

Republican bill to dismantle Florida's MCORES toll roads project on fast track



(Abbreviated from the News Press, March 2, 2021)

While this is now month old news, I thought you'd like to compare it to any current action we discover on this massive road construction plan.


State Sen. Gayle Harrell's bill to repeal and defund the massive public works toll roads project known as MCORES is on the fast track toward approval.

The bill (SB 100)

is the first by a Republican to dismantle the signature piece of legislation pushed through by former Florida Senate President Bill Galvano, R-Bradenton.

Harrell, of Stuart, filed the bill Thursday and it is already on the Senate Transportation Committee's calendar for Wednesday. It has just one other committee stop — Appropriations — before it can go to a floor vote, suggesting it has been fast-tracked for approval.

The bill, however, could salvage two projects: The extension of Florida's Turnpike from where it ends at Wildwood, and turning U.S. 19 into a limited access parkway from its current terminus at Citrus County to Madison County. Senate President Wilton Simpson, R-Trilby, has said he supports the latter concept.



The cost of a year of Covid-19 pandemic relief seems

to be the primary reason for Senator Harrell to seek an end to the project.

Corps might consider removing most expensive piece of Lake Okeechobee Watershed Restoration Project



(Abbreviated from article by Katrina Elsken, Lake Okeechobee News)

Anything work or changes made to Lake Okeechobee and its watershed areas ultimately affects the Caloosahatchee River and all who live along its shores.

Could changes to the Lake Okeechobee Watershed Restoration Plan (LOWRP) cut costs and expedite the project while preserving most of the water storage capacity? At the Feb. 26 meeting of the County Coalition for the Responsible Management of Lake Okeechobee, St. Lucie and Caloosahatchee Estuaries and the Lake Worth Lagoon, Col. Andrew Kelly, of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, said the Corps plans to review how the project could work without the costliest component, the Wetland Attenuation Feature (WAF).

Water storage north of Lake Okeechobee is a key component of the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP). About 90% of the water (or more) that drains into the lake comes from the north, and due to the canals dug for flood control, it flows much faster than Mother Nature intended. The Lake Okeechobee Watershed Restoration Plan (LOWRP), part of the CERP, was designed to provide some of that storage.

LOWRP plans started in 2000, but the project was put on hold in 2006. Planning started again in 2016. The plan includes three features:

• A wetland attenuation feature (WAF): This shallow 13,000-acre impoundment will hold water up to about 4 feet deep during the wet season. The water would permeate into the earth as the lake level falls; this would not be water storage that would be available for use in the dry season.

• 80 aquifer storage and recovery (ASR) wells with a storage volume of approximately 448,000 acre-feet per year. Water stored in ASR wells can be pumped out and used when needed during dry periods.

• Wetland restoration in two areas on the Kissimmee River — Paradise Run (approximately 3,600 acres) and Kissimmee River Center (approximately 1,200 acres).

Plans also call for public recreation sites in the WAF and wetland restoration sites.

Kelly said they hope to have Congressional approval in time to include LOWRP in the 2022 Water Resources Development Act (WRDA). Congress can pass a WRDA every two years, but has sometimes gone as long as seven years between WRDAs. Congress passed a WRDA for 2020. LOWRP authorization will not take funding away from other authorized CERP projects such as the Everglades Agricultural Area (EAA) reservoir. The corps follows the CERP Integrated Delivery Schedule (IDS) and the EAA reservoir is ahead of LOWRP on the IDS.



What will happen to Lee Civic Center? Kitson & Partners proposes to demolish the 42-year-old building, redevelop the 100-acre property

The Lee County Fair in southwestern Florida has been a staple of the Lee County Civic Center for many years.

Tonia Johnson-Green fears this will disappear.

On Friday, the county's evaluation committee approved two different proposals for the Civic Center: converting the area into a hotel and retail space, or improving an existing building to maintain the status quo.

Both proposals are currently sent to the county's evaluation committee. Lee County Commissioner Brian Haman said he supported plans to restore the civil center. He emphasized that the county has a long way to go to make a decision.

"Our small neighborhood is as perfect as it is now," said Johnson Green. "That's part of the reason I moved to where I moved and I love where I live."

She lives behind the Lee Civic Center. If a developer gets lost, Johnson-Green is worried about what will happen next.

Kitson and Partners, the developer of Babcock Ranch, wants to turn 100 acres of land at the Lee Civic Center into a retail space hotel. This means knocking down the current facility.

Meanwhile, Fair wants to keep the land as it is by making long-awaited improvements to the current civic center.

"I need to get rid of my animals, that is, I get out of this state, that is, I don't live here anymore, and my family doesn't live," Johnson Green said.

Mike Peak, chairman of the Southwest Florida Lee County Fair Board, said his group has a good track record of maintaining facilities.

"We want to keep doing this for everyone," Peak said.

More than a dozen people who attended the public rally said they wanted to keep the civic center as it is.

"I don't want to see the fair go. This is the last small part of the old culture of southwestern Florida," said Amanda Cochrane of Aruba. "Give it love. Just because something new happens, don't break it, pay attention to what's there.".

Today, they both still work to keep busy doing what they want to do, not what they have to do.







Charleston Park History

Community Foster Parents-Charles and Katherine Shields/Grand Foster Parents

Love is an action word! Charles and Katherine Shields were perfect examples of "love" for fostering youth in the Charleston Park Community. As pastors and respected community representatives, the Mr. And Mrs. Shields changed the future of many youth who were abandoned by families or who were wards of the courts for various reasons from the early 1960's until the passing of Charles Shields in April 2013.

Charles and Katherine ensured that the youth in their care attended schools and church. As foster parents they made certain the youth were respected, loved, cared for and well dressed. The youth served by the

Shields were well received by the Charleston Park community members because of the values instilled by the Shields in the children they raised. They taught the youth how to be productive members of society. The Shields have touched many generations and deserve much honor for making a difference in the lives of foster-care children.

A bit of ALVA History

Thanks to Joanne Iwinski Miller who has provided us with some of her research of the Alva area to share with all of us. She has an album of photos and stories of her research on Alva in the historical document library at the Lee County Courthouse where she is Historical Document Specialist II and Local Historian. Please stop in to look it over when the courthouse opens to the public again.

The Buckingham Palace (Buckingham Bar)

A fine man from Montreal packed up his family in 1957 and headed to Miami Florida. Ignace



Stefanowski, a widower, was happy to leave the cold weather in the north and settle in the south. But Miami was not to his liking and he found his way to a little community called Buckingham in Lee County, Florida.

Ignace paid \$80,000 for 20 acres of land where he decided to build a bar he named the "Buckingham Palace". The 20 acres was a working orange grove in 1958 when the land was purchased. David Borland was the man decades ago that owned and planted this citrus grove. The area for the bar was cut out of the grove and built in 1959.

From 1959 to 1963 the bar's clientele were employees of Sunland Training Center, the Quarter Milers (drag racers) and of course the Buckingham locals. On any given day you could go there and the place would be packed.

Not everyone in Buckingham was happy about a bar being out there. But it

became a hangout for many and there was not much else to do back then. The Buckingham Palace was the only spot for folks to gather for a drink, a chance meeting for romance or a place to spend the evening.

I am only guessing this as a writer but I am sure the hookups were many and the fights were as common as the cows mooing in the fields nearby.

Ignace Stefanowski sadly passed away in 1963 and his son Paul took over the bar and life at the Buckingham Palace continued.

Al Rivard aka Squeaky was a regular customer and still is today (2020) at the bar and I had the opportunity to sit down and hear some of his stories

Squeaky met his first wife in the bar around 1963. Her parents were Wimpy and Daisy Dawson, regulars that loved to dance. They would bring their 17 year old attractive daughter and prop her up on a bar stool while they would cut a rug on the dance floor. Squeaky noticed her and asked her to dance. The romance started there for the 22 year old Squeaky and later they were married.

At one point Paul Stefanowski was going to build a Motel behind the bar. Customers referred to it as it being a No-Tell Motel. The foundation was set but the locals found out and halted the motel from

being built. They certainly did not think it would be a good idea for the community to have a motel behind a bar!

Originally the bar had three front doors in addition to the bar being split for a BBQ area, the bar and a sundries store according to Tommy Lee Cook. But one day someone that had a little too much to drink drove his car into the north door. Today there is only two doors on the building.

Hank Hendry recalls a memory of the Buckingham Bar. A group of shrimpers were at the bar drinking one day and shooting pool with each other. A pool hustler was in there and challenged the group to several games. He won all their money and one of the girlfriends or wives (Hank was unsure which) was not happy about that. She went out and got a shot gun, came back in, pointed the gun at the hustler and demanded all the shrimpers money back he had won. The pool hustler handed it all over.

Pam Reilly recalls: My mother worked there in the 1960s. My brother and I used to play behind the bar while mother was working. One night a woman came into the bar while my mother was working and started firing a shot gun at her husband. Fortunately no one was hit.

Denise Pinkston Sullivan recalls: My mother Patricia Pinkston worked at the Buckingham Bar for years. She met Herbert Sapp there, they got married in 1982 and were together until the day she died.

Good looking Paul Stefanowski owned the bar from 1963 to 2002 and then he sold it to Tommy Lee Cook. Today Paul is living in Honduras according to his sister.

Fast forward to 2020, the Buckingham Palace is now known as The World Famous Buckingham Blues



Bar. Tommy Lee Cook is actually the man that put it on the map. People from all over drive out to Buckingham to hear famous musicians or locals sing. Tommy Lee being one of them. He has made it successful not only by renovating the bar and the property but by putting his heart and soul into the place. A contractor, singer, writer and a historical preservationist, Lee County is lucky to have him.

Today (11-28-2020) at 2pm behind the bar you can go and listen to blues, have a beer and possibly meet your future wife or husband. Life goes on at the Buckingham Bar....

21 years later, after the nation has been through , and is still going through, several wars and still is

Helmets: For all ages, at all times



Bicycling has become an important means of transportation for both adults and children in Lee County. Helmets are an essential part of being on a bicycle (or any kind of wheels, such as skates, skateboards and scooters); it has been documented that wearing a helmet can save a life.

But, you say, "I don't need to wear a bicycle helmet; I'm only riding in my community." Would you rather have a messed-up hairdo or brain damage? Many bicyclists think that just because they're biking in their own community, it's not necessary to wear a helmet – they feel they're invincible.

But crashes happen when least expected, and can occur riding around your home just as often as if you were on a long ride or going to work. There are bumps in the streets (or sidewalks) and an individual, no matter how experienced he or she is, can take a bad tumble! That helmet that wasn't needed might be the reason the person survives the tumble.

Helmets should not be purchased or obtained just because the adult or child likes the color or shape! They must be fitted to the individual who will be wearing it. It's also important that the helmet is worn properly; an improperly fitted or worn helmet is like no helmet at all.

Helmets need to be replaced periodically, especially for children as they grow and their heads increase in size. Bicycle helmets have an expiration date, typically five years after date of manufacture, tied to how the materials used in making the helmet can break down over time. Also, be careful in accepting a used helmet – and never purchase a helmet that's been involved in a crash.

Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital recommends the following five steps in the proper procedure for fitting and wearing a bicycle helmet:

• The helmet should be level on the head.

• You should be able to place one or two fingers on the forehead between the bottom of the helmet and the eyebrow.

- The front and back straps should be equally tight and meet a "V" just below the ears.
- You should be able to fit one or two fingers between the chin and the chin strap.
- A proper fitting helmet will not move on your head.

A helmet worn at the back of the head won't protect the bicyclist's head (and brain); it must cover the front part of the forehead. Also the helmet should not be work over something else (such as a baseball cap).

NOTE: Motorcyclists in Florida are especially vulnerable to traffic mishaps.

INTERNET VEHICLE SALE FRAUD

While purchasing a new or pre-owned vehicle online has become a common and popular practice, so has online vehicle sale fraud!

The truck looks immaculate...just what you have been looking for! Low mileage, original owner, no accidents...a dream come true! The price, based upon mileage and condition, seems incredible.

Great deals on cars and trucks do exist. Many online vehicle purchasers swear by the process and have found incredible bargains on the internet. But everything that glitters is not gold.

Criminals regularly post false advertisements and photographs of vehicles that are not for sale and usually belong to someone else. You will receive additional photos, upon request, along with a heart-wrenching story of why they need to sell their beloved vehicle at a bargain price.

"It was Aunt Tilly's favorite...rest her soul!" "I received it as part of a divorce settlement and have no use for it." "My brother is being deployed overseas and the car will just be sitting here."

Often, criminals use reputable companies to initially lure you in...such as eBay, Facebook Marketplace or other online selling sites...leading the buyer to believe that the deal is legitimate.

This is when the transaction begins to go sideways. You may be sent a third-party toll-free number, asked to pay with gift cards or asked to wire money. You may be asked to send a small amount, to serve as a deposit, to ensure that it isn't sold to someone else.

Exercise extreme caution! Ask for the vehicle identification number (VIN) and current license plate information. Insist on inspecting the vehicle IN PERSON prior to purchase. Inspect title and lien information prior to making any payment or deposit.

Over a three-year period, the FBI has received nearly 30,000 complaints of fraudulent vehicle sales exceeding \$57,000,000. Don't be the next victim!

A library in the northeast county will undergo a complete renovation, including creating new spaces for adults, teens and children. Commissioners approved the design contracts for the planned \$2.5 million renovation of the branch library in Buckingham. The county bought that building a couple of years ago and will make improvements that track some of the current trends in library usage.

Riverdale library, which serves much of the northeast county, will see improvements that have become commonplace in modern library design, such as designated areas for teens and, separately, for younger children. 

Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services launches a bilingual vaccine education campaign

(abbreviated text from original article)

Tallahassee, Fla. – With the COVID-19 vaccine becoming available for at-risk populations in Florida, Agriculture Commissioner Nikki Fried and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services today launched a bilingual vaccine education campaign to encourage COVID-19 vaccination among Florida's farmworkers and agriculture community.

A recent study found that food and agricultural workers are among those most at risk of death from COVID-19, facing a 39 percent increase in excess mortality during the pandemic, the highest of all sectors studied – including a 59 percent increase for Hispanic/Latino food and agriculture workers. Farmworkers are also more susceptible to respiratory diseases like COVID-19 and frequently lack health coverage. Commissioner Fried has strongly advocated that the Governor include farmworkers and agriculture personnel in the critical infrastructure category of the vaccine rollout's next phase.

The education campaign, created in partnership with the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS), includes a safety video featuring Commissioner Fried and the Centro Campesino Farmworker Center, printable materials, and events available in both English and Spanish. The campaign toolkit can be downloaded here.

"Florida's farmworkers are critical to a safe, healthy domestic food supply upon which 150 million Americans rely to feed their families," said Commissioner Nikki Fried. "That's why we're encouraging Florida's farmworkers and agriculture community to get the COVID-19 vaccine as soon as it's available to them. Getting the vaccine will not only help farmworkers stay safe, but their communities as well. I thank UF/IFAS, Centro Campesino, and others for helping spread the word about these life-saving vaccines to some of our most susceptible essential workers."

My Covid Story



My husband and I were exposed to coronavirus by members of our family. This is The Rest of the Story.

I went to the CenturyLink Stadium on Daniels Parkway and Six Mile Cypress to get a FREE covid test (www.curative.com). There are 2 tests they use: the 15-minute antigen test and the 2-day PCR test.

Here are my TEST RESULTS

	15-minute test	2-day test
Monday MARCH 15	negative	positive
Wednesday March 17	negative	negative

So, I had 1 out of 4 positive tests. It is possible to have a false positive test.

Knowing we were exposed, my husband and I began gargling with Betadine (povidone iodine), even before I had a positive test. I heard a doctor talk about gargling to help prevent this virus from replicating, last year on the news. Gargling is a common hygiene measure in Japan and East Asia.

Does gargling explain why my Wednesday test came back negative? Does it explain why my Monday headache disappeared as quick as it came and I had no further covid symptoms? I believe I was starting with the virus and the gargling killed the virus. If someone only gets a small amount of the virus, they may not feel sick, but if someone gets a large amount of the virus, they may be very sick...thus the term VIRAL LOAD.

Betadine is a topical antiseptic that has been shown to kill the coronavirus after 30 seconds of gargling. There is some literature from around the world regarding this practice. There are currently trials being done at the National Institutes of Health as well.

The caveat here is that folks can be allergic to iodine. It can stain anything including teeth if not careful. Also, the 10% topical solution is Not for oral use.



Betadine does sell an Antiseptic Mint Sore Throat Gargle but it is a new product and difficult to find, unless you order it online. I did not have the luxury of time so I diluted the topical solution with more than 10 parts water to 1 part Betadine. We used a glass measuring cup and glass cups and was very careful with it. We gargled 4 times a day for a few days being careful not to swallow the product.

So that's my story and I'm sticking with it!
