Your car isn't a gun safe: stop leaving guns in cars

Police say it's one of the reasons why a certain kind of crime is on the rise in the city

Editor's note: Four years ago, Lee County's Northeast District police met with Alva residents to share a concern they said was a big one in rural areas of the county, but in suburban and urban areas to.

"If citizens would simply lock their cars, and never leave laptops or guns visible on seats or the floor, the Lee County crime rate would drop by 90%.

TODAY: While crime in the city of Cape Coral dropped 28% overall in the first half of 2025, police statistics show one crime has risen dramatically.

Fox 4 analyzed records from the Cape Coral Police Crime Analyst Department that show armed burglaries of unoccupied conveyances, or vehicles went from 1 case in 2023, to 3 cases in 2024, to 18 so far this year.

"We're in a very good place to be able to handle the city, handle the crime and calls that are coming in," said Mercedes Simonds of the Cape Coral Police Department.

And Simonds says the statistics can be misleading because of how crimes are categorized. "If one kid goes out and does a bunch of vehicle burglaries and steals seven guns, those are going to be seven

different charges that happen in one night that make it look like crime in that area is just skyrocketing," Simonds said.

Simonds says many of these crimes are committed by juveniles, prompting the department to crack down on juvenile probation checks. But officers identify a bigger underlying issue: people leaving firearms in their vehicles.

"We see it all the time, and some people don't even call because they feel embarrassed or they're worried they're going to get in trouble. You're not going to get in trouble. We just want to document it," Simonds said.

John Johnson, a firearms instructor in Cape Coral, says proper gun storage is a key component of his safety classes. "When you leave a firearm in a vehicle overnight, it's like leaving your keys of your front door in the vehicle," Johnson said.

With Florida being a "melting pot," Johnson notes different rules and regulations in each state may contribute to the issue.

"Florida is the gun-shine state," Johnson said. "You don't need to take any education at all. You don't need to do anything to buy a gun."

"You owe it to your family, you owe it to your neighbors, you owe it to community to understand what you're doing with the pistol," Johnson said.

CCPD encourages residents to bring firearms in every night and report all vehicle burglaries.

Editor's closing note: What do you think? Is vehicle theft worse in Cape Coral than Alva, LaBelle, Fort Myers Shores? I doubt it. I imagine that in the four years since our Lee County police visited Alva such crimes have risen. Like the man said above, "You owe it to your family, you owe it to your neighbors, you owe it to community to understand what you're doing with the pistol,".



Riverdale High School unveils \$108 million renovation with ribbon-cutting ceremony

The School District of Lee County officially opens Riverdale High School's newly renovated campus during a ribbon-cutting ceremony Friday afternoon, marking the completion of a two-year, \$108 million transformation project.

The ceremony will take place at the start of the school's Homecoming Pep Rally, celebrating the addition of new classroom spaces and a state-of-the-art gymnasium.

The extensive renovation project included construction of a 14-classroom science building and full-size gymnasium, according to the school district. The school also added visual arts classrooms, a dedicated testing facility and a childcare academy.

Infrastructure upgrades encompassed lighting, flooring, paint, HVAC, audio, fire safety and communications systems throughout the campus.

The parking lot was redesigned and expanded to accommodate 774 vehicles, while sports fields were relocated with the addition of beach volleyball and outdoor basketball courts.

The \$108 million transformation was funded through revenue generated by the half-cent sales tax approved by Lee County voters in 2018.

Parents of Riverdale High School students in Lee County wanted more money to improve safety and also get "real classrooms," Now with a multi-million-dollar project, they are getting it.

Nearly two years ago, we first reported on concerns about the parking lot hazard and the portables for math and science.

The district's power-point calls for a nearly \$52 million project, but after planning for inflation that could be about \$60 million. When we first did this story a couple of years ago, we heard from a parent. At that time, she said Riverdale had more than 2,000 students, but only had 340 on-campus parking spots. This created a spillover of off-campus parking for students who will have to walk on dark roads before sunrise to make it to class by 7:05 a.m. This is just a start of a long list of projects at Riverdale.

"I love how we are going to have the main entrance now; we're changing the light down the road a little bit, I think safety has been an issue," said Misty Gonzales, a parent and cheerleading coach at Riverdale High.

Gonzales says she had multiple children go through Riverdale high and says these changes have been needed for a long time.

Riverdale opened in 1972- and to keep up with what the district calls the increase of students, the school is adding more room for parking for students and staff, more room for parents to pick up their child, and inside a new science lab.

If you have been following the Lee County School

Board news since 2022 and before to the present you have realized this enormous cost over-run crept up, or leaped up, year by year to today, when the project can finally be called done.

Many things completely out of the control of the planners can cause major over runs. Anyone who has built their own home knows the 10% margin for them in the budget often gets eclipsed by economics and discovery of unplanned things you 'need'.

I am sure many of those, especially with the pandemic at the beginning of this project, inflations rise, and since February tariff's that may have burdened the last part of the project.

However, from \$52m to \$108m in 3 years seems a bit...

And again, if you've followed the school districts history of construction over runs for the past decade and more, and now the history of the budget increases already plaguing the proposed new middle-high school at Tuckahoe and Joel Boulevard in Alva, there are many with deep concerns that our school district cannot plan or spend professionally. Or trustfully.

Our parents and students in Lee County along the Caloosahatchee River are today thrilled that this project at Riverdale High is being called DONE.

Parents, and future parents of Lee County, are praying that their school board tries harder from now on to spend what is originally budgeted or at least a bit closer to that number, when the next shovel goes into the ground.

Note: Two years ago, a school board member at an ALVA INC monthly meeting told that group that 16 new schools were then being planned for Lee County. Our tax dollars at work for education.

Lake Okeechobee water levels raise concerns ahead of dry season

Army Corps commander says lake needs to reach 14 feet to avoid water shortages, but vegetation recovery shows positive environmental impact

As Florida nears the end of its wet season, Lake Okeechobee's water levels remain concerning for the upcoming dry season, despite successful recovery operations completed earlier this year by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The lake currently sits about 2 inches shy of 13 feet deep and has risen approximately 8 inches in the past month. However, District Commander Colonel Brandon Bowman said he would like to see the lake reach at least 14 feet by the start of the dry season.



"We do stand a really good chance of hitting 14 feet, but again it's going to be mother nature that's going to decide that," he said.

The lake's depth heading into the dry season is critical because it typically experiences a 3 to 4-foot drawdown during that period due to evaporation and increased water usage. Lower lake levels entering the dry season increase the risk of water shortages for all users.

"If we fall below that goal, we will be working very closely with South Florida Water Management District about proper water management procedure early in the dry season so we stay as far away as possible from the water shortage zone as possible," Bowman said.

The Colonel acknowledged this was always a risk the Army Corps considered when beginning recovery operations to lower the lake. "Based on the forecasts we had back then, it was a very, very low risk that we would have that situation," Bowman said.

While no one hopes for tropical systems to impact the state, Florida's climate almost requires tropical rainfall to limit drought conditions during the dry months.

"All it takes is one hurricane to park over the Lake and we will be well above 14," Bowman said.

Despite concerns about water levels, there is a positive outcome from the lower lake levels. Subaquatic vegetation has increased 800% in the past year to 28,000 acres, thanks largely to the recent recovery operations.

"We draw that (water) back down and we will have essentially another quasi lake recovery without having to do anything. Mother nature will take care of that for us," Bowman said.


Be selective on social media: Unfollow or mute accounts that amplify your stress. Curate your digital space to be more supportive and less emotionally overwhelming.

Mindfulness can help you manage your thoughts and emotions without judgment, which is especially helpful in emotionally charged times.




Engage in relaxing activities: Make time for hobbies and activities that bring you joy and peace of mind, such as exercising, reading, or listening to music.



Florida Says Ban on Openly Carrying Guns Is Invalid After Court Ruling

The state attorney general told law enforcement officers to stop enforcing the decades-old ban, after a court last week ruled it unconstitutional.

Members of law enforcement in Florida should no longer arrest or prosecute people for openly carrying firearms in public places, the state attorney general, James Uthmeier, said on Monday, citing a state appeals court ruling last week that found a decades-old ban to be unconstitutional.

Mr. Uthmeier's legal interpretation effectively allows open carry in Florida, which had been the last remaining Republican-led state to ban the practice. "Open carry is the law of the state," Mr. Uthmeier, a Republican, wrote on X on Monday.

He attached a copy of the "guidance memorandum" that he had sent to sheriffs, police chiefs and state attorneys about the ruling, which was issued last Wednesday. A three-judge panel of the First District Court of Appeal in Tallahassee found that the state's open carry ban, in effect since 1987, violated the Second Amendment right to bear arms.

Florida had been one of four states, along with California, Connecticut and Illinois, to still ban open carry in nearly all circumstances.

Gov. Ron DeSantis, a Republican, and some Republican state legislators tried to do away with the ban for years but faced opposition from other members of their party in the State Legislature, who cited concerns from sheriffs and police chiefs. In recent weeks, as Mr. DeSantis laid out his legislative priorities for the annual session that begins in January, he again clamored for lawmakers to allow open carry.

"This decision aligns state policy with my long-held position and with the vast majority of states throughout the union," Mr. DeSantis wrote on X after last week's ruling. "Ultimately, the court correctly ruled that the text of the Second Amendment — 'to keep and bear arms' — says what it means and means what it says."

The ruling stemmed from a 2022 case in which a man looking to challenge the ban live-streamed himself carrying a visible, holstered pistol and a copy of the U.S. Constitution at an intersection in downtown Pensacola.

The Florida Supreme Court upheld the open carry ban in 2017. But the appeals panel said last week that a more recent ruling from the U.S. Supreme Court in 2022, striking down a New York law limiting guns in public, had invalidated it.

"No historical tradition supports Florida's open carry ban," Judge Stephanie W. Ray wrote in the opinion. "To the contrary, history confirms that the right to bear arms in public necessarily includes the right to do so openly."

Judge Ray, who was appointed by Gov. Charlie Crist, a Republican, was joined in the opinion by Judges Lori S. Rowe and M. Kemmerly Thomas, who were appointed by Gov. Rick Scott, also a Republican.

Democratic state legislators have said the ruling would make Florida more dangerous — and less attractive to tourists.



"Historically, the Florida Sheriffs Association, many departments across the state and leaders on both sides of the aisle have agreed: Open carry will make Floridians less safe," Nikki Fried, the chairwoman of the Florida Democratic Party, said in a statement. "The impact of this decision will have negative long-term effects on our communities and further erode Floridians' trust in one another."

Florida's original ban on visibly carrying guns in public was put in place in the 19th century, and then repealed in the 1980s in what officials later called a mistake. Lawmakers re-enacted the ban in 1987, and it was signed into law by Gov. Bob Martinez, a Republican.

Last week's appeals court ruling technically does not take effect until Sept. 25, to give time for the state to request a rehearing from the full appeals court. Some sheriffs urged caution immediately after the ruling, lest Floridians think they could start openly carrying firearms right away. But Mr. Uthmeier has said his office will not seek a rehearing or appeal to the Florida Supreme Court.

In a statement last week, Sheriff Bob Gualtieri of Pinellas County, home to St. Petersburg, questioned whether a decision by the First District, which does not include Pinellas County, could overrule the earlier Florida Supreme Court ruling upholding the ban. "We must consider whether the Supreme Court's prior decision is the law in Pinellas County," said Sheriff Gualtieri, who also has a law degree. His office did not respond to a request for comment on Monday.

In his guidance to law enforcement, Mr. Uthmeier noted that no other state appellate court has considered the ban's constitutionality under the 2022 U.S. Supreme Court precedent. Mr. Uthmeier's predecessor, Ashley Moody, a fellow Republican, had previously defended the open carry ban in court. Mr. DeSantis appointed Ms. Moody to the U.S. Senate in January and then appointed Mr. Uthmeier, his chief of staff at the time, as attorney general.

Florida Republicans have been so supportive of gun rights since assuming complete control of the state government more than 25 years ago that Florida became known as the "Gunshine State." Only after the 2018 mass shooting at a high school in Parkland, Fla., killed 17 people did Republicans pass an array of gun restrictions, including raising the minimum age to buy a rifle from 18 to 21. Mr. Uthmeier has said that law should be struck down as well.

Lake Okeechobee ranks as the dirtiest in a travel website study

Lake Okeechobee is known as the largest freshwater lake in the State of Florida, but a new study also ranks it as the dirtiest lake in the country.

A study by Lake.com, which is a website for vacation rentals on or near the water, evaluated 100 of the largest U.S. lakes using up-to-date chemical data.

The website states it cited high detectable lead and phosphorus levels in the lake, which can lead to algal blooms and murky conditions.

The study analyzed chemical data from the National Water Quality Monitoring Council for 100 of America's Largest Lakes sampled from January 2020 to July 2025.

The U.S Army Corps of Engineers is aware of the study.

"I didn't dive into the science or their metrics where they're getting their information or how they're coming up with Lake Okeechobee being the dirtiest and the most polluted lake in America," Col. Brandon Bowman said.

Water quality is something the Corps observes but doesn't have the authority to address.

"It's something we do watch very closely, and we do talk with South Florida Water Management District about water quality in the lake, and we try our best to help them and support them with any effort they are doing with regards to the water," Col. Brandon Bowman said.

The South Florida Water Management District is also aware of the study.



Lee County creates two-tiered system for Conservation 20/20 land

The Lee Board of County Commissioners approved a new twotiered acquisition priority matrix for Conservation 20/20 properties. This decision aims to identify properties with the highest environmental importance and evaluation score.

The Conservation 20/20 Land Acquisition and Stewardship Advisory Committee (CLASAC) developed the priority system. It ranks parcels into Tier I for high-quality nominations and Tier II

for others as Tier I acquisitions progress or stall.


Commissioners authorized staff to pursue acquisitions for nine nominations recommended by CLASAC. These include parcels on Pine Island, Buckingham, and Sanibel Island, with some adjacent to existing preserves.

Any successful negotiations will return to the Board of County Commissioners for final approval.

CLASAC meetings are open to the public monthly. Visit the website for more information on land nominations and public meeting materials.

Conservation 20/20, established in 1996, has conserved over 31,000 acres. The program partners with federal and state governments, nonprofits, and developers to prioritize open spaces and wildlife corridors.

Currently, 27% of Lee County's 520,576 acres is held in conservation, demonstrating the program's significant impact.

Can you get the COVID vaccine in FL? Apparently, you can but it's complicated

New FDA rules cause confusion over access as many await CDC decision



Many Floridians seeking the COVID-19 shot are still struggling to get it.

"It's been a little stressful. I don't know when I'll be able to do it," a Tampa woman recently told us. A few weeks later, she's still hunting for the vaccine.

Stephen Sanford of Venice has also been searching for the shot.

His husband suffers from severe lung disease. Sanford said it's gotten to the point where they are now talking about traveling to another state just to get the boost.

"Yes, of course! I don't need to have my husband die on me from not being able to get a vaccine," he said.

Local pharmacies are also finding themselves in a bind with the COVID vaccine.

The Health Matters Pharmacy, in Tampa, is waiting for its supply of the COVID vaccine, but isn't sure it will ever arrive.

"It's very frustrating," said Tiara Ross, a Nurse Practitioner there. "We want to get people vaccinated as early and as quickly as possible, but these barriers are going to make it a little bit more difficult," she said.



The Food and Drug Administration

recently approved updated COVID-19 vaccines, but with limits. The shots are currently limited to people at least 65 years old and those younger with certain health conditions and a prescription from their doctor.

The restricted new rules have prompted a wave of confusion among medical professionals and pharmacies, with some of Florida's most popular drugstores holding off on offering the shot.

At Publix, the COVID-19 vaccine is "currently not available" in Florida, according to its website.

The same applies to Walgreens, where the chain is waiting for the official recommendation from the CDC before offering the shot to Floridians.

While states can set their own rules, Florida's Department of Health appears to be deliberately evasive about the topic. The agency has refused to provide any clarity despite our weeks of emails seeking answers.



In a recent podcast the state's controversial Surgeon General, Dr. Joseph Ladapo, a vocal critic of the COVID-19 vaccine, announced his hope to shut it down in Florida.

"The MRNA, the goal for that is not to be available to anyone because no-one should be using that one," he said during the podcast.

Despite all the uncertainty, some Floridians have managed to get the shot.

"I feel lucky," said Mark Llebow of Port Charlotte. Lebow is over 65 years old and has Stage 4 pancreatic cancer. He recently got the booster at a CVS in Venice, but had to wait until he had a prescription from his doctor.

"I think she wanted the prescription just because she's afraid of corporate backlash, or something like that," he said.

A vaccine that was once encouraged and available to all, is now up in the air and fueling some concerns in Florida that it will become out of reach.



-Editorial comment BY OTR: In a conversation with a Hendry County pharmacist on August 18th who wishes to be anonymous revealed that while the confusion began with the National Health Czar, Robert Kennedy Jr., Florida had up to that time produced no guidelines for Covid 19 vaccine use. Quote," Blame our own state government, no one else.)

Dr. Lapado responds on Sep 23: Florida's Surgeon General, Dr. Joseph Ladapo, a staunch vaccine critic, took to "X" to offer some clarity after remaining unusually silent about patient access to the COVID-19 booster in Florida.

In the four short-sentence post, Ladapo appeared to be trying to clear up rumors that Florida's Department of Health was preventing Floridians from accessing the COVID-19 vaccine or requiring them to obtain a prescription to get one.

Dr. Joseph Ladapo described those rumors as "a hoax."

RUMORS?? HOAX??

My pharmacist told me, as stated above, and pharmacists are telling many others now, "Either wait till Florida tells us what to do, or get a prescription from your doctor, and check with your insurance company to see if they will pay for it.

In his post on X, the Surgeon General called the vaccine "unsafe" and "not fit for human use." Still, he added, "the decision to administer them at a pharmacy rest in the hands of the pharmacist or pharmacy. FDOH is not involved in this decision."



Here is what we know right now on COVID-19 vaccine availability in Florida:

Publix started making the shot available to eligible patients. Walgreens is offering the vaccine, but with restrictions, so you'll want to check with your local store. At CVS locations, the vaccine is also available to eligible patients but some respondents said even though they were over 65 they still needed a prescription.

If you are interested in getting the vaccine, your best bet is to contact your local pharmacy first.



FL's Governor, Surgeon General refuse to answer 'silly' question about personal family vaccination plans

As Florida Governor Ron DeSantis and Surgeon General Joseph Ladapo push to eliminate childhood vaccine mandates in the Sunshine State, neither public official is willing to publicly share whether their own children are vaccinated.

At a recent press conference in Tampa, the governor and the state's top doctor dodged the question about whether their children get vaccinated. Surgeon General Ladapo called the inquiry "silly."

Our Investigative Reporter, Katie LaGrone, asked the question after she had previously contacted each office and didn't receive a response. A Governor's spokesperson eventually sent an email stating, "Every parent should have the freedom to decide what vaccines to give their child."

Earlier this month, the Governor and Surgeon General announced a controversial push to end vaccine mandates in the state. "All of them! Every last one of them," Dr. Ladapo said as he compared mandated immunizations to slavery.

"Every last one of them is wrong and drips with disdain and slavery," he said. "Who am I as a government or anyone else to tell you what you should put in your body," he said.

The announcement prompted immediate reaction from concerned doctors, elated parents and even a cautious President Donald Trump. "You have vaccines that work, they just pure and simple work. They're not controversial at all and I think those vaccines should be used," Trump said following the announcement in Florida.

But while the proposal continues draws its share of concern and applause, it's also fueling some confusion among parents who aren't sure if they should continue vaccinating their children if the push to scrap mandates succeeds.

In Florida, children who attend public schools are required to be vaccinated against a series of infections including polio, mumps, measles and rubella.

Reporter LaGrone asked the two public leaders, who are parents of young children, if they were willing to share if they're children are vaccinated, if they plan to continue to vaccinate their children and their reasoning behind their personal decisions.

In response, Governor DeSantis laughed and passed the question off to Surgeon General Ladapo to respond. Ladapo, in turn, said, "So all this media stuff is all new to me, and some of the questions are just so funny," he said.

"This idea of 'well, do you vaccinate? Did you take the COVID shot? I actually don't care about sharing information about that. I really don't care at all but, but I won't, and I won't because I'm not going to participate in the silly games that so much of the media chooses to partake in instead of the substantive parts of the issues," Ladapo said.

While Governor DeSantis has previously admitted to getting the COVID shot when it first came out, his position on the COVID vaccine has since shifted.

Surgeon General has been anything but silent about his own personal stance on the booster. "They're not fit for human use," he has said about the COVID jab.

Neither has ever disclosed publicly if they're children receive any vaccinations.

As the two public officials embark on a proposal to make Florida the first state in the country to end childhood vaccine mandates, their personal family vaccination plans appear to be none of the public's business. "I mean, that's just silly stuff so I'm not going to participate in that," said Ladapo.

North Fort Myers restaurant 31 Produce closes permanently due to state road project

NORTH FORT MYERS, Fla. — On State Road 31, you can't help but drive by the giant strawberry landmark at 31 Produce. The market and restaurant is closing due to a state road widening project.

For Henry and Valentina Moreau, the closure marks the end of a sixand-a-half-year Sunday morning tradition. The couple has been regular customers since the restaurant opened, developing relationships that went beyond typical customer service.

"They're not just waitresses. They're friends now," Henry Moreau said.

The restaurant's closure stems from eminent domain proceedings, which give government entities the legal authority to acquire private property for public use. In this case, the land is needed for a State Road 31 widening project.

Editor's note: Restaurant Owner Mike Greenwell won his long sought dream of having this property rezoned to commercial-residential from rural when he joined the five member Lee County Commission. His signs along Rte 31 offering his land, that will not be paid for by FDOT at the now higher Commercial land value, has been for sale for a couple of years. He offers room for 400,000 sq ft of commercial space.

Elevate Florida funding pulled, leaving families in limbo

A family of veterans in Florida is grappling with disappointment after their applications to Elevate Florida were denied. Shannon Perez, who lives close to her family, shared her experience with WINK News.

"My parents live across the street. I had them in. I had myself in. My mother-in-law's down the street," said Perez.

Perez expressed her desire to keep her family close, emphasizing the importance of their proximity. "I applied immediately upon notification that Elevate Florida was happening. We did," she said.

Last year, Perez and her family lost precious family memories during a challenging time.

"I lost pictures. That was the worst. I lost pictures and family mementos," said Perez. Among the memories were items from her father's time at the Naval Academy. "My dad's albums got warped, and I had to dry them out. It was a horrible experience," she said.

Perez had hoped Elevate Florida would help elevate her family's homes, but those hopes were dashed. "I had three applications. I had three confirmation numbers. All three were pulled. How convenient?" she said.

She explained the impact of the denial on her family.

"I had to explain to him, after I moved him down here for two years, that 'your house we bought two years ago is worth half as much'. We can't raise it. We can't fix this, and we can't get insurance to cover it," said Perez.

With hurricane season approaching, Perez shared her concerns about the home's safety. "I'm on edge because it's hurricane season. I was a little bit more comfortable thinking we were going to elevate this," she said.



The denial came as a shock to Perez, who had been assured by confirmation numbers. "They pulled... I had my numbers, and by email, it was like, May, they pulled all the funding, and they're like, 'Oh, your status has changed.' How did my status change?" she said.

WINK News reporter Haley Zarcone has been in contact with Elevate Florida since August, seeking answers about the denial criteria. However, no answers have been provided. Perez expressed frustration with the lack of response from officials.

"It's all just words. If I hear Gov. DeSantis on a podium one more second, spouting off, (I say) do your job. Do your job, protect the people who voted for you," she said.

We are contacting you to inform you that pre-enrollment verification for the Marketplace's loss of Minimum Essential Coverage (MEC) Special Enrollment Period (SEP) will start on Friday, May 16, 2025.

If a consumer claims to have experienced or expects a loss of MEC and qualifies for a SEP, but our systems can't automatically verify this loss, they must provide documentation proving the loss or anticipated loss of coverage before using their plan.

A Special Enrollment Period Verification Issue (SVI) will occur when a plan is selected, requiring manual verification for the MEC loss. Consumers will have 30 days to submit the necessary documentation to resolve the SVI. If the SVI isn't resolved within this timeframe, the consumer won't be able to access their health coverage



HURRICANE WATCH ACTIONS (48 hours ahead)

Prepare as if the storm is headed directly for your home. Be ready for a Hurricane Warning within a few hours.

- · Fill your vehicle's gas tank.
- · Get cash and secure important papers and valuables.
- · Refill medications.
- Fill containers and tubs with water, even if evacuating
 you may need the water when you return.
- Secure yard equipment and furniture.
- Shutter your windows.
- If your plans are to evacuate the area, secure your home so you can leave as soon as an evacuation order is issued.
- If you plan to travel or be transported to a public shelter, be sure you have everything you need in your disaster bucket.

HURRICANE WARNING ACTIONS (36 hours ahead)

- Be prepared for an evacuation order to be issued.
- Stay tuned to local news and get your weather radio ready.
- Complete final preparations to evacuate or to shelter in your home.
- If your plan is to travel out of the local area and you can leave at this point, go.

WHEN A HURRICANE STRIKES

Prepare for the storm before the arrival of tropical force winds. When hurricanes move onto land, the heavy rain, strong winds, storm surge and crashing waves can damage buildings, trees, cars and other infrastructure.

HURRICANES HAVE TWO MAIN PARTS:

- The <u>eye</u> of the hurricane is an area of nearly calm winds in the center of the storm where the lowest pressure resides. The eye of a hurricane averages about 20 miles in diameter and often has very few clouds.
- The second part is the wall of very tall clouds that surrounds the relatively calm eye. This region, known as the <u>eye wall</u>, is where the hurricane's strongest winds and heaviest rain occur.

Silent Starts: The Power of a Few Quiet Minutes

Most of us have been in meetings where the same voices speak up right away, while others hesitate to jump in. One simple tool to balance this out is called a Silent Start. It means beginning the meeting with a few minutes of quiet reflection before anyone talks.

Why it works:

- Gives everyone, not just the "fast talkers," a chance to collect their thoughts.
- Helps people settle in and focus on the topic instead of whatever they were doing before the meeting.
- Reduces pressure for shy or quieter members who need time to think before speaking.
- Often leads to more thoughtful ideas, fewer repeats, and a stronger group discussion.

How to do it:

1. Frame it at the start. Say something like:

"Before we jump into discussion, let's take two minutes quietly to jot down our ideas about [the topic]. This way we'll hear from everyone, not just those who think quickly."

- 2. Set the time. Two to three minutes is usually enough. You can use a phone timer, a watch, or simply keep an eye on the clock.
- 3. Give a clear prompt. Examples:
- o "Write down one concern and one hope you have for this project."
- o "List two ideas you'd like the group to consider."
- 4. Move into sharing. After the quiet time, invite people to share what they wrote. This gives quieter participants a natural way to join in and makes the discussion feel more balanced.

Extra tips for success:

- Let people know they don't have to write in full sentences quick notes are fine.
- If the group is large, start with pairs or small groups before moving to the full group.
- Keep it consistent. The more often you use Silent Starts, the more comfortable the group becomes.

A Silent Start is simple, takes very little time, and makes a big difference. With just a few quiet minutes, you'll create space for everyone's voice to be heard and for more thoughtful meetings overall.

Florida legislators are considering mid-cycle redistricting to redraw Congressional maps outside of the regular redistricting cycle. Redistricting is intended to reflect population changes captured in the U.S. Census, every ten years. Conducting recycling between those periods breaks trust with communities and undermines the promise that every person's voice matters equally. Partisan gerrymandering is unconstitutional in Florida; maps must not be drawn with the intent to favor or disfavor any political party or incumbent. In addition, mid-cycle redistricting could divert millions of taxpayers' dollars and legislators' time away from issues affecting voters' deily lives such as housing costs, insurance, and infrastructure.

The League supports redistricting processes and enforceable standards that promote fair and effective representation at all levels of government with maximum opportunity for public participation. Fair maps should be created in a process that is transparent, community-driven, and consistent. Stability matters. When elected officials change the rules mid-decade, it is the public who loses representation and confidence in the system.

If Florida moves forward with mid-cycle redistricting, legislators should adhere to transparent, nonpartisan standards in compliance with US and Florida Constitutions and laws that protect voters and communities. Redistricting is a cornerstone of representative democracy. When done equitably and responsibly, it ensures that every person's voice carries equal weight. When done improperly, it silences voices, magnifies inequities, and undermines the very foundation of representative democracy that ensures a government that is responsive and accountable to the people. The redistricting process should follow the No Harm to Our Communities: Mapping Guidance for Elected Officials by the League of Women Voters. The League's public policy positions have been developed after study and member consensus; see Impact on Issues pages 44-48.

Oak Park Malted Waffles

INGREDIENTS

- 1 1/2 cups cake flour
- 2 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 3 tbsp malt powder
- 1/2 tsp kosher salt
- 3 large eggs
- 1/4 cup unsalted butter melted
- 1 1/2 cups whole milk

Cooking spray

INSTRUCTIONS-



If you are waffling for a crowd, preheat your oven to 150 F to keep waffles warm while they wait to be served.

Fire up your waffle iron (make it a mickey mouse waffle maker if your going for the full disney parks experience). This recipe is quick, and the fluffy egg whites won't stay aerated long, so make sure your waffle iron is ready in time!

Sift the dry ingredients (flour, baking powder, malt, and salt) into a large bowl. Set aside.

Separate the egg whites from the egg yolks. Place the yolks in a medium bowl and the whites in a separate bowl.

Add the melted butter and milk to the egg yolks and whisk to combine.

Pour the wet ingredients into the flour mixture and whisk to combine.

Use a hand mixer or some bicep muscles to whip the egg whites until soft peaks form.

Gently fold the egg whites into the egg yolk and flour mixture.

Spray your hot waffle iron with cooking spray and ladle in enough waffle batter (follow the instructions for your waffle maker on batter quantity) to make a waffle.

Eat immediately for optimum fluffy texture, or keep warm in the preheated oven.



FLOOD WATER SAFETY

Don't Drive In Flooded Areas

Drowning is a leading cause of storm related death. Turn around, don't drown!

- Always follow warnings about flooded roads.
- · Vehicles can be swept away or may stall in moving water.

Flood Waters Can be Contaminated with Bacteria and Viruses

Avoid skin contact with flood waters especially if you have open cuts and wounds.

- Do not wade through standing water. If you do, wash your body and put on clean clothes.
- If an open cut or wound comes into contact with flood waters, wash the area well with soap and clean water to prevent infection.
- If you are cut or have a puncture wound, get a tetanus booster.

Avoid eating, drinking or touching anything contaminated with flood waters.

Wash your hands with soap and clean water for 20 seconds.

If you are unsure if your tap water is safe, boil or disinfect it.

- Boiling tap water is the best way to kill harmful parasites, bacteria and viruses. The
 process is complete when the water is held at a rolling boil for at least one minute.
 Let the water cool before using.
- If boiling is not an option, disinfect tap water by adding eight drops of regular unscented household bleach (4 to 6 % strength)—this is about one-eighth teaspoon or a dime-sized puddle, per gallon of water. If a higher strength bleach is used (8.25 % strength), only add seven drops of bleach. Mix the solution and let it stand for 30 minutes. If the water is cloudy after 30 minutes, repeat the steps once.

ICE and local enforcement of immigration policies have escalated in Southwest Florida. Be aware of your rights.

WHAT TO DO WHEN YOUR LOVED ONE WAS PICKED UP BY ICE



First, report the raid!

Contact your local community organization if you have one and share the raid information. If you do not know of any organizations, you can report the raid to the Immigrant Defense Project (IDP) at 212-725-6422. Be ready to provide details about the raid.

Second, retrieve your loved one's information. It is important to have your loved one's complete name, date of birth, country of origin, and their A-Number if possible. An A-Number begins with an "A" and is followed by eight or nine digits. This is an identifying number issued by the Department of Homeland Security for anyone who has had contact with any immigration agency.

Q: WHAT HAPPENS IMMEDIATELY AFTER ICE DETAINS MY LOVED ONE?

A: If ICE arrests your loved one, they will first be taken to an ICE office for processing and then to a jail where they will be detained. Families will often get a call from their loved one a few hours after the arrest.

Q: HOW DO WE KNOW WHEN THE FIRST COURT DATE WILL BE?

A: If your loved one does NOT have an order of removal, in most cases they will be placed in removal proceedings, which means they can fight their case in front of an immigration judge while detained. You can find out when and where the court date will be by calling the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) Automated System at 1-800-898-7180 or by visiting EOIR's automated website: https://acis.eoir.justice.gov/en/.

Q: HOW WILL THEY GET A LAWYER?

Most detained people are unrepresented, because the U.S. government does not provide an immigration lawyer, even if the person cannot afford one. In New York, some detained non-citizens will be appointed an immigration attorney through the New York Immigrant Family Unity Project (NYIFUP) after their first court date but before their second court date. This program provides a free attorney to individuals who are detained and do NOT have a prior order of removal (see the information sheet on NYIFUP included on page 27). Important: if you hire

a private attorney before the first court date, you will be disqualified from NYIFUP, even if you cannot afford to pay that attorney in the future.

Q: SHOULD WE TALK TO AN IMMIGRATION ATTORNEY NOW?

A: If a loved one has an order of removal you should consult with an immigration attorney right away. It is important to determine whether the loved one already has a prior order of deportation because they will be at imminent risk of deportation and might need immediate attorney intervention.

Q: HOW LONG WILL THEY BE DETAINED?

A: If a loved one qualifies for a way to legally stop the deportation in court, they may be detained for many months and sometimes years, all while fighting their case. Under immigration law, some people qualify for a "bond hearing" within the first few months to try and fight their case from the outside while other people are not eligible. Even with a "bond hearing" many people will not be released or they may not be able to afford the bond amount set. Families should make financial plans in order to have money ready for bond and support themselves, for a potentially

long period of time, without their loved one's income.


Q: HOW CAN I VISIT THEM AND SEND THEM MONEY?

A: Each jail has different rules. Specific updated information can be found here: https://www.ice.gov/detention-facilities. In the following page you can find information for the most common detention centers.

Q: CAN WE PREPARE NOW WHILE WAITING FOR COURT?

As Yes. There are documents that the family can start to collect that may help. In addition, if the loved one had an ongoing obligation to report (maybe to criminal court to pay a fee, probation, a rehabilitative program, etc.), it is important to let the point of contact for that reporting know that your loved one is detained. This can be a long to do list- and a great way for organizers or community members to support the family through this process.





Be aware of organizations with copycat names or names similar to reputable organizations.

Be wary of new organizations that claim to aid victims of recent high-profile disasters.

Do your research. Use the Federal Trade Commission's resources to examine the track record of a charity.

Give using a check or credit card. If a charity or organization asks you to donate through cash, gift card, virtual currency, or wire transfer, it's probably a scam. Learn more about this trick from the FTC.

Practice good cyber hygiene:

Don't click links or open email attachments from someone you don't know.

Manually type out links instead of clicking on them.

Don't provide any personal information in response to an email, robocall, or robotext.

Check the website's address—most legitimate charity organization websites use .org, not .com.

After a natural disaster or other emergency, carefully vet any contractors before hiring them to work on your home or business.
