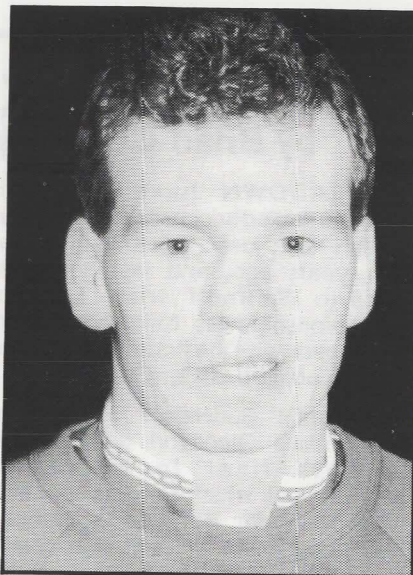
GREG DAVIDSON (Midfielder) — Age 24. The battling East Belfast man is one of the great favourites of the Portadown fans, and not least because he has popped up with some memorable goals, including one against Linfield which helped clinch the League title. Greg relishes the big occasion and he usually produces his best football in games against the top clubs. A member of the famous McCreery footballing family of East Belfast. He had a fine match in the Gold Cup final when he was the Ports best performer.

STEVE COWAN (Striker) — Age 28. The former Aberdeen and Motherwell striker made an instant hit with Portadown when he joined the club for the decisive assault on the Irish League last season. He reads the game very well, and is devastating around goal. He has come in for some close attention from defenders this season, but it has not curbed his goalscoring qualities. Hero of semi-final when he came off the bench to score twice and he followed this up with a hat-trick against Crusaders three days later.

MARTY MAGEE (Striker) — Age 26. Now staking a claim for a regular place in the side after the trauma of last season when his career took a plunge following a controversial sending-off incident at Carrick. Recent injuries and suspensions have given him this chance and he is making a determined effort to become a first team regular again. Signed from Newry Town.

DAVID MILLS (Midfielder) — Age 25. It has been an unfortunate season for the battling midfielder so far, as injury has meant him missing quite a slice of the opening games. However, he has been battling back against an ankle knock, and Ronnie McFall has been happy to see him showing signs of his best form. Mills is a tremendous competitor with non-stop running and drive. Another former Glentoran player.

TREVOR WILLIAMSON (Striker) — Age 18. The Annaghmore lad had been on the fringe of a regular first team place for the past two seasons. He is a prolific scorer, and has the temperament to come into the side and do a job. A product of Boys' Brigade football, Trevor has been attracting the attention of cross-channel scouts

NEIL McCULLOUGH (Defender) — Age 20. Another youngster who has been making a strong bid for first team football. Home town lad Neil, formerly with Linfield, has never let the team down when the need for him to come in and do a job has arisen. Strong and resolute.

ROY McCREADIE (Midfielder) — Age 29. A great favourite with Portadown fans, who will be hoping that Roy has recovered from the hamstring injury which kept him out of recent matches. He is another player who had some people questioning Ronnie McFall's judgement in signing him three years ago, but the big Londonderry man has confirmed McFall was on the mark again. A great competitor, McCreadie adds the iron to Portadown's midfield. Forced by injury to limp off after just 20 minutes or so of the Gold Cup final.

STEPHEN LYNCH (Midfielder) — Age 21. The former QPR player has been dogged by injury since returning to Portadown a year ago. However, a recent exploratory operation on his knee revealed that everything is alright, thus clearing the way for him to make his comeback. A skilful player, Stephen has the ability to step into the team when required.

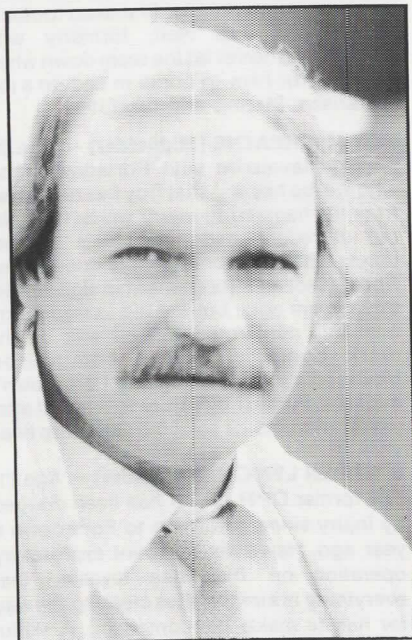
Portadown — Seven Finals under McFall

PORTADOWN have enjoyed unprecedented success since **Ronnie McFall** took over the managership four years ago, and last season's historic Smirnoff Irish League championship was followed earlier this season with the first-ever triumph in the Lombard Ulster Cup.

Tonight's Budweiser Final with great rivals Glenavon will be the seventh final in knockout competitions which Portadown have reached under Ronnie's guidance, and despite the incredible success the club has enjoyed, they might easily have fared even better.

Why is it that the Ports lost out at the final stage in five of the six finals

— last season's Bass Irish Cup, three successive TNT Gold Cup finals, and a Roadferry League Cup final?

Any hint of a bogey or hoodoo is immediately discounted by the Portadown manager.

"That story was going the rounds before our run-in for the Irish League championship last season, and I think the lads exploded that theory for all time, so I don't place any credence on similar stories about our performance in knockout competitions," says McFall.

He prefers the more logical explanation that it is what happens on the night that counts, and this is surely an answer that stands the test of close examination.

Take that Roadferry Final back in 1987 at the Oval, when Coleraine won with a goal in extra-time. The Ports had dominated the game in normal time but just couldn't find the net, and the reason for the defeat was simply missed chances.

In each of the three TNT Gold Cup finals the Ports battled hard and gave a good account of themselves, but crucial incidents swung the game their opponents way.

Two years ago a Lindsay McKeown penalty decided the issue in favour of Linfield and sent the Gold Cup to Windsor.

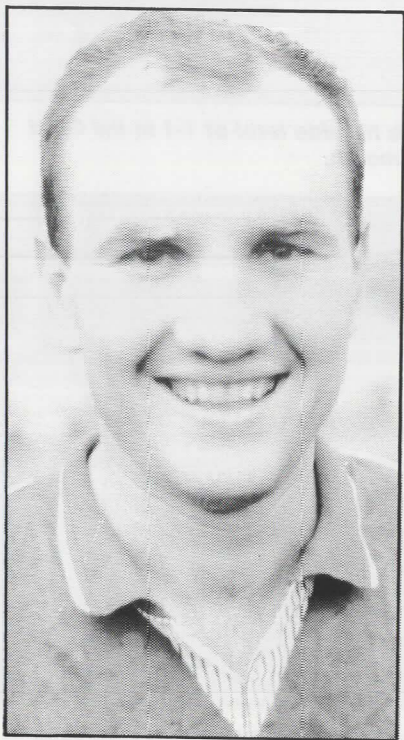
Portadown must have thought that luck was on their side when they dominated last year's final, but had to settle for a scoreless draw. They were hot favourites for the replay but lost

an 18-match unbeaten record, and the cup, in losing 2-0.

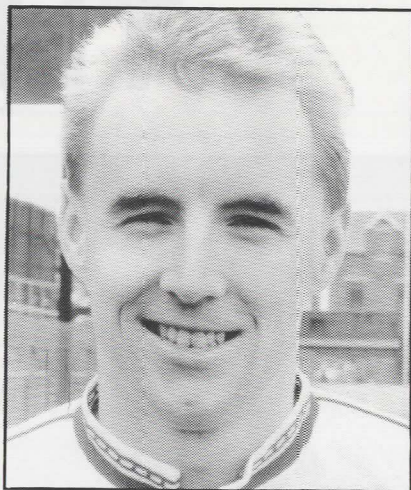
The Ports kept their promise to come back this season, but after leading Glenavon 1-0 lost their way with Ian Curliss and Roy McCreadie going off, and the Lurgan team stormed through to a 2-1 win.

As for that Irish Cup final last season, most Ulster footballing folk felt that it had come too close to Portadown's celebrations after winning the League title.

But **Ronnie McFall** is not putting all these things forward as excuses, and he prefers to concentrate on the job in hand tonight, and preparing his team for what promises to be an exciting 90 minutes.

"A cup final — any cup final — boils down to what happens on the pitch. It can hinge on a penalty, a sending off, or a lucky bounce of the ball. One team can hit top form, while the other doesn't do itself justice," he said.

In any event, as Ronnie points out, the Ports have already lifted a knockout trophy this season, so this, like last season's League success, exploded any theories about bogeymen or such like.

He could also add that the Gold Cup has traditionally been a lucky tournament for Portadown, the cup having been won five times by the Shamrock Park club.

Perhaps the luck which has temporarily deserted Portadown in their favourite competition has switched to tournaments like the Lombard Ulster Cup. The red and white followers will certainly be hoping that proves the case tonight in the third final of the season so far between the great rivals from North Armagh and Portadown's first Budweiser final.

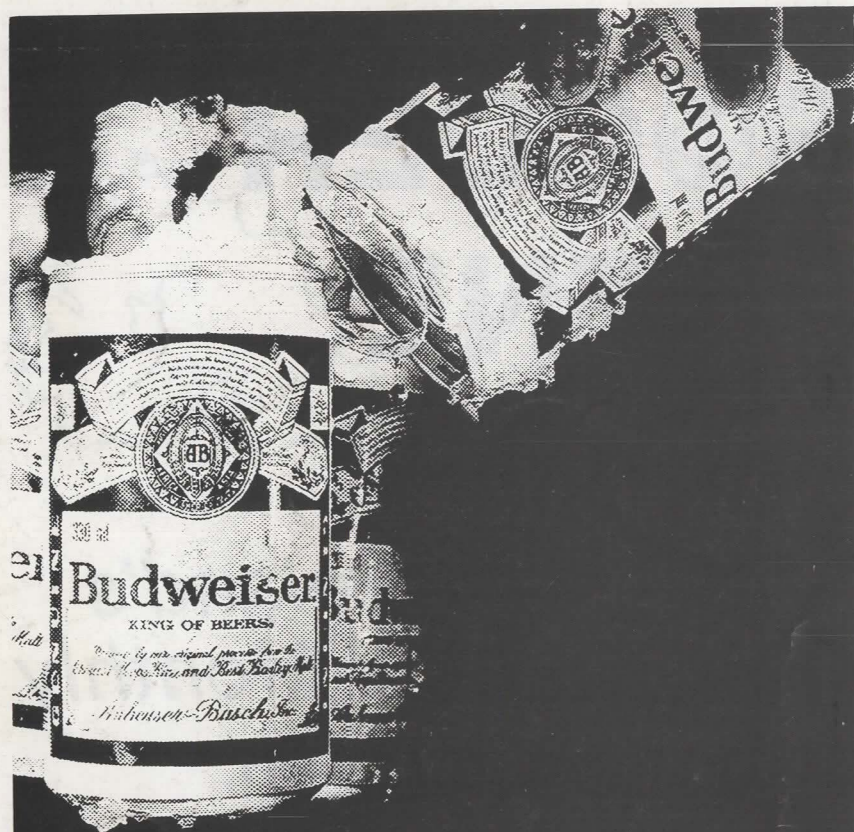
