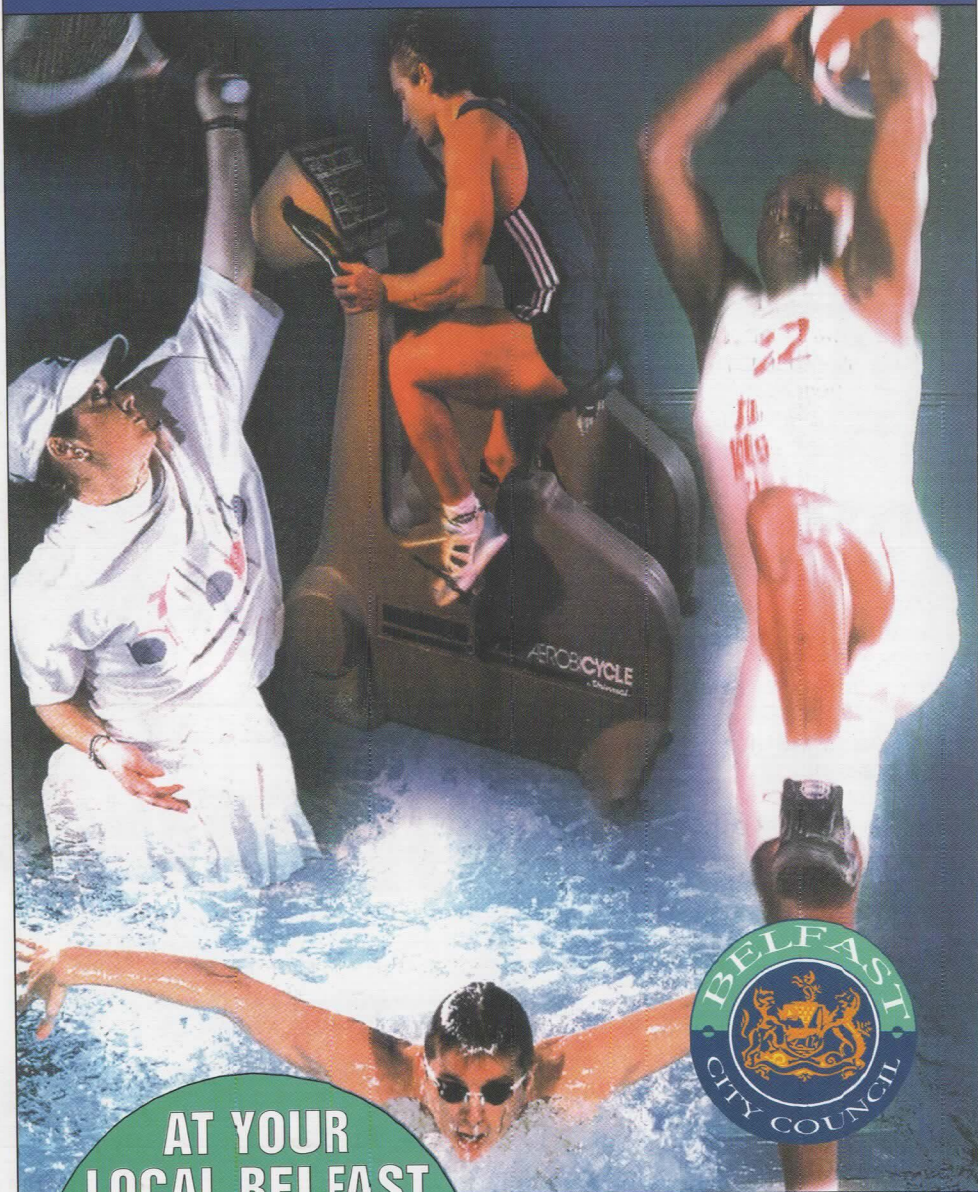

The Glenavon line-up – season 2000/2001

“Darren Murphy on Glenavon’s season”

Victory tonight would be the icing on the cake for surprise Coca Cola League Cup finalists Glenavon.

Although it has already been a highly successful season for the Lurgan Blues, this evening’s meeting with Glentoran offers the prospect of a first major trophy success since a Nationwide Gold Cup Final win against Coleraine in December 1997. Captain Darren Murphy, who played in that 4-2 win against the Bannsideers and is likely to return to Glenavon’s starting line-up tonight following a two-match suspension, reckons that victory against Glentoran would be a deserved reward for some consistent performances since August. “I don’t think anyone really expected us to achieve anything after Roy Walker left at the end of July last year,” says the versatile 26 year-old. “However, Colin Malone and Dixie Robinson were appointed, made some good early signings and everyone knuckled down to the task at hand. Even though we had a few setbacks in those early weeks the team gradually found its feet and since November our form has been excellent.

Despite the pundits’ belief that we would drop out of the running for second place in the Premier Division our performances have, if anything, become more rather than less consistent as the months have passed.”

Glenavon’s record in the Premier Division Championship series is highly impressive. Seventeen wins in thirty-three outings, including ten victories in the last fourteen matches is Championship-chasing form. Yet back in August the club’s ambitions were much more modest. “The manager’s first objective was to reach 40 points,” added Darren. “Following Roy’s sudden departure Premier Division survival was the name of the game. However, we have far surpassed that target and are now looking to finish runners-up to Linfield.

When you think about what the club has achieved over the last nine months you can understand why everyone at Moumeview Park is on such a high at the moment.”

The Lurgan Blues’ results in the cup competitions have been almost as impressive as

their form in the Premier Division Championship series.

Quarter-finalists in the Nationwide Gold Cup and semi-finalists in the Nationwide Irish Cup, Linfield is the only club to have beaten Colin Malone’s side in knock-out football this term. “We were very unfortunate to lose to the Blues in the Gold Cup last October and performed well against them in the Irish Cup at the Oval a fortnight ago,” said Darren. “With a bit more luck we might have made it through to the final of one of those two competitions.”

Glenavon’s 1-0 triumph against Linfield in the semi-finals of the Coca Cola League Cup provided a measure of consolation for those defeats. “I certainly felt that we deserved to win that match,” said Darren. “Apart from defending well we created more goalscoring opportunities than they did. To top it all

Mark Glendinning hit a fantastic shot from the edge of the penalty-area to win the match for us. If we can reproduce that sort of form against Glentoran tonight there is absolutely no reason why we can’t win the Coca Cola League Cup.”

RACIST GESTURES - THROWING MISSILES - DISCHARGING FIREWORKS
DRUNKENNESS - THREATENING OR VIOLENT BEHAVIOUR**

With your assistance and co-operation this type of behaviour can be eradicated. It is acceptable that in the spirit of excitement which is generated at football matches there will be people shouting in support of their team and we have no intention of interfering with this activity providing it does not become unacceptable conduct as described above.

STUART ADDIS (goalkeeper). Age 21. Made his senior debut with Glenavon two seasons ago and has matured into one of the top young goalkeepers in the Province. A microfilm processor from Dunmurry, Stuart has kept no fewer than 18 clean sheets so far this season.

JONNY WRIGHT (full-back). Age 21. Joined Glenavon in October 1997 after spending three full seasons with Norwich City. Capped by Northern Ireland at every level, except full international level, Wright was regarded as one of the Province's most talented young defensive exports. Spent 15 months with Ards before returning to Mourneview Park last summer.

MARK GLENDINNING (full-back). Age 31. Moved from Clondeboye Park to Mourneview Park in a £40,000 transfer deal in July 1995. Capped by Northern Ireland at U-18, U-19 and U-21 international level. An outstanding talent. Widely regarded as the top left-back in Irish League football.

JOHNNY MONTGOMERY (central-defender). Age 27. Joined Glenavon from Dungannon Swifts in August 2000. Had been with the Stangmore Park outfit for 10 years before deciding to join Colin Malone and Dixie Robinson at Mourneview Park. Celebrated his 27th birthday earlier this month. A lorry driver by occupation.

KIERAN RAFFERTY (central-defender). Age 25. Joined Glenavon from Mid-Ulster League club Red Lion in October 2000 and made an immediate impact. Spent a week on trial with Tottenham Hotspur during November 2000. Although Kieran has missed quite a few games since then through injury, he could have an influential role to play tonight.

CIARAN O'KANE (central-defender/midfielder). Age 28. Craigavon-born teacher who started his career as a promising midfielder in the Glenavon side which reached the 1990-91 Irish Cup Final. Subsequently played for Portadown, Newry Town, Finn Harps and Dungannon Swifts. Re-joined Glenavon in August 2000.

DARREN MURPHY (midfielder). Age 26. Had spent six seasons with Portadown before joining Glenavon via a short stop-off at Loughgall during summer 1995. Has made over 200 first-team appearances

during his Mourneview Park career. Has won Irish Cup (1996-97), Coca Cola Cup (1996-97), Gold Cup (1997-98), Co. Antrim Shield (1995-96) and Mid-Ulster Cup (1998-99) winners' medals.

GERARD McMAHON (midfielder). Age 27. Perhaps the outstanding individual talent in Irish League football at present. Returned to the Province last summer after a distinguished career in the full-time game with Tottenham Hotspur, Stoke City and St Johnstone. Has been the key component in Glenavon's success story this season. Capped 17 times at by Northern Ireland at full international level.

SEAN COLLINS (midfielder). Age 27. Started his career in England with Norwich City before spending a short spell in Finland. Returned to the Province in 1993 and put pen to paper for Glenavon. Transferred to Ards in 1996 following a brief loan spell with Larne but returned to Mourneview Park in September 2000.

RODNEY McAREE (midfielder). Age: 26. Former Liverpool, Bristol City and Fulham midfielder. Joined Glenavon in November 2000 after returning home from England. Son of well-known Tyrone-based football coach Joe McAree. Missed Glenavon's Coca Cola League Cup and Nationwide Irish Cup semi-final meetings with Linfield through suspension.

CONOR DEVINE (midfielder). Age 23. Magherafelt-born midfielder who started his career with Cookstown United. Had spent periods with Coleraine, Dungannon Swifts and Cliftonville before putting pen to paper for Glenavon in August 2000. Talented player in possession.

MARC McCANN (winger). Age 21. Quick, direct and a good crosser of the ball, the Portadown-based student is one of the most gifted wingers in Irish League football.

Since joining Glenavon from Wolves on the eve of the 1998 Irish Cup Final, Marc has firmly established himself as a first-team regular.

DWYER HILL (striker). Age 22. Craigavon-born striker who joined Glenavon in August 2000 after five seasons with Portadown. Collected George Wilson Cup (1996-97), Mid-Ulster Cup (1997-98) and Irish Cup (1998-99) winners' medals at Shamrock Park. More often on the substitutes bench than in the starting line-up so far this season. Scored Glenavon's late equaliser in the 2-2 draw with Glentoran at the Oval last Saturday.

GARRY HAYLOCK (striker). Age 30. Joined Glenavon on-loan from Dublin club Shelbourne in September 2000. Has more than proved his worth with some excellent performances and important goals. Despite missing the first month of the local season and a further five-week spell through injury, Garry is one of the leading scorers in the Irish League with 19 goals.

DEAN SMITH (striker). Age 24. Moved to Mourneview Park from Armagh City in September 2000 following three full seasons at Holm Park. Had started his career with Glenavon. A product of boys' club football in the Craigavon area, Dean is a son of former Portadown and Oldham Athletic striker Raymond Smith. In excellent form in Glenavon's recent 2-0 win against Crusaders at Seaview.

DAVID HUTCHINSON (striker). Age 21. Moira-based striker who has broken into the first-team squad this season. Scored Glenavon's winner in a 2-1 success at the Newry Showgrounds in August 2000. Although limited to substitute appearances since then, David is reckoned to be one for the future.

Glentoran - up for the cup again!!!

In a season were, league wise, Glentoran have had an up and down season, it is in the cups that Glentoran have shown real consistency.

By the season's climax on May 5th, Glentoran will have featured in every game possible to a local side.

Tonight is match number fifty three out of a possible fifty seven or fifty eight if there is an Irish Cup replay. When you take into account the fact that every cup final will have been played in along the way, that's quite an achievement.

With the Gold Cup already in the Oval trophy cabinet, it goes without saying that Glentoran will be looking to add firstly tonight's Coca-Cola Cup, then make it a treble next month in the Irish Cup. For tonight though it's the "Battle of the Glens" that will be upper most in their thoughts.

As for the game itself, Glentoran opened the scoring through Rory Hamill however, Limavady United fought back and equalised in the second-half. As the game appeared to be going towards extra-time, up stepped Paul Leeman to nip in to score a late winner, much to the relief of everyone at the Oval.

Quarter-final stage saw Glentoran travel

away to Armagh City on a cold Monday evening and yet again Glentoran left it late to seal the victory.

Despite a somewhat easy 3-0 win at the same venue a month prior in the Irish Cup, this Coca-Cola Cup game proved a lot more trickier.

Numerous chances went begging before a Glentoran shot was handled in the box. There was only a few minutes left on the clock so it needed a cool head to make sure of the penalty that was awarded. Just as he had done the previous Saturday, up stepped Justin McBride to bury the ball into the net and confirm Glentoran's passage into the semi-final.

With Seaview as the venue, Omagh Town stood between Glentoran and a place in tonight's final. Omagh came into the game confident of pulling off an upset but a mistake by the Omagh goalkeeper allowed Tim McCann to nip in and head Glentoran into an early lead. Try as they might Omagh tried hard to break down the Glentoran defence but they found it to be impenetrable and in particular Alan Gough was in outstanding form. As time ticked on Omagh continued to press and fell finally to a sucker punch with a Rory Hamill goal virtually on the final whistle and with it, securing Glentoran's place in tonight's final. As for tonight's final, who knows!

Glentoran come into it on quite a roll with nine wins and two draws in their last twelve games so confidence will be high. Glenavon certainly have players of quality but then again so do Glentoran. It should be quite a game, lets sit back and enjoy it.

Alan Gough – Dublin based goalkeeper who has been in terrific form all season. Now in his second season at the Oval since joining from Shelbourne in July 1999. Has missed only one game all season and tonight will be his 100th appearance for Glentoran.

Colin Nixon – Still only 22, Colin has won every honour in local football, bar a League Cup medal, so he will be hoping to change that tonight. Capped by Northern Ireland at youth and under-21 level, Colin has been a first team regular for five years and has almost 250 appearances. A top quality right-back.

Michael Ferguson – Another under-21 international, Michael has returned to the side recently in the absence of regular left-back John Kennedy. A very adaptable player, Michael can play in either full-back role or in central defence should the need arise.

John Kennedy – Vastly experienced left-back. John has been absent through injury of late but has returned to the panel again. Loves to overlap and support the forwards at every opportunity. May have to settle for a place on the bench tonight.

Gary Smyth – Returned to the Oval in the summer after five seasons with Glenavon, during which time he was capped by Northern Ireland at 'B' level. Strong in the air and in the tackle. Gary has also been amongst the goals this season, with seven goals.

Chris Walker – It's now six seasons since Chris joined Glentoran from local junior side 1st Liverpool. In that time Chris has matured into one of the top central-defenders in local football. Has represented the Irish League at both Under-21 and full level.

Paul Leeman – Very adaptable player and equally dependable, Paul has slotted in well

at centre-half alongside Gary Smyth and has not looked out of place. Another 22-year-old, Paul will always give 100% in every game, and has a wealth of experience. Looking for his first League Cup medal tonight.

Scott Young – Scorer of Glentoran's opening goal on Saturday, Scott has bounced back well from injury and is starting to regain his form of old. Glasgow-born Scott has been instrumental in Glentoran's successes of late and will be looking to maintain that record in tonight's game. Has 22 goals in just under 130 appearances.

Darren Lockhart – Signed from Crusaders in the summer, Darren has been a very useful addition to the Glentoran midfield. Chips in with his fair share of goals and has scored

seven so far. Formerly with H&W Welders and Carrick Rangers.

Pete Batey – Glentoran captain who leads by example. Signed from Bangor in 1995, Pete now has amassed nearly 240 appearances, chipping in with 23 goals. Led Glentoran to the Gold Cup earlier in the season and will be hoping to pick up a couple of other trophies by the end of the season, starting with the League Cup tonight. Hails from Ashington in Northumberland.

Martin Hunter – Another very promising midfielder, Martin made his debut for Glentoran in the game with Omagh Town in the Premiership back in February. Has remained in the squad since then. Missed much of the last two years with a knee injury but has bounced back with great effect this season, particularly with the Seconds with

whom he picked up George Wilson and Steel and Sons medals earlier in the season.

Michael Halliday – Twenty-one-year-old, Bio-chemistry student, Michael has been a revelation of late playing in a centre-forward role, scoring three goals in the last two games. Signed from East Belfast a year ago, Michael has impressed many with his enthusiasm and commitment.

Tim McCann – The only ever present this season, Tim was voted the Glentoran 'Player of the Year' on Saturday. Twelve goals this season, Tim in his silver boots, has pace and an abundance of skills that has endeared him to the Glentoran fans. A bargain £5,000 signing from Cliftonville in December 1998, Tim is also a Northern Ireland 'B' international.

Rory Hamill – Capped once at full level by Northern Ireland, Rory has also won honours at youth and 'B' level. Joined Glentoran three years ago after spending two years with Fulham. A strong runner on his day Rory is one of the top players in local football. Can play on the wing or in a central role in midfield or up front.

Darren Fitzgerald – Former Northern Ireland under-21 international. Darren joined Glentoran in the summer after a four year spell with Glasgow Rangers. Took a little while to settle but of last has started to show his true potential. Possesses a great pace and touch, posing a threat to any defence.

Justin McBride – Glentoran's leading scorer this season with sixteen goals, including the winner in the quarter-final at Armagh City. An expert penalty taker, he could well be Glentoran's match winner tonight. Missed much of last season through injury but has come back to his best again this year. A former Northern Ireland Under-21 international.

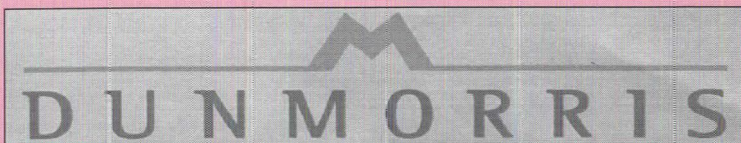

The last Coca-Cola Final meeting of Glenavon and Glentoran

Their only meeting in the final of the Coca-Cola Cup took place four years ago on April 9, 1997. The teams lined out as follows:-

Glenavon: Dermot O'Neill, Stephen Caffery, Mark Glendinning, Lee Doherty, Paul Byrne, Gary Smyth, Sammy Johnston, Glenn Ferguson, Raymond McCoy, Tony Grant and John Gregg. Darren Murphy replaced Gregg after 77 minutes while Paul Stranney and James McCartan were not used.

Glentoran: De Camp, Colin Nixon, Michael Smyth, John Kennedy, John Devine, Nigel Quigley, Justin McBride, Tom McCourt, Rory Hamill, Pete Batey and Stuart Elliott. Andy Kirk replaced Hamill after 85 minutes, while Stevie Livingstone and Chris Walker were not used.

Mr John Ferry from Londonderry was the man in charge. In a tight tense game which looked to be heading for a scoreless draw and extra-time it took a goal from Lee Doherty just two minutes from the end of normal time to send the Glenavon support among the crowd of 4,046 home happy. Incidentally this was Lee's 100th appearance for the Glenavon team. This win turned out to sweet revenge for the Lurgan men as Glentoran had beaten them in the final of the Bass Irish Cup at the end of the previous season.

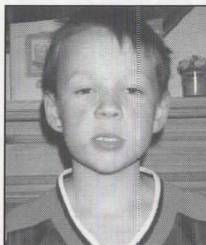
It is interesting to look back at the teams and to see that Glenavon will have just two

players surviving from that night. They are Mark Glendinning and Darren Murphy who came on as a substitute. By contrast Glentoran can still call on six of their squad. Colin Nixon, John Kennedy, Justin McBride, Rory Hamill, Pete Batey and Chris Walker should all be available for selection. There is one more man who should be in the Glentoran line-up who was on the winning Glenavon team that night and that is Gary Smyth. Gary has returned to the Oval after a spell wearing the blue of Glenavon.

Will it be a case tonight of another victory for Glenavon or will Glentoran finally get their hands on the Coca-Cola Cup. By 10.00 p.m. this evening that question will have been answered to once again send one set of supporters home happy.

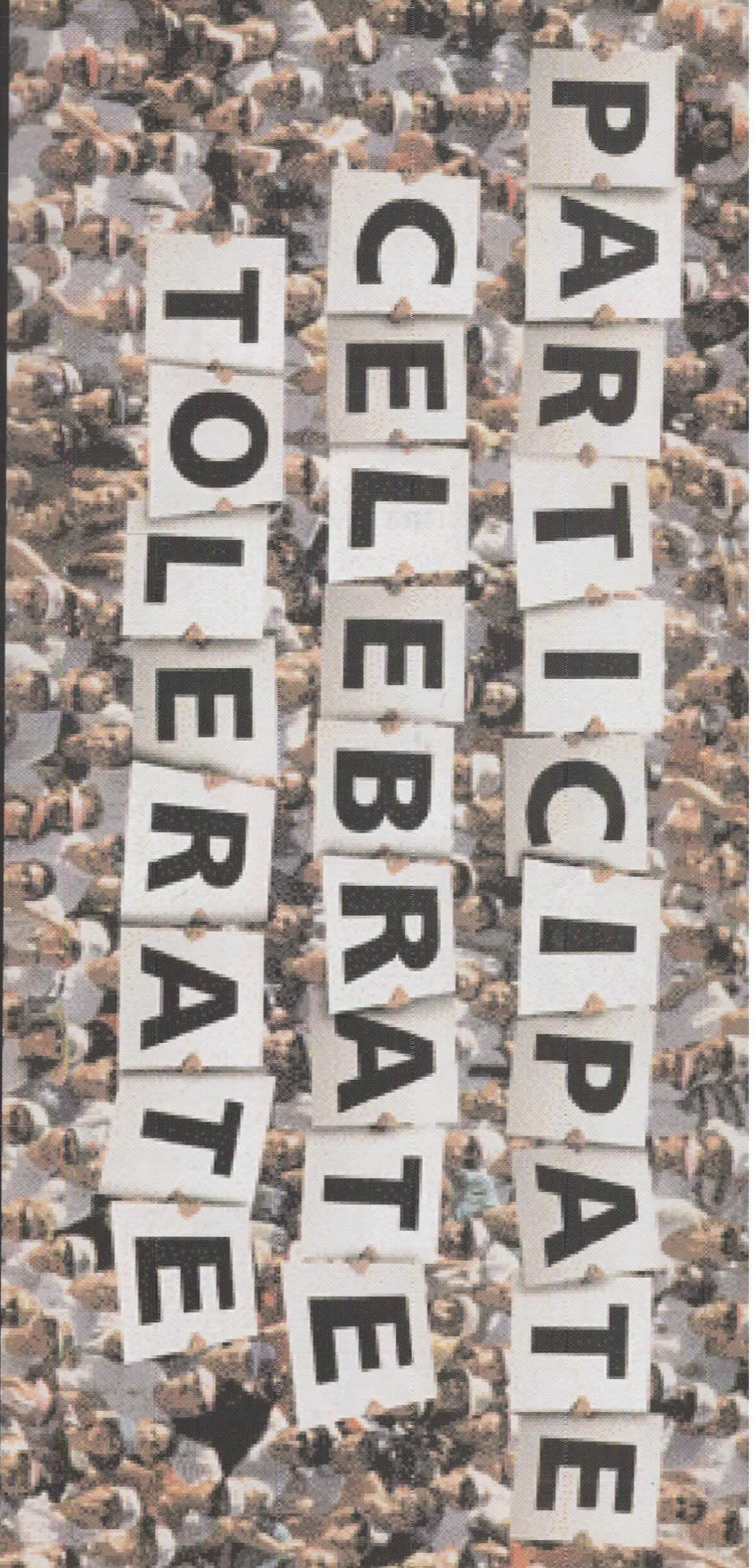

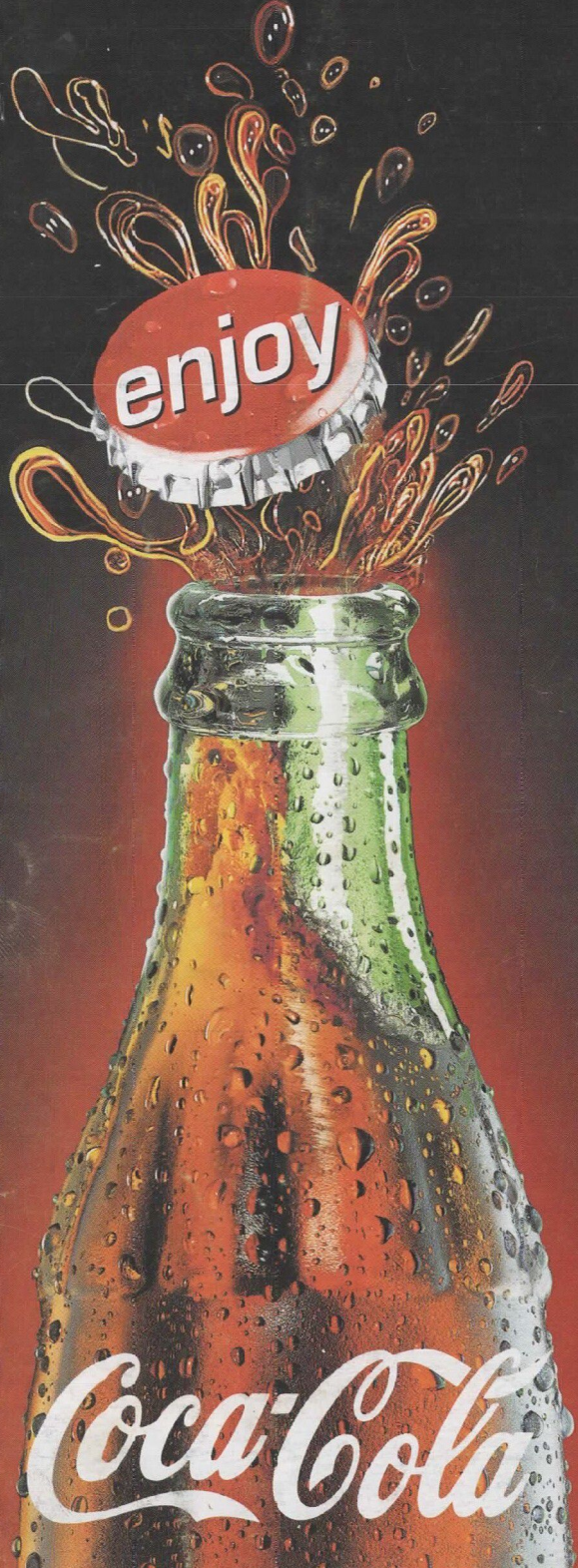
